Second-Graders Explore Text Using Shared Inquiry

Shared Inquiry is used as an effective teaching tool to engage students in higher levels of listening, speaking, reading and writing.

Second-graders in Miss Allen's classroom at Luther Elementary School have learned through using Shared Inquiry to collaborate and share their interpretation of what they are reading while addressing the text to support their responses, using Socratic dialogue. Miss Allen uses Shared Inquiry to teach students how to appropriately address and challenge their peers' responses. The Socratic model of discussing literature enables students to think for themselves and develop a deeper understanding of the text rather than to merely fill their heads with "right answers" that are parroted back with little student thought involved.

Shared inquiry gives Miss Allen's students a tool to read deeply, think critically, listen carefully and write clearly while achieving a more thorough understanding of text, as required using Common Core strategies.

Living With Cystic Fibrosis

Cystic fibrosis (CF) is a life-threatening, genetic disease that affects the lungs and digestive system of 30,000 people in the U.S., and 70,000 people worldwide, according to the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

People with CF have a hereditary gene that causes a buildup of thick mucus in the lungs, pancreas and other organs. There isn't a cure for CF, but tests and treatments are available to help manage it.

Living with CF:

- CF is not contagious, but a child with CF is susceptible to lung infections and should be isolated from others with respiratory symptoms
- A child with CF has a special diet, and must be allowed unlimited access to snacks and water
- A child with CF must take enzymes before meals or snacks
- A child with CF must have time to take medications and do airway clearance treatments at school
- A child with CF should have unlimited access to the bathroom
- A child with CF should exercise, but must drink water or sports drinks to replace fluids and salt lost through sweat
- · A child with CF may be hospitalized during the school year and must be given the opportunity to make up work

It's vital that children with CF receive treatment from an accredited CF center, like the one at Miller Children's Hospital Long Beach. Keep Calm and Stay Focused

Over the past two years, staff members of the Centralia School District have adjusted their sails toward a new focus, Common Core State Standards. The Orange County Department of Education describes the Common Core as follows: "The foundation for success in the 21st century will be the ability to think critically, solve problems creatively, and communicate and collaborate effectively. The Common Core State Standards will

provide opportunities for students to acquire and perfect these 21st-century skills." Centralia School District staff has focused their attention on these Common Core beliefs through aligning professional development, assessing the use of technology, and building capacity within the district through expert teacher trainers engaging their peers in the understanding and teaching of new standards. The intense work is driving how teachers teach and children learn, as well as how the district is evaluating the needs of its future for student academic success.

The new Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) and its accountability model, Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP), set the sails and the wind for the changes that public schools must make to focus their efforts. Our administration has looked to our entire learning community of teachers, management team members, classified staff, parents, and members of the public for input on how we will meet this new focus. Over 15 meetings have taken place thus far for this sole purpose. The LCAP charts the course showing not only where we are sailing, but also identifying the financial support that will get us there. When the final plan is submitted and approved by the California State Board of Education, we can set sail in our new direction with the Common Core State Standards.

In the words of Jimmy Dean, "I can't change the direction of the wind, but I can adjust my sails to always reach my destination." Centralia School District will continue to adjust its sails to maintain our course for success for all students.

Thinking Maps Chart the Road to Learning

Buena Terra is focused on making sure that students not only read but actually understand and comprehend what they read. In order to reach our goal, all teachers have been trained in Thinking Maps.

Thinking Maps allow students to visualize and organize information so that they can learn and share with others. There are eight different thinking maps, and they can be used across the subject areas in all grades from kindergarten to high school as well as beyond. Unlike graphic organizers that individual

teachers create for their students, Thinking Maps are consistent among grade levels and classrooms. Students themselves learn to decide which map would be most appropriate and then learn to determine in their reading what is most important.

Teaching for Understanding

Centralia School, along with hundreds of other schools across California, is teaching the Common Core State Standards and preparing its students to take the new formative assessment test (the SBAC).

Our extraordinary faculty supports the growth and development of diverse learners with a range of learning styles, multiple intelligences, family and cultural backgrounds, and life experiences. We encourage our students to learn more challenging material and demonstrate their learning in ways that illustrate more proficient performance.

Not only do we serve a more diverse student population than ever before, but we also expect to "teach for understanding." That is, to create new methods of teaching that can help children develop the ability to use their knowledge in novel ways

When students are taught for understanding, they are expected to evaluate and defend ideas with careful reasoning and evidence. They are also required to independently inquire into a problem, produce a high-quality piece of work, and understand the standards that indicate they have done so. The students demonstrate that they understand the curriculum by using what they've learned to solve problems.

The staff at Centralia is embracing the demands of CCSS by applying research-based teaching strategies and performance-based assessments to support the more complex knowledge and skills needed to succeed in college and the 21st-century workforce. We took the next step in April by administering the SBAC field test to students in the third through sixth grades.

Exciting Changes Ahead

California has adopted new Common Core State Standards (CCSS) for the education of our children. All parents should know about the changes the new standards will bring to the instruction, curriculum and testing of public school students. Dysinger School and the Centralia School District are very excited about the changes.

CCSS is a national education initiative that will bring states' curricula into alignment by using standards-based education reform. The initiative was initially sponsored by the National

Governors' Association and the Council of Chief State School Officers. CCSS provides a consistent, clear understanding of what students in kindergarten through 12th grade are expected to learn, so teachers and parents know what they need to do to help them. The standards are designed to reflect the knowledge and skills that our young people will need for success in college, in their chosen careers, and in the global economy.

After spring break, the district will be administering a field test called the Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium (SBAC) Field Test. This assessment will be a trial-run and is intended to prepare California schools and students for the new standardized state test for the 2014–2015 school year.

Dysinger students in third through sixth grades have had the opportunity to take practice tests in our computer lab. Students can also practice on their own computers or use the Buena Park Library computers by visiting the SBAC official Web site. To preview the practice test, go to http://www. smarterbalanced.org.

Teachers Making a Difference

Teachers at Juliet Morris Elementary School have written and received several grants this year, highlighting their commitment to technology integration and 21st-century classroom practices. It started in the fall, with various teachers receiving art supplies, gardening materials, and tablets from Donors Choose. Next, our instructional learning coach, Isis Ortiz, wrote a grant through the Cotsen Foundation to provide professional development to all second- and third-grade teachers. She released each teacher for a day of training focused on Number Talks, which has had a significant impact on classroom instruction.

Additionally, Morris will be adding new netbooks and electronic tablets as the result of four Orange County Innovate grants written by teachers. Fourth-grade teacher Ida Egenberger-Gutierrez wrote a grant titled, "Growing a Garden of Knowledge," and she will be using tablets for science in conjunction with her gardening and composting projects. Assessments and Successes

It's the first year of Common Core State Standard implementation, and with that come some changes to the assessment system. This year our third-through sixth-graders will be taking the Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium exams. This is a pilot year, so scores will not be reported. The assessment is computer-based, and students will need to be able to answer test items through a variety of means. Some questions will be written response, some multiple choice, some drop and drag, and some will use other testing techniques. We

are currently participating in practice tests, so the students are familiar with the format of these tests. Our lucky fifth-graders will also participate in the California Standards Test for science this year.

We also have adjunct programs. Reading Counts promotes extracurricular reading by offering books targeted to student comprehension levels. Students read books at their levels and take quizzes on the books to earn school-wide recognition of their reading success.

Vessels teachers and students also participate in the Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) program, which offers a school-wide positive behavior approach to classroom management and school expectations. By providing school-wide standards, students are confident that they are in a safe environment where expectations are clear and every student can focus on learning!





Letting Our Pride Show

As we look at our accomplishments for the 2013-2014 school year, we cannot help but let our pride show! When a school district holds great expectations and believes that the best opportunities are yet to unfold, wonderful things can happen for students. Holder School's modernization is nearly complete, with a ribbon-cutting/dedication ceremony for the newly renovated campus planned for Wednesday, May 28 at 2:30 p.m.; the modernized campus will be ready for occupancy when we return

for the 2014–2015 school year. We welcome the community to take part in our ribbon-cutting ceremony, which will be followed by guided tours of the newly modernized campus.

We're very proud of this opportunity to provide safe and secure learning environments for our students; such a protected atmosphere is essential for students of all ages. Without it, they are unable to focus on learning the skills needed for a successful education and future. Classrooms are being remodeled to include technology for 21st-century teaching and learning. Other improvements to classrooms and offices include: enhanced wall systems; energy-efficient, dual-paned windows; new energy-efficient heating and air-conditioning units; new plumbing, electrical, fire-alarm and low-voltage systems; and upgraded roofing. Our heating and air-conditioning units, lighting, security cameras, classroom projectors, and even irrigation systems will be on energy-management systems, which will be controlled remotely to ensure that units do not run during times they are not needed. Some older portables have been removed, and replacements have been placed in new locations on the campus to better serve kindergarten and preschool classes, as well before- and after-school daycare programs. Student restrooms are

being remodeled to include new plumbing and sewer lines, energy-efficient fixtures, and terrazzo flooring, which will last at least another 50 years! Smarter Balanced Field Test

Students in third through sixth grades are participating in the California Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium Field Test, the new state assessment system which replaced the California Standards Test (CST). Unlike the CST, the Smarter Balanced Field Test is administered entirely on computers. The new assessment system will not generate any individual or group scores this year, but instead will serve as a learning experience for students and teachers alike.

Tiger Woods Learning Center

Fifth-grade students at Cerritos School participated in a week-long education program at the Tiger Woods Learning Center, where students learned about marine science, including exploration of oceanic regions, squid dissection, analysis of sand samples, and marine-life classification.
