Reading is Fun!

The Canyon Early Learning Center celebrated the months of January and February by working on our instructional focus of “Developing Language and Reasoning Skills.”

The CELC instructional staff recently attended a professional development that centered on how to best develop language and reasoning skills in the classroom setting. We have implemented an instructional practice called “Language Dance” that is being infused into our daily instructional practice. CELC staff are also using language and reasoning development techniques during their staff-to-student interactions.

With the emphasis on language and reasoning, CELC recently celebrated Dr. Seuss’ birthday in the preschool classrooms by having volunteer readers visit and read to our students. The students also performed thematic activities such as Dr. Seuss art projects, storytelling, small- and large-group reading activities, and Dr. Seuss-related indoor and outdoor games.



The teachers also tied Dr. Seuss into our Creative Curriculum Unit on the study of clothing. Our students really enjoyed Dr. Seuss Day at CELC because it made reading and language acquisition fun!

Coding Program

The Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Math (STEAM) program at Clifton Middle School is really heating up with a new three-year course sequence that allows students to develop skills and unleash their creativity with coding and robotics.

In sixth grade, students build personal websites using HTML, code small games using code.org and learn to drive and program VEX IQ robots to conquer various challenges. In seventh grade, students build on that foundation, creating more advanced games and modifying their robots to tackle more difficult challenges. In eighth grade, students create polished, arcade-style games using Scratch, make commercial quality two- and three-dimensional games with Unity, and control hardware devices using JavaScript and the Adafruit Circuit Playground.

Courses are self-paced, with specific goals, instructional videos, and teacher support. Students with prior coding skills can accelerate and plug into the course that's right for them. Clifton is proud of this flourishing program!

Fortunately, we do know the way to encourage readers of any age: Keep books in the house, set aside daily reading time, and read yourself. For teens specifically, it may help to tap into whatever they're passionate about. From music and fashion to video games and the Victorian era, if you can name it, there's a book about it.

In a world filled with entertaining diversions, it can be difficult for teens to find reading material that really motivates them to read. Check our reviews (you can sort our book reviews by age, genre, and topic).

Here are some more ideas:


- **Try an ereader.** Ereaders offer your teen a bit more independence, flexibility, and privacy. And they're great for travel.

Timmy Grows Up

Timmy Failure It's the End When I say It's the End by Stephan Pastis

This is the 7th and last book of the *Timmy Failure* series. Timmy and his imaginary polar bear named Total (T. Failure + Total = Total Failure of Total Failure Inc. Detective Agency) take on a task of solving the world's problems and defeating crime. Timmy also has to do routine things like writing a script for his class project. But then a new student takes over the show and ruins Timmy's vision of Greatness. The script gets stolen and more Christmas shenanigans follow.



I liked these book series because despite it's ridiculous, over-the-top narration by Timmy, you can see he's just a young kid with great imagination, producing action-packed scenarios, which help him escape the harsh reality of struggles — like getting a new step-dad, finding his real dad and trying to get him to participate in his life, and not realizing his aunt, with whom he and his mom lived during hard times, is dying. But in the end Timmy grows up and lets go of his imaginary sidekick Total by helping him find his long-lost brother and releasing Total to the Arctic. This book is definitely 5 out of 5 stars.
