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### A Search for Our Next Superintendent has Started!

We will sadly say goodbye to our current Superintendent Jeff Pelzel on June 30, 2022, as he goes forward to a new path in his career. To find a new person to fill this role is the responsibility of the Governing Board and one of the most important functions of a board. You may have many questions on how this works which I will outline here, but many resources and links have also been placed on the district's website under a new tab "Superintendent Search".

There will be several phases, starting with the hiring of a search firm: Leadership Associates. They assist in a rigorous nationwide search of qualified candidates. Leadership Associates will collect input from stakeholders and community groups (including but not limited to employee groups, administrators, community leaders, parents, district organizations: PTA's, PTSA's, Foundations, School Site Councils, etc.). This outreach helps inform about the characteristics, skills, and desired traits for our next Superintendent.

The main phase will involve the advertising, recruitment, and reference checking to insure a pool of highly qualified candidates. The board meets (in a closed session) to review the applicants and choose who will be interviewed. This process, and the interview are conducted in closed session to protect the privacy of the candidates and the discussions of the board.

Once the board has selected a finalist (mid-June) the next phase is to validate the candidate, negotiate a contract, and confirm the applicant's acceptance. The Board will then approve of the candidate, announcing the terms of the new contract at a regular meeting in open session. This is scheduled for the June 28th meeting if all goes well! The goal is to have a new Superintendent in place for the 2022/23 school year.

# iHa comenzado la búsqueda de nuestro próximo superintendente!

Tristemente, nos despediremos de nuestro actual Superintendente Jeff Pelzel el 30 de junio de 2022, ya que él sigue un nuevo camino en su carrera. Encontrar una nueva persona para llenar este papel es la responsabilidad de la Junta Directiva y una de las funciones más importantes de una junta. Es posible que tenga muchas preguntas sobre cómo funciona esto que describiré aquí, pero también se han colocado muchos recursos y enlaces en el sitio web del Distrito en una nueva pestaña "Búsqueda de Superintendente".

Habrá varias fases, comenzando con la contratación de una empresa de búsqueda: Leadership Associates. Ellos asisten en una rigurosa búsqueda a nivel nacional de candidatos calificados. Leadership Associates recogerá las aportaciones de las partes interesadas y los grupos de la comunidad (incluyendo, pero no limitado a los grupos de empleados, administradores, líderes de la comunidad, los padres, las organizaciones del distrito: PTA's, PTSA's, Fundaciones, Consejos Escolares, etc.). Este alcance ayuda a informar sobre las características, habilidades y cualidades deseados para nuestro próximo Superintendente.

La fase principal incluirá la publicidad, la contratación y la verificación de referencias para asegurar un grupo de candidatos altamente calificados. La Junta se reunirá (en una sesión cerrada) para revisar a los candidatos y elegir quién será entrevistado. Este proceso y la entrevista se llevan a cabo en sesión cerrada para proteger la privacidad de los candidatos y las discusiones de la Junta.

Una vez que la Junta ha seleccionado un finalista (a mediados de junio), la siguiente fase consiste en validar al candidato, negociar un contrato y confirmar la aceptación del candidato. La Junta luego aprobará al candidato, anunciando los términos del nuevo contrato en una reunión regular en sesión abierta. ¡Esto está programado para la reunión del 28 de junio si todo va bien! El objetivo es tener un nuevo Superintendente en lugar para el año escolar 2022/23.



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
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

# Innovation and Creativity in the McGrath Maker Space

Engineering, design, creativity, innovation...welcome to the McGrath Maker Space! Maker Spaces are collaborative areas where students have tools to experiment.

Students are able to take apart and put together items to explore and

tinker. Whether students are designing cars, testing electrical circuits or building cities from cardboard, the McGrath Maker Space allows students to use their natural curiosity, combined with what they have learned to become problem solvers and build their skills. The space creates enthusiasm for reading and research.

In June, McGrath students will take part in the first Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) problem, the Egg Drop Challenge. The challenge is for students to design a carrier or contraption that will protect a raw egg dropping from approximately 25 feet. The materials will be recyclables combined with ideas that are fostered in the McGrath Maker Space. Hands-on and integrated learning, the key to fun at school!



### **Enrichment Program**

If you were to take a peek into the Meadows Science Lab on a Monday after school, you might just see a small group of robots heading your way. The Meadows Foundation sponsors our school Lego Robotics Program and has been offering this enrichment opportunity for the past five years. Following the FIRST LEGO League program, sixth grade students engage

STEM learning and exploration missions with a heavy emphasis on the programming aspects of Lego Robotics. Students team up together to be critical thinkers and problem solvers as they navigate how to first build and then program Lego robots. As students build their capacity in programming their robots, they complete and compete in a variety of missions. Throughout the sessions, students not only develop their skills, they learn the value of collaboration and perseverance. Mrs. Dobry, one of Meadows' teachers and robotics facilitators shared that students learn so much as they preserve when attempting to program a new mission.

#### What I Need (WIN) time

This school year Newhall Elementary has focused on providing quality reading instruction for all students. We took a deep dive into our data, evaluated our knowledge on early foundational reading skills, followed a solid universal and diagnostic assessment system,

and implemented data-driven small groups reading instruction - What I Need (WIN) time. The implementation of all of these actions has been transformational for dozens of students, today we want to share Bryan's story. His first day of first grade was this August, in fact, it was his first day of school - ever. Bryan knew no letter names or sounds and had very weak phonological skills. After 4 Cycles of WIN time. he has mastered the letter names and sounds and has developed strong phonological and phonemic awareness. Bryan now reads 30 words per minute and is on track to becoming a lifelong reader!


#### **Butterflies**

Thanks to our Oak Hills
Foundation, our kindergarten
students were able to engage in
the metamorphosis of caterpillars
to butterflies this spring. The
kits, which included a tent and
a cup of baby caterpillars that
just hatched from their eggs,
arrived. They were so tiny! The
caterpillars ate brown sugar at

the bottom of their cup and had grown a little bit by the very next day.

They continued to grow and looked fuzzy and spiky. While the caterpillars were eating and growing, students could observe little balls on the bottom of the cup, called frass, or waste. The caterpillars began to make their chrysalides, and they hung from the lid, forming their chrysalides. The teacher removed the lid from the cup once all of the chrysalides had formed. The caterpillars metamorphosed inside the chrysalides.







Once they were formed, each butterfly broke out of its chrysalis and dried its wings. The students put orange slices in the tent. The butterflies used their proboscises to drink the sweet juice from the oranges.

The students observed the entire process and drew their observations on a chart. They also labeled all the parts of a butterfly and learned about their life cycle. They used academic vocabulary to label the parts. At the end of the process, the students all went out to the grass and released the butterflies to their natural habitat.

# Why Physical Education is Important to our Roadrunners

In addition to helping students grow academically, the state requires students in fifth grade to take part in a physical education test (PFT). The goal of this test is to help students in starting life-long habits of regular physical activity. We have been lucky this year to not only have PE with our classroom teachers, but the district has also

provided PE lessons once a week with the YMCA. Through all of our programs, we are helping students create these health habits and prepare them for their fifth grade testing.

The PFT requires students to take part in five different activities: a one-mile run to check aerobic capacity, curl ups for abdominal strength and endurance, a trunk lift to test trunk extensor strength, push ups to see upper body strength and a sit and reach which assesses flexibility. We are proud of all the hard work that our students and teachers have put in to prepare.

#### **Math Enrichment**

Students and parents alike have learned of this outstanding enrichment opportunity that Bryan Eifert provides for all interested

sixth-graders, beginning in January each year. His lifelong love of math prompted him to begin the Algebra Enrichment class in 2008, which was hosted before school in his classroom. Algebra is now so popular that Mr. Eifert had to move the class to an after-school session in the MPR.

The benefits for the students are immense. From those seeking extra support in mastering and building upon the

sixth-grade algebra standards to those who wish to prepare for placement in Accelerated Math 7 in junior high, there is a seat for any student willing to put in the extra hard work and dedication to push themselves to the next level in their math competency.

Mr. Eifert has a mathematical mind and a heart that seeks to share his wealth of knowledge with anyone who is eager to learn. No matter what level of understanding the students walk in with, they all leave with the same gained sense of confidence in their math skills. It is an environment where the students are safe to take risks, and they feel accomplished after tackling challenging problems. From outside the MPR, the sounds coming from within are reminiscent of an exciting school assembly—laughing, cheering and moments of silent concentration. However, upon entering, it becomes clear that the commotion is coming from a diverse group of scholars sharing a common interest: their love of math!





Jenna is a 6th grader. She enjoys playing soccer and drawing. She likes to read fiction novels. Someday she wants to publish a book.




