#### Early Childhood Education

Additionally, we are proud of our expanded state preschool program for three- and four-year-old students. These five-day-a-week classes are taught at Danbrook, Centralia, and San Marino Schools. Our state preschool programs have earned the highest rating of success from the Quality Start Organization who rated ours a five-star program!

### **Health and Nutrition**

Each day, our Food Services Department serves over 800 breakfasts and 4,000 lunches to Centralia School District students. We are a collaborating partner of the Center for Ecoliteracy California Thursday meal program. This partnership is evidence that we are reaffirming our commitment to incorporate healthy, California-grown products in our Thursday menu options. We are one of 71 districts in the state and two in Orange County that are participating in this effort.



During our kickoff program in January, it was a joy to observe children enjoying tomatoes and carrots in the same manner that they would eat apples! Parents, students, and community members attended this event, where they enjoyed fresh fruits and vegetables, participated in menu tasting and judging, and enjoyed culinary demonstrations.

What is next? We are offering opportunities for healthy nutrition and cooking lessons in class, parent nutrition lessons, and more!

#### **Facilities Improvements**

A huge thanks to our community for your overwhelming positive support of Measure N! We have already begun part of the work, including the replacement of outdated kindergarten playgrounds at Centralia, Buena Terra and Los Coyotes Schools. Next up are Miller and Dysinger Schools.

We are also in the process of making improvements to the air conditioning systems in the multipurpose rooms at Miller, Danbrook, and Raymond Temple Schools. Of course, this is just the beginning as we continue to make improvements to each of our eight schools as we transition into true 21st-century learning environments.

#### **Academic Excellence**

At this point in the year, staff and students are focused on "the next big thing," state testing. Our testing window for third-through sixth-grade students is April 10–May 5, 2017. Of course, students are not testing all of these days! Rather, we use this schedule to allow for make-up sessions for students who are absent on the regular testing days.

Our third-through sixth-grade students continue to use our new language arts curriculum, Benchmark and our new math curriculum, My Math. We supplement these programs through the addition of software tools, including MIND Math, Accelerated Reader, Ticket to Read, and PBS Discovery. To enhance critical-thinking skills, we incorporate a 20-hour computer-programming curriculum through CODE.org. Our district continues to purchase technology devices. In short, there is a lot of "good stuff" happening in each of our classrooms!

Education is in an exciting phase of change and evolution. We cannot do this alone. For this reason, I, on behalf of the Board of Trustees, thank each member of the Centralia Learning Community for your support and involvement in our schools. CESD: In Pursuit of Excellence!

### **Identifying When a Stomachache is Serious**

When a child experiences a stomachache, it's important for parents to be able to distinguish normal abdominal pain from a serious problem.

There are several reasons kids may experience stomachaches:


**Constipation:** Stool may be hard and difficult to pass leading to stomach pains. Poor diet and insufficient water intake are frequent


**Diarrhea:** Diarrhea is runny, loose bowel movements. It's often caused by food that upset the stomach, but if diarrhea persists it may be a sign of an infection.


**Stomach Flu:** The "stomach flu" is not actually a type of flu but inflammation in the lining of the intestines usually caused by a virus, called gastroenteritis. Symptoms can include diarrhea, stomach pains, vomiting, headache, fever and chills. Most people recover without treatment.

**GERD:** A common childhood condition is gastroesophageal reflux disease, which is a chronic disease that occurs when stomach acid or contents flows back into the food pipe. Symptoms include a burning sensation in the chest, chest pain, difficulty swallowing and dry cough.

Unless your child has a serious infection or condition, stomachaches will usually go away with time. However, if your child experiences frequent abdominal pains, bloating, diarrhea or constipation, talk to your child's pediatrician about an improved diet or consultation with a gastroenterologist.



Understanding Smarter Balanced Assessments and Supporting Student Success—With new academic standards, our students are working harder, thinking more critically, and applying their learning in the real world. To measure their progress in mastering English/language arts and mathematics standards, students in grades three through six take the Smarter Balanced assessments each spring. This workshop provides parents with an overview of the assessments their children will take and how families can help support student success.

Using Effective Questioning Strategies to Foster Student Learning— Effective questioning strategies encourage students to think more critically, which is an essential skill for both school and life success. This program teaches simple techniques that can be used at home to promote critical-thinking skills.

National Alliance on Mental Illness Parents and Teachers as Allies— This workshop is designed to help families better understand the signs and symptoms of emotional and behavioral difficulties that may be early warning signs of mental illnesses in children and adolescents.

Fourth-grade students created thinking maps using the Popplet application on iPads. Third-grade archeologists imported photos of their hands-on projects into slideshows that played on classroom computers. PowerPoint state reports were on display, complete with imported photos, transitions, and unique backgrounds. Classrooms were filled with QR codes for parents to use to listen to reports, read more about a topic, or view PowerPoint presentations, and parents learned from their children about the applications, computer programs, and devices they use at school. Technology was showcased throughout the school

In addition, slideshows played in classrooms across grade levels as the semester in review was shared in photos and videos for children and parents to view and remember. Parents, grandparents, and family members marveled at the proficiency of students using computers and iPads to showcase work. However, with all the technological tools our children have available to them, it was also nice to see such excitement about handwritten stories, art displays, and booklets that chronicled learning from the first day of school writing to present—and the progress was inspiring! Hansen School's Open House allowed yet another opportunity to demonstrate that "The Best Is Yet To Come!" With the learning that is continuing to take place across all of our schools, we can't help but show our pride by inviting the community to attend Reid School's Open House on March 9, Cerritos School's Open House on May 4, or Holder School's Open House on May 11.

Many classes have already begun using Hour of Code and Ozobots in our Technology Learning Centers and Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) Centers as they create even more student projects! The continued focus on technology in our classrooms will help to ensure that students are held to the same level of expectations as students in the world's highest-performing countries and that they gain the knowledge and skills that will prepare them for success in postsecondary education and in the global arena.

Our Great Expectation that we must continue to partner with parents to support students both at school and at home was evidenced during our 25th annual Reach the Reader family reading night. Throughout this fun-filled evening, parents and children were involved in activities that focused on literacy, many with a STEM focus. Parents attended a session led by a local engineer, Mark Castruita, as he shared his personal story and asserted that we are all engineers because we all engage in problem solving. Parents can support their children in school by giving them opportunities to become problem solvers, helping to prepare them for jobs of the future.
