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Monrovia USD to Offer Renowned Computer Science Program

The creators of Code To The Future, the nation's leading Computer Science Programs for K-12 schools, will be bringing their Computer Science Immersion Program to Monrovia Unified

School District beginning in Fall 2016.

The White House recognized Code To The Future as the leader in Computer Science Magnet Schools in January 2016. "I am thrilled that the leaders in Computer Science Education have selected our district to be among the first in Los Angeles County to offer this unique approach to education," said Katherine Thorossian, Monrovia Unified School District Superintendent.

"We're honored by the selection."

The partnership comes as a small but growing number of schools around the country are using Computer Science and games like Minecraft to help students learn everything from math to language skills. In doing so, they leverage the explosive popularity of a game that has surpassed 100 million registered users.

Andrew Svehaug, CEO of Code To The Future, is familiar with the use of Minecraft, having worked closely with the COO of Mojang (makers of Minecraft) on a joint-presentation



about this movement in London, and having presented to U.S. Department of Education executives in a TEDx talk in April at Qualcomm Headquarters.

The Monrovia Unified School District is helping to lead the way in capitalizing on Computer Science's potential as a teaching tool. In teaming up with Code To The Future, the district is offering two Computer Science Immersion Programs beginning in August that use Minecraft and other new technology to create a cutting-edge learning environment for students.

Code To The Future officials decided to visit Monrovia after meeting district officials and hearing about what was happening in the district. The partnership will result in the concentration of computer science programs at Plymouth and Mayflower Elementary Schools, where every student, from kindergarten through grade five, will have an opportunity to develop coding skills as part of the daily curriculum.

A Gallup poll released in August reports that over 90% of parents in the United States desire more computer science education opportunities for their students, but only 6% of U.S. School Leaders perceive this demand.

The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics projects that there will be a 1 million job

gap by 2020, with American students being unprepared for the skills that American companies are demanding.

"Monrovia is taking strong steps to become a leading district for Computer Science," Svehaug said. "We are looking forward to partnering with the Monrovia team."



A Repertoire of Skills

The instructional focus at CELC is to support the development of executive function skills in young children. Executive function is the ability to control one's behavior, and the ability to plan, implement, and complete an activity, as well as maintain attention and respond to feedback (from the National Institute for Early Education Research). The development of executive function provides children with the repertoire of skills they need to become effective learners.

We accomplish this by using evidence-based practices that promote young children's emotional competence and self-regulation. Teachers gather evidence and plan for the development of the children's attention maintenance, self-comforting, curiosity, and initiative in learning, self-control of feelings and behavior, engagement and persistence, shared use of space and materials, and much more.

Beginning in October, CELC will offer a six-week parent series entitled "Positive Solutions for Families." It is based on work from the Center for Social and Emotional Learning Foundations, and will provide parents with evidence-based strategies they can use in the home.




Keep your eyes out for Santa Fe Cougars in the community because they will be, and are, doing great things.




The Hardy Boys - The Missing Mitt


