# **Creating a College-Going Culture**

We are hoping that many of you reading this article have, by now, attended or participated in one or more of the many events that have become part of RBUSD's college-going culture. They may include an informational session focused on improving your financial literacy and how to be in a position to send your child to college; a fourthgrade field trip to a local university; meeting with Shannon Rodriguez at the RUHS "Nest"; or taking a college-readiness exam, such as the PSAT or ReadiStep, during the course of your school day. But we also recognize that as a parent, a guardian, a student or a community member, you may only have a small window into what your particular

school site is doing to promote a college-going culture. Our goal is to let you know that we are taking specific steps at every school and every grade level to ensure that our students are prepared for their education beyond RBUSD.

To that end, every year, each school must have a written plan approved by an elected school site council and the RBUSD Board of Education that lays out their precise goals, objectives and priorities for the upcoming school year. In December 2012, our Board of Education approved the school plans for all eight elementary schools, two middle schools, one comprehensive high school and alternative education.

Every RBUSD school has adopted specific college and career-readiness goals, actions and measures of progress to address this important component of an RBUSD education. You can see the details of each school's plan on our website. Click on the "Departments" link for "Instructional Services" and scroll down to the bottom of the page to find out what is happening at your school and across the RBUSD community.



### **AVID**

Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) is a research-based program with proven results of student achievement. The program targets students in the academic middle who have the desire to attend college and who are motivated to work hard. Furthermore, AVID focuses on teaching students the academic and social skills needed to succeed in a rigorous academic curriculum.

At Adams Middle School, AVID is offered as part of the elective wheel in the sixth grade and as a full-year elective class to

seventh- and eighth-grade students. Incoming sixth-grade students are given an AVID-like experience. The AVID curriculum they are exposed to emphasizes the importance of organization, goal setting, team building, and college awareness. In addition, students are taught how to use Cornell Notes, a formal note-taking strategy, as tool to aid them in all of their courses.

Seventh- and eighth-grade students are selected to enroll in an AVID class after an application process. During the AVID class period, students learn organizational and study skills through the use of Cornell Notes, learn collaboration and problem-solving skills during tutorials, and participate in motivational and team-building activities. The AVID curriculum is driven by the Writing, Inquiry, Collaboration, and Reading (WICOR) method. Additionally, students visit local colleges and universities and have regular guest speakers to share their college journeys and professional careers.

### **Starting the Day Off Right**

As adults, many of us make morning exercise a part of our daily routine. For most busy parents, one of the main reasons often given for choosing the morning to exercise is schedule. Exercising first thing in the morning gets your exercise out of the way so you can focus on other things. The benefits we also reap are a more regulated sleep/wake cycle, a higher energy level, obesity prevention, and more focus during the work day.

The same holds true for our students. At Alta Vista Elementary School, one of our most exciting new programs is

our bi-weekly running club for kindergarten through fifth grade. Why hold a running club in the morning? We know that children need daily physical activity, but an early morning running club offers so much more. Regular sleep habits are even more pivotal for children, as their brains are still developing. 

We are grateful for Coach Mike's efforts to keep our students on the move and focused on health.



adding a twist to his shows. For this production, he stated,
"I want the stage to look like a huge yearbook collage. I want to
add a level of depth to the show, and the idea of a yearbook is
relatable to everyone."


Making this production even more exciting is Advanced Drama's involvement in designing the technical elements of

the set, costumes and makeup. Baldridge said, "Students will create their own designs off the yearbook concept by researching, drawing sketches, and completing mini-models and drawings of their final designs." His students have not taken this responsibility lightly.

"It's really awesome how Mr. B is turning this program into one that is student run," said Jennifer Duong, a student participating in the design unit. "To be a part of the first major production that has been handed over to students is really an honor. There is a lot of creativity in Advanced Drama."

Starting in January, students began completing their set models. Baldridge said, "Once they completed their designs, I decided which fit the needs of the production best. I didn't solely use one set design—rather, I used a mixture of several designs. After deciding on a design, another group of students, under the guidance of teacher Robert Van den Eikhof and theater manager Aaron Morgan, built the set."

"This was a fantastic real-life experience for the students," Baldridge said. "In college, design students go through this same process. College readiness is important on campus, and giving my students this opportunity prepares them for the college experience."

### **Running the Numbers**

While the numbers cannot tell us everything, they can give us great insight into a school. Parras Middle School has seen an increase of over 29 points in its academic performance index (API) score over the last several years. But what does this mean? The API measures the growth of student learning in the four core subjects of language arts, math, science and social studies. All students are assessed in math and language arts, but only eighthgrade students are assessed in all four subjects. Students are rated at a performance level of Advanced, Proficient, Basic, Below


Basic or Far Below Basic in each of the subject areas. The higher the number of students in the Proficient and Advanced performance bands, the higher the school's API score. The state has set a target API of 800 for all schools. Any schools above 800 have met the state's requirements. Parras is proud to have achieved an API of 916!

Another measure that Parras Middle School uses as an indicator of success is our students' grade point average (GPA). Over the last two years, Parras Middle School has seen an increase of 11 percent in students earning a 3.0 GPA. At the end of last year, our data showed that 79 percent of our students were achieving a 3.0 GPA, whereas in previous years, the percentage of students earning a 3.0 GPA was 68 percent and 69 percent. The increase in GPA can be attributed to the popular tutorial period and the focus of the staff to make sure students are succeeding.

Another number we look at is taken from the California Health Kids Survey (CHKS), a survey that analyzes students' feelings of safety and connectedness to their school. When looking at last year's seventh-grade students and comparing them to the previous year's seventh-graders, we found a drop across the board in the number of students who felt unsafe at school or experienced a negative interaction with someone else. Our Safe School Ambassadors program, which is funded by the Redondo Beach Education Foundation (RBEF), is a large contributor to our success.

With only a few months of the school year remaining, the staff at Parras is striving to live up to our mission statement: to ensure continual grown in our students' learning and academic achievement while promoting responsible citizenship

### Riding the Wave to Greatness

These newly adopted standards will roll out in 2014, and our teachers will be ready with an aligned curriculum, instruction and assessments to help meet the needs of our students.

In addition to staff professional development, Tulita parents attended a coffee talk to learn about this new initiative. Common Core will keep us on a path to greatness as the standards are internationally benchmarked and research-based, and aligned with college and career-readiness standards including rigorous

content and the application of knowledge through high-order thinking stills.

Tulita students are immersed in an educational experience that is focused on making the whole child great. We formed a Student Wellness Council for the fourth- and fifth-grade students looking to take on a leadership role and help our school be a healthy place for adults and children.

Tulita is also launching the "Walking School Bus" program to encourage more children to walk safely to school. In the area of social and emotional health, our students attended a meaningful assembly called "Waking up Courage" during Yellow Ribbon Week. The assembly themes align with the RBUSD's Safe School Ambassador program and teach the children how to take action to keep our school safe.

### Strong in Academics

For academic and social enrichment, many children have been completing my monthly Expectation Projects, aligned with Tulita's Expectations for Success. The students take time at home to work on projects that demonstrate their ability to collaborate, communicate, value challenges, overcome obstacles and engage in critical thinking. We also have celebratory lunches together where they share their projects with the other students.

At our Town Hall meetings I remind the community about the importance of being a PeaceBuilder. At Tulita we do our very best, do what is right, treat others the way we want to be treated, and take personal responsibility for everything we say and do.

To support us in our quest for greatness, the Redondo Beach Educational Foundation has been able to fund the following programs and projects at Tulita Elementary School: a field trip to Chapman University for the fourth grade; Family Science Night; a credentialed science teacher to provide weekly lab experiences for the fourth- and fifth-graders; Music Center Artists in Residency Program for the first and second grade; a credentialed vocal music teacher to provide vocal music education for every third- and fourth-grader; an Arts Education Field Trip to LACMA for every second- and third-grader; upgraded technology including Computer Lab and iPads, with the use of funds from past RBEF Donor Drive grants in conjunction with PTA funds.


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


# **Get Moving with Ella Jenkins**

If you were in preschool or early elementary school any time after 1962, listen to "London Bridge Is Falling Down" or "Skip to My Lou" from Ella Jenkins's new collection, Get Moving with Ella. I can almost guarantee that you'll have an immediate olfactory


memory of the waxy smell of crayons and that thick white paste that came in a jar. You may even remember how it tasted.



Ella Jenkins's songs and activities, sung in her gentle, firm voice accompanied by her guitar, have been the first introduction to integrated music and vocabulary for many young children within the past 60 years. Her 33rd release, Get Moving with Ella Jenkins, is a compilation of 15 of these songs, three of which are previously unreleased. The collection will have young children getting up and getting on some healthy moves and enriching their language through repetition and rhythm, a long-practiced, successful methodology. "Who Fed the Chickens?" features personal pronoun usage along with farm animal names; "Head and Shoulder" mixes exercise with learning the names of body parts; and "Play Your Instruments" involves music making while learning the names of instruments. And there's a really neat reworking of the old jump-rope rhyme "Teddy Bear."

First Lady Michelle Obama recommends exercise to keep children fit. Get Moving will provide children with a good measure of it along with smart, healthy play—just like the kind you got as a child if you danced and moved to the sounds of the First Lady of Children's Music.

# **How Do We Keep Your Children Safe?**

Safe from What? Safe from being bullied, safe from germs, safe from being hurt on the playground, safe from being injured while playing a sport, safe from being exposed to drugs, safe from being totally stressed out due to the amount of school work they have to complete, safe from being cyber-bullied, safe from being a victim of child abuse, safe from being hit by a car as they arrive or leave school, safe from being injured or worse due to an earthquake, safe from being injured or worse due to a student bringing a weapon to school, and safe from an armed intruder entering campus. I probably missed some safety issues.

The greatest fear that most parents have is that their child may be hurt, injured, abused, or worse.

When I read the above list of things that school districts need to address regarding student safety I felt overwhelmed. Then I thought about all the things we have in place such as: a district wide anti-bullying program (Safe School Ambassadors), health clerks at all schools as well as three district nurses R.N.'s & Public Health Nurses), monitoring of our playground equipment by Principals and M&O staff as well as campus supervisors and noon aides, a certified trainer at most high school athletic events, an RBPD School Resource Officer, a community drug and alcohol task force, a voluntary drug testing program, drug sniffing dogs, Project Alert middle school drug prevention program, MindUp Curriculum delivered to all elementary students, counselors at all schools for students to talk to when needed, parent ed night regarding cyber-safety and cyber-bullying, staff who have been trained regarding what to do when there is any suspicion of child abuse reported to them, crossing guards, walking school bus program, valet drop off system in school parking lots, regular earthquake drills, zero tolerance regarding students bringing weapons to school which includes being expelled, all gate entrances to schools locked once school has started, visitors must go through the school office to enter the campus, all schools practice lockdown drills, the district has a Violence Prevention Action Committee, maintaining an emergency communication system by phone or email to our parent community, school wide communication to all classrooms from the office, and district wide communication to all schools, fencing around the perimeter of our schools in most areas, continue to hire the best people possible who understand how to recognize potential violent situations or individuals, promote to all staff the use of positive and professional communication to students and community members at all times, continue to provide parents/community members an avenue to voice their complaints and concerns, and we have an active and concerned parent community.

I know RBUSD can still make improvements, but there are many positive things that already exist. I hope this makes you feel just a little safer.

# **Keeping Our Students Safe**

The recent shooting at Connecticut's Sandy Hook Elementary School has left the nation shocked and shaken. We were at a loss to explain this deeply disturbing tragedy and the other horrific acts of gun violence on our campuses.

As Superintendent of Schools in San Bernardino for a dozen years, and now here in Los Angeles County, I have dealt with the issue of school safety.

My goal, which I'm sure all educators share, has been to look in the eyes of our students and promise them they will be safe.

We want to reassure students that their only concern at school is school work - not whether they can remain out of harm's way in the sanctuary of their classrooms.

But, unfortunately, we cannot make such a promise yet. There's still a lot to do to prevent gun violence in our schools, which continues to claim too many lives.

As President Obama recently said: "Can we say that we're truly doing enough to give all the children of this country the chance they deserve to live out their lives in happiness, and with purpose? I've been reflecting on this the last few days, and if we're honest with ourselves, the answer is no."

At the same time, the president has given us hope when he proposed a new \$150 million Comprehensive School Safety program that would help school districts hire staff and make other critical investments in school safety.

What can we do to make our schools safer? Here are a few key steps we can take:

- Make sure our Comprehensive School Safety Plans are updated and useful.
- Create a school culture of first preventers. This includes identifying the risk factors affecting students and staff and addressing them effectively.
- Train school personnel, mental health specialists, and police officers on ways to maximize personal and collective effectiveness to prevent or reduce school violence.
- Conduct parent workshops to be sure they know how to be partners in their children's education.
- Prioritize funding for school safety initiatives that protect our learning environments.

The Los Angeles County Office of Education has collaborated with community agencies in promoting school safety. We help county K-12 schools comply with all local, state and federal school safety laws. We offer workshops to train mental health professionals and other school personnel in the recovery process after traumatic school events.

We also hold the annual Safe Schools Conference to share best practices and learn innovative ways to address school safety issues.

I hope that we can all continue to work together to keep our students safe because it will take sustained commitment and resources from all of us to meet this challenge.

Arturo Delgado, Ed.D., was appointed superintendent of the Los Angeles County Office of Education in July of 2011. 


