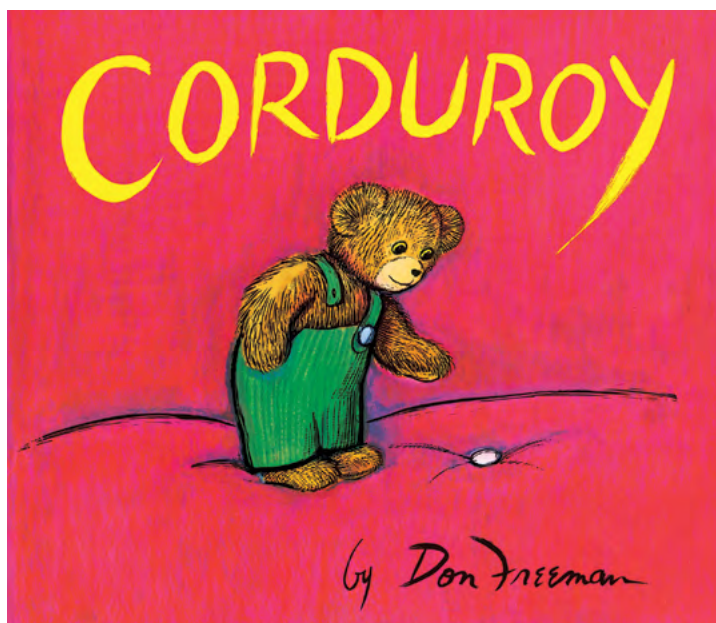
I asked one of my high school students what action he would take if he led a school district. He responded, "I'd make sure everyone had a friend. I attended two different middle schools and never felt I was wanted or belonged."

In June, my brother Stuart and sister-in-law Jennifer returned from Masuda Middle School's orientation beaming with gratitude with how impactful our event was. He recalled when he and his wife started middle school (Masuda is where they first met and where he later proposed), they had to figure it out on their own. He raved how FVSD now provides this welcome night for all three of our middle schools where we connect incoming 6th graders with staff and students. The parents and their child experience the campus together as a family unit and get to meet the principal, counselors, and teachers. Additionally, the week before school starts our 6th graders will get a half-day introduction to campus and an 8th grader will call home and speak with every 6th grader so they have a friend before the first day of school.

Transitioning to middle school doesn't have to be an anxiety-filled experience. The real learning loss of the Covid era is the loss of connection, manners, and belonging. As leaders, we must live out the story of Corduroy; a teddy bear who is missing a button and stuck on a shelf feeling

unwanted, craving a friend to love and a place to belong, until a little girl buys him, takes him home and sews on a button, elevating Corduroy from his loneliness by leading with love.

To welcome our former FVSD students to high school, I gave 200 of them a Corduroy card with an actual wooden button attached with this message, "Let this button remind you that you matter, you belong, and you have a friend and home here. Love you big, giant, much!"



Seeing my niece, Lily, and her parents excited about starting 6th grade, I know FVSD is closer to ensuring my student's wish of everyone having a friend and a button of belonging.

Tips to a Safe and Fun Summer!

The summer season brings the hot sun, trips to the pool and beaches, and fireworks lighting up the night sky. This summer, keep these safety tips top of mind, so your family can enjoy the fun, while staying happy and healthy.

Sun Safety

- Apply sunscreen 30 minutes before going outside and continue to reapply every two hours. For infants, avoid using sunscreen and dress them in lightweight sun protective clothing that breathes and covers their arms and legs. For babies six to twelve months, apply sunscreen with SPF 30 or higher with broad spectrum protection.
- Dress kids in wide-brimmed hats.

Water Safety

- Never leave your child in the water without adult supervision, no matter how shallow the water.
- Enroll your child in formal swimming lessons to reduce the risk of drowning.
- Wear properly fitted U.S. Coast Guard-approved personal flotation devices, like life jackets.

Pedestrian Safety

- Look left-right-left and behind for traffic before crossing the road.
- Cross in marked crosswalks, at intersections or where drivers expect pedestrians.
- Walk focused and alert.

Bug Safety

- Avoid areas where insects nest or congregate, such as stagnant pools of water.
- The CDC recommendation for children older than 2-months-of-age is to use insect repellents containing 10% to 30% DEET, but do not use DEET on children younger than 2-months-old.
- When outside in the evenings, cover up with long-sleeved shirts, pants and socks.

Firework Safety

- Soak all fireworks before throwing them away.
- Keep sparklers away from your child's face, hair and clothing.

Q. My 10-year-old son only wants to stay indoors, play video games and eat chips and the like. He doesn't like sports. I'm trying to get him outdoors and moving but he complains about the heat. Any ideas on how to get him away from becoming a couch potato and away from the TV?

A. There are plenty of programs that your son might like such as swimming, drawing, painting, camping, making pottery, volunteering at a pet shelter, cooking, graphic design for kids, etc. The whole idea is to get him into a scheduled activity three to five days a week. Some of the facilities where the activities take place have lunch served to the kids. It's usually a pretty healthy one at that. They should give you a weekly copy of them. If not, ask for one. Some programs allow kids to bring their lunch. This means that he will be eating less of the bad things and more of the good. He might even decide that eating fruit is a good break from chips. If your son can find something he likes and can participate in it with a friend, he'll be more willing to stick with it, especially if there's no pressure to be a super star. This will also give him less time to play video games or to watch TV.

Are You Disconnected?

This is one of the most difficult times there has ever been to be a parent. The extreme use of media and extended challenges of the pandemic have changed our children; thus, the way they need to be parented. And some needs of children never change.

All children need to feel connected. Can you see the difference between, "You're a good friend!" And "I really needed someone to talk to last night, thanks for being there." Instead of talking at children, talk to them; look into their eyes, be with them and listen. Since children often require constant attention, it is totally appropriate to say, "I want to hear what you have to say, and (cooking) needs my full attention right now. I'm turning the timer for 15 minutes. When you hear it ring, come and I will listen!"

Read to your children every night. Eat dinner together as a family. Play games together. Go on outings together. Don't talk on your cell phone in the car, talk to them. This precious time of being the architect of a child's life is very short. There are no re-runs in the parenting game; connect with your children so they feel valued and appreciated.

Construction Coming to an End

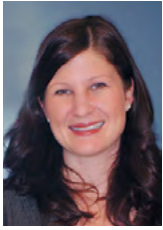

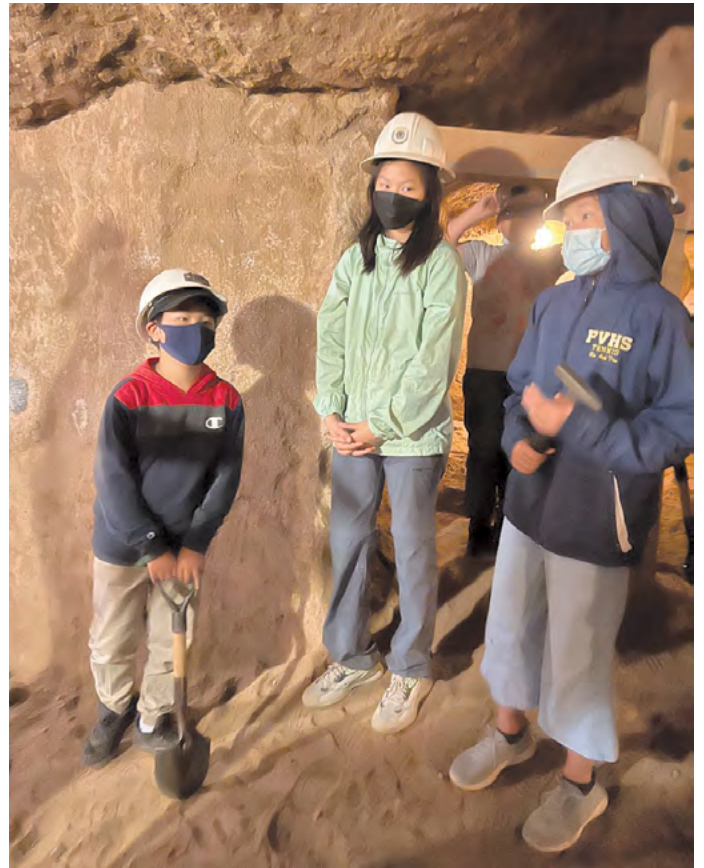
