2019 State of the City

On January 15th, I delivered my fifth State of the City address and was delighted to report the state of our city is strong and getting stronger.

As an educator, I know the best economic development and anti-poverty tool is access to a quality education. That is why I strongly believe that there is no better investment than in preschool and early childhood education.

Four years ago, I set a goal to provide universal preschool in Long Beach. While Long Beach Unified and other providers have served hundreds of additional preschool students, we still have more work to do to close the gap.

As a member of Governor Gavin Newsom’s transition team, I am confident we are close to a state and local solution for a major expansion of pre-k. In fact, just last week, Governor Newsom called for universal preschool for all eligible four-year olds.

I’m proud to share we recently opened a new Educare Center at Barton Elementary in North Long Beach. This new pre-k and early childhood center is now the largest early education center in the city, offering high-quality care to about 200 infants and toddlers.

In addition, our Health Department worked with the Early Childhood Education Committee and the Mayor’s Fund for Education to develop one of the most comprehensive citywide early childhood education plans in the state.

We took many more exciting steps including: banning Styrofoam, expanding our Clean Team to keep our streets clean, and the Long Beach Airport embarked on a plan to become the most sustainable airport in the nation. I’m proud the Port of Long Beach continues to be recognized as one of the greenest seaports in the world.

Now honestly, as a parent who has to figure out potentially how to get two kids to two different schools in opposite ends of Long Beach, the concept of a local high school that they have to go to with no choice is rather appealing. But LBUSD understands that the job market today is more competitive and difficult than the job markets of years past. If our students can begin to develop their passions and career choices in high school, I believe it will make their trajectory of college and future employment easier. Parents of 7th graders – when your son or daughter (or both as in my case) get to 8th grade, encourage them to fully explore all the high schools in Long Beach. Take the time to take them to the open houses, attend the fair and sign them up for Shadow Days. You will be putting them squarely onto the path of success in adulthood.

Inspiring Student

My office recently received a note from an inspiring student who was part of the City Prosecutor's Parent Accountability and Chronic Truancy (PACT) program.

Deborah (not her real name) was skipping school every day. Her mother, consumed with her own emotional challenges, was not helping to improve Deborah's attendance.

Deborah wrote, "At one point I wanted to give up on school, I was struggling with many difficult aspects of my life...I completely lost sight of who I was and wanted to aspire to be. I didn't feel like I had anyone to show me that light and love I needed to help give me the strength to pick myself back up again."

With the help of friends and her church, Deborah "started surrounding myself with genuinely good people" and "noticed a great deal of change in the way I would think about things." These people gave advice and began "genuinely showing me love and sharing their experiences with me."

"After going through those tough obstacles in my life to the point of thinking about dropping out of school,

the people who also helped me get back on track and get back on my feet were the City Prosecutor's Office. They encouraged me and for that I am forever grateful."

The PACT program gets habitually truant students back into school. Unfortunately, some parents do not even realize the importance to education.

Students who frequently miss school fall typically fall behind in their classes, and eventually drop out. School drop outs are less likely to be employed, and more likely to be incarcerated.

Long Beach has made it relatively easy to get a world-class education with award-winning neighborhood schools in every part of the city. But students need to attend to get benefits.

Deborah will graduate high school this year. Now wants help other students: "With every struggle that I have faced and got through with the help of everybody, I now want to be able to be that role model for any teen younger than me or even somebody older than me struggling with those difficult obstacles. I want to share my story to give them hope, and show them that light at the end of the tunnel."

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Negative Effects of Energy Drinks on Your Teen

Energy drinks have rapidly become a go-to beverage for teens. According to the National Center for Complementary and Integrative Health, energy drinks are the most consumed products by teens and young adults in the United States.

They may not understand, however, the harm energy drinks can have on their developing bodies. Here's what you and your teen need to know about energy drinks and their long-term effects:

- Almost one third of teens between the ages of 12 and 17-years-old consume energy drinks regularly.
- Large amounts of caffeine may harm children's still-developing cardiovascular and nervous systems. A 24 oz. energy drink may contain the same amount of caffeine as four or five cups of coffee.

- According to the American Heart Association, drinking a single 16 oz. energy drink boosts blood pressure and stress hormone responses in young, healthy adults. These changes can lead to an abnormal, irregular heartbeat or even sudden cardiac death.
- Energy drinks may cause heart problems that develop later into adulthood, despite not being immediately present during adolescence.

Energy drinks should not be considered a healthy beverage option for children or young adults. If your teen is looking for a boost of energy, recommend a healthier option, like exercising, stretching, getting more sleep or drinking a fruit-filled smoothie.

The Children's Heart Institute at MemorialCare Miller Children's & Women's Hospital Long Beach encourages families to talk with their children about the affects energy drinks can have on their hearts.

Tax Laws that Take Effect 2019

The tax laws passed in 2018 will impact how you file your return this year. Here is a brief look at some of the changes. Your personal situation is best addressed by your tax preparer certainly, but these are some of the highlights as they pertain to real property.

A Greater Standard Deduction

The standard deduction increased for singles to \$12,000 from \$6,350, and for couples filing jointly, the deduction increased to \$24,000 from \$12,700. Buyers who previously itemized their tax return to write off mortgage interest might find that their standard deduction for 2018 is more than what they paid in mortgage interest for the year.

The Mortgage Interest Deduction has Been Reduced

The ability to deduct interest paid on a mortgage has been decreased to loans of up to only \$750,000 (prior law allowed mortgage debt of up to \$1,000,000) for primary and secondary personal residences. If you purchased your home after January 1, 2018, this applies to your situation. If you owned your home before then, you may deduct the interest on up to \$1,000,000 of debt for qualified properties.

Home Equity Loan Interest is Not Always Deductible

The interest paid on this type of home loan is not deductible unless the funds borrowed are used to buy, build, or significantly improve a home. No more vacations, debt consolidations, dog training, unicorn safaris etc. However, homeowners can still deduct mortgage interest paid on a home renovation loan, which could result in a significant tax savings if the borrower's mortgage interest exceeds the standard deduction.

Property Taxes

The new tax law also limits the amount of property taxes you can claim beginning in 2018, placing a \$10,000 cap on state, local, and property taxes collectively. This ceiling also applies to income taxes you pay at the state, and possibly local level, as well as property taxes. They all fall under the same umbrella. The limit is \$5,000 if you're married but file a separate return, and property taxes for personal foreign real property have been eliminated entirely.

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Healthy Financial Habits

Happy New Year! Good habits play an important role in living a healthier life – whether it's eating healthy, exercising, living a balanced life or managing your finances well. Healthy money habits can have long lasting positive results affecting not only your financial security but also your overall health.

Stick to Your Plans. Create a realistic simple budget that lists of all your expenses including miscellaneous items against your household income. Deduct all of your expenses from the total amount and the remaining balance is cash flow or for your “want” list. Go over your want list and ask yourself if it is worth the extra expense or would you rather allocate the extra money toward paying down your debt or putting the money away in savings.

Invest in Your Retirement Account. Saving for retirement is one of the best things you can do to prepare for the future when you won't be receiving income from your employment. The money you save in a retirement account is withdrawn before taxes, reducing your taxable income. If your employer does not offer a retirement savings plan, look into a retirement savings account such as an Individual Retirement Account (IRA).

Building on Success In Our Local Schools

High quality school facilities convey an important message to our young people. Safe, clean and comfortable learning environments show children that we care about them. I'm pleased to report that in addition to our continued gains in student achievement, we are also making great strides with our school construction and repair efforts.

This school year we saw significant projects completed at Kettering, Riley, Rogers, Cleveland, Stephens and Garfield schools. These campuses received new central air conditioning and related infrastructure improvements. Over the next several years, a total of 51 schools will see similar updates. We've also been renovating auditoriums and providing new athletic facilities such as all-weather fields, tracks and stadiums.

Funds from Measure K and Measure E school bonds, overwhelmingly approved by local voters, also are being used to re-build and create new classroom buildings on several high school campuses, including Jordan, Renaissance, Sato and Millikan. Wilson and Poly high schools are enjoying their newly refurbished auditoriums and stadiums. In all, we still have more than \$1 billion in active projects.

Most importantly, great things are happening inside these ever-improving campuses. Our efforts to prepare more students for college and careers are paying dividends for students and their families. Record numbers of students are taking and passing Advanced Placement college preparatory exams, graduation rates are rising, and we are seeing progress across each subgroup of students.

Such success is the result of careful planning and strong support from everyone who supports our students, including our employees, parents, volunteers, elected Board of Education, higher education partners, business partners and many community agencies. The logistics are complicated. For instance, nearly 9,000 students and 378 classrooms were relocated over the summer of 2018 so that we could provide upgrades to their classrooms and schools. The reward is that nearly 4,000 more students had new air conditioning and heating as of this school year. We appreciate the patience and hard work of everyone who has tolerated the inevitable inconveniences of renovation, and everyone who strives to improve the lives of our young people each day. Your support is a testament to the spirit of community that makes the Long Beach Unified School District one of the top performing school systems in the nation.

The Impact of LBUSD Partnerships

There were approximately 500 district partnerships when I was first elected to the board in 2004. Today, there are approximately 1700 such partnerships that provide a variety of services that support the district's educational mission. To be sure, these efforts are of vital importance to that mission.

Consider, for example, The Assistance League. There efforts to provide school uniforms, school supplies and other support have far reaching implications. In a district that is ranked 70 percent poverty by the federal government, and in some parts of the city, more than 90 percent, providing school uniforms to our students impacts the stigma of poverty, but more importantly, enhances students' self-perceptions while having a positive impact on classroom participation. School uniforms level the playing field regarding issues of clothing and allows students to engage more fully in academic work.

Students also benefit by receiving free eye examinations, and if warranted, free eye glasses provided by the Los Angeles Clipper Foundation. For many students who may be undiagnosed with vision problems, eye examinations have had a tremendous impact on their classroom participation and academic progress, which, in some cases, can changes their designation from students with learning problems.

Similarly, health centers have been established in a number of our schools through a partnership with the Children's Health Clinic under the direction of Dr. Elisa Nichols. These clinics not only serve children, they also serve parents and the demand for services continues to grow. The clinics provide a number of services that promote the health and safety of children and their families. The partnership is important to the district for a variety of reasons: good health helps to minimize school absences due to illness. Minimizing school absences extends student learning opportunities by providing more instructional time.

The list of business partners extends to individuals who volunteer as readers, playground monitors and classroom aids, such as VIPs, (Volunteers In Public Schools), to businesses, individuals and nonprofits, also provide support to the district through personnel, funding, and in-kind contributions. Personnel often provide classroom support by adding technical expertise in science, engineering, robotics and other cutting-edge subject areas.

I've merely touched briefly on the services that our business partners provide to the district. When you consider the challenges of urban school districts, such as declining budget support, health issues, poverty, etc., the role and importance of partnerships becomes more readily apparent, along with their impact on the district's strategic mission. If the district did not have such support, would there be a difference in student academic outcomes? My response to this question is an unequivocal "yes." It is difficult to quantify the value of these partnerships, or measure their impact on student learning, but we know there is a relationship.

Receptivity to Partnerships

I'm not aware of earlier efforts by the district to promote partnerships or the rationale for doing so, but I have observed an effective vehicle for doing so during my tenure as a member of the board. The Foundation Office, headed by Judy Seal, has facilitated the Principle For A Day program that brings hundreds of visitors to our schools each year. These visitors have the honorary distinction of serving as a school principal and an opportunity to spend a portion of their morning at a designated school site in the district. They receive a tour of the school, visit classrooms, speak with teachers and staff, and learn about some of the prevailing issues.

The next phase of the program is a mid-morning debriefing session with lunch where the Principal for A Day, accompanied by the regular school principal, have an opportunity to share their experiences. The debriefing session may also include a panel discussion on educational issues facilitated by the superintendent, the Long Beach Community College Superintendent, and the CSU, Long Beach President.

The Principal for A Day program has served as a powerful and effective vehicle to rekindle interest and involvement in district schools. Invariably, the district has been able to turn this into a tremendous investment in our schools and students. By extension, the partners that are cultivated also become public relations advocates for the district whose value cannot be underestimated.

Given my role and involvement as the Chair and LBUSD district's representative on the Council of the Great City Schools, an organization that represents and advocates for approximately 72 of the nation's largest urban school district with a combined enrollment of 7.2 million students, I don't see programs of a similar nature at other districts that are of the scope and size of the program that currently exists in the district. The importance of the Principal for A Day program, while difficult to quantify, has served the district well by providing a forum for information and participation.
