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

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As School Starts, Rising Stars Start

As the school year started in August 2017, students weren't the only ones returning to the classroom. Fullerton School District staff volunteered to participate in Rising Stars, a mentoring program that paired each staff member with students

in elementary school. The Rising Stars program has continued and this year, is being expanded to more students at additional schools.

The Rising Stars are students who have amazing potential and can benefit from an additional adult in their lives to make sure they are attending school, completing assignments, and getting assistance, when and if needed. The mentors serve as cheerleaders to the Rising Stars and an additional resource to help them. The mentors are there to make a positive impact on the students. For example, during one year with additional tutoring and encouragement from the Rising Stars program, 30% of the participants demonstrated an improvement of two grade levels.

Both mentors and the Rising Stars look forward to ongoing activities including in-person lunch check-ins, holiday celebrations, school supplies and additional necessities distribution, tutoring, and special activities and field trips to recognize and celebrate achievements throughout the year.



As stated by Ms. Holm, Principal at one of the FSD Rising Stars schools, "All students have obstacles they need to overcome to reach their full academic potential. However some students have traumatic events or obstacles that seem impossible to overcome. The Rising Stars mentor program impacts a student's life by providing a mentor that motivates them to have confidence in themselves to achieve all their dreams."

As a classmate asked if the program would continue through high school, another said, "Rising stars is an amazing experience they help you with problems they try to help you with work overall it's an amazing program they showed me how to be a better person in general."

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Welcome back to a new school year. By now students are settled into their routines and happy to be back in the classrooms.

Social Emotional Learning

Social Emotional Learning has been supported by research to increase student achievement over the last 20+ years. However, in response to the pandemic, the social-emotional and mental health of students has received increased and much-needed attention. Ladera Vista Junior High School of the Arts has been ahead of

this curve by staffing a robust mental health team that includes a full-time School Psychologist, a full-time Academic Counselor, a full-time Mental Health Specialist, and a full-time Student Success Mentor. The school includes two additional Mental Health Associates to support a caseload of students and provides group therapy for various categories of students.

Our entire school staff also supports our students' social-emotional health through the Second Step Middle School curriculum, a program adopted by the district. These lessons are designed to help students both in and out of school to build skills in empathy, managing anxiety, bullying and coping skills.



The program supports whole-child development, creating a positive school climate where students and adults can grow together, improve social-emotional knowledge and increase academic achievement.





Taeyoung K. is a 6th grader. She loves reading books and writing her own stories. Also, she likes to draw and play video games.








Young Maestros

Tracy Bonham's Grammy-nominated compositions might be familiar to some—Google “Mother Mother” if you've never heard it—but her gifts extend on beyond “Billboard.” Her classical training and devotion to developing a passion for music

in very young children created the [Melodeon Music House Curriculum](#), which teaches music fundamentals to preschool youngsters.

You don't need a spoonful of sugar to get children interested in music, but Bonham knows a most delightful way anyhow. “Young Maestros,” a collection of songs and games from Melodeon, opens with “Me Symphony,” in which Bonham laments how she misplaced her instruments everywhere—her tuba in Aruba, her shaker in Jamaica. But hey, she has her fingers, mouth, nose, feet and a beat as substitutes! Take heed, teachers and parents—there's a great maps lesson in there.



Bonham puts the “fun” in “fundamentals” with “Beats to a Measure,” a pleasant, rapid-fire lesson in rhythm. “All the Blackbirds” gives flight to the black keys, and “Feelin’ Pretty Major” explains major and minor keys and how the upbeat feel of the former and the mournfulness of the latter comprise the music of life.

“Background Singers” is my personal favorite. Like the documentary “Twenty Feet from Stardom,” it pays homage to the unsung singers who provide the bones and

body of a song. “Background Singers” tells what happens when a lead singer is unkind and unappreciative to them. Let's say that she learns about harmony the hard way!

The final track on the collection is “A Song Without an Ending,” only 32 seconds long with an abrupt stop, but no satisfactory end. Bonham seems to be telling the Young Maestros, “You pick up from here!”


