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## Safety is Key to a Fun-Filled Summer!

Temperatures are rising and summer is around the corner! As COVID-19 restrictions lift and friends and family begin to gather outside, make sure to keep safety top of mind. Follow our tips to have a safe and fun summer:

### Sun Safety

Sunburns are caused by overexposure to UV rays and can increase the risk of skin cancer.

- Seek shade. UV rays are strongest and most harmful during midday.
- Wear hats that shade the face, scalp, ears and neck.
- Apply sunscreen with at least SPF 15 and UVA and UVB (broad spectrum protection) 30 minutes before going outside and reapply as needed!

### Water Safety

Every day, about 10 people die from unintentional drowning.

- Never leave your child in the water without adult supervision, no matter how shallow.
- We recommend using US Coast Guard-approved floatation devices.
- Enroll your child in swimming lessons.
- Install barriers, such as fencing around a swimming pool.

### Bug Safety

Protect your family by preventing bites and diseases, like West Nile virus and Lyme disease, which can be transmitted by insects.

- Avoid areas where insects congregate, such as stagnant pools of water.
- Use insect repellents containing DEET.
  - The CDC recommendation for children older than 2-months-of-age is to use 10% to 30% DEET.
  - DEET should not be used on children younger than 2-months-old.
  - Avoid applying DEET on hands, around eyes or mouth.
  - Do not allow children under 10 years of age to apply repellent by themselves.
- When outside in the evenings, cover up with long-sleeved shirts, pants and socks



## Highlighting Special Programs

Though our instructional program has been impacted this year by the effects of the pandemic, CESD has continued to look forward and continued to innovate and implement programs to bring a fuller learning experience to our students. We look forward to continuing to grow our programming into the new year.

**Music Program:** Recognizing that music instruction is of high value to our community, CESD has hired two certified music teachers to continue to bring this subject matter to life in our district, helping to enrich and develop students' academic and life experiences. We know that musical training is of benefit, helping to develop language and reasoning skills, improving coordination and giving children satisfaction and a sense of achievement. As we finish off the school year, we will be focused on providing this instruction in our Distance Learning program, with planning ongoing for the 21/22 school year.

**Foreign Language Elementary Experience (FLEX):** FLEX is a new program that is focused on helping students to gain exposure and enrichment in being exposed to a new language. Through the support of a teacher and use of technology, our students will have the opportunity to explore Spanish, gaining comfort in language study in CESD. This year, we celebrate the piloting of this program for second graders, and we look forward to an expansion of this program in the new year.

**Verizon Innovative Learning Grant:** We are pleased to offer the Verizon Learning Grant program in three of our schools to our 6th grade classes, Buena Terra, Centralia and San Marino. Through the support of their facilitator, Ms. Clark, these students are interacting with technology in incredible ways, truly infusing STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) into their content learning. A recently completed student project highlights students' abilities to create a school video tour using specialized technology that is just AMAZING! It's incredible to see the hard work and creativity of our scholars come to life on the screen!

**CyberPatriot Program** is a partnership between Cypress College and Los Coyotes School. In this program, 6th grade CyberPatriot scholars attend classes at Cypress College and learn content related to Cybersecurity. The program culminates with an end of year CyberPatriot competition in which our 6th grade team competes against 6th grade teams from other Districts. We are proud to remind all that it was a Los Coyotes Team that won the inaugural CyberPatriot Cup just two years ago! Best wishes to our team this year!

**Summer Learning:** This summer, we are launching our most ambitious extended learning program in the district, inviting students who are in need of support to catch up on learning. 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
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



### Engineering a Fuel Source

This year, Arnold fifth-grade students learned about the Law of Conservation of Matter by experimenting with different chemical reactions to propel an object.

The students used materials such as vinegar, detergent, and baking soda to engineer

a fuel source for cars they designed and created out of water bottles. The goal was to create a fuel mixture that would propel the car forward as far as 8 feet but not more than 10 feet. Students performed many fuel mixture tests to determine the best ratio of materials that would build sufficient pressure to accelerate their car. Two students, Jenettsy and Brayden, were successful in moving their car the required distance. STEM experiments such as these help students better understand the importance of science, math, and critical thinking skills.

### “Virtual” Sixth-Grade Camp at Vessels

Although this year has been unique in many obvious ways, the Vessels staff was still able to create and maintain a plethora of activities and traditions to keep our students engaged and ready to learn.

Physical distancing and other COVID mitigation measures prevented our sixth-grade students from attending camp this year, so we decided to bring the camp to our kids. Over a week in mid-February, our sixth-grade distance learning students were treated to a “virtual” camp experience that exceeded expectations. Students first checked into virtual “cabins” and began with team-building exercises to promote group unity. While in their cabins, students met one another and got accustomed to their virtual rooms for the week. Over the next couple of days, they explored the daily themes of animals, the environment, and astronomy. Students also participated

in escape room competitions and viewed live nature webcams to experience nature and the ecosystems of local mountains. Students were also provided the opportunity to asynchronously build “shelters” while taking field notes. Also important to the overall camp experience is food, which is typically best experienced in a noisy mess-hall setting. Our sixth-grade teachers mirrored this experience by hosting a pajama breakfast and communal Zoom lunches. Teachers also provided fun camp activities such as choreography and dance class. One of the most memorable experiences of sixth-grade camp is making a necklace to keep as a memento of the trip. Although they did not make one themselves, students were given a necklace utilizing colored beads to represent each activity throughout the week.

Although our students couldn’t physically go camping this year, they had a lot of fun and learned quite a bit about the great outdoors and the delicate balance of nature and ecosystems.

Under this model, students attend school for part of the day and continue with Virtual Learning for the other part of the day, five days per week. Even though the classrooms look different with all of our safety protocols in place, students have been happy to return to school, and have been doing a great job following the new procedures. Students will continue under this model through their last day of school on June 17th. Students, staff and parents were all smiles on April 12th as classes resumed.

We are currently preparing for a comprehensive Summer School Program that will run for five weeks from June 28th through July 29th. We will continue our partnership with the Anaheim Family YMCA and the Boys and Girls Club during the summer. This program will provide focused

lessons in English Language Arts and Math, as well as high-interest, interactive learning activities in Science, Technology, Engineering and Math. Students will also participate in fun and engaging recreational activities. Breakfast and lunch will be provided to all students. We are currently in the planning stages, but information on our Summer School Program will be available soon.

In addition to our Summer programs, all students will receive a summer “Getting Ready” activity book that will provide them with some home learning activities that they can do to prepare for the next grade.

Our goal for next year is to have our students return to their regular full day school schedule. We will continue to conduct daily health screenings of all students and staff that enter our schools and our safety protocols will continue to be implemented. We will continue to work closely with the Orange County Health Care Agency to ensure we are doing everything we can to keep our students and staff safe and healthy. We are happy to report that vaccines have been available to all of our staff members.

We know that the Pandemic has been traumatic for students and staff and we have counseling services available for those who need additional support. We look forward to a safe and productive future in the Magnolia School District.

## Twila Reid's Virtual Showcase



# Nuts about Nut Butters

A jar of creamy peanut butter used to be your only choice when shopping. Fast forward to 2021 and the nut butter aisle has become one of the fastest growing segments in the grocery store. Popular nut butters or spreads now include almond, cashew, walnut, and pecan. Many brands are combining nuts, adding various flavors such as coconut or popular taste combos. Nut butters continue to be used as the traditional sandwich spread, but also as a main ingredient in entrée sauces, toppings for waffles or pancakes or ice cream, stirred into hot cereal, or as a dip for fruits or veggies.

Nut butters are full of good fats (monounsaturated/polyunsaturated) and are very satisfying. You can easily make your own nut butter by adding canola oil and sea salt to your favorite nuts and blending in a food processor. There are various ways to use nut butters that can also add good protein and fiber to your diet, such as in baked goods, desserts, or smoothies!

Try my Jumbo Peanut Butter Cup recipe.

This column provides insight from Carol Sloan RDN, FAND and her daughter, Kelly Sloan, MS, RDN. They provide tips to help you make healthier food and beverages choices.

## Jumbo Peanut Butter Cup

Makes 10 cups

Ingredients:

Chocolate Layers:

- 3/4 cup dark chocolate chips
- 1/4 cup milk chocolate chips
- 1 tablespoon coconut oil

Peanut Butter Layer:

- 1 cup all-natural creamy peanut butter
- 3 tablespoons fine almond flour
- 2 stevia packets

Directions:

Prepare muffin tin with liners. Set aside. In a microwave safe bowl, combine chocolate chips and coconut oil. Microwave for 1 minute stirring at 30 second intervals. Repeat until chocolate is melted and smooth. Spoon melted chocolate into liners, spread evenly to cover the bottom. Place in freezer for 10 minutes and prepare peanut butter layer. (You should have melted chocolate leftover for last layer.) On the stove top in a pan, combine peanut butter, almond flour and stevia. Mix well and cook for about 5 minutes or until peanut butter is smooth and flour is dissolved. Take muffin pan out of freezer and add peanut butter layer on top of solid chocolate layer. Spoon about 1 tablespoon on top of chocolate layer (you can add more peanut butter if you want a thick middle layer), spread evenly to cover chocolate. Place back in freezer for 10 minutes. With leftover melted chocolate, spoon chocolate over peanut butter layer and spread evenly. Freeze for 10 minutes, sprinkle with sea salt and enjoy immediately! Note: Peanut butter cups can last about a week in the fridge or a month in the freezer.
