Therefore, their educational program must be unique. We have that in RBUSD.

I'm a former middle school teacher, assistant principal, and principal. I don't consider myself an expert on anything; what I can share with you, however, is that our two middle schools—Adams and Parras—are full of teachers, support staff, and administrators who understand, engage, and advocate for their kids. I can assure our parents and residents that the adults in these two schools are true miracle workers. They care deeply in each and every student. When I walk away from an Adams or Parras visit, I'm always happier and prouder than I was before I arrived. There is such a focus on high academic achievement and inclusion at our two middle schools that it's truly inspiring.

So, here's to the best middle schools around. Thank you to our thriving Adams and Parras staff members. Thank you to our caring parents. Thank you, most importantly, to our college and career-focused kids who are looking forward to attending the finest high school in the South Bay, Redondo Union High School.

Our next issue is February 2, 2022. Happy Holidays!









- Problems thinking, concentrating, functioning
- Substance abuse
- Suicidal thoughts

Identifying Prediabetes in Children Prevents Lifelong Issues

Diabetes is a chronic medical condition in which sugar or glucose levels build up in the bloodstream. The hormone insulin helps move glucose from blood into cells, where it's used for energy.

With Type 2 diabetes, cells don't respond well to insulin, and in later stages of the disease, the body may not produce enough insulin. According to the American Diabetes Association, the COVID-19 pandemic exacerbated risk factors for diabetes in children due to limited physical activity and sedentary behaviors.

Most children diagnosed with Type 2 diabetes have prediabetes first. Prediabetes means that blood sugar is higher than it

should be, but not high enough to be diabetes. Most of the time, the child will not have any symptoms. Prediabetes is a warning sign that a child is at risk for Type 2 diabetes.

Warning signs of prediabetes may include:

- Increased thirst
- Increased hunger
- Low energy levels
- Frequent urination
- Rapid weight loss
- Blurry vision

If a child has these warning signs, they should be evaluated by a doctor right away. If a child is diagnosed with prediabetes, it's important that the whole family makes healthy lifestyle changes to help support and prevent their child from getting Type 2 diabetes.

The Endocrine & Diabetes Center at MemorialCare Miller Children's & Women's Hospital Long Beach offers programs designed to diagnose, treat and manage childhood conditions, such as diabetes. The team works with families to get a child's blood sugar levels back to a safe range and help them stay at a healthy weight. Learn more at millerchildrens.org/Diabetes.

Measuring Unfinished Learning

One key strategy in RBUSD's recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic is ongoing, student achievement and growth monitoring through high-quality assessments. To measure unfinished learning and recovery, RBUSD administers the Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) Growth assessments in Reading and Mathematics to students in grades 1 through 11. Students in grade K will test at the winter

administration. Any assessment or survey is a snapshot of students at one moment in time, and cannot capture all of what a child knows and is able to do. On any given day, factors such as sleep, hunger, familiarity with the program, motivation, and comfort with technology influence assessment results. For these reasons, multiple data sources such as grades, attendance, and teacher observations, are taken into consideration in monitoring how a student is progressing.

MAP Growth data is shared with students' families as well. Families receive a report that includes:

• RIT Score - The RIT score represents the level of difficulty of skills your child is ready to learn.


- Percentile Level This is the student's "achievement" percentile ranking compared to same grade students who took MAP Growth across the nation. Important to note: percentile is not the same as percentage.
- Lexile Level Lexile measures a reader's ability. As a child's Lexile level grows, they are ready to tackle text that is more complex.
- Quantile Level This measure represents the math skills and concepts a child is ready to learn.
- Conditional Growth Percentile (CGP) This is a student's "growth" percentile ranking compared to same grade students who took MAP across the nation, and will start to populate with additional administrations.

Using this research-based assessment, RBUSD is able to frequently monitor the academic health of our students to provide just-in-time supports, appropriate support or challenge, and intensive interventions.

Impactful Statements

A "good job" now and then is fine, but does it help children understand why their behavior was good or what parts of their achievement made it praiseworthy? It is no secret that every student craves a sense of personal importance, and effective praise can be a tool to be sure that validation comes from a positive source.

However, simple praise can lose effectiveness quickly. It is too easy to reward children with a simple "good job" or "wonderful" when have done something that is praiseworthy or when they are telling you about an accomplishment, so that is what we give them. Children also love to feel connected and need positivity more than ever, so I am encouraging teachers and parents to be reflective about what these types of statements are telling children and adjust those statements to have more impact.

To help a "good job" become more effective, we need to pair it to the specific action we are praising or to behavior we would like to reinforce. Below are a few examples of ways that one can use to heighten the effectiveness of praise.

- 1. Use sentence starters, such as "I saw you.., "I heard you..", or "I noticed you.." Example: "I noticed you were focused and engaged, so you finished your homework in record time. Great work!"
- 2. Identify a goal to praise. Do you want to reinforce positive behavior or an act of kindness? Example: "You were so kind to your sister when you tied her shoes even though you wanted to go outside and play"
- 3. Encourage next steps. After a positive experience, let children know that the behavior or accomplishment has room for expansion: Example: "I saw that you drew an amazing picture of a car! What materials could you use to build it?

The custom of making ofrendas is a creative process that incorporates many different traditional art forms. In this project, each student in Spanish 1 at Parras Middle created a mini-ofrenda, a cultural product of Mexico, honoring the life and history of a person or pet who is no longer with us.

Calacas are a form of art done in the shape of a skeleton. In Mexico, this popular art form is used year round, but especially for Day of the Dead. A calaca can be made to honor a friend or to poke fun at a person in power.

This art form demonstrates the lighter side of Día de los Muertos, and reminds us that no matter how rich or how famous a person might be, underneath, she/he is just a collection of bones, no different than any of us.





David is in fourth grade and he loves to read and play piano. He likes math and outdoor activities such as rock climbing, tennis, and basketball.




Witch is Which?
