Social Emotional Learning as a Lever for Equity and Academic Rigor: Our Pillars for Success

Seeing the faces of our students as we welcomed them back to our schools was a compelling reminder of our collective WHY and our vision for academic success in Norwalk-La Mirada: leading our community into the future by developing students who are open-minded and curious, skilled in critical thinking, working collaboratively, and using current and emerging technologies. We strive to meet the needs of all students by tapping into their motivations and strengths to ensure that every student graduates prepared to succeed in college and careers, and participate positively in our community's civic life.

To accomplish this effort, we have engaged stakeholder groups in constructive dialogue to address and mitigate the effects of the pandemic, and to ensure a plan for learning recovery. Our first and most important priority has been student and staff safety. It was recently noted by Los Angeles County Department of Public Health that some of our sites “should be used as an ‘example’ of how each school should be moving forward” as it relates to the implementation of safety protocols at our schools.

This year we are continuing with our work on a coherence framework to guide our vision, as well as additional supports to achieve our goals. Part of this work is rooted in our collective understanding of what constitutes a solid foundation for College and Career Readiness: Social Emotional Learning and Academic Rigor and Relevance. Our emphasis on Equity, targeted professional development opportunities, intervention and enrichment supports, mental health and wellness, visual and performing arts, professional learning communities, early literacy, and a laser-like focus on learning recovery will ensure that we will live up to our promise, Every Student — Future Ready.

Norwalk-La Mirada continues to excel, receiving a California School Boards Association Golden Bell Award in 2020 and 2021, California Distinguished Schools, California Schools to Watch, California Exemplary Arts Education Award, recognized ASCA (American School Counselor Association) model programs, Top Public Schools, UCLA Center X Reciprocal Learning Partnership Framework recognition, Skills-USA awards, Harbor Freight award, and much more. At NLMUSD students are prepared for the future: college, career, and life ready!

This year we have four students enrolled in our Head Start Program with Down Syndrome. These students can do anything anyone else can do. They have the same abilities but it may take them longer to do them, but that is okay! Most people have 46 chromosomes in each of their cells and people with Down Syndrome have 47. We are more alike than we are different and we love celebrating our students!



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Identifying Prediabetes in Children Prevents Lifelong Issues

Diabetes is a chronic medical condition in which sugar or glucose levels build up in the bloodstream. The hormone insulin helps move glucose from blood into cells, where it's used for energy.

With Type 2 diabetes, cells don't respond well to insulin, and in later stages of the disease, the body may not produce enough insulin. According to the American Diabetes Association, the COVID-19 pandemic exacerbated risk factors for diabetes in children due to limited physical activity and sedentary behaviors.

Most children diagnosed with Type 2 diabetes have prediabetes first. Prediabetes means that blood sugar is higher than it should be, but not high enough to be diabetes. Most of the time, the child will not have any symptoms. Prediabetes is a warning sign that a child is at risk for Type 2 diabetes.

Warning signs of prediabetes may include:

- Increased thirst
- Increased hunger
- Low energy levels
- Frequent urination
- Rapid weight loss
- Blurry vision

If a child has these warning signs, they should be evaluated by a doctor right away. If a child is diagnosed with prediabetes, it's important that the whole family makes healthy lifestyle changes to help support and prevent their child from getting Type 2 diabetes.

The Endocrine & Diabetes Center at MemorialCare Miller Children's & Women's Hospital Long Beach offers programs designed to diagnose, treat and manage childhood conditions, such as diabetes. The team works with families to get a child's blood sugar levels back to a safe range and help them stay at a healthy weight. Learn more at millerchildrens.org/Diabetes.

Readers are Leaders!

At Moffitt Elementary, we are committed to ensuring that all our students are prepared to develop the skills they need. Therefore, our intervention support is in full swing.

Our intervention team analyzed the i-Ready reading data from last year and started screening upper-grade students as soon as possible. Students were screened with the CORE phonics assessment

and the phonemic-awareness assessment. Our upper grades have many students with significant learning gaps, so they were put into groups with like needs. But the groups are large! So, when our paraeducators were given the opportunity for more hours, many took it! We will be able to train our paraeducators and make our intervention groups smaller. In addition to phonics groups, we have a newcomer group, too, so that the needs of all our upper-grade students are getting addressed.

We have even more layers of support in our primary grades. First- and second-grade teachers have made gap filling a priority by teaching Sound Partners to their entire classes. Two groups of high school students, JGHS students and ACE students come a total of three times a week to read one on one with struggling students to provide extra practice and a one-on-one mentoring support.

We are already seeing growth and excitement for learning from our students! We are definitely all hands on deck for Moffitt Mustangs!


Family Math Time
