Recently, the College Board awarded and named our district to the 2018 Advanced Placement District Honor Roll for boosting access to AP courses to more students while maintaining or

#### **Guidelines for Success**

Buena Vista High School is a second chance for many of our students who have not experienced success in traditional high school settings. Our guidelines allow them to Strive, Organize, Attend, and Respect (SOAR) through high school and beyond to success in college and their chosen careers.

We started our spring semester with a series of mini-lessons designed to allow

students to reflect on each guideline and determine how they can implement the principle in their lives. Each guideline was taught over a week-long period in five different classes. Each week started with a short video clip starring our own students that taught about the guideline.

During Strive Week, we asked students to define what it meant to strive. They also read and analyzed quotes related to the importance of striving and set goals for themselves. Teachers shared times in their lives where they faced difficult challenges or setbacks and had to recover through hard work.

During Organize Week, we looked at various aspects of organization, including time management. Students determined which phone apps helped them to stay organized and manage their time and which apps were a waste of their time.

During Attend Week, we asked student to examine how attendance affects their grades by using their report cards. We held class discussions about the importance of attending not only physically but also mentally.

During Respect Week, we discussed the ways we respect ourselves, others, the learning environment, and our futures. Students participated in an activity that modeled how a person's respect or disrespect ripples through a community. Finally, students identified one commitment they would each make to create a respectful classroom, and these commitments were linked in a chain to show how strong we can become when we respect one another.

Our Guidelines for Success have allowed for our strong start to our second semester. As we continue through the semester, we will be recognizing students who exemplify the guidelines, and we will continue to use the guidelines as teaching tools to support our students.

#### **Bulldogs at their Best**

The Los Cerritos parents, staff, and student Bulldogs came bounding in one sunny morning to their second-trimester recognition assembly.

The assembly highlighted all of the hard work, study, and behavior efforts of our TK-5 students. They have mastered academic goals in reading and math. The assembly also wanted to honor those who exemplify our

school-wide PAWS behavior expectations. PAWS stands for Persevering, Acting responsible, Working with a winning attitude, and Striving for success.

A variety of awards were given out. The first and most prestigious was the Academic Achievers Award. This requires students to receive all 3's and 4's on their report cards to demonstrate that they are at or above grade level. Following in a close second is the Fantastic Fluency Award, which requires students to score at or above on established grade-level fluency benchmarks, math fact tests, and comprehension passage test questions.

The third award is entitled Masterful Mathematician, because it recognizes students who demonstrate exemplary comprehension, application, and verbal expression of Common Core math standards. The fourth award is the Principal Math Fluency Club. This requires students to correctly complete grade-level specific mixed addition, subtraction, multiplication, and/or division facts in or under five minutes.

The fifth award is Most Improved, which celebrates those students who have made significant gains in academic areas. The sixth award is our Bulldog Spirit, which highlights the efforts of students who really show their PAWS. The seventh award is Perfect Attendance, which requires students to have zero absences, tardies, and early-outs for the second trimester.

A hush falls over the crowd during the presentation of the final grade-level trophies for overall perfect attendance and math facts. But it is quickly replaced with loud clapping, cheering, and even a little barking from our proudest parent dog pound!

#### The New Face of Adult Education

Earlier this year, the Brookings Institution of Metropolitan Policy Program released a report stating that although the monthly national unemployment rate shows a drop in those individuals without jobs, there is a disproportionate number of people out of work.

In fact, thirty-eight percent of this population are identified as English language-learners, which is the largest student population that Paramount Adult

enrolls. In response to this issue, Paramount Adult School is piloting a new eight-week program this fall that addresses both English as a Second Language needs and valuable skills necessary for the work place.

The pilot program is known as Integrated Education and Training, and has been under development since last spring with Teacher on Special Assignment Tonya Cobb taking the lead. Ms. Cobb has worked throughout the spring and summer with administrators and teachers in

fine-tuning the curriculum for the program. Adults in the program participate in a basic skills/English as a Second Language component within a career pathway.

Career Technical Education-Information Technology is the pathway that is addressed in the program and where our students will receive their workplace skills instruction. Most importantly, Integrated Education and Training (IET) provides those individuals at the highest levels of unemployment with workforce preparation.

IET is made up of both basic skills such as reading, writing, math, ESL, and General Education Development (GED) test preparation, as well as the job skills needed for careers. In the past, basic skills and vocational skills were viewed and taught individually; however, in IET these skills are integrated into one cohesive course.

The benefits of IET include students gaining access to the 21st-century skills they need to be successful in the workforce. Additionally, students are able to acquire the basic skills necessary to succeed in their education, which results in their overall job success.

## **Don't Play With Toy Safety**

According to the United States Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), there were an estimated 166,300 toy related injuries treated in U.S. hospital emergency departments, and seven reported fatalities of children 12 years of age or younger during 2016. Register your toys to stay up to date with any recalls.

The Injury Prevention Program at Miller Children's & Women's Hospital Long Beach wants to keep kids safe in the community by providing safety education to children and families. For more information on childhood safety education and resources, visit millerchildrens.org/injuryprevention.

Many toy related injuries and fatalities can be prevented by taking some precautionary steps when buying new toys for your child:

- Purchase age appropriate toys recommended by the manufacturer.
- Read and follow all warning labels, especially for electric toys.
- Avoid toys with small parts that may become a choking hazard for younger children.
- Be cautious of toys with small batteries and magnets because they can cause serious harm if swallowed.
- Be aware of toys that may contain lead.
- Ensure that toys with movable parts do not trap or jam your child's finger.
- Be sure your child can breathe comfortably in toys they can enter, such as a tent.
