



Students Earn College Credit through Dual Enrollment

California School of the Arts – San Gabriel Valley (CSArts-SGV) students in grades 10-12 can take up to two years of transferable college courses while enrolled at CSArts-SGV as part of Citrus College's Early College Program.

This opportunity has provided students with insight into the college experience while also allowing their families to save

money on future college expenses. Students enroll at no cost, and costs for books and course materials are waived. Through dual enrollment, students are able to take synchronous and asynchronous classes college-level courses, allowing them flexibility.

The Early College Program has flourished since the program was first piloted at CSArts-SGV in 2018. It now enrolls about 400 students per semester in approximately 24 academic and arts-focused courses; ranging from biotechnology to music fundamentals.

Dual enrollment courses enable CSArts-SGV students to get a real glimpse of the college experience, while also propelling them in their studies.


Doing things with PRIDE at Duarte High, the Falcon Way!

Student's taking Control During a Pandemic

Karina Alvarez, ASB President, and the ASB members recognized this need and took an aggressive approach to address the social-emotional challenges that many of the students were facing. They realized that in order for their peers to overcome

these challenges they needed tools. The ASB members started a newsletter and provided survival tips to bolster mental health and maintain social emotional connections during distance learning. ASB members volunteered to facilitate lunch meetings for the student body. They made posters to welcome the students back to hybrid learning. The inspirational quotes, words of encouragement and cheer livened up the hallways at Maxwell Academy. In the midst of the pandemic, the true leaders emerged. The ASB members embodied caring for themselves and others. It has often been said that the most important skills you can learn are to be the best person you can be and to make the world a better place. The great thing about the pandemic is it brought about the opportunity for our students to practice leadership during distance learning, and it emerged out of a desire to ensure the social emotional health for fellow classmates. I salute Maxwell ASB members for taking the initiative to support the socialemotional health of students at Maxwell Academy, an international baccalaureate world school. SEL at MIT during the Pandemic

Social Emotional Learning (SEL) has been paramount during the pandemic, and I would even venture to say it was a necessity, so students could function and find some normalcy in a world turned upside down. D'Veal Family and Youth Counseling Services one of those SEL collaborators for our students at Mt. Olive Innovation & Technology High School (MIT). D'Veal

provided social and mental health services for at riskyouth by providing comprehensive behavioral healthcare services. Their counselors provided innovative communitybased services including individual counseling, group counseling, specialty groups, and much more.

During this pandemic, MIT faced the challenge of providing Social Emotional Learning (SEL) support for our students who have been in isolation with limited social interaction. This put a huge strain on our MIT families, and in turn our students. Well, that is where D'Veal collaborated with MIT to provide weekly virtual SEL group support during 2020-21. D'Veal counselor Alejandro Aguilar ran

the "Alive and Free" Boys Group every Thursday. "Alive and Free" helps youth build character and work through difficult times or trauma they are experiencing, like with the pandemic. Several other D'Veal counselors ran the "Alive and Free" with our Girls Empowerment Group and Non-Binary Group. This gave all students a safe place to share and work through the challenges of the pandemic with their peers and trained professionals. MIT parents were happy their youth were engaged with the "Alive and Free" program and made it appoint to make sure their child attended every week.

In addition, MIT also continued with our weekly CHILL Guest Speakers Series (CHILL stands for Career, Health, Interventions, and Life-Skills Literacy). Guest speakers that participated included LA Metro, Planned Parenthood, Credit Union of Southern California, US Marines, Citrus College, Pasadena City College, Foothill Credit Union, National Guard, City of Hope, CVS, Outward Bound Adventures, and Azusa Pacific University.

These programs helped keep our students engaged and safe!





Parent To Parent

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, often our kids were on their devices upwards of eight hours per day. What can parents do to keep them safe online and on their cell phones? It seems like more than ever, kids are getting spam emails, calls and texts from unknown sources. This is not acceptable, quite scary and exhausting to try to constantly monitor.

COVID-19 has isolated the majority of us

and leaves us with levels of uncertainty, unusual scariness and frequent loneliness. Individuals are in a vulnerable place, especially our kids. This is the perfect time for sexual predators to approach them as it can come in many forms.

Give your kids a set of online safety rules that they will understand with explanations that they will believe and take to heart.

It's important for you to know which online games that your kids are playing. Many are multiplayer games where several online players can be together playing at once or just watching. These games have text and voice chat capabilities from around the world. This is highly dangerous because people can pretend to be someone else and of a certain age and can expose kids to unsuitable and unacceptable predatory language and content. These individuals can develop friendships with kids and eventually encourage them to meet in real life. It's important to recognize that each game has specific settings which you should check out and change for better online safety.

Remember not only to talk with your kids frequently about staying safe online, but also explain that anyone at any age can be cyberbullied. If a person or group want them to chime in about someone, tell them to ignore the request and don't return to that area and group. Explain why it's so important to think about what they are going to post at any given time or in any area before doing so, to keep their passwords safe, to always log off and not to click on links from people that they don't know. The right thing to do is to report the cyberbullying to an authoritative figure as well. They may just save a life.

You could also take their electronic devices away for a few hours each day, but for those hours that they're on them, rules and guidelines still need to be in place. Even if your kids seem to have level heads on their shoulders and you feel like you can trust them, they can still be sneaky.

It's easy to hide all kinds of online activities from parents with various apps:

Snapchat is a program where people can send images, videos, etc. to friends which will disappear within 10 to 30 seconds. It's pretty popular among teens. The hidden danger is that those "private" moments are not really deleted. They're hidden in files on most phones. Even more devastating and scary is that if someone takes a screen shot, the message, image or whatever can be posted anywhere.

Finsta is a fake Instagram account where anyone can create photos, conversations, etc., staying anonymous and keeping everything private through sharing with a few close friends and can be hidden on devices. But again, just like anything else, if a screen shot is taken, boom, it can show up anywhere online.

Be sure to read about popular apps and arm yourself with knowledge for options that you as the parent can do to help your kids be safe. Below you'll find a few but there's many others that you can find by doing an online search: Instagram, YouTube, Kik, Telegram, TikTok

There's also several phone apps offered to parents to help them monitor their kids' phone and online activities.

For unwanted calls or texts, it's simple to register landlines and cell phone numbers with the office of your state Attorney General's No-Call list for unwanted calls or texts. It's available online, free and will cut down on both. While it does take a few weeks to actually go into effect, it's best to get that done straight away. Do a little research and you'll also find several other government agencies where complaints can be made. Unfortunately, it's not going to totally eliminate them and that is even truer for robot calls. Learning some basic rules to share with your kids can also help.

For example: Don't answer any calls that are not in your contact list. If it's truly someone trying to reach you, they'll leave a message. If they don't, the number can quickly be blocked. The same goes for unwanted texts. The exception in this situation is going to be from "Unknown" or "Private" numbers, which are really hard to trace because no number shows up. However, there are phone apps to help with this. As far as spam email goes, if it's opened, don't click on any links. Look up how to set up filters and teach your kids how to recognize, delete and block it.

As you are well aware, this whole cyber safety situation is extremely exhausting. But, there's no way of getting around it if you're going to be proactive in protecting your children.

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
