America's Growing Epidemic

More children and teens are being diagnosed with type 2 diabetes than ever before. Experts say it is directly related to the rapidly increasing number of overweight kids. Today, the American Diabetes Association estimates that 1 out of every 6 kids have pre-diabetes a collection of risk factors that often leads to type 2 diabetes.

Identify the Warning Signs of Type 2 Diabetes

- Excessive thirst
- Blurred vision Tiredness or fatigue
- Frequent infections Slow-to-heal cuts and sores
- Frequent urination (including bedwetting
- Acanthosis nigricans (AN)—a darkening of the skin around the neck or under the arms

Taking Steps to Prevent Type 2 Diabetes

The best way to help reduce your kids' risk for developing type 2 diabetes and other associated health problems is to make healthy lifestyle changes. These work best if they involve the entire family, and will benefit everyone.

- Eat a healthy diet. Encouraging your kids to eat low-fat, nutrient-rich foods like whole-grain cereals and breads, fruits, vegetables, dairy products, and lean proteins — can help prevent excessive weight gain.
- Limit sugary foods and beverages. Consuming lots of sugar-filled foods and beverages — like sodas, juices, and iced teas — also can lead to excessive
- Make physical activity a daily part of life. The more energy your child burns, the better his body uses insulin. An hour or so of lively physical activity every day is a good goal.
- Reduce screen time. The time your child spends watching TV, surfing the Internet, and playing video games should be kept to a limit. The risk of obesity increases when your child watches more than two hours of TV per day.

Be An Educated Consumer

As students and parents begin the process of discovering their "best fit" colleges, they often narrow their focus to one goal: getting accepted. While this is obviously an important step in the planning process, it is equally important to thoroughly research potential colleges.

The Education Trust has developed a free, interactive Web tool that provides facts on college graduation rates to students, parents, school counselors, policymakers and researchers. Their Web site is at www.collegeresults.org. Here one can select nearly any college or university and compare its graduation rate with those of similar institutions that serve similar groups of students.

The CRO, or College Results Online, lets you view the graduation rates of thousands of traditional public and private

four-year colleges and universities, including hundreds of private, for-profit colleges. It also provides a search engine to find colleges near your zip code, and with maps for each institution.

There is also an advanced search capability, where colleges can be searched by state, costs, student outcomes and more. There is even a resource page with links on college admissions, financial aid and the latest research.

CRO draws upon the nation's most comprehensive database of college graduation rates. To determine which institutions to compare, it weighs the 12 factors known to affect graduation rates. Among these are scores on collegeadmissions tests, institution size, and percentage of low-income students. This means you can discover which institutions do a better job at graduating

The bottom line is that you are the consumer. Before committing to an investment of four or more years of time and money, make sure that you are an educated consumer.



The Alliance for a Healthier Generation recognized three Redondo Unified School District schools for transforming their campus environment to promote healthy habits for students and employees.

Beryl Heights Elementary School received the Silver National Recognition Award, one of only three schools in California to earn the distinction. In addition, Redondo Union High School and Shores High School are the first two high schools in California to receive the Bronze National Recognition Award.

All three schools have made significant

improvements to their policies, meals, health education, physical education, as well as employee and student wellness to achieve recognition. Each year the Alliance for a Healthier Generation comprises a benchmark system with three levels of achievement: Bronze, Silver and Gold. Each level of achievement marks a school's progress toward its goals in all seven domains.

Bells are ringing, sticks are tapping, and children are singing! The Child Development Center (CDC) preschool children at Alta Vista, Tulita, Washington and Lincoln Schools have been creating music with Music Wonders. This program integrates the study of music through numerous rhythmic activities involving wholebody movement, fine-motor skills, and cognitive awareness. The children have been exposed to a wide variety of music through international folk songs, classical selections, instrument play, excerpts for listening, and musical games.

The younger CDC music classes combine music with expressive language and imagination play as the underlining concept. During music class, the preschooler plays an active role in making choices and expressing ideas while singing, exploring rhythm instruments, moving, and participating in pretend play to music.

The older preschool classes experience an early introduction to reading and writing music! At four and five years old, children are ready to learn very basic music fundamentals. Lessons involve rhythm concepts, singing, rhythm instrument play, notation, and music vocabulary, such as crescendo and diminuendo, accelerando and ritardando, pianissimo and forte, and staccato and legato.

The musical activities our CDC children are experiencing will culminate in the foundation to intellectual understanding of the basic fundamentals of music. It will provide self-confidence, creativity, cooperation, and a joyful appreciation for music.


legacy of Alternative Education is to prepare students to move forward with a robust sense of self into a life filled with purpose.



More than Just Music

Whether your child is the next Pavarotti or more likely to sing solos in the car, he or she is certain to benefit from music education. Research shows that learning the basics of "do-remi" assists in exceling beyond the ABCs. Music facilitates the learning of other subjects and enhances skills used in these areas. Creating music involves more than the voice or a finger playing an instrument; a child learning about music taps into multiple skill sets, often concurrently.

RBUSD students are fortunate to have continued support of our Redondo Beach Education Foundation (RBEF), PTAs, and district to partake in such visual and performing-arts opportunities and to perform as artists as an essential part of a well-rounded education. In partnership with the Music Center, first-graders receive lessons in dance and second-graders in theatrical music. Third- and fourth-grade students continue learning through vocal music instruction supported by RBEF, and in the fifth grade, students have an opportunity to join the instrumental band. Elementary students receive music, differentiated classroom VPA instruction and hands-on art lessons to enrich their K-5 education.

A 21st-Century Education

Whether it's a video game console, a computer, a smartphone or an iPod, children are fascinated with technology. Recently, we have made iPads available to our students. Our teachers can bring a portable iPad lab with 35 tablets into their classroom for our students to use. The iPad cart allows the

Arts Opportunities

Many of you have heard about the changes coming with the Common Core State Standards that our students will be learning. For example in English/language arts, students are going to be expected to understand other perspectives and cultures. respond to the varying demands of the audience, task, purpose and discipline, comprehend and critique their own work, and demonstrate independence. In the area of mathematics, students will need to demonstrate perseverance in their work, reason abstractly, and attend to precision. These are very important

skills for our students to focus on and are going to be central to all district students being among the highest-performing in the state.

It is important to note, however, that we have had a curriculum in Redondo Beach that far predates Common Core, and that is our arts curriculum. 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



Confidence for Beginning Drivers



Question: Our son is planning on getting his driving permit this summer. This means he will be able to drive on his own without supervision. What are some easy guidelines to make him feel more comfortable about driving that we could set up for him so we don't constantly nag him or make him feel uncomfortable?

From Jodie: When our teenagers got their license, we had already let them drive around our neighborhood high school **Jodie Lynn** parking lot when there were no other cars. We practiced parallel

parking, backing up, going around soccer cones, and in and out of them, while they were still new drivers. However, when it came time for driving in real traffic, even though they knew most of the traffic signs and procedures, it was clear that they simply needed more experience with real-life driving situations. They needed to understand what was required of them while driving in rain, sleet, snow and ice. They also needed to become comfortable with busy streets, highways, overpasses, etc. Driving schools, pretty much meet the requirements needed to give them the confidence that they lacked in these specific areas. The one-on-one attention with an adult who wasn't going to be grading or nagging them was exactly what was missing. Of course, in today's society, making sure that teens do not text and drive, is also one of the missing elements. SnapSecure created an infographic to illustrate the dangers of texting and driving and offer a driver's safety app which disables texting, calling and internet functions of a phone when you are driving over 15mph. Helpful for parents who are worried about the safety of their teens, the motion activated technology also alerts parents if the block is removed. I remember as a child my parents would "help out" at school. I really don't recall them using the word volunteering, in those days they were just helping out. I believe that in the beginning, my "parent volunteers" started out as a way to quell my separation anxiety. Holding onto dad's hand that first week of kindergarten gave me the security I needed to take the first steps toward independence. In actuality, dad was a yard duty volunteer in the morning, but to me, it meant that I would be able to spend ten more minutes with him before taking the walk into the classroom on my own.

The transition to first grade meant long days away from home. To help me cope, dad would come into my classroom each week, and sitting on a child's size chair as we crowded around his feet, he would read to my friends and me. It was comforting and familiar, just like those nightly bedtime stories.

Because my mother worked during the day and dad worked a night shift, it seemed natural to me when dad became the room parent! Mother would bake cookies after dinner and package them for dad and me to take to school the next morning, but having a dad as the room helper a special treat!

Fourth and fifth graders seemed to want their parents around less often, but having dad help with the SRA reading program meant he'd have a watchful eye on my progress in school. I recall him being so kind to the some of the children who weren't fast readers. I believe my friends didn't feel the pressure from him as from their own parents.

In middle school my parents wanted to help out more in school; I wanted them around less. So the subtleties of parental involvement came into play. Because I was a "joiner," there were school plays, talent shows, poetry memorization contests and pre-teen jeopardy. With each of the extracurricular activities, parent volunteers were needed. What I learned in the process was that my mother and dad were great to have around behind the scenes; helping with set designs, costume fixes and even as judges!

The distance grew between my parents and me. I was a teenager and the last thing I wanted was to see my mother or dad on my high school campus. And yet, having my mother involved in the parent teacher association or seeing my dad selling cookies and drinks at the snack bar to raise funds for school sports meant more to me than I ever let on.

My parents had this simple philosophy: "There are so many wonderful things that will never get done if we don't take the time to do them." I am grateful that they were just helping out!




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




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

September to January is a special time for college sports fans. It's the season when millions of people watch football games and sports analysts almost 24/7 during the weekend. As I watch sports television, I remember my interview with the ESPN analyst and former Notre Dame head coach Mr. Lou Holtz when I was 13 years old. Lou Holtz, also known as "Coach," won three national Coach of the Year honors, is the only coach to ever lead six different schools to bowl games, and as head coach is ranked

ninth in most career wins in college football history. As a successful coach and sports analyst, Lou Holtz is known for his knowledge, wit, and enthusiasm. Before my interview with Coach, he gave a lecture to a large audience, where he discussed his three simple life lessons: do what is right; do everything to the best of your ability; and care about people.

Coach suggested that you should do what is right and develop trust with your peers. He said that all relationships are based on trust. Gaining trust from someone can be as simple as being on time and/or doing what is right. He added, if you are late or make a mistake, don't just say you're sorry; be genuine about it.

Coach's second simple life lesson is to do everything to the best of your ability. When I asked Coach Holtz, "What do you tell kids who don't make the team?" he responded by saying, "Find something that you can do pretty well and do what you like to do. Then work at it. Do the best that you can. If it doesn't work out,

the fact that you did something to the best of your ability will make you win in the long run. You are not competing against anyone except for yourself. So ask yourself, 'What am I capable of doing?'" In addition, Coach Holtz said everyone must have: passion and dreams; love for someone; something to dream for; and something to believe in. To achieve those dreams, Holtz said not to cut corners when life is tough, as you will only be fooling yourself. Although achieving dreams requires sacrifice and can be tough, one should never do something half way because in the end, it will be worth it.

He said, "It should not be all about me. Rather, it's about others. Ask how you can genuinely help, care about others. Learn to be unselfish for the benefit of vour teammates."

I will always remember Coach Holtz's authentic personality and willingness to talk to me. His kindness towards others on and off the field is what makes him an icon in the football community. Coach Holtz's final words of advice were, "Keep life simple. God put you on Earth to do something. Have a vision, make a plan, lead by example, be accountable, and have core values so that you can make a difference in people's lives. Play like a champion today. Live like a champion every day."

People can get into huge discussions about whether deployment soldiers is necessary or whether war is the answer to solving problems. But the fact remains that thousands of men and women are paying a price to serve our country. They give up precious time with their families, risk being wounded or even losing their lives, and come home forever changed by the trauma they have seen. Whether you agree with the cause they are fighting for or not, these families deserve our assistance.

Imagine you are a young mother (or father) and your spouse has just left for duty. You are alone with three children and fear

you may be alone forever. You develop a system of survival, dealing with your children's reactions to becoming a single-parent home. A year or two later, if you are one of the fortunate ones, your spouse returns home unharmed physically. You expect your spouse to jump into the parenting arena and take half of the burden—but your spouse can't because of the trauma of the wartime experience. Perhaps the children start misbehaving to get the absent parent's attention, and a new version of chaos takes over. Or maybe the children have trouble adjusting to the new situation and don't respond to the discipline of the parent who has been absent.

Since Desert Storm, I have worked with deployed families, helping them to construct and re-construct their discipline system so that the children are provided the safety of a consistent front, whether it is one parent or two. While it is imperative for a military family to establish consistent boundaries and consequences, it is equally important that every parent do so. Through my Web site (parentingsos. com), my books, and private parenting



coaching sessions, I constantly encourage parents to vacuum the chaos out of their homes and teach children to take responsibility for their choices.

For families where a military spouse is deployed, the assistance of other families is often appreciated. Take the children to the park with your children, invite them over to watch a movie, or take the family a dinner. Any act of kindness distracts them from the grief of being alone will likely be a blessing. Military wives often feel out of the normal arena and vet are experiencing otherwise normal life. What moment of kindness can you deliver to such a family? Their sacrifices are for the safety of our country; we need to make sure they feel like a positive part of our communities and care about them as people.
