



Making a Difference

Belmont, Massachusetts, just before 8 a.m. on a balmy, early September day in 1990. My first day of seventh grade at a new school. Coat and tie.

As I walked into Latin class, the teacher was already standing erect facing the blackboard, clouds of chalk dust wafting down beneath the elbow patch on his own blazer, the tack-tack-tack of his chalk scratching out words I'll never forget: ABHOR APATHY—HATE INDIFFERENCE.

Later that morning, Eddie Gallagher introduced us to Latin declensions, but his first five-minute lesson was about one's mentality toward life: caring about your friends, your family, your work, your world. Making an impact.

Mr. Gallagher was one of a kind. As much as I loved him and his class, I learned I was better off sitting in the second or third row, lest I be hit with the spittle that came flying out when he got excited about verb conjugations, or the Boston Bruins, or how his dad, Lefty Gallagher of the Red Sox (for one year), once struck out Babe Ruth.

For comic relief, Mr. Gallagher would remove his dentures, made necessary by an errant hockey puck to the mouth in college before helmets were mandatory. Later on, when he coached me in freshman baseball, he forbade us to wear athletic cups in practice, the better for us to play "guts ball"—throwing one-hoppers to one another, moving closer and closer. If we flinched, we were out. Don't tell anyone, but I now play guts ball with my seven-year-old son (with a tennis ball, mostly), more to honor Mr. Gallagher than for any practical benefit to my son's career as a shortstop.

Even after I graduated and moved away, I stayed in touch with Mr. Gallagher. We still e-mail from time to time, reporting about my children and his grandchildren. This was a man who most definitely was not apathetic. He cared about life, and this rubbed off on his students.

As we begin a new school year, my most ardent wish for our students in Redondo Beach Unified School District is that they would find their own Mr. Gallagher, if they haven't already. One perk of being on the Board is the time

I can spend with principals and teachers—and I can promise you, they are special people. These are men and women who could have succeeded at any number of professions, but who chose education because of the difference they can make in young minds and lives.

This year, take an extra five minutes once in a while to chat with your child's teacher or principal. If we're doing our jobs correctly, we won't just be giving our students a formal education; we'll be impacting them for life, just as Mr. Gallagher did for me.

Redondo Beach schools will soon be back in session and that means thousands of tiny feet will again take to the sidewalks on early mornings as part of the Walking School Bus program. As a parent, the safety of my kids is always my top priority - which is why I'm excited to announce Beach Cities Health District (BCHD) is launching a campaign to educate the community on creating safe

"Streets for All": pedestrians, bicyclists, drivers, strollers and skateboarders.

"Streets for All" will focus on distributing public education messages about creating safe streets in community, especially along high-traffic corridors like Prospect Avenue – which passes through six school zones and impacts more than 5.500 Redondo Beach students.

Here's how parents can get involved:

- Participate in Community Door-knocking Day on Oct. 1. Help distribute lawn signs and campaign materials to residents along Prospect Avenue.
- Pick up a "Streets for All" lawn sign from your child's school Sept. 26-30.
- Enroll your child in the Walking School Bus program.

Healthy Eating On the Go

Getting your child to eat healthy can be a challenge, especially with busy schedules. Avoiding junk food can sometimes seem impossible. However, a well-balanced diet along with plenty of rest and exercise will help your child's immune system continue to function properly – reducing the risk of

A healthy diet also is necessary for brain growth and development. In the first five years of life, 90 percent of a child's brain develops.

Here are some easy meal and snack ideas that are both delicious and healthy:

- Peel a banana and dip it in low-fat yogurt. Roll in crushed cereal and freeze.
- Spread celery sticks with peanut butter or low-fat cream cheese. Top with raisins. Enjoy your "ants on a log."
- Mix together ready-to-eat cereal, dried fruit and nuts in a sandwich bag for an on-the-go snack.

- Smear a scoop of frozen yogurt on two graham crackers and add sliced banana to make a sandwich.
- Top low-fat vanilla yogurt with crunchy granola and sprinkle with blueberries.
- Make snack kabobs; put cubes of low-fat cheese and grapes on pretzel sticks.
- Toast a whole grain waffle and top with low-fat yogurt and sliced peaches.
- Spread peanut butter on apple slices.
- Blend low-fat milk, frozen strawberries and a banana for 30 seconds for a delicious smoothie.
- Mix together peanut butter and cornflakes in a bowl. Shape into balls and roll in crushed graham crackers.



Through the District's Student Study Team process and other procedures, a continuous effort is made to locate and identify individuals who might qualify for special education services.

The law also provides that parents may initiate a request to have their child assessed to determine eligibility for special education and/or related services.



Median Annual Income by Educational Attainment, 2015





We can't do our job of educating your child if he or she is absent. Being late for school hurts a child's learning, too. A student who is consistently late every day could miss up to 30 hours of instruction during the year. Your child's success in school depends on having a solid educational background—one that can only be gained through regular school attendance. Please make sure your child attends school regularly and on time!

Please attend Back-to-School Night on September 15 to listen to your child's teacher carefully outline the school year and expectations. Our PTA meeting will begin at 5:30 p.m. in the cafeteria, followed by a presentation and staff introductions. Welcome back, Bobcats! I am truly looking forward to a new school year. We want to welcome our returning Birney families and extend a special greeting to our new Birney Bobcats across the campus, from staff to students. This year promises to be another successful one, with many exciting things to look forward to.

Starting off the new school year with routines and goals is important when considering what it takes to have the most successful school year. For example, establishing a bedtime that allows for the necessary hours of sleep for a child's optimal function should be set in place early on. Having the bedtime discussion with your children ensures that they have an understanding of the expectation and why it is important for their well-being.

Another preestablished routine discussed and implemented should be expectations centered on homework and reading time. There could be a special place where homework is completed in order to minimize

distractions. Also, setting in place a "family read time" may be beneficial for your family. Everyone can sit in the same area—living room, dining room and so on—and read their own book. If you have young children in the family, this would be a great time to read to them or have them read to you. It is also good practice to make sure all electronics are put away so they don't serve as potential distractions.

The Importance of Connection

Preparing for the New Year

The start of a new school year is an exciting time for most students – learning how to navigate a new part of school, learning new schedules, meeting new friends and teachers or reconnecting with old ones will likely be the primary focus of interest for the first few days.

Help your child settle back into the routines of a new year with the following tips:

- 1. Be prepared. It is important to get to know what is expected of you and your child so that you don't tell your child one thing while the school says another. Take full advantage of all school communication and opening events. If students feel lost or overwhelmed during the school day, encourage them to seek out our Tulita Buddy Bench located on the playground. The Buddy Bench is a place where students can go when they are looking for a friend to play with or talk to during classroom breaks.
- 2. Set up a good routine. Make sure your child's body clock is ready for the school day. It is a good idea to start

- adjusting bedtimes and wake-up times early enough to get them back into the rhythm of the school day. Tired students or students who are rushing out of the house in the morning and dropped off in a hurry often get anxious and irritable because they don't have enough time to adjust.
- 3. Stay Positive. It is important to stay positive about the new school year. Children need to feel that you are happy about them going to school, or being away from you so that they don't worry or feel that they are missing out on some other fun.
- 4. Tell them what you want them to do. Letting children know how you want them to behave at school in a positive way is a great way to send them off to class. For example, say, "Be respectful to those around you today," instead of what you don't want, like, "Don't get in trouble!" Explaining as much as you think they will understand will help them become well prepared.
- 5. Encourage the growth mindset. Remind your child that hard work pays off, and that success takes determination and perseverance. Navigate them towards a growth mindset versus a fixed mindset.





A Bit of History

Note Taking

When I went through paramedic training I took pages of notes on yellow legal tablets and tape-recorded every lecture. The guy that sat in front of me took a one-letter size page of notes for each lecture. I passed tests with 94% and he passed with 99%. I looked at my note taking and saw that with my notes I was reviewing the whole lecture and not focusing on the central points. I decided it was not necessary to write notes in complete sentences. Notes should be key words that trigger memory for a quick review.

Later, when I continued my education at a university, everyone took notes as they read with a highlighter. Some of their highlighted pages had turned into a pages of pink, yellow or green color. That caused them to reread the complete pages once more taking valuable time. Rereading is good if one wants to have a better understanding of the subject; however, rereading is not good for review.

When I became a secondary teacher, I noticed my students would take notes in complete sentences with every "the," "and" and "a" in their notes. They also followed the same highlighting practice of coloring in whole paragraphs and pages. I told the students to highlight key words and that there should be no more that ten words highlighted per page. Being bright students, they randomly highlighted words to demonstrate that they had taken their notes. They miscalculated in that I did not look at the page and count the words highlighted. Instead I asked what the words triggered in their memory. Note taking should be for the recall of important points and to internalize information.

So here are my three suggestions for note taking. First, when listening or reading, write only key words related to the topic that will cause you to recall and connect to the topic. Second, review and rewrite notes at a later time and fill-in blank spots. If you cannot fill-in the blanks, write down your questions and reread that section or ask the teacher. Finally, talk to someone about what you have learned. This allows you to internalize the information and develop a better understand.



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

What are Maximalist Shoes

It appears that lightweight, so-called "barefoot" running shoes have lost popularity. Runners have learned that they need a certain amount of cushioning to prevent injury. Remarkably, a complete reversal of the "minimalist" barefoot type running shoes has occurred and we are now seeing a new trend in super cushioned "maximalist" running shoes.

Maximalist running shoes have very thick soles and generally have a "rocker sole" design to protect the forefoot during toe-off. These shoes are not only thicker than most running shoes, they are also wider so it takes some time for the runner to adapt to them. The rocker sole style also requires a slightly different foot strike and toe-off running

Maximalist shoes have worked well for runners who have forefoot problems such as a neuroma, metatarsalgia and arthritis of the great toe joint. This is because these shoes are extremely stiff and the rocker sole design is ideal to protect the forefoot. At the same time, maximalist shoes tend to have a lower heel-to-toe pitch which means they have a lower overall heel elevation. As such, they may not work well for runners with Achilles, calf or hamstring problems.

Just about every major running shoe company has introduced maximalist styles this year. The jury is still out on whether the average runner will benefit from this unique style of footwear.

Keeping Kids Safe in the Car

Many parents look to the law to 'guide buckling up their children safely in the car'. From 1/1/17, all children under 2 years old (unless 40 lbs. or 40" tall or more) must ride in a rear-facing safety seat. Pediatricians and safety professionals recommend children ride rear facing for as long as possible, until the maximum height or weight on the seat. Rear facing is 5 times safer! After age 2, California law requires children ride CORRECTLY in a safety seat or booster until age 8 and then, until the safety belt fits properly. But today, children often fit in a forward-facing seat until starting elementary school or longer. Use a booster until the belt fits properly, usually between 10 and 12 years old. By law, ride in back until age 8; however, the back is almost twice as safe, and labels in cars read stay in back to age 13.

Try this Test in Your Car

- Are you sitting all the way back against the auto seat?
- Do your knees bend comfortably at the end of the auto seat?
- Does the belt cross your shoulders between your neck and arm?
- Is the lap belt as low as possible to you, touching your thighs?
- Can you stay seated like this for the whole trip?


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
