

Springtime Fun Along Our Coastline

Spring has officially sprung giving us warmer weather, more hours of sunlight, and blooming flowers. And what better way to celebrate the change in seasons than along our beautiful coastline. From picnicking at the Colorado Lagoon with family, to strolling along the Shoreline Walking Path with a friend, to cycling along the Queensway Bike Path for some exercise, there are many activities to choose from for some outdoor springtime fun.

We can enjoy these activities thanks to Tidelands funded project improvements along our 7 mile-coastline. In 2010, my Office found that the calculation of the Harbor Department's annual transfer into the City's Tidelands Fund resulted in fluctuating transfer amounts. To stabilize this revenue source, I recommended changing the basis of the transfer from 10% of the increase in net assets to 5% of gross operating revenue. This required a City Charter change, and I advocated for the Harbor Initiative (Measure D) to reform the transfer basis and redirect the control of oil properties to the City. It was passed by the voters creating a more transparent and reliable source of money for the Tidelands area.

Since then, the City has received and invested over \$150 million to fund Tidelands projects and operations. These investments have led to cleaner beaches and improved water quality, enhanced infrastructure and facilities, and provided safety and increased security. For example, these Tidelands Funds were used for the Colorado Lagoon Restoration project where natural habitat was restored with the addition of native plants and water quality was improved through dredging. Since restoration, the Colorado Lagoon has been removed from Heal the Bay's most polluted beaches list. Tidelands Funds have also been used on infrastructure enhancements including walking and bike path improvements, beach restrooms, and a new dock at the Leeway Sailing and Aquatics Center. In addition, Tidelands Funds have been dedicated to year-round beach safety patrol, such as lifeguards and members of the certified Dive and Swiftwater Rescue Teams, keeping beachgoers and boaters safe. The Tidelands Fund supported other safety projects too, such as more patrol officers at the Pike and lighting and security cameras at Rainbow Harbor.

We can truly enjoy outdoor activities with family and friends knowing that this on-going source of revenue will allow our City to continue to make environmental, infrastructure, and safety improvements along our favorite coastline.

Continuing as City Prosecutor

I will share with you why I have decided to continue as Long Beach City Prosecutor, the elected position I have held for 12 years. There are three reasons.

To start, I am passionate about Long Beach, and this is the best way I can serve the community. Service is important to me. My grandfather Harvey Stockwell taught at three LBUSD high schools after a full career in the U.S. Army, and he showed me it was important and noble to serve. A building on the campus of LB Poly HS, called Stockwell Hall, is named in his honor.

The second reason has to do with the criminal problems we are facing. The crime rate in California and Los Angeles County is rising, and while crime has not increased as much in Long Beach, I am worried recent crime trends will impact us more.

I've been a prosecutor for 21 years, the last 12 as Long Beach's top prosecutor. In addition to successfully prosecuting cases in the courtroom, a prosecutor can do more to address crime. My award-winning Gang Prevention Strategy is considered a model because it combats gangs using multiple strategies. With the concerning new crime trend, my background and experience is more critical now than ever before.

Finally, despite all of the accomplishments of my office, there is still more work to do. In recent years we started a Homeless Court to help connect homeless people into services. We also started a successful program called PAD, which gets homeless people who suffer from mental illness or substance abuse into residential rehabilitation. This gets them off the streets and into treatment.

It is an honor to serve Long Beach as its City Prosecutor. This position requires a lot of work and sacrifice, but it also gives me the ability to make the city better and safer. This is my way of serving the community I love, and I am proud to continue to serve.

Are there Perils to Electronic Signatures?

With all the technology that has been integrated into real estate and real estate financing transactions, one of the most luxurious aspects that has evolved is the timesaving pleasure of electronic signatures. It is fast, it is simple, it can be done anywhere, and on most any device: your computer, your tablet, or your mobile phone.

Many years ago at an inspection for one of my listings, I witnessed a very experienced agent push a huge stack of disclosures about the home that her clients, a young couple, was purchasing across the counter with only the phrases, "Sign here. Initial here. Sign here. Initial here," being uttered. With my legal background, and my Type- A personality, I was, quite frankly, appalled and had to actually leave the room.

Every document, and especially the multiple page contract to purchase real estate, is a legally binding document with consequences based on the selections made by the buyer, and agreed to by the seller. The many disclosures and the information provided by the seller are essentially the results of past litigations and are meant to inform and alert the buyer to conditions specific to the property they are purchasing.

So, is there a danger in executing documents electronically? Quite simply put, not if you read them and understand what you are signing.

That is what your agent or your broker is for. Whether you are a buyer or a seller, please read what you are signing and ask your agent, who represents your interests, to explain to you any portions of the documents that you do not fully understand. It is not a race to sign these documents as swiftly as possible, but it is paramount that you understand what they mean and the consequences of your actions and the actions of others.

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Could Your Child Need Ear Tubes?

Ear infections are common for children 6-months-old to 8-years-old and may be the result of a bad "cold" that has progressed, family genetics, or poor ventilation in the ear.

For children who have chronic ear infections, tend to retain fluid in the middle ear, or have chronic fluid build-up in the middle ear – "ear tubes" may be recommended. Ear tubes are small cylinders that are surgically implanted that allow air to flow in and out of the middle ear, which prevents the development of negative pressure, as well as fluid-build up.

Ear tube surgery, or tympanostomy tube insertion surgery, is the most common childhood surgery in the U.S. It's important to have this type of surgery performed by pediatric otolaryngologists at children's hospitals, like MemorialCare Miller Children's & Women's Hospital Long Beach, who receive extended training in order to make the decision to operate on growing and developing bodies.

But not every child with an ear infection is recommended ear tube placement. So how do you know when to ask your doctor about ear tubes?

- Your child has three or more ear infections within six months, and retains fluid in their ear between infections.
- Your child has suffered hearing loss caused by persistent build-up of fluid in the middle ear.
- Your child has a collapsed ear drum, which can erode the bones in the ear.

Speak to your pediatrician if your child is experiencing chronic ear infections to prevent potential hearing loss in your child.

Safe and Positive Spaces for Students

There is an unwritten traditional path that most school leaders follow throughout their career trajectory, often beginning in the classroom and slowly moving up the ranks as school site administrators before taking leadership roles at a district or county level. Not too many have their roots in social work.

My path has never been traditional. I dropped out of high school during my first year. I became a mother to a child with a severe disability at 16. I also earned my bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degrees while raising my children.

My life trajectory does not fit into any template, but neither do the many lives of the close to 2 million school-aged children in Los Angeles County. That reality propelled me into a career in school social work.

The recognition of Social Work Month in March reminds me to pause and reflect on how my perspective as a social worker has played such a significant role in how I view the transformational power of schools, and most significantly, the impact that student access to on-campus mental health services can have on overall community wellbeing. School

mental health professionals, including counselors, social workers, and psychologists, play a vital role in creating positive, safe, and affirming school environments.

School social workers are trained mental health professionals who can assist with mental health concerns, behavioral concerns, positive behavioral support, academic, and classroom support, consultation with teachers, parents, and administrators as well as provide individual and group counseling/therapy. They act as a link between the home, school and community and connect indirect services to students, families, and school personnel to promote and support students' academic and social success.

Mental health challenges existed long before the pandemic and [U.S. Surgeon General Dr. Vivek Murthy's recent advisory on the youth mental health crisis](#) affirms that they will persist long after. Our schools need mental health professionals on staff to support the overall wellbeing of students.

In 2017-2018, the National Center for Education Statistics found that [two of the major factors limiting schools from providing mental health services](#) are (1) inadequate access to licensed mental health professionals and (2) inadequate funding. In that same

As COVID Restrictions Ease, Students, Staff Stay Focused

Our schools continue to take gradual but important steps toward a greater sense of normalcy after two years of the global pandemic. Throughout this transition, our students and staff have shown great focus and resilience.

As I write this piece in mid-March, we've just concluded our first week of mask-optional learning in our schools. A few weeks earlier, we had eased restrictions on group events. For each of these decision points and for many others, we have carefully consulted with partners including Long Beach Health and Human Services.

The month of March also marked the significant milestone of two years since the pandemic forced us to close our school campuses for what we initially thought would be a few weeks. Together, we have come a long way since that especially difficult time, reopening our schools to in-person learning, and working diligently to address students' social-emotional and academic needs in light of the pandemic. Our efforts include the hiring of hundreds of certificated staff, including teachers, counselors and social workers. We are also implementing literacy acceleration and intervention at every elementary and K-8 school, and providing many other types of specialized support, much of which is detailed in our Learning Acceleration and Support Plan available at lbschools.net.

All of our staff, students and their families deserve a huge thankyou for their perseverance in recent months. After two years in a pandemic, our schools remain at the heart of our community because of our collective commitment to our children. I'd also like to congratulate some specific individuals and schools on their recent achievements:

Sarah Savala, a physical education and dance teacher at Marshall Academy for the Arts, was selected as the recipient of the Middle School Physical Education Teacher of the Year Award from the California Association of Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance. We're so proud to have one of the state's best P.E. teachers.

The California Academy of Mathematics and Science recently earned a \$10,000 Lemelson-MIT InvenTeam grant to create its invention of a child drowning prevention device. CAMS is one of only eight high schools nationwide to be selected as an InvenTeam this year. The CAMS InvenTeam is creating the Swim Monitor, a wearable anti-drowning wristband that works with an external smart-phone app to detect and notify when someone is at risk of drowning in beaches or pools. Amazing!

Megan Lane, a senior at Poly High School, earned first place and a \$200 prize in the 2022 Long Beach NAACP Black History Month Youth and College Scholars competition. She has accomplished much during her educational career, and I have had the great pleasure of getting to know Megan in her role as co-chair for my Superintendent's Student Advisory Committee.

Several LBUSD high school students were among the recently announced awardees of the \$1,000 Donna Kelly Memorial Scholarship from the Downtown Long Beach Lions Club. The winners include Jason Perez, Tyler Nguyen and Maryam Moujahid Rubio of CAMS; Karla DeAlba, Carlos DeAlba and Vietduke Thai of Poly; Kelly Diaz-Cervantes and Aracely Asis of Cabrillo; Jasmine Padilla, Eryn Cassidy and Virginia Soto Hernandez of Avalon; and Joseph Pecot of Millikan.

These are just a few examples of excellence and equity in action. We look forward to sharing many more, and we sincerely thank everyone who supports this important work.

year, about 51 percent of public schools (or 42,200 schools) reported providing diagnostic mental health assessment services to evaluate students for mental health disorders¹.

If a silver lining to the pandemic exists, it is that our society has begun to understand how essential mental health support is to overall wellbeing and resiliency, positively impacting students' school performance and overall success. We anticipate increased federal and state funding to support the recruitment and retention of mental professionals in our schools, as our country acts with a sense of urgency to address the impact of the pandemic on mental health.

As we emerge from the COVID-19 pandemic into a new era of education that prioritizes social-emotional

support, I want to encourage young people and community members to explore careers in school social work. We need professionals invested in the success of our communities and the wellbeing of students.

Social work is a rewarding profession that provides you with an opportunity to make a difference in people's lives when they need it the most. So, explore a career in social work, knowing that it will open a world of opportunities based on your population of interest, domestically or internationally. Whether it be in education or any other sector, the possibilities are endless!

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Campus Improvements Continue Districtwide

Our Board of Education recently heard an encouraging Annual Report from local entrepreneur Walter Larkins. He voluntarily chairs the Citizens' Oversight Committee that makes sure we're using school bond funds as intended, to provide safe and modern learning environments for our children.

The Annual Report, presented during a regular school board meeting, showed that after a rigorous review process, an independent audit firm granted our school district its highest financial accountability and performance rating for the ninth year in a row. That kind of affirmation is always great to hear. But even more gratifying is walking into a newly built or renovated school building for the first time and realizing the tremendous, positive impact that such facilities will have upon our students and staff for years to come.

The recent report noted that the 2020-21 fiscal year welcomed students back to classroom-based teaching following the unprecedented shift to remote learning at all of our campuses during the global COVID-19 pandemic. In many cases, our school district used the pandemic-induced down time at our campuses to accelerate project completion. Thousands of students returned to renovated classrooms or learning spaces constructed from the ground up, including Millikan High School's new 50,000-square-foot facility, designed to accommodate specific needs of the school's academies or learning pathways. Millikan also benefitted from a new, state-of-the-art track and field. At Jordan High School, students returned to a modernized auditorium and library.

We also saw the installation of new heating and cooling systems at more than 150 classrooms across five campuses, bringing the total number of students benefitting from such upgrades to over 16,000. Air conditioning and other renovation projects at Prisk, Fremont and Madison elementary schools and Cubberley K-8 were completed by summer 2021. Installation of Wilson High School's new heating and cooling systems will conclude in the next fiscal year. Other completed projects include Stevenson Elementary School's upgraded auditorium and cafeteria.

In the current fiscal year (2021-22), we've launched a slate of new school renovation projects designed to optimize teaching and learning.

The next phase of Jordan High School's campus-wide transformation kicked off in August with an event celebrating the school's new 31,500-square-foot classroom building.

Heating and cooling system upgrades, technology updates and other enhancements began at Twain Elementary School, Robinson K-8 and Avalon K-12. Upgrades to Lakewood High School's gym are underway.

Projects at two LBUSD campuses were started and completed in the 2021-22 fiscal year. Renovations at Bryant Elementary School wrapped up in January, and students at Lowell Elementary School are enjoying a new lunch shelter that doubles as an outdoor learning space.





Activities Away from Technology

Q. My 10-year-old son only wants to stay indoors, play video games and eat chips and the like. He doesn't like sports. I'm trying to get him outdoors and moving but he complains about the heat. Any ideas on how to get him away from becoming a couch potato and away from the TV?

A. There are plenty of programs that your son might like such as swimming, drawing, painting, camping, making pottery, volunteering at a pet shelter, cooking, graphic design for kids, etc. The whole idea is to get him into a scheduled activity three to five days a week. Some of the facilities where the activities take place have lunch served to the kids. It's usually a pretty healthy one at that. They should give you a weekly copy of them. If not, ask for one. Some programs allow kids to bring their lunch. This means that he will be eating less of the bad things and more of the good. He might even decide that eating fruit is a good break from chips. If your son can find something he likes and can participate in it with a friend, he'll be more willing to stick with it, especially if there's no pressure to be a super star. This will also give him less time to play video games or to watch TV.

Research Tutor Options

Q. My fifth-grader is struggling in math and I'm not sure why. Before the pandemic, he made good grades in math. My sister has two middle school kids who are also having a difficult time in math. We've looked into tutors but they are expensive. What are some other alternatives to getting them help without breaking our budget?

A. There are several options to choose from that may help to keep you within your budget. For example, there are some brick and mortar facilities, online companies and even personal tutors that will give a group discount for two or more kids who sign up for their professional services. Research your choices before making the best one. Unless you know someone who has personally used a company or a one-on-one tutor and can vouch for them, check references. Don't forget to also ask teachers at each school if anyone there tutors or if they have a friend that does. Recommendations from friends, family and professionals are almost always a good way to find just about anything you need. You might also call local colleges, specifically the junior colleges. After the kids start their tutoring, give it a little time to work out before rushing in and thinking that it's a lost cause. Once they connect with the new person, the new regimen will become the normal one and hopefully they'll be able to catch up.

Internship at College

Q. Our 18-year-old son is supposed to have an internship this summer at the college he is going to be attending in the fall. However, he wants to live in a college apartment and this is where we have a problem. He's never been away and we are apprehensive of the environment he could be introduced to during the "summer" party group. Any rules that you could suggest?

A. Whether he is going early for an internship or moving into a dorm for the fall, this is a big step and most parents, as well as the kids themselves, are more than anxious about leaving home and entering college. If for some reason you feel like he really isn't ready to live on his own or not sure if he could easily be persuaded to party with the summer group, you might want to talk with the adult in charge of his internship and find out if there are other options for his housing. Oftentimes, there are families who take in college students just for the summer, especially if they are new to the area. It's more personalized because the people are doing it because they enjoy mentoring new kids and showing them around. You and your son can even meet them beforehand to get to know them a little bit better and you can ask about their rules and expectations. Either way, we have to let our kids go, let them make their own choices and hope for the best.

Learning to Communicate

Q. My brother's wife is always making excuses for their kids regarding just about everything. When they start to talk on whatever the topic is, she completes their sentences and basically they have grown to look to her to speak for them. When I take them out by myself, they can barely explain things or answer questions about the topic at hand. How can I help her to realize that they need to learn how to speak for themselves?


A. As parents we want to protect our kids from making poor choices, maybe because we've made a similar one and know what the results could potentially turn out to be. Unfortunately, they need to be able to make mistakes so that they too can learn from them; it's how everyone learns best in building life skills. If we talk for them and make excuses for them, not only will they become dependent on us but they will not be able to communicate well and make wise decisions. If you can talk to your sister-in-law about it without causing friction, do so in a way that helps her understand that her current protection of them is enabling their dependency on her. If you feel it's an impossible task, talk to your brother first. If neither one can see your point, don't push the issue. Just do the best you can with the kids when you have them by encouraging them to think and speak on their own. Sooner or later they'll ask her to stop.
