

Preschool Program


HSD Preschools offer early childhood educational programs for children who are three and four-years old. Families must meet State income requirements.

Hawthorne School District Solar Celebration

Celebración por la Instalación de Paneles Solares del Distrito Escolar de Hawthorne

On April 3rd the Hawthorne School District held an event at Prairie Vista Middle School to celebrate the installation of solar panels at nine of our ten schools. Jefferson School does not have enough accessible sunlight to make the installation of solar viable at that site.

In addition to the prospect of reduced electric bills, the solar structures provide much

needed shade for our students. To erect shade structures at our schools was cost prohibitive. The solar structures were installed at no cost to the District. These structures produce renewable energy, reduce utility costs, and provide a protected area for students on some of our hot and sunny Southern California days.

Renewable energy in the form of solar has arrived in the Hawthorne School District. I am sure this concept will be the subject of projects completed by our students. I am happy we are able to model the benefits of solar energy for our students and community.

In our first year of implementation, we trained fourth- and fifth-grade teachers,

purchased materials, and taught learning modules in the areas of computer science, engineering, and biomedical science. Our fourth-graders are currently working on a module on energy in collisions. At the end of the module, groups will create vehicles with safety restraints to keep their eggs from cracking when their vehicles crash.
