Brea Olinda Unified School District and the City of Brea Partner to Offer High School Internship Program

This fall, five Brea Olinda High School students will take on an internship with the City of Brea.

Through this inaugural internship program, students will have the opportunity to connect their education to real world experiences. Students will be interning in various departments throughout the City of Brea including Community Services, the City Manager's Office, Purchasing, Special Events and the Curtis Theatre.

The City of Brea has a history of offering an internship program for college students, but had never explored the idea of offering a similar program to high school seniors. This particular collaboration seemed to be a great opportunity to pilot a program.

This new internship program will provide work experience that helps Brea Olinda High School students put their education into practice, develop their leadership skills and give them a competitive advantage as they think about life after high school. The internship program will give high school students the opportunity to:

- Practice and improve their industry skills while also learning how to work in a formal setting.
- Gain a better understanding of how what they are learning in school can help them with their future.
- Master professional soft skills such as communication, punctuality and time management.
- Build a professional network.

This internship program is a win-win for our students and the entire community. For our students, work experience will help them make good career decisions while building their professional network. By employing high school students, the City of Brea receives exposure to talent early in their career journey which helps support the well-being of the entire Brea community.





Spread Fun. Not Flu!

Healthy kids of any age can get seriously sick from the flu, and they can spread it to family and friends. One of the best ways to stop the spread of the flu is to get vaccinated. Almost everyone 6 months of age and older should get a flu vaccine every year. But did you know, there are other ways to stop the spread of germs?

You and your family can prevent the spread of flu at home, work or school by following these simple steps.

Step 1: Cover your mouth and nose when you cough or sneeze.

- Cough or sneeze into a tissue and then throw it away.
- No tissue? Cough or sneeze into your sleeve (elbow) or shirt (shoulder).

Step 2: Clean your hands often.

- Wash your hands with soap and warm water for at least 20 seconds or long enough to sing the "Happy Birthday" song twice.
- No soap around? Use hand sanitizer gel or hand wipes.
- Avoid touching your mouth, nose and eyes.

Step 3: Avoid close contact with people who have the flu.

• If possible, when your child has the flu, keep them home from school to help avoid spreading germs.

Step 4: Clean and disinfect surfaces and objects.

• Clean frequently touched surfaces and objects at home or school, especially if someone is ill.

The number of flu cases increases drastically by December each year, with flu season peaking in January, February or March. As we head into the holidays, remember to spread fun, and not flu!

Think Tank Teamwork!

Country Hills students have been "ROARing" through makerspace challenges in our recently completed Think Tank. These challenges provide students the opportunity to practice the 4 C's of 21st Century Learning: creating, collaborating, communicating and critical thinking in a fun, flexible environment.

Each month, students are presented with new hands-on activities that foster problem solving and teamwork. In a recent challenge using wooden block toys, students were given the task of building a functional ramp containing a right turn that would allow a marble to pass smoothly without the addition of force. Each small group utilized the design process to brainstorm, plan, create, and improve their ramp designs. At the end of the lesson, teams discussed real-world applications of their designs and reflected on their level of sharing, listening, compromising and participation in the challenge.
