Centralia School District Looks Forward to An Exciting Year!

It is often said that change is the only constant in life. This is very true for the dynamic Centralia School District! On behalf of our dedicated Board of Trustees; Board President Steve Harris, Clerk Dennis Salts, Clerk Pro Tem Connor Traut, and members Henry Charoen and Art Montez, I welcome families and staff to the 2015-16 school year. I am thrilled and honored to begin serving as the Superintendent of the Centralia School District, effective July 1, 2015. I join our Board in holding a high interest in seeing Centralia continue its tradition of academic achievement and school safety. Further, we will use the 2015-16 school year to deepen our outreach efforts with our community and strengthen parent engagement and will seek to innovate and infuse digital learning into every day instruction. Our staff; certificated, classified and administrative teams are ready for a year of cultivating relationships with each other and our community, creating opportunities for learning, and celebrating success along the way!



We join all Districts in California in the implementation of the new funding process for school districts known as the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF). Within this process, districts are asked to engage stakeholders, review data, and establish a spending plan that addresses the needs of the community, with a particular emphasis on providing services to students who have, on a statewide level, demonstrated underperformance: English Learners, Low Socio-Economic Status, and Foster Youth. This process of stakeholder engagement involves members of the community, employee associations, teachers, administrators, classified staff, parents, and our Board of Trustees. The result of this dialogue and data analysis is the creation of a master plan known as the Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP). The Centralia School District Board of Trustees approved our LCAP in June of 2015 and the Orange County Department of Education approved the plan on August 19, 2015. There is much to celebrate as this document outlines an exciting plan of learning and support for our students.

• We have adjusted our calendar to better match Anaheim Union High School District. Our first day of school was August 12, 2015 and the last day of school will be May 26, 2016. Please log on to www.cesd.us and review the District Calendar. Families are asked to schedule trips during non-instructional time. Student absences result in a loss of learning for the student and a loss of income for the school/District.

What is in store for our students, staff and parents this year through our LCAP?

• Every Kindergarten/ Transitional Kindergarten classroom in the District is now on an all day schedule! Class size in kindergarten is averaged at 24:1 so that teachers have the opportunity to reach every student in class every day. Already, many teachers have commented on the benefits of all-day kindergarten. We anticipate that this focus on our youngest learners will result in young scholars who are ready for rigorous learning in later years.

JPL Internship

Students often associate summer vacation with beaches, shopping malls and family getaways. But if you ask eight young men and women from Santa Ana how they spent their break, they're more likely to talk about mechanical engineering, aerospace or computer programming.

That's because these students — all from Century, Godinez, Saddleback and Segerstrom high schools in the Santa Ana Unified School District — secured highly exclusive paid summer internships at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena.

This was not merely a job-shadowing exercise. Over an eightweek stretch that concluded on Aug. 14, Paula Casian, Minhanh Chau, Denise Garcia, An Ho, Troyce Morales, Luis Terrones,

Michelle Tran and Rosa Yanes worked directly with science and engineering mentors, performing highly technical work to advance real JPL projects.

This opportunity was made possible thanks to community partners

including OpTerra Energy Services and, of course, JPL. And it's precisely the type of experience that was envisioned when the state Department of Education awarded our own OC Pathways initiative a \$15 million grant to expand career pathways for students from kindergarten through college.

Led by the Orange County Department of Education and Saddleback College, OC Pathways comprises more than a dozen school districts, nine community colleges, two major universities, four regional occupational programs, three workforce investment boards, numerous community partners and more than 100 businesses — all focused on carving out clear pathways that will lead students of all backgrounds and academic levels to rewarding careers.

OC Pathways is one example of how OCDE is working to fulfill its vision that Orange County students will lead the nation in college and career readiness and success. I would be remiss in not adding that it aligns nicely with our state's recent efforts to promote critical thinking, creativity, communication and collaboration.

Preparing Your Child for Surgery

The thought of surgery can be worrisome for children and their parents. Preparing your child for any surgical procedure can make your child less anxious and help them tolerate surgery and anesthesia better.

Tips to Help Prepare Yourself and Your Child

- Participate with your child in a pre-surgical tour and discuss what happened on the tour later.
- Ask questions of your child's surgeon, anesthesiologist and nursing team in order to better understand what your child will experience. This will give you confidence and enable you to talk calmly to your child.
- Speak honestly with your child about what will happen.
- Listen to your child's concerns about surgery.
- Encourage your child to participate in medical play (Child Life Specialists are prepared to help young patients through this experience).
- Use a play medical kit at home to familiarize your child with tools the care team may use, such as a stethoscope.
- Include siblings in preparation and encourage them to ask questions too.
- Remind your child that they will return home soon.
- Read books about children being hospitalized. Children can often relate better to characters.



The more you help prepare your child for surgery, the more they will understand what is going to happen and reduce their anxiety about surgery.



• Every classroom in the Centralia School District is equipped with Smartboard and projector technology to facilitate dynamic lesson delivery from our teachers. We have also added 864 new chrome books for student use, resulting in one Chromebook cart per grade level starting in Grades 3-6, minimally.



The arrival of this technology has opened the door for an innovative year of learning for our entire staff. Our teachers will soon begin to engage students in exciting collaborative projects aligned to the tenets of 21st Century Learning. Centralia has hired a Digital Coach, Mrs. Jennifer Faulhaber, who is helping to shape the training for our teachers with the support of our principals, our District Office staff, our Technology Leads and our Technology Assistants. There will be opportunities for parents to join in and learn about our digital world through parent workshops hosted at each school site.

- Starting September 14th, Centralia's 4th through 6th grade students will begin to have lessons in physical education and art education delivered through Collaboration Teachers on Special Assignment. Our LCAP process has allowed us to hire three itinerant teachers to visit schools on a weekly basis to deliver these lesson and allow our classroom teachers an hour of release time for collaboration. This collaboration time will be utilized by teachers to review technology training, to plan units of study, and to immerse themselves in the new State Standards and instructional methodology that supports new learning.
- The District has also hired two Information Access Coordinators to help schools with the organization of Accelerated Reader, the appropriate labeling of reading books and to provide organizational support at site libraries. Accelerated Reading is a reading incentive program for students to read independently at their instructional level.



• This year, our District is updating curriculum materials for mathematics and pro-social learning. We are in the midst of a math pilot adoption program that includes 85 teachers. The results of this pilot will be shared with the Math Adoption Committee, comprised of teachers, administrators, and parents. The final outcome will be the selection of new material that is aligned to our New State Standards! As a matter of assisting students with social-emotional health, we are updating our Second Step pro-social skills program. This program assists students to determine best and better choices for solving conflict with peers.

As our community can see, Centralia is ready for a year that offers opportunity, celebration, and forward motion for the entire Centralia School District learning community. I invite members of our community to partner up with our schools through PTA/PTSO and to support the exciting changes happening in our District! Again, on behalf of our Board of Trustees, our staff, and myself, I wish us all much success this year and invite our community to come see us in action. The good news is California is reinvesting in our schools and, for the first time, channeling more resources to the students with the greatest needs. Moreover, our state has put standards in place that take learning to a substantially deeper level.

Our work is far from done, but the Orange County Department of Education and the school districts we serve are highly motivated and, indeed, well positioned to ensure students receive the training and preparation they'll need to thrive in their lives and careers.

'Glory! Glory! Hallelujah!'

This collection arrives just in time for the beginning of the school year, when teachers are scoping out their annual plans and parents are looking for some good, entertaining stuff to enhance their children's knowledge base. Glory! Glory! Hallelujah! is a real find—a brass-and-woodwind-heavy hail to the Civil War era.

The collection is a compilation of traditional songs, some familiar and others obscure, as well as

tunes written by artist Lloyd H. Miller in the sense of the era and what came out of it for better or worse. In the CD, Miller tells the traditional story and sings the well-known tune of radical abolitionist John Brown and adds his own lyrics and music to flesh out the hero's activism and bravery. "Follow



the Drinking Gourd," the hymn to Harriet Tubman's night-sky navigation to the land of freedom, is given a celebratory treatment. Another lesser-known Brown—Henry Box Brown—reached the North in another singular way: he shipped himself in a box to Philadelphia, and Miller thought he'd make a great subject for a song. He was right. Equally obscure and of note is the story of Weeksville, one of the first free black enclaves. Weeksville was established in Brooklyn in the 1830s by a former slave, and Miller graced it with a song, too.

A sequenced narration of Lincoln's Gettysburg Address squares the corners of this enlightening collection. And best of all, an online curriculum guide is in development to further link this rich era to our present.


