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Healthy, Fit, Smart and Future Ready!

On Friday, February 8, the United States Medical Soccer League brought more than 50 doctors to Lampton to work with our fourth and fifth graders for their "Healthy, Fit and Smart" out-reach program. The U.S. Medical Soccer League is a team of doctors from around the United States who play competitive soccer against other international medical soccer teams. The doctors in attendance represented almost every specialty in the field of medicine.

The "Healthy, Fit and Smart" program consisted of three rotations for students. The "Healthy" component included a Jeopardy style game about nutrition and healthy lifestyle choices. Each classroom was broken into three teams that competed for points and classroom bragging rights. These competitive teams were each coached by 2-3 doctors.

When students reached the "Fit" rotation, they did athletic warm-ups, then worked on their soccer skills. Approximately 20 doctors worked the students through agility drills, dribbling and passing practice, and kicking skills.

Lampton's multipurpose room was filled with medical industry professionals and training equipment for the "Smart" component. An orthopedic surgeon explained how he used sonogram equipment for orthopedic surgery, and demonstrated the images that are projected and how they guide the surgeon. A cardiologist brought a surgical training simulator for an angiogram. Students helped him feed the angiogram camera through a tube into simulated heart

by watching the computer display. One student dubbed this "taking a heart selfie." In yet another area, a different specialist helped students practice using a training simulator for arthroscopic surgery. Other stations in the "Smart" component gave students insights into cochlear implants, the placement of stents to support major arterial repairs, and even the treatment of embolisms.

Our students were amazed at the range of specialties of the doctors they met, and the training equipment they were allowed to experience. The Healthy Fit and Smart event was outstanding. Our students had experiences they will never forget, and that may shape their career paths in the future!


President's Message



Growth in Math

This year, the Transitional Kindergarten through fifth-grade students at Cesar Chavez Elementary School are highly engaged in Mathematical Academic Discourse on a daily basis. Every student is expected to communicate his or her reasoning, to clearly and precisely construct viable arguments, and to critique the reasoning of others. From kindergarteners who can tell why six is larger than four to third-graders who wrote letters to Puzzle Penguin explaining his mistakes and fifth-graders who can defend their answers with claims and explanations, all of our students are talking and writing about math.

Every classroom has structures and scaffolds that support students as they discuss and write about math. Math word walls, charts, Frayer Models, and pocket charts are filled with important words and sentence frames, which students use to create their arguments. Every third-, fourth-, and fifth-



grade class is writing mathematical arguments during Tier 1, Tier 2 and Tier 3 instruction. Several times a week, students state their claims verbally and in writing with supporting evidence.

Our students' confidence and math achievement are growing! We are so proud of their hard work!



With the installation of the 75-watt laser and the computer numerical control mill, the La Mirada Project Lead the Way engineering room is finally fully operational. The room, which was once an auto shop, was gutted last summer and redesigned to allow for multiple uses, including class lectures, group work tables, multiple presentation pods, coding lab, fabrication/maker space, robotics lab, and club space. The almost 1,900 square feet of the lab are currently used by 113 students and are home to our robotics, coding and Nintendo clubs.

Our Science Mentor

At Los Alisos Middle School, we strive for a learning environment that is rigorous, relevant and engaging. That means that as a STEM-focused school (science, technology, engineering and math), the transition and effective implementation of the Next Generation Science Standards is of utmost importance. That is why our STEM teachers often dedicate time outside their regular assignments to access professional-development opportunities. One of those teachers is Angelica Gunderson, a seventh-grade science and computer-science teacher at Los Alisos.

For the last two years, Mrs. Gunderson has been part of the Elementary Science Learning Academy (ESLA) at California State University, Long Beach. She helped plan and facilitate training for this program, which is designed to support elementary teachers in transitioning to NGSS. The experience in turn has helped Mrs. Gunderson progress an NGSS leader for our site and our district. In addition, in the summer of 2018, Mrs. Gunderson also served as a teacher for the CSULB Young Scientist Camp. This camp is designed to feed the minds of young scientists.

The teacher-mentoring model allowed Mrs. Gunderson to guide new teachers by co-creating a physics-inspired unit for high school female students and co-facilitate instruction during the duration of the camp. These opportunities through CSULB have also afforded Mrs. Gunderson the ability to attend the California Science Test (CAST) Academy at the California Science Teachers Association Conference this fall. These opportunities have further equipped her with the skills and abilities to support teachers throughout our site and district as we progress into the new science standards and assessment.

Mrs. Gunderson is just one of our many dedicated teachers aiming to provide quality learning experiences for our scholars.

Medical Soccer Team Visit

The U.S. Medical Soccer League brought more than 50 doctors to Lampton Elementary School for their Healthy, Fit and Smart outreach program. The U.S. Medical Soccer League is a team of doctors from across the nation who play internationally against other medical soccer teams.

Lampton's fourth- and fifth-graders participated in three rotations. The “healthy” component included a Jeopardy-style game about nutrition and healthy lifestyle choices, with teams of students coached by doctors. In the “fit” rotation, students did athletic warm-ups and agility drills and worked on their soccer skills of dribbling, passing, and kicking.

This was an experience our students will never forget and one that may shape their career paths in the future!


A Scary Read




A True Story

Is Your Child At Risk for Unintentional Drowning?

Every day, about 10 people die from unintentional drowning. About one in five people who die from drowning are children 14 and younger. And for every child who dies from drowning, another five receive emergency department care for non-fatal submersion injuries.

These non-fatal drowning injuries can cause severe brain damage that may result in long-term disabilities, such as memory problems, learning disabilities or permanent loss of basic functioning.



Drowning Prevention

With summer around the corner, it's important to keep water safety top of mind. Children need a designated chaperone at all times. Formal swimming lessons reduce the risk of drowning. Yet even when children have had formal swimming lessons, constant supervision and barriers, such as pool fencing to prevent unsupervised access, are still important.

Never leave a child in the water without adult supervision, no matter how shallow the water. And at no time should you consider that a flotation device will protect or save your child if you step away or are distracted, even for a moment.

In addition, CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) performed by bystanders has been shown to save lives and improve outcomes in drowning victims. The more quickly CPR is started, the better the chance of improved outcomes. In the time it takes for paramedics to arrive, CPR skills may save a child's life.
