We successfully approved the Facilities Master Plan, which will invest approximately 70 million dollars back into repairing and upgrading all of our schools in the next three years.

We successfully opened our new Parent Center, which will provide a place for our parents to take classes such as English as a Second Language (ESL), General Education Development (GED), parenting classes, computer classes, and more.

We celebrated the 20th anniversary of our planetarium, the first Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) program in the city of Palmdale. We also celebrated the 20th anniversary of Quail Valley Elementary School.

We received the Magnet Schools Assistance Program (MSAP) \$15 million federal grant. All of our middle schools are now officially magnet schools.

We successfully implemented interscholastic competitive sports. Students, staff, and parents will have an opportunity to help build pride and a positive culture at each middle school.

Furthermore, spring is the time to measure how well students are performing in our classrooms. Your children will be participating in the

The Palmdale Promise Interscholastic League kicked off this year with all eight schools competing in basketball. Thanks to the Transportation Department, the teams were able to travel by bus to their away games. New uniforms were purchased for every site which highlighted the schools' colors and mascots.

The teams played each other throughout league play. They entered the tournament brackets based on how well they did in the regular season. David G. Millen School won the sixth- and seventhgrade girls, eighth-grade girls, and sixth- and seventhgrade boys championship trophies. Space and Aeronautics Gateway to Exploration (SAGE) Academy took home first place in the tournament for the eighth-grade boys.

This first season would not have been such a huge success without the support of all of the students who participated as well as the efforts of the parents, coaches, administrators, scorekeepers, referees, and security, who made sure things ran smoothly at each game. Special thanks go out to Rick Myers and Mike Butler for their


Yay-Saturday School!

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
Richard's Book Review
