

Technology Leads the Way!

In order to meet the needs of children and families during the pandemic, our Early Childhood Education (ECE) program has increased the technology available in classrooms. This provides teachers with the necessary tools to create virtual-learning opportunities for students. This shift allows teachers to continue working toward achieving student outcomes and becoming 21st century learners. Almost every ECE classroom has received an interactive Promethean smartboard with user-friendly

software tools to help teachers design creative learning experiences; support our adopted curriculum, Creative Curriculum; and make progress on schoolreadiness and program goals. Teachers have also received laptops and iPad stands to further aid in instructional delivery. Over 1,500 student iPads with educational software were purchased, so each student has the necessary tools to stay connected and engaged.





Now enrolling! Spread the word! Early Childhood Education is working diligently to increase our enrollment in our Head Start and state preschool programs during the pandemic. ECE has 14 locations throughout the Antelope Valley. We have openings in Palmdale, Lancaster, Lake Los Angeles and West Palmdale. 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

As we continue to evolve and improve to meet the needs of our students and the community, the Child Nutrition Department has further expanded program offerings.

In addition to evening meal service and delivery options, we have been providing weekend meals. Even though we already serve over 10,000 meals per day, our staff continues to work hard to ensure every child has the opportunity to receive healthful meals.

During the month of November, meals were provided for 25 of the 30 days. Traditional turkey and gravy with pumpkin pudding, was carefully prepared



and served the week before Thanksgiving. The PSD lunch guys and gals spared no effort to ensure this fan favorite was still available despite the incredible amount of work. Our dedicated staff also handed out 16 meals on Friday, November 20 to ensure no child would be without meals during Thanksgiving week.

During this unprecedented time, addressing the mental health concerns of students has become more important than ever before and a major focus within the Palmdale School District. Even though schools are closed, Social Emotional Learning Specialists (SELS) are still hard at work, connecting with students and caregivers. During this time of school closures, SELS provide daily support groups, meet with students via Zoom, connect families with needed resources, and much more. Groups offered at both the elementary and middle school levels include, but are not limited to, Anger Management, Mindfulness for Relaxation and Decreasing Anxiety, Grief and Loss Support Group, Second Step for Social Skills, and Foster and Homeless Support Groups. Many campuses are also hosting Parent Support Groups. SELS also assist homeless students and Foster Youth by providing case management, referring families to housing resources and providing emotional support, as well as addressing barriers to online learning and enrollments.





Staying Connected

Staying connected during distance learning can be challenging, not to mention starting middle school itself! In a traditional setting, a student would move from having one teacher and one desk in elementary to now six, seven or even eight teachers and just as many classrooms. Then, add distance learning, Google Classroom codes and Zoom links on top of that transition!

Well, the middle school teachers at Palmdale Learning Plaza International Baccalaureate School found the one-stop-shop solution. They created an MYP (Middle Years Programme)

website at the start of the 2020–21 school year that houses all the necessary information that PLP's middle school students need to be successful during distance learning.

What do seventh-graders do when they can't find the Zoom link to their fourth-period math class? They just need to click on the Zoom Links to All Classes tab on the website and see an easy-to-read calendar of all classes, find their teachers and click their names.

What do eighth-grade students do when they need to reach out to their English teacher to make an appointment for support during office hours? They can click the eighth-grade tab, click on their teacher's picture, and email a message directly to them to set that appointment.

The MYP website at Palmdale Learning Plaza, created by the teachers, is an amazing resource for the middle schools' students, their families and the PLP office staff that is helping all members of PLP's Middle Years Programme to not only find academic success but also stay connected to our school during distance learning.





The Yo-Yo

Some believe the yo-yo originated in China. However, the first mention of the yo-yo is in Greece around 500 B.C. It is also found in pictographs in Egyptian-temple wall art. Philippine hunters used a rock with a 20-foot string to hit their prey in trees in the 16th century. Wherever the yo-yo originated, it has become a global fascination.

The yo-yo is said to be the second-oldest toy in the world, next to the doll. It is a toy that has a calming effect on the user. The French court played with the yo-yo (*joujou de Normandie*). Marquis de Lafayette toyed with the yo-yo. Napoleon and his troops played with it before the battle of Waterloo as well, as it was a favorite of the Duke of Wellington. There is a National Yo-Yo Museum in Chico, and wooden parts can be found online.

This country saw its first patent in 1866 by an Ohio company, but the toy remained obscure until 1916 in an article in *Scientific American* titled "Filipino Toys." When Pedro Flores, an immigrant from the Philippines working at a hotel in Santa Monica as a bellhop, played with his yo-yo during his lunch break, a crowd would gather around and watch. He started making yo-yos and had two factories by 1929.

A businessman named Donald F. Duncan on a trip from Ohio to California saw the yo-yo and bought Pedro's company in 1929. Then in 1932, Duncan was

given the trade name yo-yo, forcing competitors to use other names for the toy. It was Duncan who introduced the slip-string that allowed the yo-yo to "sleep." He set out on an advertising campaign with the Hearst newspaper company that increased paper circulation and sales of yo-yos.

Then in the 1960, with television and mass advertising, the yo-yo had a resurgence in sales and interest. However, the Duncan family lost a trademark case in 1965 and sold the company. Yet between 1960 and the 1990s, the yo-yo saw many innovations with the new technology that saw another resurgence in the 1990s. On April 12, 1985, the yo-yo went to space on the Discovery Shuttle. The toy needs gravity to work—you can guess the result!

Today, the yo-yo is providing more than entertainment for young enthusiasts. It is also a way for our troops to relax and take their mind off the stress of the job they have been sent to do. In 2008, Senator John McCain asked for people to send yo-yos and stress balls to the troops. There are several organizations that send yo-yos to the troops. As we get older and can no longer do what we used to do, there is still something that we can do that will make a difference.


