#### Huntington Beach Union High School District – A Top Workplace in Orange County

Huntington Beach Union High School District (HBUHSD) has cause to celebrate! We learned at the beginning of this school year that one of our employees nominated our district as a Top Workplace in Orange County, sponsored by the Orange County Register. In December, it was announced that we received the second-place award in the category of large companies (those that have more than 500 employees). More than 18,000 employees from 111 companies across Orange County responded anonymously to the Top Workplaces survey. Workplace Dynamics analyzed 19 questions encompassing six factors in a workplace: Pay and Benefits; Managers; Conditions; Execution; Career; and Direction.

According to the OC Register's annual Top Workplaces survey, the Huntington Beach Union High School District earned the No. 1 spot on the issue of Meaningfulness. The district also earned the top spot in the Special Awards Opportunities category.

Of the 14 organizations ranked in the large employer category, the district ranked No. 1 in Pay and Benefits with employees indicating they felt their benefits package is good compared with others in the industry. Employees gave high marks to the district in the Conditions factor. They feel genuinely appreciated and have

The Westminster School District has big plans for its three middle schools. Thanks to the funding provided by a bond measure that voters passed, Johnson, Stacey and Warner Middle Schools will undergo major transformations that will enhance the quality of education our students receive.

First, a Priority Planning Committee established guiding principles to be used in the development of all plans for Measure O projects. These six guiding principles are a shared reflection of our vision, values and dreams for the children in our district.

- Provide 21st Century Learning Environments.
- · Develop Schools as Centers of Community.
- Promote Safe and Healthy Schools and Lifestyles.
- Facilitate Exploration as the Key Component of Learning.
- Value Stewardship and Accountability in all Activities.
- Promote Staff Development and Collaboration.

Secondly, an Exploration Committee that consisted of teachers, support staff and principals convened to brainstorm about the

ways they thought we could improve the educational experiences of our students. Teams of people made site visits to some of the most innovative and impressive schools in Southern California. The Exploration Committee ultimately created a wish list of things they would like to have at their schools. Then our architect and builder combined the guiding principles and wish list to develop plans within our budget for our middle school expansion and remodel.

Each middle school renovation will have four basic components: a new gymnasium/multi-purpose room, a resource center, an exploration building and a variety of site enhancements.

The gymnasium/multi-purpose room will include indoor and outdoor learning areas. The indoor area will be 100' x 120' and will have seating for 1,500. In addition to basketball courts and a performance/lecture stage, it will have a fitness studio, drama studio and music studio.

The Resource Center will include a state-of-the-art library, media center, work spaces for small groups or large teams and a contemporary food services wing.



The Orange County Department of Education (OCDE) Deaf and Hard of Hearing (D/HH) Program guarantees access to quality education in a regional setting for students who are Deaf and Hard of Hearing. Venado Middle School and University High School are located in Irvine, and the Career Adult Program and vocational program is based in Costa Mesa. Together, these three programs serve over 135 deaf students in grades 7-12. Students from every school district in the county attend the program. At University High School and Venado Middle School, students have the opportunity to be mainstreamed in general education classes.

Along with a rigorous academic course of study, our OCDE staff provides students with many extracurricular activities. Venado Middle School students have been busy with a "Reading Counts" competition, and this month six students were recognized and rewarded for their ardent reading with a lunch trip to McDonalds. In addition, the students are getting ready to participate in a school-wide track and field competition.

Through grant funding, both Venado Middle School and University High School students have had the opportunity to take art lessons. Laguna Beach artist David Milton has been working with the students on watercolors, and their work will be exhibited in the Kalmus art gallery at OCDE in the near future.

University High School students competed in the Southern California Basketball and Cheerleading Tournament in Los Angeles in April 2010 and had a great experience. The basketball team won the championship and the cheerleaders took second place. University High School's Deaf Academic Bowl team competed in the National Finals in Washington, D.C. to defend their national title. The team had a wonderful experience and placed in the top ten deaf programs in the nation. Every year University High School has participated in this competition, the team has had a top ten finish.

During recent meetings at the National Technical Institute of the Deaf, a College of the Rochester Institute of Technology in New York, Deaf and Hard of Hearing Principal Jon Levy had the opportunity to have dinner with three OCDE graduates from the Deaf and Hard of Hearing Program. The students are a wonderful example of the success and achievement that Deaf and Hard of Hearing students can achieve with support and dedication. Two of the students are getting Master's Degrees in Information Technology and the third is a freshman majoring in Astrophysics.

Students in the Career Adult Program (CAP) are also doing well. In addition to learning how to find and rent an apartment, they are learning how to develop a budget. They are also working on functional academics and studying for their driving tests. At the same time, all of the students participate in job site internships. The internships are based in a variety of retail settings, including a flower store, an auto body repair shop, and a drugstore. CAP students are looking forward to transitioning to adulthood and paid employment.

It is very gratifying to have this wonderful OCDE program that is bringing so much student success and pride while ensuring that Orange County delivers a world class education where every student succeeds.

was bullied as a youth because he was different. Tears flowed from students and staff as Jon broke down and cried, as if reliving the events for the first




time. He challenged

#### **Learning in Two Languages**



When I first began teaching, I heard one of Hap Palmer's award-winning recordings in one of my methodology classes—I can still picture the little chalkboard drawings on the album's dust jacket. I thought, hey, I can just let this guy teach my whole class with these songs.

Hap Palmer's first recording, Learning Basic Skills through Music, was released in 1969. Over 40 years later, Mr. Palmer is still singing, playing musical instruments and teaching teachers how to teach basic skills through music and movement. The only changes from the early years are the CD format and the brightly


colored pictures on the booklets. His latest release, Learning in Two Languages, teaches clothing, opposites, days of the week, colors, directionality, body awareness and adverbs in paired English/Spanish versions of songs, delightfully performed by Mr. Palmer and a band of accomplished studio musicians. The instrumental tracks for each number are included in the last section, to use when children have learned the words. The songs are perfect for assemblies, teaching language at home, and second-language classes in either language, and production quality is as excellent as the CD's contents—during "What Is This Sound?" I rushed to answer a nonexistent doorbell and the cats perked up at a *meow* from the speakers.

Mr. Palmer's coupling of music with body movement, or Total Physical Response (TPR), is a long-recognized best practice for teaching language development: "If you're wearing pants, stand up. If you have any pockets, stand up." The familiar sequence of days of the week gets an additional boost from the idea that the week doesn't stop at Saturday—or Sunday in Spanish—but starts over again. In "What do the Animals Say?" Mr. Palmer cleverly teaches the importance of listening by singing, "But the rabbit says nothing—it just listens, listens, listens."





#### **PTA President Makes History**

The Westminster School District has a new PTA Council President this year. Her name is Nancy Nguyen and she is the very first Vietnamese-American PTA President in the United States. We are honored that this distinction has been realized in our District and we are very proud of Nancy who has already immersed herself in her job and is working dili-

gently for our students. I chatted with Nancy recently and her answers to my questions will help you get to know a little bit about her.

How long have you been involved in the PTA? I've been involved with the WSD PTA for six years and spent two years as the President of the PTA at Webber Elementary.

How many children do you have in the District? I have two children, a son and a daughter. My son is in high school now and my daughter is a 7th grader at Stacey.

What motivated you to take on the challenges of leading the PTA for the district? Well, when I was one of the people nominated for PTA President by other PTA members, my children were very excited. I had been actively involved in other programs they were in and they really encouraged me to go for this leadership position. My children had more confidence in me than I had in myself. So, I guess first and foremost, I'm doing this for my kids.

What is your main focus for the WSD PTA this year? There are several areas that we are focusing on including student attendance, punctuality, safety and health and wellbeing. Encouraging good attendance is important so that we may maximize funding for our district. The district loses about \$30 for each child that is absent for any reason. During these extremely tough budget times, we need to preserve the funding that we have access to. Reminding parents about the importance of sleep and proper nutrition for their child is also important. If a child is not well rested or has not had breakfast, they are not really ready to learn. And, of course student safety is always a priority. We are always trying to improve drop-off and pick-up procedures at our schools and overall parking lot safety.

How did you find out that you are the first Vietnamese-American in the country to be a Council PTA President? I had a feeling I might be the first one, so I did a little research on the internet first and I could not find any other Vietnamese-American PTA Presidents. Then, in October I went to a PTA conference in Ontario and I met Jo Loss, the California PTA President and she confirmed that I am the first Vietnamese-American PTA President in the United States, which is such an honor for me and my family.

Does this honor give you an added sense of responsibility? Yes, it is exciting to be forging new ground and making advances on behalf of the Vietnamese-American community. Approximately 40 percent of the students in our district are Vietnamese-American and I want to be a good role model for them.

Is there anything like a PTA in Vietnam? To be honest, I don't know. I came to the United States when I was 10 years old and before I left Vietnam I was home-schooled by my parents and grandmother. However, the Vietnamese place a very high value on education both here and in Vietnam.

What does the WSD PTA need most right now? More parent involvement. We'd like to see more parents in the classroom, outside the classroom or helping in any way they can. One of the specific challenges that we face with Vietnamese-American parents in particular is that they are reluctant to take an active role in their child's education because they consider teachers or educators the "experts" and they don't want to interfere. We need to change the way parents look at the parent/school relationship and get them to think of it as a "partnership."


included marine life, life cycles, and completed fish dissections utilizing state-ofthe-art scientific oceanographic research equipment.


#### **Reading Buddies**

#### **Being a Good Board Member**

Being a school board trustee is a rewarding and challenging job. It takes an entire community of dedicated, hard working individuals to educate our students and the school board's role is to ensure that happens. To that end we make plans and policy, oversee and direct. Sometimes it's a balancing act, sometimes it's making a tough decision, but always, it's with what's good for kids in mind. A newly elected trustee recently asked if I had any advice. My recommendations ranged from the broad to the specific and I present them here in no specific ranked order:

**Listen:** Be open to many points of view and when contacted by the public, staff, parents or students let them know that you have heard them. In conversation be sure to confirm your understanding of what you have heard by mirroring a condensed version of their statement. Many times people just want to be heard and an honest, open conversation can go a long way to really get to the heart of their concerns. Thank them for their input and convey what steps you plan to take going forward. Be wary of making promises.

Be Fair: By listening and gathering as much information as possible there is a much better chance that a reasonable, fair opinion can be formed. There are always many sides to an issue and exploring all of them not only aids in understanding but can sometimes lead to unexpected forms of resolution. Be open and unbiased, thoughtful and deliberative, but realize that you can't always make everyone happy all of the time.

**Read:** A good board member is well informed and, therefore, well prepared. There is a lot of information that board members must process; from budget analysis to curriculum standards and now, with technology, so many new ways to access it. Just be sure to do your homework! There is a steady stream of printed material crossing my desk, not to mention emails. And speaking of emails...

Be careful with emails: They are a printed record and subject to subpoena. As wonderful as email can be, providing instant accessibility and virtual anonymity, it can also be instantly disastrous. Some school districts have made the mistake of using email to communicate internally and externally only to find themselves in the newspaper the next morning. Which brings me to...

Stay out of the newspaper (except *School News*): It's great when our districts are recognized in the newspaper for our accomplishments, but more often than not that's not what makes "news." It's unfortunate to read about the troubles that students must face and horrible accidents and parents' nightmares and I am thankful every time it's not our district. Someone once said "any publicity is good publicity." I do not agree.

Being a good board member is something to strive for and work toward. It takes dedication, patience, and a lot of time. Sometimes the hours are long, the thanks are few, but the reward in making a difference in the lives of our students will last a lifetime.

Why offer a pharmacy technician program? The short answer:



In the Orange County area, pharmacy technician is the fourth fastest growing occupation that does not require a degree (based on Employment Development Department labor market data). By targeting resources toward programs such as this one, HBAS provides students with the training they need to find jobs and compete in this tough labor market.

So what do pharmacy technicians do? Working under the direct supervision and control of a licensed pharmacist, they perform repetitive, basic

routine tasks related to the processing of prescriptions in a pharmacy. Pharmacy technicians may count tablets; measure, mix, pour, and record amounts and dosages of medications; label bottles; and package pharmaceuticals.

HBAS is also excited about offering more classes in the accounting field. These classes are designed for those working in small business offices. This next session, you'll see new classes such as Accounting 1 and 2, Accounting for the Tax Season, Finance for the Non-Financial Manager, and QuickBooks 1 and 2. Students can pick and choose which classes to take, but it is recommended that Accounting 1 be the first class taken. Accounting skills are becoming more important in small offices, as employees are asked to do more and more during these difficult economic times.

#### **Innovations and Collaboration**

Innovation distinguishes between a leader and a follower. —Steve Jobs

When someone hears Marina High School, the word innovation comes to mind. We are a leader in our district in providing engaging opportunities for students to learn beyond the textbook. Our teachers at Marina strive to find new ways to connect the concepts in meaningful ways for the students. Our mathematics department has been at the forefront of providing these opportunities.

Approximately six years ago, an innovation emerged at Marina High School called Co-Lab. These classes were a response to data that indicated that some of our students were not getting enough support to be successful in the state-required classes. The administration at that time looked at what resources were available. The best resource was human capital. Special education and general education teachers were paired up to team-teach the content. Using this configuration allowed the teachers to reduce the net student-teacher ratio, creating more opportunities to work one-on-one with these students. According to teacher Mike Grasse, the first two departments to embrace this new innovation were mathematics and social science. As the program evolved, the departments housing Co-Lab classes increased to include science and English.

Given the state requirement for Algebra I and the conceptual standards that are too difficult for some students to acquire, the special education and mathematics departments as well as the administration decided that Algebra I would be the most logical strand of mathematics on which to focus resources. These classes provide the additional support necessary for our students to develop the concepts needed to not only meet the state requirements but also to help students to understand that they can do mathematics as well as apply the concepts to real-life situations. The innovation has been so successful at Marina that, in 2009, the district directed all sites to add these classes to their campus as a way to support student learning.



#### Auto-Matic Algebra Connection

"During my sophomore year, I was in an algebra class taught by Mr. Grasse and Mr. Merickel," said senior Jake St. Clair. "The two teachers worked together to motivate me to complete and understand the material. They connected the algebra concepts with my personal interests of cars and music to make it a meaningful learning experience. The personal attention that I was able to receive from Mr. Grasse

helped me to stay focused. He consistently made sure I was taking notes and asking questions. He made me feel comfortable to ask the necessary questions for me to understand the algebra material. The best part of the class was I knew they cared about me learning the material."

Another area where our mathematics department has taken the lead is in our Advanced Placement Calculus BC course. Our mathematics students enjoy applying their knowledge of integrals by creating a physical model of an object, such as a character from Star Wars. According to AP Calculus BC teacher Rick Boogar, "these semester projects have proven to be an integral component in helping students visualize calculus in space." These projects are truly an application of the algebra, geometry and trigonometry they learned throughout the years. This project gives meaning to the otherwise paper-pencil process of integrating a function.

At Marina, we have fostered an innovative environment. This has allowed us to stay the leader in creating a place where students have a meaningful learning experience as well as a place where teachers are able to try new ideas that help students.

#### **A Bountiful Harvest**

Harvest of the Month is a new program at VVHS that started in September. Nancy Wikes, district Nutrition Specialist, had met with VVHS's Foods Teacher, Kathi Richey, and Health Teacher, Brandon Futagaki, and myself last Spring to describe the purpose and benefits of the program, and to plan for implementation in the 2010-2011 academic year. The goal of the program is to introduce new fruits and vegetables to our students to encourage them to make healthier eating choices by providing a sample of a different fruit or vegetable every month for each VVHS student. The program

is intended to enhance student health and well being and lead to better attendance and academic performance.

Teachers receive information cards that enable them to share pertinent information with their class while they enjoy that month's fruit or vegetable. One interesting presentation, called "Rethink Your Drink", demonstrated how much sugar is in a soft drink or power drink. Many students were very surprised to learn that they would consume over 50 lbs. of sugar in one year by drinking just one soda per day. Ms. Wikes also works with our teen parents, addressing the nutritional needs of both our new mothers and their children. Our math teachers had their students calculate how much activity it takes to burn off the calories they consume. Students had to determine how many calories there were in a 10 ounce serving of fried versus baked snack foods, the origin of the calories, and how the serving related to the recommended daily range of

calories for each macronutrient. Our English teachers are preparing to introduce research projects about nutrition related topics.

In September, students were already well acquainted with apples. In October, a few students were surprised to find that pumpkins were more than a Halloween decoration or pie filling. November brought persimmons to campus, an exotic fruit that most students and staff had never tasted. Pears were a popular treat in December. Coming months will feature fresh Mandarin oranges, sweet potatoes, cabbage, asparagus, and the program will conclude with avocados in May.

Harvest of the Month is a healthy and fun snack for the whole school. Students like the program, and several report that it has led to better food shopping and nutrition at home. The teachers have strongly supported this program with innovative, applied curricula. An important indirect benefit is that the entire school, all the students, teachers, and staff, share in the experience at the same time on the same day each month. The talk around campus on "Harvest Day" is positive and upbeat. Harvest of the Month builds stronger students through better nutrition, and school spirit too.

The Exploration Building will be a two-story structure that will emphasize creativity, technology and science.

Perhaps the most significant site enhancements will be our commitment to "going green." A green school is a building or facility that creates a healthy environment that is conducive to learning while conserving energy, resources and money. An environmental site assessment was conducted at each school. Water efficiency, energy and atmosphere, materials and resources, and indoor environmental quality was analyzed. The new designs for our middle schools promise to be environmentally friendly while conserving resources.

Measure O is a \$130 million bond measure. However, when a bond measure passes the money is not received all at once. At this time, we have \$65 million to work with and we decided to focus on our middle schools first because eventually all of the students in our district will go through our middle schools and benefit from these improvements. We are extremely excited about the out-of-the-box


