Ethic of Care

The Power of Community Partners

There is an old African proverb that says, "It takes a village to raise a child." In the Redondo Beach Unified School District and community, that saying is especially true, and it is put into practice through the strong relationship that the RBUSD maintains with parents, staff, community, and in particular, the Redondo Beach Educational Foundation (RBEF).

Through a long-standing partnership with the RBEF, the students in our district have access to high-quality physical education teachers and programming, vocal and instrumental music instruction, and greater access to Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) programs such as robotics and eSports. The Redondo Beach Educational Foundation also supports the mental health of our students by providing increased access to counseling services across the K-12 continuum.

Over the past two years, the relationship between the RBUSD and its community partners has been integral in navigating the COVID-19 pandemic and campus closures. Both the PTA and RBEF were able to seamlessly pivot to online programming and support, which allowed our families to stay connected as a district.

The RBUSD relationship with the Beach Cities Health District (BCHD), also a strong community partner, has provided wraparound services to address the health and safety concerns of not only the community but our schools as well. The guidance that the BCHD has provided, and continues to provide to the Redondo Beach community, has been unparalleled during this pandemic. They have served a role in our community and the schools that could never have been anticipated.

Educating the "whole child" is the highest priority for the Redondo Beach Unified School District, one that we could not accomplish without our strong community partners.

COVID-19 Vaccines and Testing Outcomes for Beach Cities Schools in 2021

As we start 2022. we look back on the whirlwind of 2021. During this year, Beach Cities Health District (BCHD) partnered with local school districts -

Hermosa Beach City School District (HBCSD), Manhattan Beach Unified

School District (MBUSD) and Redondo Beach Unified School District (RBUSD) – to support student, staff and family health and well-being, including COVID-19 vaccines and testing.

Vaccines: On Monday, March 1, 2021, all education staff who live or work in Los Angeles County became eligible to receive COVID-19 vaccinations. BCHD coordinated with the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health regarding vaccination efforts for the school community. As an authorized vaccine provider, BCHD hosted vaccination efforts for 11 South Bay school districts in the South Bay Consortium for School Vaccines.



From March through December 2021, BCHD hosted 74 vaccination clinics, 33 of which were pop-up clinics at schools. More than 23,100 total doses of Pfizer vaccine were administered. More than 5,000 doses were administered to school staff, more than 16,800 to 12+ and more than 6,200 to 5-11 year olds.

Testing: When BCHD's community COVID-19 testing site closed in June 2021, BCHD worked with the three Beach Cities school

districts to provide ongoing testing for students and school employees. BCHD worked collaboratively with the school districts to establish on-site testing within all three school districts and daily testing at BCHD facilities. Ongoing, free testing is available at BCHD, 514 N. Prospect Ave., Redondo Beach on school days between 2 – 5 p.m. Since June 2021, more than 7,000 COVID-19 tests have been provided to students and school staff.

THC Overdosing from Edibles on the Rise in School-Aged Children

With the legalization of marijuana, it's important for parents to be mindful how accessible marijuana can be for kids. While it's important to watch our teenagers with marijuana use – an alarming new trend is occurring in children much younger.

There has been an uptick in younger children who are suffering from THC overdose, from consuming THC-infused edibles that look like candy. THC edibles such as – gummies, brownies, lollipops, and even lemonade and soda - are growing in popularity. The packaging can appeal to younger kids, who may not even know what THC is.




A little over a year ago, THC-infused candy that looked very similar to Nerds Rope® caused several kids to die from a THC overdose. Despite an edible's welcoming appearance, a single THC-infused candy bar can contain several times the recommended adult dose of THC. This creates a significant issue for toddlers and school-aged children. In addition, since THC is digested the "side effects" could take hours to develop, causing kids to eat more since they won't feel any initial reaction.

Anyone can overdose from the effects from edibles – but children especially can experience altered perception, anxiety, paranoia, dizziness, weakness, slurred speech, poor coordination, apnea and heart problems. It's not well known yet what the long-term effects of edibles have on your child's heart, but some children complain of a tightened chest and pain similar to a heart attack.



Little Stories of Great Composers Series

What better way to introduce children to great composers than with beautifully illustrated storybooks coupled with recordings of read-alouds and enhanced by tidbits of Tchaikovsky, morsels of Mozart and little Vivaldi victuals? Even better, a cheeseand-music-loving mouse narrates the tales!

Minim is the fly on the wall—rather, the

mouse in the house—who gives young listeners slices of the composers' lives as he scrounges for slices of cheddar. In "A Delicious Taste of Mozzarella!," Minim slips out of a crack in the wall to eavesdrop on "Uncle Petya" surprising his niece and nephew with a gift: a musical score. The children are at first disappointed; then, their uncle teaches them how to play the composition on the piano. They realize how music can bestow magic on the spirit. Uncle Peta is, of course, Pyotr Ilyitch Tchaikovsky.



In "That's My Piano, Sir!" Minim is hoping for leftover goodies after voyagers leave a boat on a busy dock. A sudden crash shatters the briny air. An exhausted dockworker has dropped a huge crate, which turns out to be a folded piano. The customs officer is cranky and not in the mood for any tomfoolery until a nicely dressed, polite child says, "That's my piano, sir!" The lad sits down, plays, and

charms away everyone's ill humor with "A Little Night Music." Minim finds his cheese, and we discover Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart!

Concert pianist Ana Gerhard authored the books, and Marie Lafrance illustrated them. Canadian stage actor Colm Feore was the cultured voice of Minim, and Canadian chamber music orchestra I Musici de Montreal played the score. A wonderful introduction to great composers and, as Minim shows, just what the spirit needs today!

Young Maestros

Tracy Bonham's Grammy-nominated compositions might be familiar to some—Google "Mother Mother" if you've never heard it—but her gifts extend on beyond "Billboard." Her classical training and devotion to developing a passion for music in very young children created the Melodeon Music House Curriculum, which teaches music fundamentals to preschool youngsters.

You don't need a spoonful of sugar to get children interested in music, but Bonham knows a most delightful way anyhow. "Young Maestros," a collection of songs and games from Melodeon, opens with "Me Symphony," in which Bonham laments how she misplaced her instruments everywhere—her tuba in Aruba, her shaker in Jamaica. But hey, she has her fingers, mouth, nose, feet and a beat as substitutes! Take heed, teachers and parents—there's a great maps lesson in there.



Bonham puts the "fun" in "fundamentals" with "Beats to a Measure," a pleasant, rapid-fire lesson in rhythm. "All the Blackbirds" gives flight to the black keys, and "Feelin' Pretty Major" explains major and minor keys and how the upbeat feel of the former and the mournfulness of the latter comprise the music of life.

"Background Singers" is my personal favorite. Like the documentary "Twenty Feet from Stardom," it pays homage to the unsung singers who provide the bones and body of a song. "Background Singers" tells what happens when a lead singer is unkind and unappreciative to them. Let's say that she learns about harmony the hard way!

The final track on the collection is "A Song Without an Ending," only 32 seconds long with an abrupt stop, but no satisfactory end. Bonham seems to be telling the Young Maestros, "You pick up from here!"

Finding Friends

Oran Etkin's latest collection is more than a trip around the world in music. With "Finding Friends," listeners take an actual journey to six countries—the Czech Republic, Zimbabwe, China, Turkey, Russia and Japan—where Etkin and his instruments actually visited for this project. There, they'll hear unspeakably beautiful and catchy, upbeat songs performed in both English and the native languages.

The collection was originally recorded with an adult audience in mind, but Etkin soon realized that the music would appeal to children as well. He and the musicians in each country overdubbed conversational introductions to the songs and taught a few words of the native languages another attraction for parents and educators.

If you find learning words in other languages fascinating, wait until you meet all the instruments. Etkin's clarinet, the feature character, bears the name—what else—Clara Net. You're likely familiar with accordions, drums and bass clarinets, one of which is Clara's big brother. But what's a cimbalom, or an mbira? Can an erhu—a two-stringed Chinese

fiddle—pack the same resonance as its four-stringed U.S. cousin? Listen and engage.

Depending on your national origin or culture, you may recognize a few of the songs and appreciate the arrangements, like the surprising Latin beat of the Czech song "Chaye Shukariye" or the jazz flavor that Clara Net added to the Yiddish chicken soup of "Tumbalalaika." The big takeaway is, however, the appreciation of diversity in our common language: music.
