

Teamwork Part of Child Development

Team building and collaboration are a significant part of child development. Learning to work as part of a team will help children develop social and life skills such as problem solving, leadership, creative thinking, patience, listening, empathy, respect, compromise, and tolerance. Plus, teamwork can be a lot of fun for kids, in or out of the classroom.

Teamwork must be taught and practiced. As a parent, you can help your child develop these crucial skills outside of school with activities that emphasize cooperation and collaboration. Kids can learn teamwork simply through basic free play. Time outside at the park or playground with other children is just as important for brain development as time in the classroom. Encourage children to interact with other kids and play fun, positive team games. You don't need any special equipment. Follow the Leader, Musical Chairs, and Hide 'n Seek are examples of group play activities that foster a positive, collaborative environment.

A more obvious way to encourage teamwork is to engage your child in a team sport with a good coach. Teaming up is all about teaching each other, and learning from each other. Kids will develop confidence in their own abilities and simultaneously learn to trust their team members to achieve success. A positive coach that focuses on progress, not perfection, can help to impart these lessons for the long run.

Of course, not all kids enjoy or excel at team sports. However, any team-based activity can instill social skills and confidence, regardless of athletic ability. Consider inviting your child's peers over for a fun team-based activity. The kids can do a group craft or art project, put on a play or show, or construct something with building toys. The whole family can also get involved at home. Family board games, puzzles, and party games help children develop social skills through taking turns, collaboration and compromise. Cooking and baking are other at-home ideas. Instead of teaching the child to bake a recipe on their own, organize it as a family or group activity and assign each member a role in completing the recipe.

The skills learned from being part of a team are necessary for positive action in everyday life in school, work, and the community. Children that successfully develop and engage these skills can grow up to become adults that make the world a better place for us all.

With the new Billie Jean King Main Library now open downtown and 11 neighborhood library branches geographically dispersed throughout Long Beach, there are many opportunities to check out a reading program or other learning activity. For example, did you know that libraries offer science, technology, engineering, art and math (STEAM) programs such as cooking and lego clubs, virtual reality workshops and cast molding classes. The Billie Jean King Main Library is a beautiful facility with many

cool spaces for reading, exploring, or just hanging out with your family and friends. It also has a MakersSpace studio with a 3D printing lab, a music studio, a film editing station, a sewing shop, Family Learning Center, and a designated space for teens only.

All library locations offer a variety of reading programs such as family storytimes and reading incentive programs with correlating events and prizes that promote literacy for children. Not to mention, each location offers computers with internet for those who want to use it and free wifi access.

Serving Homeless Students

California has a homeless crisis. Although hundreds of millions of dollars have been spent to solve the crisis, homelessness appears to be getting worse.

In California, about 130,000 people are reportedly homeless, and 60,000 of those live in Los Angeles County alone. By some estimates, up to 47% of all homeless people in America live in California, but other major cities outside California also report homeless

Long Beach, like all major cities, has homeless families with school age children. We have a shared responsibility to ensure children do not suffer due to poverty.

Long Beach Unified School District reports that 5.951 students are homeless. These are children living in cars, tents, motels, trailer parks, emergency or transitional

shelters, parks, and abandoned buildings. Some sleep from couch to couch with friends and family members until stable housing can be found.

Locally there are two major resources for homeless families with children. Long Beach owns and operates its own Multi-Service Center which houses 12 public agencies and private nonprofits serving the homeless population. MSC services include connecting people with housing, but also provides basic amenities like showers, laundry services, and basic medical care. The MSC is located at 1301 West 12th Street, Long Beach, CA 90813.

In addition, LBUSD provides families of homeless students with assistance under the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistant Act through the district's awardwinning Mary McLeod Bethune Transitional Center. The services ensure that homeless students receive equal access to the same free, appropriate public education, including a public preschool education, as other children and youth.

Homeless youth in LBUSD are offered these services to ensure struggling students get the education needed so the cycle of poverty does not continue. The Long Beach Educational Foundation also accepts private donations from those wishing to help families of homeless students. I urge everyone in Long Beach to get involved and help.


Youth Leadership Long Beach (YLLB) has shown me how much Long Beach has to offer, given me confidence to dream big, and contribute to the City in return.

Food Waster: We Think Not

The most recent numbers from the United States Department of Agriculture indicate that in our country, food waste is estimated at between 30-40 percent of the food supply. More consumers are becoming aware of this fact and they want to do their part to decrease food waste at home and when eating out. A question I have been getting recently is about storing left overs and optimum

time for using perishables such as meats, fruits and vegetables. Here are 5 optimal storage tips for foods and beverages.

- Cover or wrap leftovers in airtight packaging, or seal them in proper storage containers, not old plastic food containers. These practices help keep bacteria out and retain moisture.
- 2. Most leftovers can be kept in the refrigerator for 3 to 4 days or frozen for 3 to 4 months.
- 3. Store foods properly for best shelf life and nutrient retention. Did you know potatoes, tomatoes and onion should be stored at room temperature, not in the fridge?
- Spices that contain oils should be stored in the fridge. Examples are chili powder, cayenne pepper and paprika.
- Walnuts should be stored in the refrigerator or freezer because of they contain polyunsaturated fats (omega 3s) that can oxidize quickly at room temperature.

This column provides insight from Carol Berg Sloan RDN, FAND (a registered dietitian for 37 years) and her daughter, Kelly Sloan, MS,RDN Nutrition and Dietetics (a graduate of CSULB). Both give their perspective and tips to help you make healthier food and beverages choices.

As a recent graduate and new professional in the work force, I am still on an extreme budget and have always been conscious of money spent on food, including not wasting food. Smart tips that I share with friends and family include:

Using canned or frozen foods extends shelf life and helps with portion control. Canned tuna, a can of peaches or bag of frozen peas are easy items to store. They are

great for grab- n – go meal or for a lunch or dinner with my fiancé.

It seems I always have leftover vegetables such as onions, carrots and potatoes, if you do too, try my go-to meal that serves two:

3 brats, sliced - your favorite flavor (I enjoy the spinach and feta or herb chicken brats - these usually come in packs of 6, these are great for leftovers. Cook them all and store what you cooked in the fridge for immediate leftover consumption or straight into the freezer for later consumption).

1/2 cup of sauerkraut

1/2 yellow onion, diced

1 tablespoon minced garlic

1 orange bell pepper or any color you have, diced Directions:

- 1. In a non-stick medium frying pan, add sliced brats and cook for 2 minutes and flip, cook for 2 more minutes, or until crispy or golden brown.
- 2. Add sauerkraut, diced onions, garlic, and bell pepper to brats. Sauté until vegetables are translucent.
- 3. Pour onto a plate, add some dark leafy greens and fresh fruit and enjoy a nutritious meal!

Note: Fresh vegetables can easily be put in the freezer and thawed out and used later. This is a great way to reduce waste if you are using half a vegetable but don't know when you'll use it.

Recurring Ear Infections and What to do

An ear infection occurs as a result of inflammation of the middle ear, caused by a virus or bacteria. During an ear infection fluid builds up behind the eardrum. Most children have experienced at least one painful ear infection by age five.

Common symptoms of ear infections include pain, fever, fussiness or irritability, rubbing or tugging at an ear, and difficulty sleeping.

Most ear infections resolve on their own with simple treatments like rest or overthe-counter pain relievers. More severe ear infections may need antibiotics.

Many times, children struggle with repeated infections or persistent fluid which can result in hearing loss. In these cases, surgical care can help to prevent infections or lessen the frequency or severity of ear infections. One of the most common procedures performed by ear, nose and throat (ENT) specialists is a myringotomy and tube placement. According to the American Academy of Otolaryngology-Head and Neck Surgery, ear tube surgery is the most common childhood surgery performed with anesthesia.

A myringotomy is a surgical procedure that relieves pressure caused by the excessive build-up of fluid in the ears by making a small incision in the eardrum. After excess fluid is suctioned out, the ear tube is then inserted into the eardrum to allow air to reach the middle ear. The tubes will fall out on their own, usually a year after they are placed. While they are in place, they work to prevent further ear infections and help children avoid long-term complications.

If your child has severe, recurring ear infections, it's important to talk to a pediatric ENT specialist. like the team at MemorialCare Miller Children's & Women's Hospital Long Beach who can help determine what treatment option is best for your child.

Striving For Equity, Inclusion

After more than 50 years as a student and employee in the Long Beach Unified School District, I firmly believe that our organization's greatest strength is its ability to think big. When I say big, I mean the big, hopeful ideas like "We hold these truths to be self-evident," and "I have a dream."

I grew up in a 900-square-foot home with one bathroom and five brothers in a workingclass neighborhood here in Long Beach. My

siblings and I knew to avoid certain streets on our way to school. My parents lacked a college education. But with the help of committed teachers and other supportive adults, I was able to make a better life for myself and my own children.

Despite my own good fortune, I know that my experience as a white, male, able-bodied U.S. citizen doesn't represent the array of experiences and challenges facing today's diverse student population.

Fifteen years ago, I visited one of our high school Advanced Placement courses where I saw almost all white, upper-middle class students in attendance. I knew this was wrong, so I worked with our Board of Education, school leaders and teachers to offer wide open access to these college prep classes, providing additional support along the way such as tutoring, Summer Bridge programs, and free PSAT and SAT testing to help determine students' strengths and areas for improvement.

Today, LBUSD ranks first nationally on the percentage of African American male students who took one or more AP courses; second on the percentage of Latino male students who took one or more AP courses; second on the percentage of socioeconomically disadvantaged students who took one or more AP courses; and second on the percentage of students with disabilities who took one or more AP courses.

Our progress on AP inclusion is one of many examples of our commitment to equity. Some of the nation's leading education experts have commended our strong results on state tests for our three largest student subgroups: African American, Latino/a and white students.

While other school systems dismiss a four-year math or quantitative reasoning requirement for high schoolers as too difficult, we've already implemented it, complete with extra support for students who need it. Our graduation rates continue to rise, and more students are meeting the A-G college entrance requirements for the state university systems, with all subgroups seeing significant improvements in these areas. Many of our recent graduates, now in college, have taken time to say, "Thank you, Mr. Steinhauser for helping me to push myself in high school, because it's paying off now." Those are the moments that make my day.


Our reputation as a high-functioning organization is well documented. Despite our success, we know that we have much more work to do. Like all communities, we have our challenges in terms of equity and inclusion, and we know that an increase in divisive rhetoric, often lacking in civility at this point in our nation's history, has impacted America's schools, including ours.

In our school district, please be assured that ignorance, prejudice, hate and fear will be dealt with appropriately and met with thoughtful, rational, collaborative and inclusive discussion, planning and action.

Through many avenues, including our various advisory groups, community forums, surveys and community partnerships such as those with the California Conference for Equality and Justice, as well as Californians for Justice, we are actively engaging and listening to all members of our Long Beach Unified family, including students, parents and guardians who are most affected by poverty, racism, homophobia and xenophobia.

Our school leaders and staff also are intently engaged in system-wide ongoing professional development and collaboration to examine the inherent biases that we all possess as imperfect human beings. Some of our discussions on these topics are difficult. Emotions can run high. But we are finding ways to have these important conversations in ways that promote healing rather than polarization.

The unfortunate reality is that we live in a world that can make people feel small, especially our most vulnerable students and their families. To these families, and to all we serve, we extend an invitation to help us continue thinking big. We can and must persist in these efforts if we are to provide all students the education they need and deserve.

Work-Based Learning

Work-based learning experiences are one way to expand student learning beyond the classroom walls and prepare students for college and careers. In the last three years, California Academy of Mathematics and Science (CAMS) has built its biotechnology focus by expanding lab space, adding a third year to the sequence, and establishing

industry partners the expand the reach of the program. Through these intentional changes, the biotechnology focus has been able to establish safety practices that meet industry standards and use equipment such as spectrophotometers, autoclaves, and analytical balances.

In February, students from CAMS were able to visit a local food science laboratory that tests for common pathogens, such as E.coli, and salmonella, as well as for common allergens, such as peanut and soy. Chief Science Officer Karilyn Gonzalez gave CAMS students a tour of

> the lab and explained the safety procedures put in place and approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and the Compendium of Methods for the Microbiological Examination of Foods. CAMS biotechnology classrooms have also tested foods for genetically modified organisms (GMOs) and genetically altered organisms by adding different proteins with bacterial plasmids.

At this event, the students had to work in teams to design and build a boat out of aluminum foil, craft sticks, and masking tape to hold the most weight. As if collaborating with each other wasn't enough of a challenge, the teams also had to stay within a budget of \$500! They all had 30 minutes to design, test, and revise their boats with the highest of three

weights graphed. Many of the students were in awe of how such simple materials could hold so much weight.

After each of the teams' results were graphed, the classes then reflected upon why certain designs could hold



more weight than others, and what variables helped or hindered the design process. Not only did our students love this hands-on project, they also had a preview of project management and budgeting, and without even realizing what they were learning!

'Can You Feel It?'

Can You Feel It? is a collection of original songs about natural science, played simply and organically. Banjo, bass, steel guitar, drums and keyboard blend with Jessa Campbell's lilting voice as she sings to both young people and adults about sun and shadow, a salmon's circular journey from birth to spawning adulthood, burrowing mammals, fractals...

Wait—fractals?

Yes, fractals. And alevins, bract, trillium and frass. Can You Feel It? doesn't play cute with science. The selections enchantingly introduce science vocabulary without being didactic or windy. They sneak up on anthropomorphism but don't



diminish or trivialize the concepts through fantasy. "Waltz of the Trillium and Ant," for instance, encapsulates the natural partnership of flower structure, ant colonies, pollination and germination in a waltz melody. It's like a fairy tale, but the sprites are unarguably real. "Mole in the Ground," written in the Appalachian mountain tune manner, speeds up or slows down each verse depending on the pace of each animal.

The title song has a silent tone and focuses on feeling instead of sound. The listener can feel the waves as the salmon roll from freshwater to saltwater and back, changing from alevin to smolt to adult. The bouncy "T-Rex in the Forest" begs to be acted out by children who'll enjoy snoring like a prehistoric reptile. "How I Love You, Sun" is a worthy love song to the star that gives light, energy and life to everything on Earth.

How Campbell manages to pack so many ideas about each topic into every song without cramming it all in is a marvel, like her subjects themselves.







The Yo-Yo

Some believe the vo-vo originated in China. However, the first mention of the yo-yo is in Greece around 500 B.C. It is also found in pictographs in Egyptian-temple wall art. Philippine hunters used a rock with a 20-foot string to hit their prey in trees in the 16th century. Wherever the yo-yo originated, it has become a global fascination.

The yo-yo is said to be the second-oldest toy in the world, next to the doll. It is a toy that has a calming effect on the user. The French court played with the yo-yo (joujou de Normandie). Marquis de Lafavette toyed with the vo-vo. Napoleon and his troops played with it before the battle of Waterloo as well, as it was a favorite of the Duke of Wellington. There is a National Yo-Yo Museum in Chico, and wooden parts can be found online.

This country saw its first patent in 1866 by an Ohio company, but the toy remained obscure until 1916 in an article in Scientific American titled "Filipino Toys." When Pedro Flores, an immigrant from the Philippines working at a hotel in Santa Monica as a bellhop, played with his yo-yo during his lunch break, a crowd would gather around and watch. He started making yo-yos and had two factories by 1929.

A businessman named Donald F. Duncan on a trip from Ohio to California saw the vo-vo and bought Pedro's company in 1929. Then in 1932, Duncan was given the

trade name vo-vo, forcing competitors to use other names for the toy. It was Duncan who introduced the slipstring that allowed the yo-yo to "sleep." He set out on an advertising campaign with the Hearst newspaper company that increased paper circulation and sales of yo-yos.

Then in the 1960, with television and mass advertising, the yo-yo had a resurgence in sales and interest. However, the Duncan family lost a trademark case in 1965 and sold the company. Yet between 1960 and the 1990s, the yo-yo saw many innovations with the new technology that saw another resurgence in the 1990s. On April 12, 1985, the voyo went to space on the Discovery Shuttle. The toy needs gravity to work—you can guess the result!

Today, the yo-yo is providing more than entertainment for young enthusiasts. It is also a way for our troops to relax and take their mind off the stress of the job they have been sent to do. In 2008, Senator John McCain asked for people to send yo-yos and stress balls to the troops. There are several organizations that send yo-yos to the troops. As we get older and can no longer do what we used to do, there is still something that we can do that will make a difference.
