Technology in Our Schools

What will our students need to be successful in a world in which the jobs of their future do not even exist? When any job that can be outsourced, or packaged into a routine for a computer or robot to run will become obsolete, the need for creativity, non routine problem solving, and collaborative

leaders will be necessary in this Brave New World. The ability to innovate, create and leverage 21st Century communication and collaborative technologies becomes vital for our children's success in this new global economy.

In 2004, the District first implemented Laptops for Learning, a 24/7 program at Fisler, Golden Hill, Hermosa Drive Schools and Nicolas Junior High. As a result, this year marks the sixth year that Fisler School has been designated as an Apple Distinguished School. The great success from this program has set the stage for the implementation of additional technological programs.

All teachers in the District have the opportunity to utilize laptops for everyday use in the classrooms. This is complemented with mobile carts at the schools with laptops, iPods, and iPads for use by students in the classrooms. The integration of iPods has been successful as exemplified by the iPods in Education Learning Project at Valencia Park School, which has been designated as an Apple Distinguished Program for the second year.



In March of this year, the Fullerton School District will implement the 1:1 iPad Visible Innovation Program (VIP) for all 6th and 7th grade students across the entire District and extend this program to all 5th through 8th grade students very soon. Our 5th through 8th grade students will have the device to utilize at school and at home 24/7. When our educators inspire passion for learning in our children, students will be able to pursue that learning beyond the school day in areas of their choice such as writing, arts, engineering, science, or wherever their learning takes them. For those students who need extra help, we will have resources such as screencasts of their teachers lecture that they can access at home. Within the context of the school days, the iPad will allow students to work collaboratively with professionals on real world projects, receive immediate feedback on their work and create new designs with digital tools such as 3D modeling software. Additionally, we will be able to further personalize learning for our children with a wide array of supports and extensions.

This new iPad Visible Innovation Program is an exciting opportunity for our children. Our students will have greater opportunities to pursue their interests, learn whenever they are able, create with innovative tools and connect their learning to the real world learning. Every child deserves the chance to be masters of their destiny and their dreams. At Fullerton School District, we are committed to providing this destination for our students.

As one of two district schools fortunate enough to be a part of Project Create (Children Reaching Excellence in the Arts and Academics through Engagement), our students have been busy learning the art of filmmaking and creating historical movie vignettes about the Gold Rush and the Boston Tea Party.

The "Arts Lab Bus" is a former school bus that was converted for service as a movie-making classroom. As it rolled onto our

Growing and Learning

At Ladera Vista Junior High School (LV), students value their partnership with California State University, Fullerton (CSUF). Through the Urban Agriculture Community-based Research Experience (U-ACRE) and Project Learning Tree Programs, graduate students work with LV students to collect and enter data, such as the number of tomato flowers on a given day, and retrieve information, such as the nutritional benefits of a tomato or the regional history of a particular plant. Student-generated information is stored on a university server to be downloaded

for LV activities, such as a photo of a flowering plant for an art project, the soil temperature over time for graphing exercises, or the weight of school-grown tomatoes to estimate the amount of beta carotene. These activities reinforce math skills, information literacy, and knowledge of nutrition



The school also recycles green lunch waste into a school biosafe, creating rich fertilizer to enhance the beautiful garden spaces across campus. Students greatly benefit from these outstanding, hands-on, learning experiences!

Student in the Nicolas Junior High Project's Lead the Way class will be focusing on robotics for the second semester. The students will be using VEX robotics kits to complete challenging tasks in class and demonstrate their new knowledge. Students will also learn how to program robots using the RobotC programming language.

In the previous semester, the students learned about 3-D design using AutoDesk Inventor computer-aided design software. Utilizing their understanding of computer-aided design, the

students created a children's playground, a custom light-switch cover and a pegboard toy. In order to draw the various shapes, the students had to learn



to extrude threedimensional objects from two-dimensional objects and also learned to create a helix from a circular shape they created. Mrs. Desai, the project's teacher, led the way. Robotics and 3-D design classes is inspiring the next generation of creative problems solvers through the Project Lead the Way curriculum.

Technology Plays an Important Role

Students in kindergarten through the sixth grade are interacting with a variety of new technologies as they explore, question, and individualize their learning.

In Mrs. Sanchez' and Mrs. Hernandez' kindergarten classes, students solve math problems by using the Strip Design app to photograph and label three-dimensional objects. The first-graders love using their iPads to practice fluency skills in reading. They become motivated by recording and listening to themselves reading the passages.

The second-graders in Mrs. Rowatt's class use the "Educreation" app to create social studies projects. The third-graders use

their laptops to solve math equations on ST math. Our students also use an interactive projector to explore concepts through BrightLink. With this tool they are able to visualize and physically work with the materials and concepts.

Along with interactive projectors, we also use Active Expression Responders. This powerful tool can motivate learning as well as monitor individual progress towards learning goals. Mrs. Walker's fourth-graders use the Responders to select an answer, view it in class, and then get immediate feedback.

Our multi-age students recently used laptops to enhance a condensation lab. They digitally recorded the process of condensation, used iMovie to edit-in a speed increase to quickly review the process, and then embedded the video into a keynote.

Fifth-grader Ryan Simpson remarked, "Mrs. Hawkey showed us how to use virtual manipulatives on our iPads to help understand and compare fractions." The sixth-graders have also created a keynote on the five ecosystems, and explored the Outdoor Science Camp to become expert scientists.



We are proud to announce Valencia Park Elementary School's renewal as an Apple Distinguished Program for its IAM Learning Project and The Young Scholars After-School Program. This is a two-year designation from 2013 through 2015.

In order to receive this honor, we had to demonstrate strong evidence of the five best practices of an Apple Distinguished Program: visionary leadership, innovative teaching and learning, ongoing professional development, evidence of success, and a flexible learning environment.



This journey first began in 2010, with 600 iPod touch devices. It has evolved to include a 1:1 iPad program in 28 of our 32 kindergarten through sixth-grade

This technology is a vehicle for great instructional practices, and helps individualize the learning experience for each student. Its strong focus on professional development, technology integration and student engagement has helped to instill a love for learning in our students, and a culture where children love to come to school.

Let's Go Green!

"What can we do about the amount of trash on campus? How can we get students to conserve, recycle, and reuse whenever possible?" As students asked these questions, the opportunity for exploration through project-based learning was born.

The resulting Green Team provides students with a multitude of opportunities to model and encourage stewardship of our planet. So You Think You Can Drive

My children are in their 40s, and a lot of water has gone under the bridge since I parented them. One of the most memorable areas of difficulty is when they learned to drive. It is bad enough that your precious baby is on the roller coaster of hormones and exhibiting moments of extreme independence; now he or she wants to get behind the wheel of a car and disappear into the teenage world. Yikes! Besides ensuring that your teen has lots of supervised practice with driving, which will allow him or her to react appropriately when faced with an unexpected situation, it's also important to impress upon your young person the magnitude

of the responsibility the privilege of driving entails. Following are some thoughts to share with your children at this important stage of life.

It is critical that your teen understands that driving an automobile is wielding a deadly weapon. You are not only risking your life but someone else's life. Can you live with being the cause of another person's death? My high school pal and I were in her car when a drunk driver ran a signal, broad-sided our car on her side, and killed her. The loss of my friend was horrific! But let's also look at what happened to the man who was driving the car. He awoke from his drunken haze in jail and found out he had killed someone. How do you live with that the rest of your life? His life was forever changed due to a really poor choice.

Today's teens also have to deal with the impact of the world of electronics on their driving. Texting and driving is the same as playing Russian roulette, only the stakes are higher, because more lives are at risk. According to textinganddrivingsafety.com, there are 1.3 million crashes involving cell phones each year. If you look down for five seconds while driving 55 miles per hour, it is the same as looking down while driving the length of a football field. Too many people have lost their lives or killed someone else while texting and driving. Whatever you have to share can wait.

Drinking and driving is not new, but it is still unacceptable. I warned my children that if they came in from an evening with friends and I could tell they had been drinking or doing drugs, they would lose their driving privileges. Mothers Against Drunk Drivers (MADD) has plenty of graphic pictures on its Web site, which clearly illustrate that alcohol dulls the clarity of a person's thoughts. Quite a few years ago, my former husband and I came out of a party. I held out my hand for the keys, as he was clearly past his limit. He said he was fine. I started walking down the street. Angry, he let me drive home, and halfway there he passed out. What could've happened had he driven home? I'm glad I don't have to know. Alcohol inhibits your ability to make wise choices, so it should never be mixed with driving.

Distracted drivers are also a danger on the road. Driving a car requires your full attention. Reaching into the glove box, turning to talk to friends, or singing and bouncing around, as in the movie "The Blind Side," distracts a driver. Once on a winding road on the coast, a van filled with teenagers tried to navigate at too great a speed. Passengers were killed and one girl paralyzed when the van rolled. The driver was not drunk or on drugs; he simply disengaged from driving and was unable to navigate a curve.

All of these behaviors need to be emphasized with young drivers. But they all boil down to one truth of life: you always need to be responsible and make good choices. From incurring parking tickets or allowing someone else to drive your car to driving while intoxicated, poor choices have serious consequences for your teen, and he or she should know that before you hand over the keys.

Finally, before you send your teen out on the road solo for the first time, remind your child how much you love him or her. Let your teen know that you are aware of the dangers driving may impose and you trust him or her to make good choices. When your child knows that your trust is at risk, hopefully he or she will think twice before making a life-threatening poor decision.

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FSD on Solid Financial Footing

Through careful financial management and prudent budgeting, the Fullerton School District has reported another positive year for the District's finances. FSD ended the 2012-13 school year with net income in the General Fund for the 6th year in a row. This resulted in an Unrestricted Ending Fund Balance (equivalent to our "retained earnings" in a for-profit company) of \$20.3 million.

Despite several years of continued cuts from the State (including a 15% cut to the District's Revenue Limit [general purpose] apportionment income), the District has continued to post positive financial results. The District achieved this by parents, staff, the Board and community members working together to develop a prudent budget plan which would keep

the District financially sound while maintaining our high quality educational program. Some steps taken included increasing class size, eliminating some positions, implementing an early retirement program, and using Federal ARRA and Education jobs funding. Additionally, all budgets were scrutinized and reduced where possible, while District employees did their part by taking furlough days to help close the budget gap.

Due to the improving economy and the new State Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), the District's financial future is looking brighter. The Board, staff, parents and the community now have a different task: come up with the Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP), a detailed guide on how the District will use State funding to achieve its educational goals. Stay tuned!

Fullerton S.D. Saves Money AND the Environment with Propane Buses

FSD is saving resources and the environment by replacing 30 year old diesel fuel burning buses with clean burning Propane buses. The buses were purchased with a \$2 million grant from the Air Quality Management District (AQMD), so the net cost to the District for 16 buses was only \$8,743.

Transportation Department leaders Debbie Vasquez and Jon Andrews were responsible for finding the grant for the District, as well as putting together the detailed application. Thanks to their hard work and attention to detail, the District was able to benefit from this highly competitive program (not all Districts that apply receive funding).



The District received its first shipment of three buses (walk-on/wheelchair) in November. The second group of six conventional passenger buses (72 passenger) were received in December. An additional seven buses will be received in January and February. Buses will be used to transport students from home to school, as well as for field trips.


At the Fullerton School District, traffic safety is something that we passionately believe in and always appreciate parent support. If you would like more information on how to become a volunteer for the occasional traffic duty, contact your school's office for more details.

Otherwise, if you are unable to volunteer, another way to make a difference is to remember these basic safety principles while driving near a school.



- 1) Follow posted signs, area crossing guards, and those directing traffic.
- Be an early bird and allow enough time each day to safely drop off/pick up your child.
- Demonstrate patience and take a deep breathe. You are not the only one in a hurry trying to get somewhere (really).
- Put down the cell phone and pay attention to what is happening outside your vehicle. Children are unpredictable and can walk directly into traffic.
- Make sure your student enters/exits the vehicle on the safe side. The safe side is the one closest to the sidewalk or curb. Never allow your child to cut through moving traffic.
- It's better to yield to another driver than to push your way through.
- Set the example for your child, always use crosswalks or marked intersections.
- Never leave your car unattended in a student loading/unloading area. These seem to be basic tips, but always worth repeating for the sake of our children's safety.
