Academic Strength as a Foundation for Future Success

Once again, we outperformed both state and county averages for Meeting or Exceeding State Averages on state tests! At the elementary level, these numbers are important since they help to tell a story of our scholars' ability to be ready to engage in deeper work to prepare our scholars of today for success in the future.

Developing College and Career Readiness

Centralia ESD continues to move forward on its quest to support our young students with the skills needed for tomorrow. As automation grows around us, we need to be fostering important skills for the future that encourages students to collaborate, think critically, solve complex problems, communicate verbally with not only the people in the room but globally as well, and process information with ease. This illustrates the importance of strong reading, speaking and writing skills! Our schools have taken to this challenge from our very youngest students all the way to our sixth-grade scholars.

Preschool and Transitional Kindergarten

Did you know that our preschool program staff has been engaged in a year of professional development to support science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) in the classrooms? Our little 3- and 4-year-olds have the opportunity to explore their world through the STEM lens. In transitional kindergarten, we have engaged our staff to provide model programs for our young scholars. Our Blocks Program has evolved from simple playtime to play that challenges our 4- and 5-year-olds to build model cities by describing community essentials they would like to see in their city. As we move into the 2019–20 school year, we look forward to implementing

the Blocks Program in all of our transitional kindergarten classrooms as well as adding a transitional kindergarten classroom at Miller School!

Project Based-Learning (PBL), Cognitively Guided Instruction (CGI) and AVID

PBL and CGI are two instructional strategies that have permitted our staff to infuse our everyday instruction with opportunities to apply future-ready skills such as solving complex problems, communication, creativity and critical thinking. Students work in groups to identify a real-life challenge. They research, talk to experts in the fields, and prepare presentations for peers. These strategies are supported by Centralia ESD's commitment to STEM practices in all of our schools. Centralia continues its efforts to ensure that all of our teachers are trained in these valuable instructional strategies so our scholars may participate and develop these future-ready skills. As we continue our quest to provide the aspirational goal of college graduation, I am so pleased to share that San Marino Elementary School is well on its way to earning its rating from AVID as a model elementary school for AVID implementation!

Helping Children Manage End-of-School-Year Stress

It's the beginning of spring, the air feels warmer and the excitement of summer is present. However, as the school year winds down, anxiety can ramp up.

The end of the school year is a time of transition. Children and parents internalize stress in different ways and finding ways to alleviate anxiety will help families have a more enjoyable summer. Many stressors can impact their well-being, such as:

- Changes to sleep and diet along with other routine activities
- Changing schools or needing to attend summer school
- Leaving a friend or beloved teacher behind
- Moving to a larger campus
- Studying for and taking exams

Although it's difficult to predict how a child will respond to change, it's important to communicate. Parents can help with their child's transition by creating closure, so that their child doesn't assume the worst about the upcoming year. It is

important to have a meaningful conversation, so parents can be aware of how a child is handling the situation. Some tips to deal with stress and anxiety include:

- Encouraging involvement in non-verbal activities, like sports, reading, writing and art
- Establishing coping skills for when they're feeling overwhelmed, such as walking the dog, playing a game or talking to someone
- Celebrating the completion of milestones
- Highlighting the independence they'll gain because of the new transition
- Visiting the new school or meeting with their next teacher
- Writing a card to a beloved teacher they're leaving

Measure N Projects

Centralia ESD continues its implementation of Measure N projects. We are so thankful that our community supported this bond measure in 2016 with a resounding 71% support! This bond has permitted our district to ensure that equity projects are finalized, that school safety is prioritized through frontoffice remodels, and that classrooms reflect learning spaces that capture the essence of learning in a future-ready environment. Projects:

- - Air conditioning has been added for multipurpose rooms at Miller, Danbrook and Raymond Temple School, giving us 100% of schools with air-conditioned assembly spaces.
 - Parking lots have been upgraded and expanded at schools as permitted by the geography of the school. Both Miller and Danbrook Schools have had expansive parking lots added to their site.
 - All Centralia ESD schools now have a shaded lunch structure where children can eat outdoors and enjoy the great Southern California weather in a shaded setting.
 - Bark chips and sandpits are gone! All Centralia ESD playgrounds have rubberized safety surfaces to ensure ADA-compliant, safer access for all of our scholars. In addition, all of our schools have colorful engagementlearning spaces for each kindergarten and upper-grade play space.
 - Two schools, Miller and Raymond Temple, have completed office remodels with a single point of entry. Currently, Danbrook and Buena Terra School offices are under construction, with Danbrook expected to be completed in June and Buena Terra in November. Two other schools, San Marino and Los Coyotes, are next, with plans being submitted to the Division of State Architect for approval.
