

Is It a Cold or Allergies?

Your child's nose won't stop running and they're constantly sneezing. You may blame the common cold, but it could be a telltale sign of allergies, especially as seasons change. While colds and allergies share common symptoms, there are certain differences that may help you distinguish what your child is experiencing.

Allergies

Allergies occur when your child's immune system reacts to a foreign substance (allergen)—such as pollen or pet dander. Symptoms include:

- Shortness of breath Wheezing,
- Itchy, watery eyes Sneezing
- Runny or congested nose
- Swollen sinuses

The severity of allergies varies in children and can range from minor irritation to anaphylaxis — a potentially life-threatening allergic reaction to an allergen.

The common cold is caused by a virus, which spreads through the air and close personal contact. Cold symptoms include:

- Sore throat Runny nose Coughing Sneezing
- Headaches Body aches Fever


Telling the Difference

The difference is in a few key distinctions. Colds are more likely to cause sore throats, fever, headaches and body aches, while itchy, watery eyes are a classic sign of allergies.

Most people recover from a cold within 7-10 days whereas allergy symptoms continue with exposure to the allergen. Allergy symptoms also respond better to over-the-counter antihistamines.

The Children's Pulmonary Institute at MemorialCare Miller Children's & Women's Hospital Long Beach uses several types of allergy tests to identify allergens that may be causing your child's symptoms. It can then be decided what type of medications or treatments are needed. By identifying these allergens, changes can be made in your home to potentially improve your child's health.

This is why teaching the four Cs of Collaboration, Communication, Critical Thinking and Creativity are so important. Project-Based Learning






"Cougar News" at King Elementary School is a schoolwide television broadcast created by students for students. Each week, the Cougar News team delivers timely

Each team had 21/2 minutes for their robot to accomplish as many missions as possible. The students learned to code and work together to help strategize their approach to the robot game.

Now our students are building Sumo Bots and coding them to battle in an arena. Here two robots will battle each other with the goal of pushing the other one out of the circular arena, just like Sumo wrestlers. The advanced students will write computer code for the robots to battle autonomously, while the beginners will use a program on a cell phone to move the robot in real time, like a joystick.

Our team is looking forward to many great Sumo Bot battles!


Over the past three years

Robert M. Pyles Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) Academy is in its second year of partnering with Cypress College to bring the CyberPatriots program to sixth-grade students. The CyberPatriots program was founded in 2009 to attract students to careers and academic opportunities in cybersecurity and other STEM fields.

With the help of Mr. Gordon Richardson, sixth-grade teacher and school-based CyberPatriots coach, and Cypress College volunteer mentors, students are gaining a better understanding of cybersecurity and using systems that connect us across continents. Specific learning goals include the basics of computer anatomy, the world of information technology, cybersecurity techniques, and how to protect personal devices and programs from outside risk.

Mr. Richardson and his group of CyberPatriots have made a strong commitment to the program and to each other. Their journey began with a special three-day summer camp at Cypress College in July. After returning to school in August, the team continued to meet weekly for extended coaching with Cypress College volunteer mentors. Those same mentors have also provided extended training during monthly, five-hour sessions.

Since November, our team has been competing in monthly challenges in which they have to find and fix cybersecurity vulnerabilities in a variety of simulated networks. Students use their programming skills to defend operating systems from cyber attacks. One of the most important lessons learned during competitions, however, is teamwork. Together, they must learn to trust each other to solve problems.

Everything in the future will be linked technologically, and this generation of students will be the cybersecurity specialists defending our devices, programs, networks and data. CyberPatriots has provided students with a unique skillset that prepares them for higher education and careers in the cyber industry.



The Federal Census Bureau

In just a few months, you'll be asked to participate in one of democracy's most considerable responsibilities — and it shouldn't take more than a few minutes of your time.

As mandated by the U.S. Constitution, the federal Census Bureau conducts a nationwide population count once every 10 years. This is one of the few national

activities the American public does together. It's also easy, confidential and critically important to our students and their communities.

Along with establishing the number of congressional seats and electoral votes for each state, census data serves as the basis for deciding how approximately \$900 billion in federal funds are spent annually, impacting education, housing, public safety and other vital services.

These anonymous statistics also enable local governments to make highly consequential decisions about public safety, including staffing police and fire stations, and they help school districts plan for enrollment shifts.

Meanwhile, businesses rely on census data to open stores, offices and factories that generate new jobs. Real estate developers use these figures to construct new houses and revitalize aging neighborhoods. Residents use the census to support community initiatives. Despite all that's at stake, our state is expected to lose about \$1,950 per person in annual federal funding as a result of undercounting. But a number of organizations are working to offset those losses by generating awareness in advance of the 2020 count. OCDE is among them, offering workshops for educators along with a social media campaign to help drive home some important points.

For example, we want to spread the word that the 2020 census will be easier than ever. Orange County families will be asked to respond starting in March, and the process should take about 10 minutes. In-person visits will only be made to households that don't respond online, by phone or by mail.

Another point worth noting is that any information collected by census-takers is confidential and can only be used for anonymous statistical purposes. In fact, every census employee takes an oath to protect your personal information for life.

Completing the census is easy, it's confidential and it's mandatory. But it's more than that. It's a way for all of us to participate in our democracy, ensuring that Congressional representation and taxpayer-funded resources are distributed equitably over the next decade.
