Hawthorne School District Recognized as Being a “Positive Outlier” District

A new study from the Learning Policy Institute (LPI) takes an in-depth look at strategies used by the Hawthorne School District and six other California school districts that may have contributed to their students outperforming similar students in other districts on math and reading assessments.

LPI released the study, *Closing the Opportunity Gap: How Positive Outlier Districts in California Are Pursuing Equitable Access to Deeper Learning*, on Tuesday, September 10th at an event in Sacramento. It examines what Hawthorne and the other six “positive outlier” districts have in common that may have contributed to their students’ success.

This recognition is a testament to the combined efforts of our staff, students, and families. We are committed to ensuring that all of our students are able to experience academic success, and it is truly so rewarding to see those efforts leading to such sustained and steady growth.

LPI’s analysis found several commonalities across the districts, including:

- Qualified teaching staff;
- A widely shared, well-enacted vision that prioritizes learning for every child;
- Continuous leadership from instructionally engaged leaders;
- Strategies for hiring, supporting, and retaining a strong, stable educator workforce;
- Collaborative professional learning that builds collective instructional capacity;
- A deliberate, developmental approach to instructional change;
- Curriculum, instruction, and assessment focused on deeper learning for students and adults;
- Use of evidence to inform teaching and learning in a process of continuous improvement;
- Systemic supports for students’ academic, social, and emotional needs; and
- Engagement of families and communities.

We are very proud of the efforts and achievements of our staff, students, and families who work collaboratively to bring these continued recognitions to the Hawthorne School District.

Un nuevo estudio del Instituto de Política de Aprendizaje (LPI, por sus siglas en inglés) analiza en profundidad las estrategias utilizadas por el Distrito Escolar de Hawthorne y otros seis distritos escolares de California que pueden haber contribuido a que sus alumnos superen a alumnos similares de otros distritos en matemáticas y evaluaciones de lectura.

LPI lanzó el estudio, *Cerrando la Brecha de Oportunidades: Cómo los distritos positivamente distinguidos en California buscan un acceso equitativo a un aprendizaje más profundo*, el martes 10 de septiembre en un evento en Sacramento. Examina lo que tienen en común Hawthorne y los otros seis distritos “destacados positivamente” que pueden haber contribuido al éxito de sus alumnos.

Este reconocimiento es un testimonio de los esfuerzos combinados de nuestro personal, alumnos y familias. Estamos comprometidos a garantizar que todos nuestros alumnos puedan experimentar el éxito académico, y es realmente muy gratificante ver esos esfuerzos que conducen a un crecimiento sostenido y constante.

El análisis de LPI encontró varios puntos en común en todos los distritos, que incluyen:

HMSA's College Going Rate

This past summer, State Superintendent of Public Instruction Tony Thurmond announced the release of a first-of-its-kind report about California students that enroll in college after completing a public high school. The College-Going Report (CGR) sorts college enrollment by student groups and by type and location of postsecondary institutions attendance. The CGR is available on the California Department of Education's DataQuest site for the 2014 -2015, 2015 -2016, 2016 -2017, and 2017-2018 academic years.

"I am pleased that we are able to provide this information for the first time, and that it gives us a great metric to show the progress our students are making as they advance to college and career," said State Superintendent Thurmond in a July 11, 2019 press release from California Department of Education.

According to the CGR report, in 2017-18, there were 439,211 California public high school students who completed high school, of which 282,740 enrolled in college within 12 months of completing high school for a State college-going rate of 64.4%.

According to the CGR report's data, HMSA's 2017-18 college-going rate was 89.2%, 24.8% higher than the State rate. The HMSA Class of 2018 rate was the 22nd highest rate in the state of California and 4th in Los Angeles County.


New Teachers

Research: What Parents Need to Know About Kids, Media, and Body Image



How kids think, feel, and act about their bodies is a critical piece of their self-esteem and overall healthy development. Common Sense Media's new research report, Children, Teens, Media, and Body Image, examines the role of traditional and

digital media in the development of children's and teens' body image. This review of existing research reveals some surprising trends -- such as that half of 6- to 8-year-old girls feel their ideal body size is thinner than their current one -- but it also shows evidence that parents play a huge part in shaping how kids relate to their bodies. Some key findings:

- Many kids are dissatisfied with their bodies, and society's body appearance ideals are highly unrealistic.
- Body-image concerns start early; even preschoolers learn that society judges people by how they look.
- Parents' attitudes toward their own bodies are a big influence on how kids feel about their bodies.

- Unrealistic, sexualized, and stereotypical images and messages about bodies and gender are rampant in the media kids consume.
- Teens feel pressure to look good and cool online but also feel that social media helps their friendships and connections with like-minded peers.
- Although young girls are most susceptible, boys have issues with body image too.

Our report uncovers large gaps in research on body image and media. Several groups -- young children, boys, kids of color, LGBTQ youth -- are not well-studied, and research on online, digital media has yet to keep pace with the explosion in their use by kids and teens
