After 4 years of impressive work, the implementation team will highlight and celebrate the actions and services that have been completed, and will explore the other projects that remain. One of the guiding principles for the implementation team is "sustainability." The team understands that developing programs in order to merely check off a list is no way to build effective systems. A key component in all undertaken projects will be making sure that resources are available, now and in the future,

and that the allocation of resources does not detract from other established programs. Some of the needed programs that were on the original list included full-day kindergarten, expanding technology, and a 7-period day for middle school. These have been implemented and should be celebrated! From these three actions alone, our students have been experiencing more time learning and increased engagement. An example of an action that is still in the works is building our multilingual options: Though our dual immersion programs are robust and growing, the team is still exploring the best way to incorporate multi-lingualism at our schools.

The Facilities Master Plan is in full swing, with the following examples representing only a small fraction of progress made so far:

Desert Rose Elementary School: An innovative time and cost saving option that serves as a wall play surface for students and meets storage needs for PE teachers was installed in the schoolyard. A new kindergarten playground and new turf area were also constructed to provide a safe, comfortable recreation space for students to enjoy. Joshua Hills Elementary School: Metal ramps in existing modular classroom buildings were removed and replaced with concrete ramps. Additional new concrete flatwork and new AC pavement were completed.





Reinforcing Positive Behavior

The staff at Yellen Learning Center has received training and is implementing the Boys Town Specialized Classroom Management System. This positive approach teaches students to replace inappropriate behaviors with appropriate ones, stressing positive relationships and interactions. Students learn how to manage their own behaviors through recording positive behaviors as points earned. Students use points to purchase items and activities offered by the school community. They also use points to advance on the level system.

Social skills are taught and practiced at neutral times. When a student uses a skill appropriately, he receives praise and a reason to use the skill again. When a student does not use a specific skill, the inappropriate behavior is identified, negative points are earned, the appropriate behavior is re-taught, and the student is given an opportunity to earn half of their negative points back by practicing the skill appropriately. Points are awarded to show that the student learned and practiced the skill.

Boys Town addresses positive social skills in a supportive, step-by-step manner. Its focus is on the individual student and allows for self-pacing based on needs. We are excited about this research-based program and expect remarkable results as we fully implement this at Yellen.

School Wellness

Child Nutrition, Health and Physical Well-Being

Healthier students tend to be stronger learners. Student health is related to grades, school attendance, and graduation rates. However, one in three children is overweight or obese (Alliance for Healthier Generation, n.d.). In addition to the connection to poorer education outcomes, childhood obesity is also linked to diabetes, cardiovascular disease, and other health issues in adulthood.

Given the long-term educational and health consequences of unhealthy behaviors, childhood is a critical time to intervene and establish healthy habits that will have lasting benefits. Schools are an important setting, and can partner in our efforts to promote health, well-being, and safety. The majority of our school-aged children in the U.S. attend school and spend a great deal of time in that setting.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) have developed a "Whole School, Whole Community, Whole Child" (WSCC) model to depict how a collaborative and aligned approach between education and health can improve our students' education and physical, social, and cognitive development (CDC, n.d.). The WSCC model emphasizes both the psycho-social and physical environment. Additionally, it promotes community, family, and student engagement.

Understanding the link between health and academics, and the important role that schools play in helping students not only learn but also stay healthy, our school districts across the country are adopting policies and regulations to improve health and wellness. One way to support district-wide wellness policies is through Local School Wellness Councils (LSWCs) that work at the school building/campus level.

LSWCs are small groups comprised of faculty, parents, students, and administrators focused on implementing programs, policies, and practices to improve physical activity, nutrition, and health of students. LSWCs are important vehicles to ensure that district-wide health and wellness efforts will address the identified needs and concerns of the school.

Each school setting serves different populations, has different needs and resources, and requires an individualized action plan to address its school's health priorities. LSWCs can implement school district health and wellness policies to fit a school's context and needs. Research also indicates that schools with LSWCs are more likely to implement wellness policies passed by school systems (Hager et al., 2016), and are thus an important link to putting policy into practice.

Enhancements to the school's playground, including the replacement of damaged equipment, were also completed.

Chaparral Elementary School: Improvements and enhancements to the elementary school's playground were completed, including a ramp for ADA access to swings and repairs to the playground surface.

Mesquite Elementary School: Metal ramps were removed from existing modular classroom buildings and replaced with concrete ramps. In addition, improvements were made to the school's playground, including the removal of rubberized surface cutouts to create footings for new equipment and the proper installation of a Burke Loop Climber.

Los Amigos Dual Immersion School: Improvements to the elementary school's playground surface were completed, including the installation of a new slide deck and button caps.




