The community must participate to assist in creating unique individuals who will reinforce positive awareness of the city and its schools. Through partnering with the City, Beach Cities Health District, and Sharefest, RBUSD is already creating a larger support system for its students that are beyond the boundaries of a school site. The district also invites the blurring of the school zone by inviting citizens to contribute through the Redondo Beach Educational Foundation (RBEF), a partnership with individuals, community businesses and corporations that seeks to provide the additional funding and resources needed to enhance the educational experience of all RBUSD children; and through the Parent Teacher Association (PTA), a student advocacy organization that provides leadership and teaming opportunities with school site staff. These are just a few opportunities to become involved in the enchantment of Redondo Beach schools. Please, help to continue to make magic happen in RBUSD and the larger Redondo Beach community.

These laws require that a free and appropriate public education shall be offered in the least restrictive environment to all students identified as disabled. Through the District's Student Study Team process and other procedures, a continuous effort is made to locate and identify individuals who might qualify for special education services.

The law also provides that parents may initiate a request to have their child assessed to determine eligibility for special education and/or related services.

Music and arts programs are vital components of student learning and success. Research consistently proves that exposure to arts and music physically simulates the brain and change it for the better. Through the generous support of our families, community and business partners, 3, 962 students enjoy Arts and Music education in our school district. Over the years, RBEF dollars have helped to fund:

1st and 2nd Grades Music Center Teaching Artist **Residency Program:** This program brings in professional dance, music and theatre teachers into 66 primary grade classrooms for a quality performing arts experience for students.

3rd and 4th Grades Music Teachers: Having a consistent music program in place for a student during their years in elementary school allows teachers to really develop and build upon prior learning and prepares them for introduction to musical instruments in 5th grade.

5th Grade Band Music Teachers: The band program continues to be very popular with our students. They receive more appropriate small group instructions when needed along with whole group support from talented credentialed band teachers. The sign-up for middle school band has increased each year and our high school band program continues to expand.

Middle Schools Vocal Music Class: Because our elementary schools and high school continue to provide a music program, the offering of middle school vocal music class was the right thing to do to support our aspiring music students.

Redondo Union High School Band: Dozens of students annually borrow aging district-owned instruments. We never want a student to miss out on the opportunity to participate in high school band because we don't have instruments for them to borrow and play. In partnership with RBUSD and Band Parent Booster, thousands of dollars were spent replacing old instruments.

- Require comprehensive right-to-know and public information provisions in environmental laws and policies.
- Encourage the use of renewable, sustainable energy and technologies, as well as environmentally healthy land-use policies to reduce greenhouse gases and manage hazards to minimize further health problems.

Identifying When a Stomachache is Serious

When a child experiences a stomachache, it's important for parents to be able to distinguish normal abdominal pain from a serious problem.

There are several reasons kids may experience stomachaches:

Constipation

Stool may be hard and difficult to pass leading to stomach pains. Poor diet and insufficient water intake are frequent causes.

Diarrhea

Diarrhea is runny, loose bowel movements. It's often caused by food that upset the stomach, but if diarrhea persists it may be a sign of an infection.

Stomach Flu

The "stomach flu" is not actually a type of flu but inflammation in the lining of the intestines usually caused by a virus, called gastroenteritis. Symptoms can include diarrhea, stomach pains, vomiting, headache, fever and chills. Most people recover without treatment.

GERD

A common childhood condition is gastroesophageal reflux disease, which is a chronic disease that occurs when stomach acid or contents flows back into the food pipe. Symptoms include a burning sensation in the chest, chest pain, difficulty swallowing and dry cough.

Unless your child has a serious infection or condition, stomachaches will usually go away with time. However, if your child experiences frequent abdominal pains, bloating, diarrhea or constipation, talk to your child's pediatrician about an improved diet or consultation with a gastroenterologist.

Portraits from the Heart

The Smile Project originated through the vision of Redondo Shores High School art teacher Unique Campa, who sought an opportunity to give back to a deserving population while simultaneously teaching her students to be mindful of others who are less fortunate. As part of a partnership with various orphanages in the Ensenada, Baja California area, Redondo Shores students

received photos of individual children, which the students used to create stencil portraits to give back to these same children. Ms. Campa has facilitated this experience with a dual purpose in mind: instilling philanthropic values in the students while allowing them to utilize natural and learned skills from their art courses and providing orphans with special, personalized gifts for the holiday season.

Thirty Shores students participated in the project, creating 40 individualized portraits for the children prior to the holiday break in December. Although they have never met the children whose faces they portrayed, the Shores artists were able to capture the spirit and energy of every individual child. According to Ms. Campa, "From the beginning of this project, students were invested in the final outcome because they genuinely cared about how their work would be received."





Dylan Roa (12): "When I was drawing the pictures, I was thinking of the smile on their faces when they would receive them." Ruben Hernandez (12): "I thought it would be really awesome to make a portrait for someone who would really appreciate it and put a big smile on their face." Dylan Uyemura (11): "I learned that when the kids are adopted, they can bring only one of their belongings, which is their portrait. Being able to give that to them, is a huge blessing."

To sum up the experience, 12th-grade student Daisy Aguilar explained, "Being able to share my love through my art and for those children to receive it...is special to me."

Animal Safety



It's a Bird! It's a Plane!

Finches have descended upon the Redondo Beach Unified School District. Finch Robots, that is! Last summer we wrote and were awarded a grant to borrow 30 Finch Robots from January through June of this school year.

The Finch is a small robot designed to inspire and motivate students to learn computer science by providing them with a

tangible and physical representation of their coding. They can be used by children as young as five, as well as adults. The students work in pairs to program the Finch to move in several directions. It can make sounds, speak words, and light up its beak in a variety of different colors.

As the students become adept at using and understanding coding, they have challenged themselves to code the Finch to "dance," go through a maze, and even draw shapes on paper or whiteboard desks.

The company that produces the Finch has a teacherloan program that usually provides eight to 15 Finches at a time for a period of one to two months. However, we were able to persuade them to loan us 30 Finches for six months with the goal of utilizing them in our elementary, middle,

and high school classrooms. This winter, classrooms throughout our school district have been conducting coding lessons and are successfully utilizing their Finches.

RBUSD Special Day Adult Education

The Redondo Beach Unified School District (RBUSD) provides a continuum of support for students with disabilities who reside within the boundaries of Redondo Beach. Students 18 to 22 years of age are eligible to attend the Special Day Adult Education Transition Program, which is housed at the South Bay Adult School (SBAS).

Students in this program participate in a wide variety of activities that incorporate functional academics; recreation and leisure activities, including dances, field trips, and a prom; curriculum integration of work-readiness skills; vocational training; and work-based learning experience. The school-based component includes elements that are commonly part of the school curriculum and the educational delivery system. Vocational and work-based learning programs and services help link school and work-based learning opportunities or provide strategies to connect the classroom to work.

A great example of all of this is Connie's Café. Students in Ms. Perry's class have created a coffee stand, which provides the opportunity to further practice their vocational and work-based learning. Connie's Café proudly serves our SBAS community with fresh coffee and morning

treats on a monthly basis. Students display their customer service skills, attention to detail, personality, and their multi-tasking abilities in an authentic real-world situation.

Our Adult Education Transition Program team works diligently with local community resources and state agencies to help prepare our adult students for the transition to life after attending RBUSD.

Setting Our Sights

At Jefferson, we are fortunate to have a variety of programs which are adding an extra degree to our students' education. Through classroom lessons, Hands-on-Art, Artists in Residence from LA Arts, the Mind-Up curriculum, and credentialed RBUSD teachers, our students can enjoy frequent experiences in the arts, social-emotional wellness, and physical education.

science education as well. Over the past few years, with the support of the RBEF, the lab science program has provided weekly "hands-on" lessons to our students in the fourth and fifth grades. The instruction comes from a fully credentialed science teacher who leads students through inquiry based science investigations. The

> scientific method. The kickoff to the Fair will be a set of grade-level-specific "how to" assemblies that will explain what our students need to do for the event.

It is clear that through the lab science program, along with classroom instruction and school-wide events, our Jefferson students are building the necessary science skills they need to become successful in their education and beyond.

Music in Schools

When I was a fourth-grader growing up in Missouri, I joined the Rountree Elementary School instrumental music program. Clarinet was my instrument of choice, and I eventually made it to "third chair" in the middle school band. It has been years since I've played an instrument, but the experience was one that has made a lasting impression in my life.

My musical training provided me with an appreciation for the arts. It also taught me self-discipline, as I practiced and set goals for improvement. I value my past experiences, but it is important to get input from the professionals who bring music to life for our youngest students.

I recently had the opportunity to interview one of the RBUSD elementary band teachers, Yvonne Zoetewey, to get her ideas on why music is important in schools. I think you will find her words that follow inspirational! "Wow! Look at what music does," she told me. "Music engages the heart and the mind. When one plays an instrument, many skills are employed. The student must hold the instrument properly, have good posture, breath correctly, blow correctly, read the notes, finger the notes, produce a sound, and play in rhythm all at the same time. What a student receives from being in band is confidence, a sense of accomplishment, teamwork, and the ability to understand what it takes to make music."

"Music surrounds us everywhere we go," she added. "It is empowering for students to have an understanding of what music is comprised of, and have the ability to perform music on their own."

One of my favorite quotes that captures what I feel about music is from Plato. He states, "Music is a moral law. It gives soul to the universe, wings to the mind, flight to the imagination, and charm and gaiety to life and to everything."

Keeping Healthy

With a successful Jog-a-Thon behind us, and the Jump Rope for Heart event in front of us, there has been a big shift in how we now fund-raise at Madison. No longer do we sell cookie dough or boxed candies, thus sending the message to our students that the only way to help improve the programs at our school is by encouraging habits and behaviors that have led to some of the most shocking statistics that surround our children's health. Such as:

Childhood obesity has more than doubled in children and quadrupled in adolescents in the past 30 years. The percentage of children aged six to 11 years in the United States who were obese increased from 7 percent in 1980 to nearly 18 percent in 2012. Similarly, the percentage of adolescents aged 12 to 19 years who were obese increased from 5 percent to nearly 21 percent over the same time period.

In 2012, more than one third of children and adolescents were overweight or obese. Obese youth are more likely to have risk factors for cardiovascular disease like high

cholesterol or high blood pressure. In a population-based sample of five- to 17-year-old youth, 70 percent of them had at least one risk factor for cardiovascular disease. Obese adolescents are also more likely to have pre-diabetes, a condition in which blood glucose levels indicate a high risk for development of diabetes.

Children and adolescents who are obese are also at greater risk for bone and joint problems, sleep apnea, and social and psychological problems such as stigmatization and poor self-esteem. (source: www.cdc.gov)

The changes that we have made over the last few years have focused on supporting community events such as our Redondo Beach 5K/10K race, which now features a special 1K race for our students. We also now feature a curriculum that is designed to specifically support student wellness, like the MindUp program and LiveWell Kids, both of which are made possible by the support of the Beach Cities Heath District.

We highly encourage you to make sure that we continue these trends at home to plan fun and exciting activities with your children, ones that involve being outside and physically active in the warm California sun!

Students were given a Station Card to be punched at each station so that they could experience all the experiments. Students and parents rotated through Ghostly Bubbles—dry ice enclosed in a bubble;

Glow-in the-Dark Art, using zinc sulfide; Instant Snow, using sodium polyacrylate and water; Ultraviolet Bracelets, using colorchanging glowing beads; Flubber, using glue, water and starch; Neon Slime, using a PVA solution, atomic glow dye and borax solution; and Giant Fluffy Stuff, using glue, color, soap, shaving cream, eye drops and baking soda. During the great Family STEM challenge, families built a cup tower in less than one minute!

This great event was a kickoff to our April Science Fair. We hope this evening of STEM activities gave our students great experiment ideas and enhanced their knowledge of how awesome science is!


