

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'Journey to Success' College Fair

Reaching out to its large local Cambodian community, Cal State Long Beach (CSULB) hosted "Journey to Success," a college fair for Cambodian and other Southeast Asian Communities recently in the campus' University Student Union.

Some 250 middle school, high school and community college students and parents attended the free event to learn how to prepare early for college. A variety of workshops provided information on CSU admission requirements and application processes; how to pay for college; and CSU's other college preparation and admission resources that are available online.

"The CSU's Journey to Success college fairs are valuable because they serve to educate both prospective students and their parents about what it takes to go to college," said CSU Chancellor Charles B. Reed. "These events are strongly family oriented because parents play such an important role in the education of their children."

Parents shared their experiences and heard about the relevance of college to life in the United States, job satisfaction and giving back to the community. They also received tips on how to help their children meet their educational goals.

A group of Cambodian professionals who have received degrees in medicine, social work, law, and psychology at universities in the United States shared their feelings of self-worth, financial stability, sense of achievement and satisfaction received from their professional careers.

Receiving a higher education degree in Cambodia is a privilege, said MaryAnn Seng a psychologist who works for the Long Beach Unified School District. "In the United States it is an opportunity that is open to you," she added. The professionals agreed that as a result of having higher education they have become more interested in traveling to see the world and enriching their lives.

Students heard from CSU officials about the habits they need to acquire when getting to college and about the rewards of learning to be independent and responsible for themselves.

"You have to wake up on your own when you live in a college dormitory; you pick your own schedule; you decide what and when to eat and you make things happen," said Corion Lucas, a member of CSULB's student services office. "You enrich your life by being with all kinds of people and you can take classes in another country and get credit for them."

In addition to the workshops, the college fair included booths and tables with representatives from many local area colleges and universities ready to provide information and assistance to students and parents in attendance.

Damon Dunn was born in Fort Worth, Texas to a 16 year-old single mother. He grew up in a three-bedroom trailer with ten people. His father was killed when Damon was three years old. Two of his uncles went to prison. But that mother of his kept going to school, setting her sights for herself and her son as high as she could set them. She taught him the value of hard work

and told him to be a good boy because "God has a plan for you."

Damon went on to be an honor student in high school and was recognized as a Texas All-State Football player. He was awarded a scholarship to Stanford University. At Stanford he had a record-setting football career, ran track and was a stellar student academically. He was awarded the NCAA Academic Scholarship, All-Pac 10 Honors and Academic All-Pac 10 Honors, and the NFL and College Hall of Fame Award. He went on to play pro football for the NFL with the following teams: Dallas Cowboys, Jackson Jaguars, Cleveland Browns, and New York Jets.

Since leaving the NFL, Damon co-founded a successful real estate firm and has at the age of 35 retired so that he can devote his life to helping youth succeed in school and in life. He moved back to Long Beach this year. He has already set a blistering pace for fundraising and program development as the newest member of the Board of Directors of the Long Beach Education Foundation. His Future Business Leaders Academy works with 23 high school youth from the MALE and FEMALE Academies, programs that seek and find at-promise youth and help them develop their potential and enroll in college. The Future Business Leaders program is a collaboration between the Long Beach Area Chamber of Commerce, Long Beach Unified School District, and Long Beach City College. He has had a 100% success rate in his first go-around.

"We talk about the achievement gap a lot. I want to talk about the Expectation Gap. Some of our most at-promise youth have tremendous potential within, but they don't believe it. I started this program and invested enough to give each participant a \$1,000 scholarship to college if they finish it. My Mom always said, "God has a plan for you." Eventually, I began to believe it. But it takes hard work."

Financial Tips

Beware of New Scam to Steal Your Identity Money Saving Tips for the Holidays

I continue to be amazed by how much effort and creativity "crooks" use to scam or otherwise steal or hurt innocent people. If they were employees, and performed this imaginatively and thoroughly, they'd surely be employees of the month.

The new scam involves the use of Craigslist and homes that are for sale. The scammers identify a property that is for sale, collect images from the Internet, and then list it for rent on Craigslist. The advertised rent is very appealing, usually low or offering to pay utilities, or cable service. When a person makes an inquiry about the property, the scammer invites them to complete an application. This application is what they are after, of course.

The Craigslist ads are vague. When a party calls about the rental, they are given a story about how the homeowner is forced to move out of state to care for an ailing relative. And that the move is going to be for a substantial period of time, so they are looking for an honest, sincere family to move into their residence during this absence.

Scammers may make viewing the property hard to view. A reliable landlord or rental agent will want you to see the property. Scammers may say the keys will be delivered after the application is completed. This is not standard protocol. Run quickly from a person who tells you this.

To avoid scams, work with reputable firms. And do your research. If average rents are \$2000 and you see a home advertised for \$1000, ask yourself why. Remember that things that seem too good to be true, really can be.


The Family Library

New Opportunity for Success

Beach High School, opened in September 2011, provides a unique opportunity for credit-deficient LBUSD high school students to make up credits and get a new start toward academic

"We are already having many great success stories with students who just needed a little extra individual help or a special schedule," said lead teacher Lisa Lauriano.

Under the direction of Matt Saldana, Beach High's principle, Ms. Lauriano and the other teachers have developed a safe,

educationally sound program. The 350 students attend classes in a lab setting in conjunction with teacher-directed pullout classes and small-group instruction. The curriculum covers all courses required to complete individual grade requirements, including physical education for 10th-graders. For students who need remedial assistance in basic subjects, there is a literacy center on campus for basic math, reading and writing instruction.

Beach High School offers an alternative to the traditional high school schedule. There are three sessions daily—8 a.m.-noon, noon-4 p.m. and 4–8p.m.—to meet the needs of individual students and their families. Students who attend Beach High must be referred by their high school counselors.

The school is open to 10th to 12th grade students but is proving to be especially beneficial for students who did not start high school successfully or do their best work in ninth grade. Making up lost credits provides the opportunity for these students to start afresh. Once they are back on track, it increases their chances to be successful students and graduate with their respective classes.

Burbank Joins the 800 Club!

According to the No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB), federal and state governments set performance markers based upon the results of statewide standardized testing. In California this is known as the California Standards Test (CST).

For accountability purposes, the federal government implements the Adequate Yearly Progress scale (AYP), and the state government utilizes the Academic Performance Index scale (API). Each year, a school is given a target number of points to gain or exceed on both its AYP and API.

The goal of the state's accountability measure is to have each school at or above an 800-point threshold (the scale ranges from 200?1000). The API serves as a catalyst for driving school improvement related to student achievement in combination with the federal legislation.

Burbank began the last school year at 788 points, and was given a target growth of 5 API/AYP points. Through the continuous and dedicated efforts of our teachers in providing a quality, standards-based instruction, and the diligent work of our students and parents, Burbank reached the state's milestone with a resounding AYP and API growth of 17 points, and an overall total of 805!

This achievement is the result of the Burbank community working together to support the Long Beach Unified School District's mission of providing the best education for every student, every day.

On the Cutting Edge

The California Academy of Math and Science (CAMS) sent three Vex Robotics teams to compete at Viewpoint High School in Calabasas. Team 687 K won the coveted Excellence award and now qualifies to compete in the VEX World Championships to be held in Anaheim in April 2012. Teams 687 K and 687 N will be competing in Hawaii's Pan Pacific Vex Robotics Championship in December.

Principal As part of the Principles of Engineering curriculum, all CAMS sophomores were invited to attend one of four field trips to expand their knowledge of alternate energy sources. At the Edward C. Little Water Recycling Facility in El Segundo, students discovered that the West Basin Municipal Water District uses a 60,000 square-foot solar power generating system to help reduce their use of electricity generated by non-renewable resources. Other students toured the facilities of a windmill blade manufacturer in Huntington Beach. When assembled, these blades exceed 150 feet in length.

CAMS is entering the prestigious Solar Cup for a second year. This engineering competition, sponsored by the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California, requires high school teams to build, equip, and race 16-foot, single-seat canoes powered only by the sun. In November, 14 CAMS students traveled to Claremont to build the boat's wooden hull and received support to furnish the boat for competition in May 2012.


The Garfield staff and community know how important it is for children to read every day as they work towards becoming more proficient readers. So Garfield has made it a priority that books get into the hands of every student.

21st-Century Learners

Technology is used to enhance learning at all grade levels at Patrick Henry School. Beginning in kindergarten, students access a state-of-the-art iMac computer lab on a weekly basis. Students practice skills on educational software, conduct research using Web-based media, and produce projects using Kidpix, PowerPoint, and iMovie. Each classroom also has a minimum of three computers with Internet access for practice and enrichment. Our computer lab instructor, Ms. Roberts, collaborates with teachers to develop project-based learning while students gain proficiency in technology standards.

In middle school, students master more advanced technology standards as they complete computer electives. Our technology teacher, Mr. DeSantiago, integrates technology instruction with core curriculum standards. Students produce projects using Word, Excel, PowerPoint, iPhoto, iMovie and Web browsers. Technology courses are taught in both English and Spanish as part Henry's Dual Immersion program.

our first-annual "Moms and Muffins" morning. Hundreds of students brought in





Songs from the Baobab

This beautiful collection is one that parents may play even if the children aren't home, particularly if they were fans of Miriam Makeba or were blown away by the South African group Ladysmith Black Mambazo on Paul Simon's Graceland. The set includes a CD and a colorfully illustrated book by French children's book artist and illustrator Élodie Nouhen; it includes lyrics, explanatory notes translated into English, and geographical information that shows children that Africa isn't one large country but 54 independent ones, with different languages spoken throughout.

On the disc are lullabies, game songs, and nature anthems, all to be sung to or by children. The lullabies calm and amuse crying, upset children through rocking and movement. In light of the hard lives that so many African children endure, it isn't surprising that the greater part of the songs falls into the lullaby category. A lilting shepherd's flute threads plaintively through "Yum-maa yehii jaabe," (Your Mother Has Gone to Search for Jujubes); in the song, the child's mother is absent, and the singer tells the child that the mother was out hunting fruits. Orphaned African children are often taken in by other families; "In Ga" and "Faatime Hawwaa" tell of the sadness of children who know that they aren't as valued as are the birth children.

There are joyful songs as well. "Îtä Zâke" translates from the Sango tongue to "Frère Jacques"; it was taught as a "time to wake up" song in Central African French schools. Game songs include "Kabuye Kanjye" (My Little Pebble) with clear instructions for playing a stone-passing game, and there is a Togo version of "This Little Piggy," titled "Eya Bé" (He Says).

A best-seller in France, Baobab is set to tell its stories on this continent. Welcome it into your home, heart and ears.

Love Me for Who I Am

"Please don't try to fix me. Love me for who I am. I may not talk the way you talk, but I've got some things to say....And I may not walk the way you walk, but I've got some place to go." Love Me for Who I Am Grammy-award nominee Brady Rymer has taken diversity and inclusion to a new and worthy level.


Love Me was inspired by Rymer's work with children at the Celebrate the Children School in Wharton, N.J. The school specializes in alternative learning styles, including autism and other communicative disorders. Rymer's lyrics celebrate the children there and surprise us with the realization that the feelings and thoughts in them are universal among us.

Rymer and the musicians provide catchy folk- and reggae-flavored tunes. The CD art was created by Zoe Kakolyris, an artist with Asperger syndrome who is also deaf. The songs themselves deal with identity, discomfort, tuning out, moving around—or not—and other traits that characterize autism but have a broader reach. "Picky Eater," "I Don't Like Change" and "Who Wants to Wear Shoes?" describe a special-needs child's extreme discomfort with certain sensations or things that go off pattern. "So Many Ideas" addresses the frustration of not being able to communicate feelings and ideas—"I've got so many ideas in my head, Yeah, they're hard to get out, I wanna scream and shout"—ever have writer's block? "Wiggle Alive" and "Squish Me, Squeeze Me" are about physical issues. "Squish Me" brings to mind the "hug machine" invented by Dr. Temple Grandin, arguably the most celebrated person diagnosed with autism; as a teenager, she created the machine to deal with stress and sensory overload.

Grandin herself commented on Love Me, saying "I really liked it. I hope it gets widely played." Such an endorsement is underscored by the five percent of the sales that will go to Autism Speaks, a nonprofit research and advocacy group.



On The Run

Night Splints Can Help Foot Problems

It is common for people to consult the internet to search solutions for medical problems before contacting their doctor. This practice can be beneficial for the patient in providing valuable information about their condition so they can make informed decisions about treatment options when they visit with their doctor. On the other hand, many so-called medical education websites are actually a disguise for a commercial entity which is trying to sell remedies for medical problems which may or may not have any proven value.

When a runner researches the internet for remedies for heel pain, they often see advertisements for shoes, arch supports and

"night splints." Night splints actually have proven value to help treat the underlying cause of many forms of heel pain in active athletes. The purpose of these devices is to provide a gentle stretch of the Achilles tendon of the patient during sleep. Improved flexibility of the Achilles tendon is thought to reduce the symptoms of plantar fasciitis which is the most common cause of heel pain in runners.

Night splints can also be an effective treatment for Achilles tendinitis. While stretching of the Achilles is always recommended for treatment of this condition, many runners will find that they always get tighter in their calf while sleeping. Night splints can prevent the natural tightening of the calf muscle and Achilles tendon while sleeping and this can greatly enhance the normal stretching program which runners should do during the day in treating painful heel conditions. These splints can be purchased not only from internet web sites but also from physicians, podiatrists, and physical therapists.



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

Powell Academy for Success teachers are engaged in a collaborative review and implementation of Thinking Maps. Grade-level meetings have been combined to encourage interactive Thinking Map discussions. nonprofits to communities of faith, from the Chamber of Commerce to presidents of large and small businesses, from parents and grandparents to elected officials. We all play an important roll in the success of our students.

At the center of the activities are the hard-working educators in the Long Beach Unified School District, Long Beach City College, and California State University Long Beach who are buoyed on by the Greater Long Beach community. The three institutions have held monthly, sometimes more often, cross-institutional meetings focused on student success without skipping a single month since 1994. When students succeed, communities prosper.

Though the three education institutions have been making consistent improvements in education together through Seamless Education since 1994, garnering one national recognition after another along the way, never have they been more focused on college-going rates than in the last three and a half years. On March 20, 2008, after two years of gathering stakeholders' input and rigorous strategic planning to put the structures in place, the three institutions have made the biggest commitments to each other in Long Beach history. LBUSD Superintendent of Schools, Chris Steinhauser, Superintendent-President of LBCC, Eloy Ortiz Oakley, and President of CSULB, F. King Alexander signed the Long Beach College Promise. The goals of the promise are:

- Increase the percentage of LBUSD students who are prepared for and attend college directly from high school;
- Increase the percentage of LBCC students who earn degrees and/or career and technical certificates;
- Increase the percentage of LBCC students who successfully transfer to CSULB or another four-year college or university; and
- Increase the percentage of CSULB students who graduate with a bachelor's degree and/or advanced degrees.

Part of the Promise is LBCC's commitment to a tuition-free first semester for our local students immediately following high school graduation. The LBCC Foundation has raised over \$6 million to pay for students' tuitions. The number of LBUSD high school graduates going directly to LBCC has increased significantly since 2007. About 75% of LBUSD grads enroll in college and about half of them go to either LBCC or CSULB. Part of the CSULB Promise is to give priority admission to our local students. While other CSUs are abandoning priority admissions for their local graduates, CSULB is keeping their promise despite receiving over 72,000 undergraduate applications.

Other positive findings of the Long Beach College Promise:

- LBCC students from LBUSD have stronger math skills than other incoming students.
- Every local high school 2011 graduate who enrolled at LBCC this Fall paid no enrollment fees that's over 1,600 students.
- LBCC students from LBUSD are more likely to persist than other students: LBUSD students are twice as likely to persist from their first fall term of enrollment at LBCC to the following fall semester.
- CSULB accepts over 80% of LBUSD applicants compared to 30% for students from other high schools.

Both LBCC and CSULB are committed to increasing the number of students successfully graduating from their institutions with certificates and/or diplomas. LBCC has set targets and timelines for students to successfully matriculate from LBCC to CSULB with their Promise Pathways Program. In the community college world, this is a unique strategy being deployed by LBCC to ensure LBUSD grads get priority registration and course placement, and academic advising, all part of the goal of getting students prepared for and on their way to CSULB or other

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12350 Del Amo Blvd. Lakewood, CA 90715 colleges and universities in a timely fashion. The same course offering improvements are happening in certificate programs at LBCC.

On December 1, 2011, the three institutions hosted a joint faculty symposium at LBCC, bringing together key stakeholders to discuss how to be more successful with fewer resources. Teams of educators from each of the comprehensive high schools comprised of principals, counselors, and faculty from mathematics and English/language arts met with their job-alikes from LBCC and CSULB. They discussed everything from student achievement data to end-of-course exams. Symposia like this one is key to communication among educators so they can strategize and plan for their students' successful graduations and transitions.

Who funds the Long Beach College Promise? The institutional leadership insists on not only a mentality of collaboration but collaborative action plans each year among the three institutions' executive level faculties. It is written into their job descriptions. Therefore, collaborations are guaranteed and never dependent on state or federal funding. This one characteristic of the Seamless Education Partnership and the Long Beach College Promise is the reason collaborations never stall in Long Beach. This institutional commitment was recently noted in a nationally published case study on our Seamless Education Partnership by the Business and Higher Education Forum as the most important feature for sustaining successful P-18 collaborations. But outside funding is welcomed enthusiastically!

The Boeing Company has been hugely instrumental in funding innovative programs and components of Seamless Education including the Long Beach College Promise activities. They have funded student success programs like the Male Academy and Counseling Reform. They have funded scholarships for elementary teachers to go back to college and take more mathematics classes to make them stronger math teachers. They have funded more Seamless Education programs than any other public or private foundation. This year, Boeing is funding the joint faculty work, the heavy lifting by high school teachers exhausted from teaching who are meeting with higher education counterparts to find more ways for students to succeed. Boeing will announce a \$75,000 grant to the Long Beach Education Foundation on December 7th at the State of Education Address at the Long Beach Convention and Entertainment Center

"The joint faculty work across the institutions is critical to removing barriers to higher education and the world of work for our local students. The Long Beach Education Foundation is honored to bring resources to our dedicated faculties to work on the Long Beach College Promise. Student success is our mission and we are dedicated to it," said Scott Dionne, President of the Long Beach Education Foundation after hearing the announcement that Boeing will give the Education Foundation \$75,000 to continue College Promise work this year.

Project Based Learning Defines Westerly School's Program

In the world of teaching and learning, there are many ways to help students gain access to academic content. To do this well requires study, practice, and reflection, processes that all great teachers embrace. If quality instruction were not challenging enough, however, the fact that people learn differently from one another further complicates the matter.

One way the Westerly faculty addresses the various ways students learn best is through project-based learning, which is a hallmark of the school's philosophy and program. With the mission to develop each child's full potential: intellectually, emotionally, morally, and physically, the act of project-learning facilitates a deeper understanding of the material and of one's self. Students are posed with a "driving question" to spark interest and then work in small collaborative groups to explore the topic at hand. Through the combination of independent and group work, students develop their confidence as learners, collaborators, and problemsolvers, while also honing their organizational and time-management skills.

Below are some of the projects that Westerly's students are engaged in, which provides them a broad and varied platform from which to deeply understand instructional concepts.

Second and third graders studied geometry and measurement by taking a closer look at the shapes around them. Third grade students invited the second-graders to be featured artists at a "Geo-measurement Palooza," which created intrigue and guided the initial inquiry. The students photographed geometric figures in their classroom and around campus, and then analyzed and measured these to indentify scale. The photos were displayed at a gallery opening with a written summary answering the following driving questions: How does Geometry and Measurement appear in the world around us? What shapes do we see in our environment? How can we measure the size of those objects?



2nd and 3rd grade students collaborating.

In making a connection between the curriculum and real life, students in fifth grade applied their study of fractions and their decimal equivalents by being "hired" as a reviewer for a magazine publisher. Their job was to investigate competitor's magazines to determine what parts of the magazines include articles compared to advertisements. They used fractions, ratios, and decimals to prepare a report to summarize their findings. In their report, they included a bar graph to show the comparison between four different magazines.

Westerly's Middle School enlivens the program through project-based learning as well. Sixth graders recently studied statistics and data analysis in math class. They participated in the Census at School program and used a random sampling of U.S. 6th grade responses to create data displays. Each student chose a quantitative response and created box-and-whisker plots, bar graphs, and stem-and-leaf plots based upon the data. Students learned to sort data and remove extraneous responses, display the same data in different manners, used Excel to create a chart and graphs, and were part of a nationwide collaboration.

Regularly integrated into Westerly's project-based curriculum are the enriching subjects of visual arts, music, foreign language, and physical education, all of which are subjects that are integral parts of the Westerly program and experience and contribute to the school's mission of educating the whole child.

Westerly Community Visits: Seeing Firsthand

Each month Westerly School hosts a community visit, which provides the public an opportunity to see the type of teaching and learning that occurs every day on campus. The visits last just over an hour and include on overview of Westerly's history, mission, and programs, followed by a tour of the classrooms and a question and answer session. This first-hand view of a Westerly education in action enables visitors to hear about and see a variety of ways the school's mission is delivered including, but not limited to its:

Strong Academic Program

A Westerly education includes a rigorous and supportive academic program along with instruction in Visual Arts, Music – both vocal and instrumental, Spanish, and Physical Education. In addition, Westerly's commitment to the development of the whole child includes opportunities to address the emotional and moral development of its students.

Sense of Community

Westerly is known for its small class size and inclusive and safe environment. Families know one another, parents are involved, and each student is encouraged to take academic risks and is challenged to reach his or her full potential.

Student Mentor/Mentee Program

The Mentor/Mentee Program has been a long standing tradition at Westerly. Each year a younger class is paired-up with an older class and each pair will spend the year forming a relationship and engaging in activities and projects.

Differentiated Learning

Throughout the classrooms, teachers engage in a variety of approaches to meet the needs of individual students. This could include one-on-one or small group instruction, student-centered stations, activities, experiments and projectbased learning.

Interactive White Board Technology

Each classroom is equipped with a SMART interactive white board. These modern "chalkboards" extend learning opportunities for students where faculty and students find numerous ways to integrate this technology across the curriculum.

Computers

Each middle school student is loaned their own laptop computer, which extends learning opportunities between home and school. Lower School students are also provided daily opportunities to engage with computers and technology to enhance their learning experiences.

Intangibles and Anecdotals

Day in and day out, the value of a Westerly education presents itself in unexpected ways. Community visits allow for the sharing of these unique moments, which help complete the tour that may lead to an education that we believe will change a child's future.

While I am one of five school board members elected to oversee our entire school district, I also represent a distinct geographical area of our school system known as District 2. In a school system frequently recognized among the best urban school districts in the nation, District 2 is certainly among the most urban areas of our system, and I take special pride in the outstanding progress that our District 2 schools have made despite unprecedented cuts in state funding for education.

Just five years ago, none of our District 2 elementary schools had yet to achieve the state's ultimate target of 800 on a scale of 1,000 on the Academic Performance Index. Parents, realtors,

investors and homeowners know these numbers well, for they affect property values and quality of life in our neighborhoods. Today, two-thirds of District 2 elementary schools have surpassed 800 on the API. Some of these schools have far surpassed the state goal. Among them are Roosevelt (840 API) and our highest performer, Lafayette (860 API). In fact, both Roosevelt and Lafayette have won the prestigious National School Change Award for their incredible transformations in just a few years.

We are excitedly watching the remaining three elementary or K-8 schools in District 2 that have yet to reach an API of 800, because they are very close. Garfield is at 790, Hudson is at 779 and Robinson is at 770. By this time next year, we think all will reach the coveted 800 target, which is an amazing testament to the hard work going on in our schools every day.

At the high school level, District 2 includes Cabrillo and Poly high schools along with the California Academy of Mathematics and Science. Far more students are taking Advanced Placement college prep courses there, and the amount of scholarships earned by graduating seniors at these schools has grown by a whopping 70 percent to \$27.7 million in just four years. Students routinely are gaining admission and full-ride scholarships to the nation's most prestigious college and universities.

make sure they practice good habits, such as looking both ways and always crossing in the crosswalk.

Make sure your children take the same route to school and back home every day. Taking the same path means less chance of getting lost, and you'll know where to find them when they are in transit. Even if your students are capable of walking or biking themselves to school, go with them occasionally so you are familiar with the terrain and possible hazards.

Children should walk, never run, when crossing the street.

Drivers can't always see pedestrians, and a child sprinting across the City Prosecutor street might not be seen until it's too late. Some concepts that are simple for adults need explanation to a child. For example, everyone knows cars must stop at a red light. But cars may, after stopping, turn right against a red light. I've seen too many near misses when a child steps onto a street just as a right-turning car passes.

Finally, I'd like to caution you about distracted driving. This is not just an admonition to drivers: pedestrians also need to be careful to protect themselves from distracted drivers.

Parents who drive their children to school have their hands already full. After rushing to get the children fed, dressed and in the car, moms and dads then race through rush hour traffic while discussing after-school activities, homework deadlines, field-trip permission slips, and what's for dinner—or at least attempting such discussions when the children aren't fighting.

Getting students to school comes with its own distractions. A driver doesn't need to be texting, listening to loud music on the radio, making a call on the cell phone, or putting on makeup to get sidetracked.

Just remember, when you enter the school zone, all attention must be focused on careful driving and looking out for students walking and biking to school. And just as important, families walking or biking to school need to look out for distracted drivers.

The Long Beach Unified School District's 2011–2012 school year is well underway. Practicing good habits with your children will help make sure you and your family enjoy it safely.



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
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
