As the spread of COVID-19 in our community decreases, we are excited to be allowed to bring back various sports and spectators. We were excited to hold our first football competitions of the season at Fred Kelly Stadium mid-March, and we look forward to being able to continue to slowly move toward more traditional events as public health guidance permits.

Due to the data trends, the California Department of Public Health has also updated its guidance regarding social distancing in classrooms. The most recent revision allows for flexibility to maintain less than 6 feet of distance between individuals under certain conditions, such as accommodating a student for in-person instruction due to learning loss. This change will allow for more students to receive in-person instruction, should families so choose. The Educational Services team is working with site administrators to implement the new guidance. If you would like to transition your student back to in-person instruction for this last trimester/quarter, please reach out to your site principal.

2021/2022 School Year

Many families have been inquiring about the instructional models for the 2021/2022 school year. It is our intent to safely transition toward a traditional instructional model while continuing to adhere to and facilitate the specific protocols/procedures outlined in our Safety and Health Driven School Reopening Plan.

Each family will receive an Instructional Model Commitment Survey in early April to determine if your student(s) will be participating in the traditional instructional model or the 100% distance learning model that, as of today, must remain an option for all families. Based on these numbers, the Educational Services team will then be able to provide more specifics concerning 100% distance learning options for next year.

Thank you for your support and patience as we work to offer more opportunities for our students and community while being mindful of the safety and health protocols we still need to follow to continue to lessen the spread of COVID-19.

Graduation

Our goal is to celebrate the Graduating Class of 2021 during the week of June 7th – 11th at Fred Kelly Stadium. Specific dates/times for each high school will be determined in the next few weeks. In order to maintain safety protocols, current plans allow for each graduate to have two attendees. Depending on updates that occur to public health guidance, the number of attendees permitted may change. Additionally, each graduation ceremony will be live-streamed for public viewing.

Our next issue is May 25, 2021.


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

On March 2, 2021 our preschoolers celebrated “Read Across America Day”. In one of our preschool classrooms at Lampson Elementary, teachers read *The Cat in the Hat* to the students. As a follow up activity, students used their handprints to create Thing 1 and Thing 2. Before they went home each student was able to select one RIF (Reading is Fundamental) book to take for their home library. Preschool hosts three RIF events per year and provides children with the opportunity to choose a book from a variety of options. This preschooler was very excited about choosing the book *Welcome to the World!*, a story about baby animals born in the zoo. Strong pre-literacy skills are important to the growth and development of young learners in our OUSD Early Learning programs. Parents can support pre-literacy skills by reading to their child every day, encouraging them to retell their favorite stories, playing letter matching games, asking open ended questions, and enrolling them in a high-quality preschool program. 

International Baccalaureate Program

Running Spring Elementary School is a second year candidate school for the International Baccalaureate Primary Years Program. Transdisciplinary learning is a key component of the International Baccalaureate program.

Transdisciplinary means “across the disciplines”— or subject areas. Therefore, transdisciplinary learning is learning that occurs throughout all the subject areas. What does this mean for the students of Running Springs? It means that teachers are working to connect the learning that the students are doing in one subject with the learning they are doing in many of the other subject areas. This is done by using broad concepts as the anchor for the learning. As an example, first graders “Who We Are” unit develops the concept of rules and laws throughout various subject areas from social studies (rules and laws in the community) to grammar (rules for writing sentences) to math (rules of addition and subtraction). Another example comes from sixth grade. In their unit of inquiry for “Where We Are

in Place and Time”, the teachers focus on the concept of civilizations and how they have impacted our lives today. In social studies, the students learn the background knowledge they need to understand each ancient civilization. The learning continues during reading where the students read stories from their Wonders series about various civilizations. In writing, the students share their learning through multiple writing activities such as an expository essay. The learning even continues during math once the students learn about geometry, which started in ancient Greece. Transdisciplinary learning is beneficial for the students because it gives them multiple opportunities to explore a concept through various subject areas.

Running Springs is a candidate school for the International Baccalaureate (IB) Primary Years Programme and pursuing authorization as an IB World School. IB World Schools share a common philosophy—a commitment to improve the teaching and learning of a diverse and inclusive community of students by delivering challenging, high quality programmes of international education that share a powerful vision.
