We hosted a very successful and unique Open House program on Tuesday, March 17, 2015 to introduce our newest four Technical Career Pathways and Academies. This event was attended by our community partners including Monrovia City Council Member, Becky

Shevlin, District Superintendent, Dr. Katherine Thorossian, District Administrative Cabinet, Board President, Ed Gililland, Canyon Oaks/Mtn. Park parents, staff, and students as well as Monrovia Community Adult School staff and students.

Our new Pathway Academies were introduced to this group for the first time through a series of short, interactive workshops. The new pathways are:

- Construction Engineering Academy
- Medical Services Academy
- Media Arts Academy
- Performing Arts Academy

Each pathway leads to either a certification for immediate employment, or includes intended coursework for Community College or a four year University degree. Students will be asked to select a pathway or academy as they enter our schools beginning in the Fall of 2015.

Thank you for including School News among your reading choices. Our next issue is September 9th. Have a wonderful summer!



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
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# Celebrating Our Community


The reason that I personally love this time of year is all of the acknowledgements that we give to our selfless volunteers. Each PTA celebrates

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

## And the Silver Medal Goes to...Plymouth Elementary!!!

For the last fifteen years, Plymouth school has participated in the Los Angeles County Science Olympiad. This year was the 29th Annual Los Angeles County Science Olympiad which took place on February 28th at Occidental College in Eagle Rock. There are 188 schools that participate in the Science Olympiad. Of the 188, only 67 are elementary schools. The students are expected to participate in twenty events. Some of these events are "Crime Busters", "Egg Drop", "Mystery Architecture", "Name the Scientist", "Tennis Ball Catapult", "Weather or Not" and "Starry Starry

Night". The Science Olympiad Team is comprised of 15 students who compete in teams of two. Teams receive points for the completion of tasks ranging from 15 – 35 points. Plymouth earned 505 points placing them in the silver category. The students were recognized and celebrated at the March 11, 2015, Monrovia Unified School District Board of Education meeting. Teachers Susan Sauvageau and Jeff Crowell commented, "They (the students) worked really hard and took it seriously. It was obvious, they had fun too." Next year, we are going for the Gold!


## Arts for All!


