### A Positive Message

We have had incredible outcomes this election cycle in education. As a result of the passage of California Ballot Measure 30, we have staved off a state-wide funding disaster, which threatened to have students lose countless instructional days. Locally, the residents took the issue of education funding into their own hands and passed Measure Q. This third affirmation of the

importance of education to the community of Redondo Beach means that district technology infrastructure will be able support the ever-changing needs of students as we look forward to jobs in the 21st century.

So, I guess all of the issues surrounding school funding have been solved, and we can all relax knowing that funding in public education has been taken care of. Or has it...?

We are far from out of the woods. What we have managed to do with Proposition 30 is create a short-term solution, where educational funding is stable. However, if you look at our funding over the last few years, we have

been constantly enduring cuts. This has necessitated the elimination of both teaching and staff positions. The passage of three school bonds has allowed the district to make capital improvements, but day-to-day operations and learning continue to be under an ever-present pall. Per pupil funding from the state of California will continue, for at least the short term, to be in the bottom of the bottom quartile when compared to other states. (Pause for a second, and let that sink in!) Given the state government's proclivity for putting off problem solving, what other solutions are there?

Regardless of election outcomes or Sacramento political whims, the Redondo Beach Educational Foundation (RBEF) and Redondo Beach Council PTA are the organizations in our community that seek to provide what is still missing in our children's' educational experience. RBEF will be giving over \$600,000 to the school district this year. Under the leadership of President Brad Serkin, the RBEF reaches out to community members, small business leaders, and corporate leaders to provide teacher grants, program funding, and summer session classes. ### Senior Citizens: Your Butler's Almost Ready!

It all started with a group of students who didn't know a thing about robotics. They also didn't know a thing about programming. In February, a group of fourth-grade families at Beryl Heights Elementary school came together to form a First Lego League (FLL) robotics team. Ten fourth-graders began meeting each Friday in the Beryl Heights computer lab. They first learned how to build with NXT Lego robotics sets. Then, they learned how to create basic programs for the robots. In May, the team registered with FLL and became Superbotics, team number 58 out of 291 in

the Los Angeles area. There are some 29,000 teams worldwide. All the students had worked together in classes before, and therefore, forming a team came easily.

FLL is the result of an alliance between FIRST (For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology), founded by Dean Kamen and the LEGO Group organization. The 2012–13 FIRST Tech Challenge theme is "Senior Solutions." The students all have learned about seniors and their special needs and how to program intricate movements for the robot to do. All of this helps them get ready for competition. All of the students are grouped into three teams, each having a programmer, a builder and a strategist. Each gets missions for the robot to complete that represent a problem that a senior citizen might face in everyday life. As a group, they need to accomplish these missions using the robot on a game table that represents the challenges a senior faces. For example, one challenge is related to shopping, so the students need to build a mechanical arm for the robot to reach up and down to grab things.

In the competition, the team is judged on the robot tasks, a project and core values. For the project, the team will do a small play about a product they have invented to help seniors. During the competition, the students also need to cheer for their team. Finally, on the game table, the robot does all the work, and this is where the programming comes in. They need to do many missions to get points, and to win the robot game, they need to have the most points of all the teams.

In November, the Beryl Superbotics team went to practice and qualifying tournaments where they put everything they have learned to the test. As a team, they started and finished a lot of challenges, but they are a team, and a team can get though anything if they work together and set their minds to it.

### **Caring Counselors at Our School**

Feb. 4–8 is National School Counseling Week, a time when we celebrate the unique contribution of professional school counselors within U.S. school systems. At Parras, we are thrilled to have a counseling department that has a tremendous impact on the success of our students. Our counselors follow the ASCA National Model and focus on three main domains: academic, college and career planning, and social and emotional concerns. In order to meet the needs of students in these three areas, counselors work with students individually, in small groups, in the classroom and in

collaboration with teachers, support staff and parents. Schoolwide programs include Safe School Ambassadors, Red Ribbon Week guidance activities, Career Day and Yourspace. Yourspace is a weekly lunchtime program offered to all students who are interested in joining counselors for a fun-filled lunchtime experience, giving them the opportunity to make new friends in a supportive environment. Parras has a zero-tolerance policy for bullying; therefore, counselors work closely with students trained through the Safe School Ambassadors Program and administration to prevent and address mistreatment and to improve the school climate.

In the classroom, counselors teach guidance curriculum focusing on such topics as active-listening skills, strategies for achieving academic success, college and career planning, and the transition into and out of Parras Middle School, to name only a few. Counselors also support students in the AVID (Advancement via Individual Determination) program by providing both academic and social/emotional counseling services to ensure success.

### **Self-Responsibility: A Pillar of Counseling**

Parras Middle School has an active CJSF (California Junior Scholarship Federation) population. Students must meet rigorous academic standards and must apply to be a member. The primary focus of CJSF is for students to maintain a high level of academic performance, to expose students to universities, and to encourage students to give back through community-service opportunities.

In addition to providing services to all students, counselors work closely with those who are at risk academically and emotionally. Students are given targeted support through referrals, coordinated collaboration between the school and home, and academic program planning. In order to expand our services, Parras is a training site for counseling interns who are attending local-area graduate programs in the field of school counseling.

Our counselors serve on the Violence Prevention Action Committee, Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Task Force, School Site Council, SST Committee, IEP Team and AVID School Site Team. Parras Middle School's counseling program played a key role in earning us the California Distinguished School Award. The Parras Counseling Team has also been given the Best in the West award for having a superior SPARC (Support Personnel Account Report Card).


and Hands-On Science for each classroom. These enrichment programs give students a chance to work with materials and perform experiments to make learning




cians combined produce a

I was recently asked by three different people what to do about their children or grandchildren they suspected may have exceptional needs. It was fortunate they happened to bump into me or knew how to reach me by phone, and I was glad to refer them to the appropriate staff members, who could follow up on the referrals. But, I would venture a guess that there are some out there who do not know what to look for—or if they do, they may not know how to go about getting help for their children or grandchildren.

Please know that, under state and federal regulations, your local school district is required to seek out individuals within its boundaries who are suspected of having a disability. The district is required to assess, and, if the child is eligible, to provide child and his or her parents with an Individualized Education Plan (IEP). We do this by working with the Southwest Special Education Local Plan Area (SELPA) to contact private schools, doctors, and pediatricians in the area, letting them know about the services we provide. We also advertise in local newspapers (including *School News Roll Call*) each year so parents are aware.

The school district's responsibility to assess and provide services begins when the child turns three years old. The district's Learning Is Fun Together (LIFT) Preschool assessment team includes a variety of licensed and credentialed professionals, including Special Education teachers, psychologists, speech and language pathologists, occupational therapists, boardcertified behavior analysts, and more. LIFT Preschool is located on the campus of Alta Vista Elementary School.



# **Common Myths About College**

Students often have beliefs about why they cannot attend college. These beliefs can get in the way of students pursuing their opportunity to make the choice to attend a college or university after high school. We must debunk these myths and help students separate rumor from reality as these can be obstacles to gaining access to higher education.

### Some typical examples include:

- Nobody in my family has gone to college
- I cannot afford to go
- My grades are not good enough for college
- I don't know how to apply or where I want to go
- I need to decide on a career before I can choose a college
- I just want to get a job and make lots of money
- College will be too difficult for me
- I don't need to start planning for college until my junior year in high school
- I can't go to college full-time
- I'm not sure I'll fit in
- Only the best students receive financial aid from colleges
- I only have to take the minimum college-prep courses to get into college
- I didn't do well in my 9th and 10th grade years, so it's too late now

We have heard these comments from some students and families here in RBUSD. Together, we want to demystify who can go to college, debunk the myths about college eligibility and attendance and help open the doors for ALL students and families. Everyone should have a choice.

**Myth:** Many students owe more than \$100,000 by the time they graduate from a private college. (Council of Independent Colleges, September, 2012)

**Fact:** One third of students who graduated with a bachelor's degree did not have any educational debt. The average debt level of bachelor's degree recipients who borrowed for college is \$20,000



Proposition 30, a statewide initiative focused on "temporary taxes to fund education..." passed the necessary 50-percent threshold and received a 54-percent YES vote. Based on what we know today, our leaders in Sacramento have stated that school districts will not receive midyear reductions because of the passage of Proposition 30. As this pertains to RBUSD, the potential for 12 additional furlough days will not occur.

Proposition 38, a statewide initiative focused on "tax[es] to fund education and early childhood programs" did not pass the necessary 50-percent threshold and received a 26-percent YES vote.

Of course, there were many other items on your local, state, and national ballot. The purpose here is to focus on dollars that directly impact RBUSD. We will continue to apprise you of any significant developments that pertain to our district. Our goal is to maintain clear communication with our community, staff members, and families. In the meantime, thank you for your continued support and care of our students.
