Supporting Social Emotional Health

The Ocean View School District (OVSD) places a priority on nurturing the social emotional wellbeing of our students, but it became critically important this past year as our students experienced the myriad challenges that came with navigating a global pandemic. We evaluated the social emotional supports we had in place and augmented them to provide additional aid to our students and families

To fully address the social emotional needs of our students, we employ psychologists, counselors, and social workers. We also place Social Emotional School Teams at each site that are comprised of a school administrator along with school and district mental health staff. The teams meet regularly to assess the mental health and social emotional needs of students, and how to best support them.

We provide a variety of trainings for our staff that facilitate building inclusive school communities and positive climates by creating emotional safety, encouraging respect, teaching

empathy and providing a space where all students feel they belong. In order to gauge students' emotional ability and mental health, teachers use emotional check-ins with their students at the beginning of class.

This year, we created a [Virtual Wellness Room](#) on our website for our students and families. It is broken down into sections for elementary and middle school students and includes things like: mindfulness activities, animal yoga, calming techniques, drug free/tobacco free messages and resources, affirmation messages, anxiety workbooks, teen line, suicide prevention line and more. [The Virtual Wellness Room](#) is a great resource that can be accessed 24 hours a day.

To commemorate Mental Health Awareness Month in May, every student in OVSD received a Student Wellness Kit containing items to assist students with reducing stress. The kits contained everything from squishy stress balls to journals. The goal was to promote the practice of stress management and coping skills to reduce anxiety and improve student learning.

OVSD is committed to fostering the social emotional health of our students, as we believe it is foundational to academic achievement, lifelong health and success. If your child needs assistance, please call our Student Services office at (714) 847-2551 ext. 1360.

The COVID-19 pandemic brought unprecedented disruptions to our communities, at times making it feel as if our lives were suspended indefinitely. And yet, schools in Orange County found ways to move forward.

In October, our county was credited with the largest return to school for a major metropolitan area in California. About six months later, 21 local middle and high schools have earned the state's highest level of recognition as 2021 California Distinguished Schools, a title annually granted to campuses that demonstrate exceptional student performance and narrow achievement gaps.

Orange County was also well-represented on the annual list of the country's best high schools published by U.S. News & World Report, with Oxford Academy ranking No. 1 in California and No. 11 nationally.

Despite the challenges, our schools, students and staff continued to earn distinction through one of the most trying years in modern history. At the same time, far too many children and families struggled under the weight of the pandemic, with an untold number of students facing hurdles to remote learning.

While we're not out of the pandemic woods yet, COVID-19 transmission rates have plummeted thanks to modern science and this county's vigilance, enabling an increasing number of students to return to their classrooms five days a week. In fact, school districts are now eagerly making plans for the start of the next school year, and many will offer robust accelerated learning programs this summer.

For its part, the Orange County Department of Education, which provides direct instruction to the county's most vulnerable students and supports local districts with services necessary for their operations, will prioritize three critical areas in the 2021-22 school year:

- Accelerating student learning with a focus on in-person instruction while building on the technological innovations developed during the pandemic
- Supporting the mental and physical health and wellbeing of students, staff and families
- Promoting civic learning and engagement opportunities that equip students to contribute to healthy, just and thriving communities

Each of these objectives aligns with our department's ongoing mission, vision and values, and we believe we have a strong infrastructure in place to successfully check these boxes.

In 2016, the state selected OCDE as the lead agency in an initiative to help schools and districts implement the California Multi-Tiered System of Support framework, which aligns new and existing strategies to meet students' academic, behavioral and social-emotional needs.

MTSS may look different depending on each school's strengths, but the idea is to empower educators to intervene and resolve issues before they become barriers to learning. The MTSS framework builds a baseline level of support for all students, additional assistance for some, and targeted interventions for those with the greatest needs. And it starts with knowing the name, face and story of every student at a school.

Recognizing that depression and anxiety were on the rise even before the pandemic, OCDE's education and health experts have also been working with our local schools and districts to specifically address the complex mental needs of students. Along with creating new resources for families, our teams regularly offer no-cost trainings for educators covering trauma-informed support, substance abuse prevention, social-emotional learning, restorative practices and suicide risk assessment.

Finally, we continue to build collaborative partnerships with legal professionals and local business leaders who can help students engage civically with their local communities.

In 2019, OCDE launched the Orange County Civic Learning Partnership with the goal of equipping the next generation with the rights and responsibilities that are foundational to American democracy. Since then, educational leaders in California have further incentivized civic awareness by creating a Seal of Civic Engagement that students can earn for their diplomas, transcripts or certificates of completion.

The new seal was the focus of a virtual symposium in April that brought together nearly 75 educators, law professionals and community leaders for a meaningful discussion on how to deepen students' Constitutional knowledge and amplify civic engagement.

This past year has tested all of us in ways previously thought unimaginable, taxing our bodies as well as our minds. Yet the pandemic has also revealed our collective resiliency. As educators, we are driven by a noble purpose and a spirit that cannot be defeated by a virus. We have been called to shape this generation of young learners into the leaders of tomorrow, and we will do exactly that.

The challenges ahead are real and they are fierce. But our eyes are clear and so are our goals for the year ahead. And on that basis, there has never been a better time to be in education.



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Safety is Key to a Fun-Filled Summer!

Temperatures are rising and summer is around the corner! As COVID-19 restrictions lift and friends and family begin to gather outside, make sure to keep safety top of mind. Follow our tips to have a safe and fun summer:

Sun Safety: Sunburns are caused by overexposure to UV rays and can increase the risk of skin cancer.

- Seek shade. UV rays are strongest and most harmful during midday.
- Wear hats that shade the face, scalp, ears and neck.
- Apply sunscreen with at least SPF 15 and UVA and UVB (broad spectrum protection) 30 minutes before going outside and reapply as needed!

Water Safety: Every day, about 10 people die from unintentional drowning.

- Never leave your child in the water without adult supervision, no matter how shallow.
- We recommend using US Coast Guard-approved floatation devices.
- Enroll your child in swimming lessons.
- Install barriers, such as fencing around a swimming pool.

Bug Safety: Protect your family by preventing bites and diseases, like West Nile virus and Lyme disease, which can be transmitted by insects.

- Avoid areas where insects congregate, such as stagnant pools of water.
- Use insect repellents containing DEET.
 - The CDC recommendation for children older than 2-months-of-age is to use 10% to 30% DEET.
 - DEET should not be used on children younger than 2-months-old.
 - Avoid applying DEET on hands, around eyes or mouth.
 - Do not allow children under 10 years of age to apply repellent by themselves.
- When outside in the evenings, cover up with long-sleeved shirts, pants and socks

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Better Practices

Our children should be doing work out of love of learning, not fear of getting bad grades. The data has been clear for years that homework does not work. The time is now to make homework optional for grades k-4, and minimal and meaningful grades 5-12.

Homework is the biggest cause of parent/child conflict and biggest cause of creating an apathy to learning in our students.

I am asking all School Boards to listen to the overwhelming data that shows homework (busywork) is more a deterrent than a development and enact a Family Values Homework Policy that makes all homework grades k-4 optional and grades 5-12 minimal and meaningful while prohibiting any homework assigned to any grade level during holiday breaks or weekends, and no exams or quizzes assigned the day after a holiday or weekend either.

A child's time at home with their family is sacred and needs to be protected. Any work assigned at home should be about creating something and students should be given multiple days to complete it. Traditional homework doesn't improve intellect, but actually turns kids off to learning and makes them care more about obtaining points than gaining wisdom. We need to build a culture where kids see their growth as more paramount than their grades. Let's get our students reading that's not attached to grading and assignments based in imagination not memorization, where all students leave school curious and inquisitive, and keep a life-long love of learning.

Challenging Students through GATE

The Ocean View School District believes that every student should be appropriately challenged, and we offer a rigorous program for identified gifted and talented students in 3rd through 8th grade. Our Gifted and Talented Education (GATE) program strives to inspire students to utilize their talents and intellect to realize their full potential within an enriching academic environment. The GATE program promotes complex levels of thinking by working collaboratively, seeking innovative solutions, and challenging our students' unique, creative abilities.

We support student needs in the classroom through targeted differentiation. Differentiation is defined as the integration of depth, complexity, novelty and acceleration into the core curriculum. Differentiation occurs in the adaptation of the thinking skill, process, or product during the learning experience, and it is aimed at meeting the individual student's needs, interests, and abilities.

OVSD offers two GATE placement options. We have GATE Magnet programs where students are homogeneously grouped together and challenged with like peers at Circle View Elementary, Star View Elementary, Mesa View Middle, and Vista View Middle Schools. In addition, we have GATE cluster programs at all other schools where students are grouped within their regular classroom setting with their intellectual peers and receive appropriately differentiated activities from their regular classroom teacher.

We have amazing teachers in our GATE program and we recently recognized 23 teachers at a Board Meeting in May, for receiving their GATE Academy Certification. These teachers successfully completed 25 hours of professional learning, targeting differentiated lesson planning and instructional practice for gifted and talented students. This certification is recognized throughout Orange County and is quite an accomplishment for these teachers!





After installing energy-efficient HVAC systems, campus-wide LED lighting, and solar arrays that produce 90% of the school's energy

needs, all funded by Measure T, the school developed a customized Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) program. The program assisted students in how these improvements help combat climate change. Fryberger maintains an 80% waste-diversion rate with students cleaning and sorting biodegradable containers and maintaining a compost bin with worms to break down waste. We're proud of the efforts at Fryberger in supporting our Board's mission: "Prepare all students to be responsible, resilient, resourceful and productive world citizens in a changing and diverse society."



Taking on the Role of Animators

At Eastwood Elementary School, the second-grade students in Mr. Nakatsu’s class are learning about the different properties of matter called volume, mass, and shape, all while gaining first-hand experience in animation by creating stop-motion videos.

Stop-motion animation is a slow process that requires a lot of patience. Students take a single picture, move an object, take another picture, move again, and then repeat the process until the images can be combined into a short film.

Using clay, Play-Doh, Legos, and construction paper as their materials, the students take hundreds of pictures that contribute to the final video product. They then record their voices to narrate the animation and add music and sound effects, followed by the editing process on WeVideo. This process allows the students to explore various digital programs and old-school



stop-motion techniques, all while giving them an unforgettable lesson on how matter can be changed by heating or cooling.

It is incredible to see how far teaching and learning has come. Mr. Nakatsu’s ability to engage his young students in the standards, while also giving them career-technical education experience, is truly a remarkable thing to see.

Students also shared that they became more independent.

“When my computer wouldn’t work or I didn’t understand something, I figured things out on my own,” a student said. “It felt good.”

As we close this school year, we know that emphasis on social-emotional health will continue to be a priority. Knowing that students used these strategies in the face of adversity makes it even more essential.

Curiosity and Skill Building

Three years ago, most of our teachers were introduced to Cognitively Guided Instruction (CGI). Over the course of the training, we learned about this constructivist approach to teaching math and its benefits. Instead of teaching our students algorithms, procedures and facts to memorize, our CGI trainer urged us to draw on students' natural curiosity and inquisitiveness to build deep conceptual understanding and engage in rich conversations about the mathematical concepts that serve as the foundation. I have been impressed to find how quickly students become engaged in counting, sorting and thinking about numbers.

As I walk into the kindergarten classrooms weekly and at random times, I find that these students are given this time and instruction on a regular basis. I am thrilled to see that our students are provided ample time to exercise their skills and curiosity as they explore numbers and counting.

CGI teaching strategies definitely help us build strong conceptual understanding and flexible thinking. It is my hope that as we all become more proficient in the implementation of these strategies, we will see greater success and love for math in the near future.





Favorite Tree House Adventure





Feeling "Inspired"






The Tomb of a Dead Emperor

Sadako's Wish




