Our school year is well underway and we have carried the positive momentum created by all the wonderful work of our teachers, staff and students. What began in August with District-wide training that prepared us to inspire our young learners, has continued with impactful programs that have provided our community with newfound opportunities to thrive.

We were excited to offer free PSATs to high school students and eighth-graders in October as we strengthen our college-ready culture. We were able to waive all registration fees for test takers as we strive to break down barriers between students reaching their goals. To ensure success, we will review test results with students in January and offer SAT prep classes in February.

Three of our high school students provided a shining example of college preparedness and academic excellence when they were named Commended Students by the National Merit Scholarship Program. Gabriel A. Garcia, Joanne Charlene D Robielos and Jason Wong earned the honor by achieving exceptional performance on the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) and were among the 50,000 highest scoring test-takers out of a pool of 1.6 million. The fantastic recognition this trio has garnered is a triumph for the entire District!

We have much to celebrate, and in October I had the privilege of attending a Hispanic Heritage Month Celebration staged by Mokler Elementary School. The event featured art projects dedicated to prominent Latino men and women, and a priceless performance of our students dancing ballet folklórico. I was able to share my own story of growing up as an English language learner and was reminded of the importance of reading to our children.

Of course, one of the first steps to developing exceptional readers is ensuring our students have healthy vision. Through our partnership with Vision To Learn, we offered free eye exams to K-5 students at Los Cerritos School. Those in need will be given free eyeglasses. It's a wonderful program, and I can't wait to expand it to reach all of our kids throughout the District.

The community partnerships we have established are helping us push students to new heights. Let's continue to work together to educate and inspire our kids. There are truly no limits to what they can achieve!

Adventures with AVID

Alondra Middle School prides itself in making a difference in the lives of some of Paramount's finest: our students! One way Alondra is supporting the district-wide initiative of supporting a college- and career-ready culture is the

implementation of the AVID program (Advancement Via Individual Determination).

This program began at Alondra last year with seventhgrade students, and it has expanded to include the eighth grade this year. AVID focuses on teaching students through writing, inquiry, collaboration, organization, and reading. By integrating tutorials, field trips, guest speakers, and parents, the program has proved to be extremely successful.

Alondra currently has four AVID tutors that are college students. The tutors meet with students twice a week and provide guidance and mentoring. In addition, field trips to colleges provide valuable experiences for AVID students. Our first field trip will be to Cal State Fullerton, where



students will have an opportunity to experience first hand what it is like to be on a college campus.

Speakers are also invited to present to our students. These include college professors, business owners, and career professionals. Our first presenter was Gwen Anctil, a biology teacher from PHS, who shared her amazing personal story

and emphasized how future success depends on current studies.

A final piece in the AVID puzzle is parent involvement. This year we hosted the first annual AVID breakfast. New and returning parents gained a deeper understanding of the purpose and goals of the AVID program. Parents had a chance to mingle with our AVID team, which included AVID elective teachers, Ms. Humble, Ms. Enciso, counselor Mr. Dawson, and AVID coordinator Mrs. Griffith-Wu. Amid the smiles and pastries, our parents realized that AVID extends beyond the classroom, and that they are essential to the success of the program.

Our goal is to continue to expand AVID to all grade levels at Alondra. Stay tuned for more adventures in AVIDLand!

Exciting Changes

Spirit Week brought musical chairs, a three-legged race, sports activities, twins, throw-back clothes, sports team representation, and a general feeling of fun and togetherness to Buena Vista High School for the first time in a long time. With the continuation of Freagles (Free Eagles) trips, our students have had opportunities to enjoy different experiences in the surrounding

Opportunities for student leadership have dramatically increased in the first quarter of the 2016-2017 school year. A new student leadership class has begun, and with it, our students have stepped into many different leadership roles. El Camino, Long Beach City College, and the University Technical Institute representatives will also be sharing information about post-secondary options to the seniors. These visits will culminate with field trips to the colleges. Students also had the opportunity to visit a showcase put on by ACE Clearwater, introducing them to the manufacturing world.

As we prepare our students to be college and career ready, we are increasing the ways in which we recognize them for their academic achievement. Students are recognized every four weeks if they have A's, B's, or C's in all classes. Teachers are also selecting a student of the week, and students of the quarter. The students also attended a guidance lesson where their transcripts were reviewed. They received their current grades, and were given strategies about how to improve their grades before the semester's end.



Get Your As Up!

Jackson Middle School continues to promote enrichment opportunities for all students. This past September, the Knights teamed up with University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA) to launch our first annual Get Your As Up (GYAU) Literacy Academy for all of our sixth-through eighth-grade African American students.

This enrichment program is designed for students to experience the enjoyment and power of literacy through a variety of team building, reading, dialogue, and problem-solving activities. The goal of this intensive course is to help raise student achievement and assist students in achieving the critical literacy skills needed to be successful in high school and college.

Families of participants were invited to learn more about the GYAU Literacy Academy at our Kick-Off Dinner and Parent Forum. Dr. Tyrone Howard, UCLA Associate Dean of Equity and Diversity, shared data and discussed the importance of this program. He noted that all stakeholders play a vital role in the progress and success of our African American students.

Every Friday, students meet with Ms. Anderson-Byrd,

UCLA Director of Center X, to discuss one of the assigned program texts. These text a variety of themes, from perseverance to justice. Students utilize comprehension, vocabulary, and critical-thinking skills to navigate through the literature and participate in rich academic discussions.

Participant Joshua Williams values the lessons he's learned. "Our teacher told us we have to work twice as hard and reach higher than the standards set for us, no matter what," he said. "At first, I wasn't sure I needed this program, but it has helped me at school and with life problems."

The program culminates with a field trip to UCLA and a literature celebration, where our students will share their insights and growth with family members, teachers, and special guests.





Number Talks: Mathematical Discourse

Number Talks are making a difference in math classrooms here. Many teachers recognize the need for students to be fluent in math strategies but know that not every child thinks about math in the same way. That's where Number Talks come in. There are two purposes to these talks: they're an effective method for students to work on their computational fluency and

mental mathematics, and they engage students in math discourse with their classmates to prove or disprove their mathematical thinking.

Number Talks are 10-to-15-minute problem-solving lessons that help students make sense of mathematics, develop efficient computation strategies, communicate mathematically, and provide opportunities for students to reason and prove solutions. Mental math is a key part of Number Talks because they encourage students to build on number connections to solve problems instead of memorizing procedures. The students focus on number connections and use them to



solve problems. Communication is also a key component;

In the upper grades, students solve arithmetic problems and discuss the different strategies they used to solve them. These strategies build on each other to help the students develop mental-computation skills. Questions such as *How did you solve that?* and *Can this problem*

be solved a different way? help students communicate their mathematical thinking. This allows the teacher to understand how the students are making sense of mathematics and offer necessary support.

It's so exciting to hear students talk about their thinking and learn from one another. Through the use of these standards-based problemsolving strategies, teachers are fostering little mathematicians at Mark Keppel School.

Coffee with the Coaches

What does it mean to be smart? Parents delved into this provocative question during Coffee with the Coaches, a series of informational parent meetings organized at Abraham Lincoln Elementary School. The first one of this school year was held on October 25

Coaches Mandy Murrietta and Joyce Taylor, with support from our intervention teacher, Rebecca Mercado, and our

counselor, Priscilla Villa, asked parents to take an informal self-assessment to determine their mindsets. Attendees responded to true-or-false statements, such as "People are born either smart or dumb" and "People who are truly smart don't need to try hard." The coaches then explained that brain research shows that intelligence is not fixed, meaning people are not born smart or dumb. Instead, intelligence is malleable and grows with effort. Using good strategies, asking questions, practicing, and persevering often lead to increased achievement and a growth mindset!

Parents then watched "A Secret about the Brain," a ClassDojo video about brain plasticity, and listened to "You!" an inspirational story written by Sandra Magsamen about dreaming big and trying hard. The meeting closed with tips for participants to help develop a growth mindset at home, with suggestions on how to respond when children declare that they are not smart enough or want to give up. Parents were encouraged to reply, "This may take time, but you will learn" or "Try a different strategy!"

Upon hearing that all Lincoln teachers and students have been trained to develop a growth mindset, parent Valerie Salazar shared that her second-grade daughter, Juliana, is already internalizing the concept. "My daughter said, 'Mom, it's normal to make mistakes. We learn from our mistakes!" Juliana's statement confirms that the Lincoln Lions are empowered learners indeed!

The Crux of the AVID Program

This school year, Paramount Park Middle School has embarked on its second year of the Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) program. The AVID program's driving purpose is to prepare students to be successful in the areas of organization, problem solving, and critical thinking in order to promote academic success and college readiness. Students in

the program are seventh- and eighth-graders who take specified AVID classes in the areas of language arts, math, science, social studies, and AVID elective. In their AVID elective, students have the opportunity to address an



area of content where they may be experiencing difficulty through peer tutoring. The tutorials, that take place weekly are the crux of the AVID elective class.

Tutorials are very similar to Socratic seminars. Students present a "point of confusion" to their group. Students then work together to solve the problem guided by questions from group members and an AVID tutor. Peers will act as facilitators in the discussion, asking open-ended questions and providing evidence to guide the understanding of the concept. No Digital for Toddlers Isn't Bad

Q. My 20-month-old son goes to a mom's day out program twice a week. Many of the moms volunteer a couple of times a month in the classroom. I've noticed that during free time some of the kids have iPads and seem to really enjoy various types of educational games and material on them. My son loves to play and touch the screen on my phone and

computer. Could you recommend apps that are fun but also teach our kids?

A. If you search online for "free apps for toddlers," an abundance of choices of apps and games will come up. I do want to point out that The American Academy of Pediatrics recently released a report that says that parents still need to "avoid digital media for toddlers younger than 18 to 24 months other than video chatting." Of course, they still limit screen time for all kids at different ages, but from age two to five, one hour a day of "high-quality programming" is recommended. The report gives tips and guidelines but also explains why there "continues to be evidence of harm from excessive digital media use." See http://pediatrics. aappublications.org/content/early/2016/10/19/peds.2016-2591 for the full report. Read the recommendations and then base your decision on how much one on one time you currently give your son. He is at an age where everything is fun, regardless if it's digital or a book or you and him just playing together, etc. He will get into the electronic world soon enough. But for now, there's nothing that can substitute human interaction, talking, touching, laughing, listening and just letting him be a kid.


