being selected as our 2018 Classified Employees of the Year. We are proud to have them part of Team Los Al!


# The Leaders of Los Al

## Knowing Congenital Heart Disease Signs Can Save a Child's Life

Congenital heart disease is a defect or malformation of the heart or its associated blood vessels that forms in a developing baby. Depending on the specific defect, symptoms can appear right away or later in life.

Common signs and symptoms include:

- Abnormal Heart Murmurs – commonly heard during an annual checkup
- Labored breathing – especially with activity and in a baby during feeding
- Growth Abnormalities– not gaining weight or growing appropriately, when feeding well
- Blue skin or lips – nail beds or lips can turn blue, especially during crying
- Extreme fatigue – tiring quickly or easily; racing of the heart during physical activity
- Swelling in the legs, abdomen or areas around the eyes is a late finding that can be seen in chronic heart failure

When a non-critical congenital heart defect goes untreated, it can put undue strain on the heart and body which can lead to organ failure and ultimately lead to death. Being aware of the potential warning signs of a congenital heart defect can save your child's life.

## CERT Classes Starting

The City of Seal Beach, the Seal Beach Police Department, and the West County CERT team will be hosting a free Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training class. CERT educates people in disaster preparedness for events that may impact their area and provides basic disaster response skills. Using the training, CERT members can assist others in their neighborhood or workplace following an event when professional responders are not immediately available to help. CERT members are encouraged to support emergency response agencies by taking a more active role in projects in their community. WEST COUNTY CERT is comprised of those who live and/or work in Buena Park, Cypress, La Palma, Los Alamitos, Seal Beach and Westminster plus their attached communities.

The 20-hour FEMA-approved course includes training in Disaster Preparedness, Medical Operations, Light Search and Rescue, Fire Suppression, Team Organization and Disaster Psychology.

Training will be held at the Joint Forces Training Base—Building 244, 11200 Lexington Drive, Los Alamitos, CA 90720. The training schedule will be comprised of two weekend training sessions;

- Friday, March 16th, 2018 from 6:00 pm to 9:00 pm
- Saturday March 17th, 2018 from 8:00 am to 5:00 pm
- Friday, March 23rd, 2018 from 6:00 pm to 9:00 pm
- Saturday March 24th, 2018 from 8:00 am to 5:00 pm

## Guilty of Distracted Driving?

In 2013, nationally 3,154 people were killed and an estimated 424,000 were injured in vehicle crashes involving distracted drivers. Distracted Driving is driving a vehicle while engaging in any activity that diverts attention from driving; especially texting and cell phone use. Following are other facts from a survey that show how dangerous Distracted Driving can be. In 2016, more than 54% of California drivers stated they had been hit or nearly hit by a driver who was talking/texting on a cell phone. In 2016, 10% of drivers, under the age of 20, involved in fatal crashes were reported as distracted at the time of impact. Also in 2016, “5 seconds” is the average time your eyes are off the road while texting. When traveling at 55 mph, it’s enough time to cover the length of a football field blindfolded.

Here are few reminders to keep yourself safe on the road. Never ever text and drive. Turn off your phone before getting behind the wheel. Don’t text or call someone when you know they’re likely driving. Don’t eat or drink while driving. Don’t program any devices such as GPS while driving. If a phone call or text message is necessary, pull over to a safe parking spot. If something falls onto the floorboard of the vehicle, pull over to a safe parking spot.

Lastly, California laws prohibit cell phone and electronic wireless device usage among any driver, except for a valid emergency. Any driver under the age of 18 cannot use a cell phone or any other electronic wireless device at all; including hand-held, hands-free, Bluetooth, speaker phone, or any other means.

### Project Lead the Way

Students at Lee engage in the Project Lead the Way (PLTW) computer-science modules every week in the media center. The lessons empower students to develop and apply skills to solve real-world problems, think critically and creatively, communicate, and collaborate.

First- and second-graders use an iPad app called Scratch Jr. to write their own programs to tell stories and create games. Third-graders

use math skills and explore patterns in programming to create arcade-style games using an iPad app called Hopscotch. Fourth-graders are learning how computers store and process data. They use an application called Tynker to learn basic

programming concepts, including sequencing, repetitions, conditionals, events, functions and variables, to create their own interactive games. ### Super Students

At LAE, our students are learning to ignite their super power of reading in Learning Lab Reading Intervention. LAE's reading intervention is phonics-based, and it focuses on phonological awareness, letter knowledge, letter sounds/spelling patterns, and guided reading with reading strategies.

Our students are being taught multiple strategies to help tackle tricky words during their reading. These strategies are the bedrock of reading proficiency. Our

super readers are also learning to use these effective strategies on their own, which gains them confidence and independence.

The Learning Lab is a data-driven intervention. Our intervention teachers assess students every day, which creates a flexible learning environment where both teaching and learning can grow together. We are currently in Session 2 now, and are servicing 76 students in the kindergarten through third grade. The majority of the work is being done in kindergarten and first grade.







### Rise, Shine, #Woke—Alphabet Rockers

"We want to grow children to shape the country," said the creators of Rise, Shine, #Woke. Grow, not mold them into the mainstream. Woke



is an African American Vernacular English term that means to be connected, to not be placated, to think for oneself, and to not remain 'cool' but ever active in social justice. That's the substance of Rise, Shine, Woke.

This is the weightiest, most powerful collection I can remember reviewing. The no-fooling lyrics deal with resolving conflicting messages, persevering and celebrating differences instead of subscribing to the ideal of everyone being equal.

"It's easy to say that we're all the same and that for the most part, we're equal. That's not what we see..." sing the artists on "Turn on the Light." This is a "woke moment" for anyone who is or feels "different" in culture, race or nationality or as an outsider. It's also discussion material for all children, no matter the experiences or culture.

The catchy "I'm Proud" goes beyond simple comfort in one's skin. "The Nitro" gets you moving as the lyrics fly right by. You'll want to download those lyrics from the link provided with the CD—you'll need them!

The music is interspersed with conversational raps by children and inspirational dialogue from President Barack Obama, Maya Angelou and other African American guiding lights. The songs themselves could be thought of as the spirituals of the 21st century; like spirituals, they're composed for jumping up, shouting out, and ultimately moving in a positive direction.


### **Soldier Boy**

### **A Ghost Story**


