Welcome Back to School!

While our families were enjoying some beautiful southern California weather this summer, Newport-Mesa Unified School District facilities and maintenance crews were hard at work to ensure clean, safe and beautiful facilities for students return

Maintenance Work

Every year, maintenance and operations cleans and maintains more than two million

square feet of building space and 13 million square feet of landscape and turf. This summer, they performed critical work at the school sites, including:

- Deep clean classrooms and carpets
- Replace carpet and flooring
- Repaint interior and exterior walls
- Seal coat and repair asphalt
- Repair concrete and sidewalks
- Restripe parking lots
- Field renovations
- Replace playground wood chips with synthetic turf
- General maintenance repairs and inspections
- Preventative roof maintenance
- Preventive maintenance of air conditioning equipment

Air Conditioning

Additional work this summer included the installation of Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning (HVAC) at seven schools. It is anticipated that all schools will have HVAC by 2021.

Special Projects

• Energy Efficient Lighting

Our district partnered with Southern California Edison (SCE) and their School Energy Efficiency Program to replace fluorescent lighting with energy efficient light-emitting diode (LED) lighting. This program provides more than \$700,000 in incentives from SCE and an anticipated annual electricity savings of more than \$100,000.

• Corona del Mar High School

Sports Fields Upgrade: Renovation of the two sports fields at Corona del Mar High School is underway and includes the two lighted synthetic sports fields (one with a rubber track), bleachers for seating for up to 664 spectators, scoreboards, fencing, gates and improved pathways. It is anticipated that the project will be complete by 2020 graduation.

• Estancia High School: 50 Meter Pool

Construction is currently underway for the installation of a new 50 meter pool and support facilities at Estancia High School. The two-phased project includes construction of the pool itself (currently under construction) and the additional improvements, such as locker rooms, concessions and surrounding spaces.

Newport Beach Public Library (NBPL) welcomes community members to enhance their technological literacy at Digital Saturday on Saturday, November 16, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., at the Central Library, 1000 Avocado Avenue, Newport Beach.

Digital Saturday will showcase the library's digital resources, as well as provide

opportunities for exploring the Media Lab, Sound Lab and Tech Toys available for loan. Newport Beach Police Department representatives will give a presentation on internet safety.

Library staff will be available to introduce customers to the NBPL's eBranch and demonstrate how to download eBooks and magazines to mobile devices, and access valuable research materials. A current library card and Google or Apple ID password is needed for one-on-one instruction on downloading eBooks and magazines to personal mobile devices.

The NBPL will host the Digital Bookmobile as part of the event. The 42-foot-long traveling exhibit provides devices, internet connectivity and expert guidance to the local library's digital collection of eBooks and audiobooks.

Vehicle Fire Safety

A lot of us drive in our vehicles never thinking we can be the victim of a vehicle fire. Your Newport Beach Firefighters would like to share safety tips on preventing vehicle fires and how to act safely if you are the victim of this type of an emergency.

To prevent a vehicle fire:

- Have your car serviced regularly by a trained mechanic.
- Keep gas cans or propane tanks away from passengers and upright. Drive with the windows down for ventilation.
- Address recalls with dealers as soon as possible.

If your vehicle catches fire:

- Pull over as quickly as you can and safely.
- Once you have stopped, turn off the engine.
- Get everyone out of the car. Never return to a burning car.
- If you think there is a fire under the hood or trunk, do not open it. This could cause the fire to grow.
- Move everyone at least 100 feet from the fire and well away from traffic.
- Call 911

Mastering Menopause

Menopause is a normal stage of life for women when the ovaries stop making the female hormone, estrogen, which helps control the menstrual cycle. According to the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecology, the average age that women go through menopause is 51, but many women begin to skip periods in their 40s. This is a sign of perimenopause, when the amount of estrogen begins to fluctuate and changes in the menstrual cycle start to occur leading to lighter or heavier periods. Menopause is considered a full year without a period indicating the end of a woman's reproductive years. Symptoms of perimenopause and menopause include:

- hot flashes
- · sleep problems
- night sweats
- · vaginal and urinary tract changes

Hormone replacement therapy can help relieve these symptoms, but it's important to discuss benefits and risks with your doctor. Following menopause, women lose bone density more rapidly, due to lower levels of estrogen. This increases their risk of osteoporosis, which increases the risk of bone fractures.

To stay healthy during and after menopause, these three habits are your best bet:

- Eating a balanced diet with calcium and vitamin D to maintain strong bones
- Getting regular exercise to help slow down bone loss, including weight-bearing activities, such as walking and strength training
- Getting routine health care exams and tests
- · Limit stress

The preschool program carefully integrates teacher directed instruction with



Our new library has many programs this fall.



There were many accomplishments to celebrate. Over 43 percent of our student body earned the Principal's Honor Roll award last semester with a 3.5 or higher unweighted academic GPA. We also had a school-wide GPA of 3.26 during the last

school year, which is an all-time high percentage for ECHS. Almost 55 percent of our returning student body also earned the California Scholarship Federation Award.



On the heels of earning both the 2019 California Distinguished School and California Honor Roll Awards this past spring, it was officially announced earlier this month that ECHS was now a 2019 PLATINUM Level PBIS (Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports) School!

This is our first time in receiving this designation, after reaching the Bronze level

the last two years. The Platinum PBIS Implementation Award is a reflection of excellence in our efforts to implement the core features of PBIS, which are promoting positive student behaviors and providing social emotional learning experiences.


