The mission of the Monrovia Unified School District is to inspire students to engage in meaningful learning within a safe and nurturing environment that embraces diversity.

We want to embolden students to be ethical, productive members and leaders of our community. For those reasons, we invest in the growth of our students both academically and socio-emotionally.

While test scores are just one measure of student success, it is one that gauges their academic growth and allows for a comparison to their peers throughout the state. According to the new state report, Monrovia Unified students, in almost every cohort, have shown consistent gains in both English Language Arts (ELA) and math over the past three years. This is best reflected by 75 percent of Monrovia High School 11th-graders meeting or exceeding ELA standards, as compared to the state average of 59.76 percent. We attribute this success to three factors: teacher expertise, finely honed by a rich professional development series; student effort, fostered by the support of caring adults on campus; and parent partnerships, supplementing the work in school. Thanks to these pillars, Monrovia Unified students are afforded ever-greater opportunities to ensure they flourish in their endeavors outside of school—including in college and their chosen careers.



Our “whole child” approach to learning has also led to some changes in our facilities and operations. The Wellness Center at Monrovia High School is a remarkable example of our investment in the social and emotional well-being of our students. Offering students and their families mental health support, counseling, and tutoring, the facility serves as a quiet place for students to decompress and obtain the support they need. Indeed, it

has become such a model program that Congresswoman Grace Napolitano has asked Susan Hirsch, the lead architect of this program, to present at the Mental Health Consortium of the San Gabriel Valley.

Thank you for your continued contributions to our schools. With them, we are able to provide not only the ordinary, but the extraordinary to our scholars.

Monrovia High School is celebrating some outstanding scholars! Senior Nathan Nakamura has been selected as a National Merit Scholar semifinalist for earning a high score on his Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test (PSAT), placing him in the top 1 percent of high school seniors across the nation. Nathan earned a 1500 out of a possible 1520 PSAT score.

The National Merit Scholarship Corp., established in 1955, honors exceptional American youths and encourages them in achieving their goals and aspirations. Students apply through a combination of PSAT scores, academic record and extracurricular achievements.

The pool of 1.6 million students across the U.S. is narrowed to 15,000 semifinalists who received top PSAT scores. Finalists—the top 7,500 seniors—will be announced in February. National Merit Scholars receive one of three scholarships: a \$2,500 National Merit Scholarship Corp. scholarship, a corporate-sponsored scholarship or a college-sponsored scholarship.

Five Monrovia High students were recognized as Commended Scholars, scoring in the top 34,000 seniors across the U.S.: Alexandra Feldman, Valerie Flores, Ishika Muchal, Benjamin Tang and Max Young. Three Monrovia High students earned a place in the National Hispanic Recognition Program, scoring among the top 2.5 percent of the Hispanic/Latino population across the states: Rebecca De La O, Valerie Flores and Gabriel Lujan.

The children at CELC began their study of balls by answering the questions "What do we know about balls? and What do we want to find out?" They engaged in shared writing activities in which they compared and described different types, textures, sizes and weights of balls. Hypothesized which balls would bounce high and which would roll. As they tested their ideas, they tallied and charted, counted and compared. They discovered that some balls are hollow and some are solid, some you eat (meatballs) and some are tools (wrecking balls). They played with letter sounds when they sang songs such as "Bouncing big brown balls" or had fun with tongue twisters "A big bug bit the beetle...". Yet, the best part of all was playing ball.

Blood On the River



The Only Road





The only way Angela and Jamie can escape is to leave Guatemala, and that might be harder than it seems. Train hopping, refugee churches, immigration officials, and lost dogs are all part of their journey, and hopefully they can make it to the other side. The U.S. is promising safety, but the road to get there isn't.

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
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
