Ocean View Takes Hands-On Learning to the Farm

Did you know that there is a farm right in the middle of Surf City? The extraordinary farm is part of the Golden View Environmental Science School and it recently underwent a major renovation. The refurbished 2.5 acre farm provides students with multiple, unique, hands-on learning opportunities and it is the only one of its kind in Orange County.

The special farm has been considered a community treasure since it was established in the early 1970's. Students are able to care for living animals which helps them understand life cycles, the reciprocity between animals and humans, and the importance of making responsible choices. Tending the garden allows students to plant. harvest and cook nutritious food using natural ingredients. Through the recycle, reuse and repurpose program, students learn how to be stewards of the environment.

Key upgrades made to the farm include: new animal enclosures for sheep and goats, an outdoor exercise area for animals, hardscaping, and new interior and exterior fencing.

The farm encompasses five essential areas: a garden, a chicken coop, a barn, animal enclosures and a pond. A variety of fruits and vegetables are planted in the garden throughout the year and students just finished planting new harvests of lettuces, beans, squashes, and snap peas.

The chicken coop houses a variety of breeds of chickens and roosters. The eggs laid are used for cooking as well as science and math lessons.

Six new animal enclosures were built for the geese, ducks, sheep and goats. In addition, a new outdoor exercise area was created for the animals along with an eight-foot wide pathway from the entrance of the farm to the animal enclosures.

The pond is home to geese, ducks, fish, and about 15 red-eared slider turtles. It is not uncommon to see wild geese and mallard ducks stopping by for a visit also.

The barn contains the farm's tools, supplies and feed for the animals. Golden View has built great relationships with local Scouts from around the community and they have provided assistance around the farm in a variety of helpful ways. An Eagle Scout recently designed and

constructed a beautiful shed for the garden area and another Eagle Scout is currently working on building new tool racks for the barn. The school highly values this partnership and is proud to support the Scouts.

I encourage you to visit the Golden View Farm and see first-hand the engaging, real-world experiences it provides our students. Golden View students can't wait to get out to the farm each day and their smiles, enthusiasm and inquisitiveness are evidence of the meaningful learning taking place.

In addition to the wonderful farm, Golden View Environmental Science School offers a rigorous academic program with environmental

science integrated throughout the school day. The school offers gifted and talented (GATE) instruction, Chromebooks for all grade levels, art, music and a variety of clubs and after-school programs. To learn more, please visit www.ovsd.org



Six Ways to Prevent the Flu

Getting the flu can be more than a miserable experience. Complications can include bacterial pneumonia, ear or sinus infections and worsening of chronic conditions such as asthma, diabetes or congestive heart failure. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends a flu shot for anyone 6 months of age and older. In addition, practice six health habits to help protect yourself and others:

- 1. Keep your distance. Stay away from people who are sick. And if you are ill, stay home.
- Cover your nose and mouth. If you sneeze or cough, cover yourself with a tissue or the crook of your arm if a tissue isn't nearby.
- Avoid touching your mouth, eyes and nose. Germs are everywhere computer keyboards, elevator buttons and door handles are just a few of the places they can be found.
- Wash your hands frequently. Use soap and water and scrub for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water aren't available, an alcohol-based hand sanitizer is an alternative.
- Stay as healthy as possible to keep up your immune system. Eat a balanced diet, drink fluids, get plenty of sleep and be physically active. As much as possible, manage stress.
- Keep a clean environment. Flu virus can live for up to 48 hours on surfaces.

When you feel ill, it may be difficult to know if you have the flu or just a cold. Both are viruses, but the flu is worse than a cold. You doctor may run a test to be certain. Take care of yourself and stay well!



Retired Senior Volunteer Program

In 1990 the Fountain Valley Police Department established a program utilizing retired volunteers to provide services to our community. This program, designated the Retired Senior Volunteer Program or RSVP, has become an important part of the Fountain Valley Police Department. The program currently has 43 volunteers providing invaluable assistance to the department.

One of the greatest strengths of the RSVP program comes from the variety of life experiences that the volunteers bring. Our members have come from the ranks of teachers, aerospace

workers, secretaries, retail merchandising, truck drivers and airline pilots to name a few. Two of the things they have in common are that they are retired and have a sincere wish to give back to their community.

One of their duties include patrolling our neighborhoods for the identification of community problems which is then relayed to either the police department or the city's code enforcement for corrective action. They also provide other important duties such as checking homes of vacationing residents, interacting with community members, spotting and reporting graffiti and patrolling parking lots for handicapped parking violations.

Another duty that they perform are administrative jobs in nearly every area of the Police Department, including the records department and traffic department. Some of their responsibilities include data entry, filing, fingerprinting, administrative review of parking citations and other duties that help ease the workload of the police department.


Reading Challenge, Authors Festival and HB Reads

Understanding Concussions

As more children and adolescents compete in team sports, practice martial arts, or enjoy pastimes like skateboarding, the number of head injuries among American youth is larger than once thought. Concussions can refer to anything from mild to moderate traumatic brain injury not causing permanent harm because of direct or indirect force to the brain.

Signs your child may have suffered from a concussion:

- Headache
 Dizziness or confusion
- Coordination or balance problems
- Trouble thinking or remembering
- Changes in sleep or feeling sleepy
- Feeling sick
- Blurred vision
- Speech problems

In most cases, symptoms happen immediately, but can show up hours or even days later. Treatment involves physical and cognitive rest. Rest is particularly important in the first 24 to 48 hours following injury, with gradual return to activity, first with light aerobic exercise and then full-contact play.

Immediate evaluation is critical If you believe your child has suffered a concussion. The Orthopedic Center at MemorialCare Miller Children's & Women's Hospital Long Beach has a care team of leaders in sports medicine and concussion protocols.

Children are continuously growing, which makes them much different than adults. Physicians who primarily care for adults might not be able to adequately treat injuries in children and may even cause further damage, so it is important that they receive specialized pediatric orthopedic care. 

Middle school students may just give a quick nod of the head to acknowledge the help given, but all students will provide a smile that translated means, thanks, I could not have done this without you. The school and teachers will be incredibly thankful. Volunteers in classrooms when we know they are coming are incredible assets teachers can use to increase, improve and impact their instruction.

So, as we all begin to develop our "To Do" list of resolutions for the New Year, make one of them to volunteer a set number of hours in your local school. The school, the teachers and most importantly the students need you.

Reading aloud with your child for 15 minutes a day from the time of their birth will help them grow vocabulary and knowledge, give them time to bond, provide an enriching environment, and foster a love of books and learning.






Lessons in Agriculture




