Throughout the school's history, the room behind the stage at Palmdale Learning Plaza (PLP) has been called "the green room," the Performing Arts (PA) room, and the band room. Thanks to new opportunities in music education for all students in pre-kindergarten through eighth grade, this year it is simply called the music room.

Jennifer Gilreath, PLP's music teacher, who also teaches music at Yucca Elementary School, has designed a music program that reaches all learners. She starts her day with a kindergarten music lesson and then grabs her baton for her beginning and symphonic middle school band rehearsals before switching back into general world music lessons for the first-through fifth-grade students.

In keeping with the goal of providing music lessons for all PLP students, Ms. Gilreath also delivers weekly music instruction to our 23 pre-kindergarten through fifth-grade Deaf and Hard of Hearing (DHH) students.

- Children from diverse cultural backgrounds perform better when parents and professionals collaborate to bridge the gap.
- Students whose parents are not involved are more likely to drop out of school.

Our counselors design and deliver a school counseling program based on the school's data to improve a range of student learning and behavioral outcomes. The American School Counselor Association's (ASCA) National Model is a framework that our PSD school counselors use to create and maintain the comprehensive counseling programs at each middle school.

These comprehensive counseling programs are provided by a statecredentialed school counselor and delivered to all students on campus. This includes delivering developmentally appropriate curriculum focused on the mindsets and behaviors students need for post-secondary readiness and success; closing the opportunity and achievement gaps; and then seeing the results in improved student achievement, attendance, and behavior.

Following the ASCA National Model, and to ensure access and equity for all PSD middle school students, the seven PSD school counselors continuously monitor their programs' alignment with the national framework. The counselors are striving for their sites to earn national acclaim and be designated as a Recognized ASCA Model Program (RAMP).

Applying for RAMP helps schools evaluate their comprehensive school counseling program, disaggregate data, discover areas for improvement, and enhance their program's effort to contribute to student success. The RAMP application process is a culmination of the implementation of a comprehensive school counseling program.

Science of School Food

Did you know that our school menus are both science and data driven? The Child Nutrition Department serves millions of meals each year, but before any item is prepared, it has already been months in the making.

The primary focus for each menu item is student preference. Every member of the Child Nutrition team ensures that the meals we serve are those we would eat ourselves and be proud to feed to our families. Student preference is determined through face-to-face interactions as well as data. Everything we prepare is recorded, and once the data is compiled, we determine whether a menu item can stay or be archived to try again in the future.

Beyond student preference, USDA and California state guidelines must be followed to ensure funding. These guidelines regulate calories, saturated fat, trans fat, sodium, type of grain and even the nutrient composition of vegetables! Once items have been chosen and the guidelines have been considered, the menu must be put together like a puzzle. There are countless logistical considerations to take into account as well as intentional aesthetic choices.

Next time you bite into a fresh Gala apple from one of our cafeterias, remember the science!



Twelve Wolf Principles

One of Oak Tree's goals to help students change their mindset, so they can make better decisions in and outside of the classroom. We use a variety of different interventions to help us with our mission. From October 15 until November 19th, we have been sharing a partnership with the Wolf Connection. The Wolf Connection is an education and empowerment program with wolfdogs, Youth Ambassadors, as the centerpiece. The program is based in Acton Ca. mountains. Our students learn about nature, the wolf pack, caring for others, and how to work through challenges in their lives.

Our students are learning through life lessons and character-building activities. The Wolf Connection is an emotionally, psychologically, and physically safe environment for our students. They get a chance to experience the Wolf Connection once a week throughout a six-week period.

They also get a chance to meet rescued wolves, hike up and down mountains, and share life experiences with team leaders and other Wolf Connection youth, while learning the "Twelve Wolf Principles."

- 1. Wolves are okay with who they are.
- 2. In order to be okay with who they are, wolves first know who they are.
- 3. Wolves let go of the past and make room for new things in their lives
- 4. Wolves are open to learning new things.
- 5. Wolves give 150 percent to everything they do, so they choose carefully what they agree to do.
- 6. Wolves live by the power of their bond, they care deeply for each other without giving into drama pity.
- 7. Wolves use their individual gifts and talents for the benefit of all.
- 8. Wolves communicate effectively. They keep it honest and real.
- Wolves know how to lead and how to follow. You can't lead if you don't know how to follow.
- Wolves collaborate and work together. They know that together they will succeed.
- 11. Wolves understand they are part of everything around them.
- 12. Wolves are into being, not into doing.

These students visit the music room in two smaller groups once per week to experience rhythms, beats, and more. "With Ms. Gilreath's innovative approach, our students can feel and connect with music down to each beat," explained Alisha Fathy, teacher of the first-through third-grade DHH classroom.

Ms. Gilreath's goal is to create a "physical music experience" for the students, during which they can feel the beat with their bodies. During one exciting lesson, the DHH students were mimicking animal gaits to the beat of Ms. Gilreath's drumming.

As a support to the growing Palmdale School District middle school band programs, a plan was made to start a fifth-grade band at both PLP and Yucca. According to Yucca's principal, Terrie Dowling, the goal is to give students "such a love for music that they continue on in middle school." So, Ms. Gilreath invited the fifth-grade students and parents into her music room to introduce the instruments, talk about the band experience, and gauge interest. After all the meetings, Ms. Gilreath began the program with a fifth-grade band of over 65 students and a fifth-grade band experience for Yucca that includes all fifth-graders.

However, two separate fifth-grade bands means two separate sets of instruments. Thanks to the generous support of the Palmdale School District and Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) funding, both schools were able to order brand-new student instruments. But the excitement and high level of student commitment were even a surprise to the instrument manufacturer, as the ever-increasing instrument orders caused a backorder situation. This presented Ms. Gilreath with a new challenge—starting two separate fifth-grade bands without any instruments! But, as expected, she rose to the challenge by borrowing instruments for Yucca and starting PLP's students with recorders so they could begin learning notation.

Ms. Gilreath has hit the right note for the students at PLP and Yucca. Just listen closely next time you visit the PLP campus and you might hear a few notes of "Hot Cross Buns" from a fifth-grader with a recorder at recess.

Research: Kids, Media, and Body Image

How kids think, feel, and act about their bodies is a critical piece of their self-esteem and overall healthy development. Common Sense Media's new research report, Children, Teens, Media, and Body Image, examines the role of traditional and digital media in the development of children's and teens' body image. This review of existing research reveals some surprising trends -- such as that half of 6- to 8-year-old girls feel their ideal body size is thinner than their current one -- but it also shows evidence that parents play a huge part in shaping how kids relate to their bodies. Some key findings:

- Many kids are dissatisfied with their bodies, and society's body appearance ideals are highly unrealistic.
- Body-image concerns start early; even preschoolers learn that society judges people by how they look.
- Parents' attitudes toward their own bodies are a big influence on how kids feel about their bodies.
- Unrealistic, sexualized, and stereotypical images and messages about bodies and gender are rampant in the media kids consume.
- Teens feel pressure to look good and cool online but also feel that social media helps their friendships and connections with like-minded peers.
- Although young girls are most susceptible, boys have issues with body image too. Our report uncovers large gaps in research on body image and media.

Several groups -- young children, boys, kids of color, LGBTQ youth -- are not well-studied, and research on online, digital media has yet to keep pace with the explosion in their use by kids and teens

Texting and Driving: A Killing Combination

Teens love to text. They'll send messages any time and anywhere. But if they text from behind the wheel of a car, the results could be deadly.

Studies show that texting and driving is as dangerous as drinking and driving. If you text while behind the wheel, you're 23 times more likely to crash. Although many states have laws making it illegal to text while driving, teens (and many parents) still do it, even though they know it's dangerous. When teens are driving, any activity besides keeping their eyes on the road and their hands on the wheel -- like emailing, downloading music, taking pictures -- is a huge no no.

So how can you make sure your teen is phone-free while behind the wheel?

- **Make it non-negotiable.** Teens need to understand that keys and phones simply do not mix. Let them know that distracted driving is just as dangerous as drunk driving.
- **Set clear rules.** Tell your teens to turn off their phones and put them in the glove box before they start the car. If you're not sure your teen has the will power to do this consistently, consider using apps that specifically restrict texting while driving.
- Download an app that disables the phone when you're driving. If you don't trust yourself, get an app that will keep you honest.
- **Set an example.** Resist the impulse to check your own phone while in traffic. Your kids are watching what you do. And chances are, they'll copy your behavior.

There's no denying that texting is here to stay. So managing when and where your kids do use their phones is critical -- not just for their development, but for their safety as well.
