Curriculum + Skills = College/Career Readiness and Common Core!

We know from David Conley and others that college and career readiness skills have "significant overlap." Ocean View teachers and staff believe that statement is true, so we are training our students for what is next, whether it's enrolling in college or pursuing their career in the world of work.

College/career readiness can be measured by what classes are on a student's transcript, how many Advanced Placement (AP) tests they take, what their ACT or SAT score is, etc. We also believe college/career-ready students should be able to think critically, collaborate, innovate, persevere, and show how they have achieved knowledge and skills. Success in college and work is not easy!

In fact, many college classes have a project or signature assignment that asks students to reflect on what they learned and how they built skill in a particular area. How do we know? We asked our recent graduates to reflect on what they found they needed to know when they entered college and how Ocean View helped them learn it. Students told us the exercise of choosing what work to reflect upon to show growth was something they wished they had more practice doing while in high school. So, what if we created a signature project all students

had to produce before they graduated that focused on how well they learned those five skills: critical thinking, collaboration, innovation, perseverance, and achievement? We did! It's called the e-Folio!

The idea behind the e-Folio is for students to create a repository for their important work throughout all four years of high school and then choose some exemplary samples which show evidence of growth in the areas they choose to highlight. Students reflect on what they have learned and show evidence of their growth in an extended reflection called "My Academic Journey." In addition, students create a resume and must present an evidence section, which includes classwork, homework, and special projects, that they used in their reflection. In order to create the e-Folio, students need to know how to use many applications in their Google Suite, which every district student has.

This summer, we wanted to create a way for our e-Folio to be fully

electronic, to reflect how students have learned critical thinking, collaboration, innovation, perseverance and achievement. We knew we needed to train our students. In mid-October we started classes for what we call the Student Google Challenge. We are taking cohorts of students by grade and teaching them how to access our Parent/Student Portal, their schoolissued G-Mail account, how to create a Google Doc(ument), how to create folders, how to upload to their Google Drive, how share Google Docs, and how to create their own senior portfolio Web sites. Here's the best thing. Many of our classified staff—clerks, secretaries, guidance specialists, and our registrar—are teaching the Google Challenge classes to the students on our earlyrelease days while teachers are engaged in their staff development. We also have district information technology support on our campus during the trainings.

It's a true team effort, and I'm glad we are out in front, making this part of our cultural curriculum—a college level, Common Core State Standards, whole-class, signature assignment! The bottom line is, Ocean View teaches its students to be college and career ready through curriculum AND skill building—both essential to college and career success!

Could you be diabetic and not know it?

Most people have heard of diabetes. You might even know someone who has the disease, which affects more than 26 million people in the United States. What you might not know is that about seven million of these diabetics do not even know they are sick.

Diabetes develops when the pancreas does not make enough insulin (Type 1) or the body cannot use its own insulin as well as it should (Type 2). This causes sugars to build up in the blood and can lead to serious health problems, including heart disease, blindness, kidney failure, lower-extremity amputations and even death. Between 90 and 95percent of all people who have been diagnosed with diabetes have Type 2.

One of the reasons diabetes goes undiagnosed in so many people is that Type 2 diabetes develops slowly. Many people

will have this form of diabetes for as long as 10 years without noticing any symptoms of the disease, which may appear harmless and may vary from person to person. These symptoms include:

- increased thirst
- flu-like symptoms

- frequent urination • weight gain or loss
- blurred vision
- slow-healing sores or frequent infestions • red, swollen, tender gums.
- nerve damage

Diabetes risk factors include being overweight, family history, inactive lifestyle, increasing age, genetics, high blood cholesterol and high blood pressure. If you have risk factors for diabetes and are experiencing any of the signs and symptoms of the disease, see your doctor immediately. Do not assume your doctor will automatically test you for diabetes. Doctors do not usually screen for diabetes during routine visits.

There is currently no cure for diabetes. However, the disease can be managed by monitoring blood sugar levels (The American Diabetes Association recommends an A1C goal of <7%) and maintaining a healthy lifestyle comprised of diet, exercise and a healthy weight. Medications may also be used when these treatments are not sufficient. Diabetics who follow these treatments can often lead relatively normal lives.

WHAT'S YOUR NUMBER?

If you have diabetes you may know about A1C. A1C tells you the average level of glucose (sugar) in your blood over 2-3 months.

Good control of your glucose reduces the risk for vascular complications occurring in your eyes, kidneys, heart, nerves, digestive system, circulatory system and sexual organs. The American Diabetes Association recommends an A1C goal of <7%.

"Sit down and eat something," you insist. But as quickly as he emerged from his room, he is already out the front door. "Can't eat! I'm late!" his voice trails behind him.

Sound all too familiar? As a parent, you may be worried that your child has not eaten since last night's dinner and will not be eating until noon, and with good reason. Studies have shown that students who eat breakfast are more attentive in class, perform higher on exams, and are less likely to be absent from

school due to illness. Eating a good, healthy breakfast simply provides a great start to the day. For our "on-the-go" students, try one of the following:

- Whole-grain breads, cereals, muffins, pancakes or rolls

More children and teens are being diagnosed with type 2 diabetes than ever before. Experts say it is directly related to the rapidly increasing number of overweight kids. Today, the American Diabetes Association estimates that 1 out of every 6 kids have pre-diabetes a collection of risk factors that often leads to type 2 diabetes.

Identify the Warning Signs of Type 2 Diabetes

- Excessive thirst
- Blurred vision
 Tiredness or fatigue
- Frequent infections Slow-to-heal cuts and sores
- Frequent urination (including bedwetting
- Acanthosis nigricans (AN)—a darkening of the skin around the neck or under the arms

Taking Steps to Prevent Type 2 Diabetes

The best way to help reduce your kids' risk for developing type 2 diabetes and other associated health problems is to make healthy lifestyle changes. These work best if they involve the entire family, and will benefit everyone.

- Eat a healthy diet. Encouraging your kids to eat low-fat, nutrient-rich foods like whole-grain cereals and breads, fruits, vegetables, dairy products, and lean proteins — can help prevent excessive weight gain.
- Limit sugary foods and beverages. Consuming lots of sugar-filled foods and beverages — like sodas, juices, and iced teas — also can lead to excessive
- Make physical activity a daily part of life. The more energy your child burns, the better his body uses insulin. An hour or so of lively physical activity every day is a good goal.
- Reduce screen time. The time your child spends watching TV, surfing the Internet, and playing video games should be kept to a limit. The risk of obesity increases when your child watches more than two hours of TV per day.

Violence Prevention and Safe Schools

October 20 – 26, 2013 is America's Safe Schools Week and a time to reflect on the essential component of safety in the daily operation of schools. Students, families, and school staff have a right to expect their schools to be safe havens. In response to the Sandy Hook tragedy and other incidents of violence in the nation, there has been a renewed call to protect children and create safer school climates. Proposed solutions include, hiring additional school resource officers, counselors, and mental health professionals, and promoting collaboration between schools and law enforcement in developing comprehensive emergency plans, which include hands-on training.

A shining example of making school safety a priority in our county is the School Assessment Project, which is a partnership between the Orange County Sheriff's Department and the Orange County Department of Education (OCDE). This united effort, which is unprecedented in our state, will focus on collecting data from all schools, including emergency plans, evacuation routes, maps, and other details that will be provided to first responders during school emergencies. The Orange County Intelligence Assessment Center, a division of the Sheriff's Department, will work closely with local law enforcement agencies and OCDE to collect the data and provide feedback to schools regarding their emergency plans. This collaboration between school officials and local police will strengthen protocols for school safety across the county.

The California State Board of Education recognizes that a beginning step toward safer schools is the development of a comprehensive plan for school safety by every public school and district in the state. This plan includes making schools safer not only by enhancing their physical security and making

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

UCLA's Anderson School economic forecast for September stated that people who invested in skills important to last century's growth sectors soon discovered that these did not match the current workplace demands. It stated that, "Those sectors which are producing the job growth in California now require a different set of skills."

Schools with the resources needed to provide an enriched, future-oriented education to every student, and which enable the use of technology to keep skills current, are essential to a strong local economy. At the Fountain Valley Educational Foundation,

our mission is to, "enrich each Fountain Valley student's academic experience by providing cutting-edge technology and the resources to inspire them to think, to create and to achieve."

Despite recent increases, state funding per pupil in Fountain Valley remains \$543 less than in 2007–2008. One sacrifice was in not replacing the teachers' desktop computers, of which 85 percent are now over four years old.

We're behind in educational technology for students as well. Within Orange County, our school district scores at the very top of the 13 elementary school districts on the state standards tests, but is dead last in state per-pupil funding.

To provide an education that enables continual adaptation to increasing skill demands, our Foundation must attain its vision of, "A community united in support of educational excellence to empower our next generation of creators, innovators and visionaries."

Technology EXPLOSION!

After reading this headline, you are probably a little worried that a computer blew up in a classroom or our computer lab fell victim to some vicious cyber attack. However, rest assured, the "technology explosion" I am referring to is actually quite positive.

This summer, 19 Courreges Elementary School teachers wrote grant applications to various organizations, including Donor's Choose and the Huntington Beach Assistance League (HBAL). I am happy to report that just last month these teachers accepted over \$10,000 in grant funding from these various organizations,

with \$7,500 coming directly from HBAL. The support of these organizations has helped further our goal of increasing students' access to educational technology in the classroom. Thanks to the HBAL alone, we now have 10 additional electronic tablets, four netbooks, and two e-readers, not to mention additional materials for science kits and experiments.

In addition to HBAL's support, our PTA recently donated \$7,500 toward 10 new mini tablets, a new tablet docking station, and a laptop computer to serve as the "motherboard."

The Fountain Valley School District has also stepped in by piloting a 1:1 technology enhancement program in two of our third-grade classrooms, allowing all 60 students to have their own netbooks for the school year.

As you can see, thanks to the generous support from so many organizations inside and outside our school community, Courreges is well on its way to providing students with the needed technology to access curriculum, resources, and the 21st-century skills that will be needed in the future.

We certainly welcome and appreciate this "technology explosion!"

Part of the program includes field trips such as the Remotely Operated Vehicle (ROV) Ocean Institute Sea Floor Explorer Program and the Solar Decathlon.

Supporting the Common Core at School and at Home

Educators get asked all the time "What is the Common Core?" In a nutshell, the Common Core State Standards (CCSS) are all about thinking deeply, integrating learning, and providing evidence to explain reasoning. Let's take these three ideas and break them down a little.

Thinking Deeply: The CCSS emphasize critical thinking. They require students to analyze more, discuss more, evaluate more, and be able to explain their thinking, often in writing.

Integrated Learning: The CCSS emphasize integrated learning across disciplines. They require students to be able to look at a situation or problem from multiple perspectives and use that information to come up with solutions.

Providing Evidence: The CCSS emphasize "showing what you know" by providing proof and evidence. It's no longer enough to just get the right answer. Students are now required to support their answers with evidence.

Having students practice thinking deeply is as easy as a few questions over dinner or to and from school. First ask "Why?" Have your student explain why he or she believes something. Explain and discuss issues or problems in your house, neighborhood, and community.

At the heart the CCSS movement is the desire to better prepare our students to be competitive in a global economy. The Spring View Elementary School staff is excited about the challenge ahead of us, and we believe the transition to the CCSS will give our students the edge they deserve heading into the future.

sure they are prepared to respond to emergencies, but also by creating safer and more nurturing school climates that help prevent school violence.

According to the California Department of Education (CDE) publication, Safe Schools: A Planning Guide for Action, school safety encompasses two components, school climate, and physical environment. CDE developed a Seven-Step Planning Process for Safe and Effective Schools, which intertwine the requirements into a complete plan for school wide safety and effectiveness.

Seven-Step Planning Process for Safe and Effective Schools

- 1. Include school staff, parents, students, and the community on the planning committee.
- 2. Create a vision of your school as a place where students are safe to learn. Integrate the safe school vision with the mission statement for the school.
- 3. Gather and analyze data(examples include: California Healthy Kids survey, suspension data, police reports, and surveys conducted with students, staff, and parents focusing on issues related to safety).
 - 4. Identify areas of desired change and assess resources available to attain goals.
- 5. Promote strategies and identify activities and programs to implement (examples of programs: drug and alcohol abuse prevention, gang risk intervention, and bullying prevention).
- 6. Communicate the safety plan to parents, students, staff, and community
- 7. Evaluate progress and revise the plan as needed to ensure that goals are achieved.



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The Orange County Department of Education (OCDE) offers several programs to improve school safety, culture, and climate, and to assist in developing and maintaining Safe School Plans. Programs include Safe from the Start, Conflict Resolution, Gang Prevention, Peer Assistance Leadership, Friday Night Live, and Mental Health Services. Through the CDE School Law Enforcement Partnership Grant, administered through Kern County Office of Education, OCDE offers no cost workshops on Bullying Prevention, Crisis Response training, and Safe School Planning.

Quebecois poet and songwriter Gilles Vigneault has created a multi-layered literary experience in A Gift for Sophie. The storybook with primitive watercolor illustrations by Stéphane Jorisch and a music CD set comprise a tale of friendship across the ages. Seven-year-old Sophie loves to draw and share her art with her best friend and soul mate, Emilio, and her ancient greatuncle, Tom. The gifts Sophie receives from these dear people tie in to the wisdom that "Old Man Tom," as he is known, passes on to his little niece when he passes on himself. Sophie comes

to understand and use this wisdom in a delightful way when she and Emilio encounter a mystery.

The story, translated from the original French, is told in a lilting, evocative manner. The narrative on the CD carries the engagement further—the songs are grouped at the end and so don't interrupt the storyline; instead, they peel back the layers of each character or incident to reveal its essence. The musicians and artists, including Canadian folkrock singer Martha Wainwright, expose the story's undercurrent with voice, woodwind, accordion, and



all sorts of string and percussion. Melody lines transport the listeners to a café in southern France, the center of a folk dance, the psyche of a cat.

A Gift for Sophie evoked in me all of this and also a nostalgic memory from across my own years: me on the floor next to my little suitcase 78 rpm player listening to records about Tubby the Tuba, Peter and the Wolf, and the Churkendoose, reading the storybooks that accompanied them. See what this lovely set does for you.

Third-Grade Multiplication Week

Third-grade math can be daunting for students. They are expected to deepen their understanding of place value and their understanding of and skill with addition, subtraction, multiplication and division of whole numbers. This includes memorizing to automaticity the multiplication table for numbers between 1 and 10—Eastwood students go to 12—using the inverse relationship of multiplication and division to compute and check results and solve simple problems involving multiplication of multidigit numbers by one-digit numbers.

This year, in order to assist students in the acquisition of these skills, Eastwood third-grade teachers have designed an entire week around the concept of multiplication. Students will be immersed in multiplication during English language arts, math, art and music. Every day, students will have a timed fact-mastery test, a lesson on "tricks" for learning the multiplication facts, flashcard practice, reading instruction with literature books containing multiplication themes, multiplication spelling words, multiplication vocabulary words, a daily multiplication writing activity, centers for word-problem solving, a multiplication art activity, multiplication music and last but not least, factmastery games.

At week's end, each student will leave campus with a personal book of multiplication groups—e.g., 9 is the number in the lineup on a baseball team, the number of planets in the solar system, the lives of a cat and holes of golf and their own set of 48 fact families on triangle flash cards. Students will have a deeper understanding of multiplication and will have memorized their number facts.

Collaboration at the Preschool Level

Working in groups with peers isn't just something we teach our preschoolers. We as teachers and staff do it on a professional level, too. Land School comprises five special-day classes, one Early Start program, one blended preschool classroom and 12 general-education preschool classrooms. We utilize and blend an RTI (Response to Intervention) model, which includes individualized learning strategies, and a Positive Behavior Intervention and Support

(PBIS) model to support our students both with and without Individualized Education Plans (IEPs) in reaching their full academic and social-emotional potentials. We have a Child Success Team comprising early-learning and RTI specialists who have open lines of communication with our special education staff; we invite them to give input and collaborate with general-education teachers on a regular basis. Together, we develop SMART (specific, measurable, attainable, realistic, timely) goals for at-risk students and collaborate on other effective Tier I and Tier II intervention strategies for students who struggle academically or behaviorally within their classrooms.

In short, our teachers and specialists at Land School are in constant contact with one another to draw on resources to help all of our children have successful experiences in their development. For instance, the use of visual schedules, picture icons, social stories and token-reward systems are examples of strategies developed by special education staff but are now used throughout every classroom on our campus. As a result of our collaborative efforts, student achievement has improved and teacher referrals from general education to special education have been greatly reduced!



Common Core State Standards

History teachers often have students identify and discuss what are termed "watershed" events. Watershed is defined as an event or period making a turning point in a course of action... it is a time when an important change happens and thus shifts an established direction. As we look at the landscape of public education, one might say the adoption and implementation of the Common Core State Standards (CCSS) would fit that definition. Schools across the nation are preparing for the evolution of the standards-based instruction movement that began in the 1990s.

The key phrase is "evolution;" the change to CCSS is simply just that.

When the state governors convened and began the talk of Common Core State Standards, they quickly turned to California to find a model of content standards that was both rigorous and had been established and tested. The new CCSS in mathematics and language arts are largely based on the content standards our students and teachers have been using for teaching and learning over the past decade (more than 70 percent in each academic area). While CCSS will have a deeper focus and allow for a greater correlation to college and career, they will still have the same rigor to which our schools are accustomed. Even with the coming curriculum change, the most dynamic research for student achievement still focuses on a teacher providing quality instruction and a student being an engaged learner.

Recently I was able to hear two of our district's very best teachers, Lissie Barro and Kendra Rosales, present to their colleagues on the Common Core. As all great teachers are able to do, the eager audience immediately was taken back to the Latin root of the words: common meaning "shared" and core meaning "heart." Ahh, yes, good teaching at its very best! They used real-world instructional examples in literature and algebra to help explain the concept of that "shared heart." For so many teachers, the CCSS will represent the ability to share the subject matter that is a part of their "personal core." In other words, the daily desire teachers demonstrate to have their students share a passion and a love for learning in the world they find so powerful, this is at the

Over the coming months our district will provide opportunities through Parent University, PTSA, and our district Web site for families to learn more about the CCSS. I know the principals at each of our schools have also made it a priority to communicate with their school communities about what we are learning from our own California State Department of Education. Most recently, the state has decided that in lieu of the traditional Standardized Testing And Reporting (STAR) testing this spring, districts will have a chance to pilot the new form of testing for CCSS known as Smarter Balance.

In our global society, today's students must be prepared to compete in ways that we cannot even fully imagine yet. Something as simple as the iPhone might seem to many as "having always been here." It has been a part of our daily world for less than seven years. The changes in how our students work, interact, think, and collaborate will evolve at a rate that might be difficult to comprehend. I just hope they remember to stop on occasion and remember the special people who brought them into this world...just like we all helped our parents program their state-of-the-art VCRs!

When I wrote this column at the completion of the 2012–2013 school year, I told the story of the two woodsmen and the lesson learned of sharpening the tools in one's tool chest in order to remain current and productive. I suggested that teachers in Huntington Beach Union High School District (HBUHSD) would be busy with lifelong learning and sharpening their teaching skills, that administrators would be refreshing their leadership skills, and that all staff would be preparing for the 2013–2014 school year. It's been a busy time for all of us, including the Board, with learning about and understanding the new state

funding and accountability for education, preparing for Common Core State Standards, and generally retooling for the 2013-2014 school year.

Let me share with you just one of the many examples of our fine staff "sharpening" their tools and continuing their lifelong learning in order to improve their skills and the learning opportunities for our students.

As background, our district is a member of a Joint Powers Agreement with four other districts that form the Coastline Regional Occupation Program (ROP), and at this time I am honored to serve as the HBUHSD Board Representative to the ROP Board.

At the September meeting of the ROP Board, Merry Kim, a staff member of Coastline ROP, shared with the Board information regarding a summer grantfunded project where teachers were funded in an externship experience in industry for their professional development. Eighteen teachers and community college instructors had the opportunity to participate in two projects. Andy Brown, the math facilitator for HBUHSD and a teacher at Westminster High School, participated in the Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) Electric Guitar Making Workshop.

This workshop highlighted the teaching of science, technology, engineering, and math through the design, construction, and analysis of an electric guitar. I would add Art and make the acronym STEAM, as the guitar which Mr. Brown created is artistically beautiful and sounds fabulous.

In addition to the cross-curricular learning strategies, this program created an opportunity for teachers to establish meaningful relationships with business leaders and college instructors. These relationships will likely be maintained and create future opportunities for collaboration, learning, and sharpening of the tools necessary to effectively teach our students. With rigorous and relevant curriculum, hands-on application of the principles implants the principles firmly for our students and supports true learning.

Finally, I have enjoyed sharing thoughts about education with you all over this past year while president of the HBUHSD. Two Big Changes

This quote could well have been said by many students who come to Coast High School, one of several options that are available as an alternative to the typical comprehensive high

Most students matriculate to these large campuses at the beginning of their high school journey. But along the way, some find that, for one reason or another, these behemoth campuses are not meeting their needs. There are a number of reasons why students request the Coast Independent Study program, but they have all found Coast to be the place that makes school work for them at

This year we will be introducing two important changes to help make Coast an even more exciting option for students. The first is that our students will be experiencing, for the first time, new online classes blended with one-on-one instruction and support. We are currently transitioning to full implementation of this new online curriculum called Edgenuity. It will give our students access to engaging, high-quality resources, and also allow our teachers to truly personalize the learning experience.

Instant Feedback

Edgenuity courses combine rigorous content (aligned with the new Common Core State Standards) with direct-instruction videos, multimedia, interactive learning tools, and other resources to help engage and motivate the students.

These courses also embed supports and scaffolds into every lesson so that every student can be successful. Online learning allows teachers to be more connected to their students. They can monitor progress and give almost instant feedback to ensure that every student can attain success on a daily basis.

The second exciting change is that students who are coming to the end of their high school experience, but don't have enough credits to graduate on time, will now have the option of transferring to Coast to receive a Coast High School diploma. They can do so up until the age of 21, so long as they remain continuously enrolled at Coast prior to their 18th birthday.

This is great news for students who perhaps were not as motivated in their earlier years in high school, but have had a change of heart and want a regular high school diploma. It provides another option to the adult school diploma or

Students in these circumstances, and who are interested in continuing their pursuit of a diploma, must meet with their high school administrator to request a transfer to Coast. Perhaps they will discover that Coast High School is indeed "where they needed to be" all along!

The goal is for more students to be able to graduate using a combination of direct classroom instruction and blended online programming in our nontraditional school setting.

Our student council has been selected for the year, with three representatives from each classroom. The student council is already planning activities for the school year, including a spirit day and a dance. Back to School Night was held in late October.

New Science Standards



California is one of the latest states to adopt the Next Generation of Science Standards (NGSS). These new standards call for more project-based, hands-on activities than the old state standards. The biggest change is the shift from the memorization of facts to students being able to explain why something happened. The intent is to better prepare students for college and careers in the Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) fields.

This change aligns with the Common Core State Standards in other areas. Students will read complex text, draw conclusions, and support their conclusions by citing evidence from the text. Science teachers at Edison High School are preparing for this by examining their course content and adjusting their lessons to address these changes. Edison is working closely with local agencies to develop partnerships to provide our students with access to state-of-the-art technology.

In early October Edison science staff was asked to bring a small group of students to the Maker's Depot at the Orange County Great Park as part of the US Department of Energy Solar Decathlon. Our students were impressed with the solar homes. One student said, "I can see myself being part of the design team when I am in college." Maker's Depot is an innovation center where students have access to a variety of new technologies, such as 3-D printers and parts for robots. The ultimate goal is to develop a mini Maker's Depot at Edison.

In order to do this, the Science Department is actively seeking grants from local foundations and the California Department of Education. Edison is also working with the Orange County Department of Education (OCDE) to share curriculum to support the NGSS. Edison teachers are confident that by incorporating NGSS they will better prepare students for the STEM careers of the 21st century.

College Readiness: Going Big at Fountain Valley High School

There's a lot of talk in high schools these days about college readiness. With the transition to Common Core State Standards, schools are shifting their focus to preparing all students for college, careers, and citizenship rather than separating out the college-bound from the rest. Given that our school's mission is "maximizing learning for every student," this fits.

On Wednesday, October 16, Fountain Valley High School (FVHS) made a bold move to emphasize college readiness. We

administered college prep exams to every ninth-, 10th- and 11th-grader during the school day. Typically, these exams are offered on the weekends for fees ranging from \$10—\$20. Ninth-graders took ACT's EXPLORE exam, 10th-graders took ACT's PLAN test, and 11th-graders took The College Board's Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test (PSAT). Students, parents and school staff will receive valuable information regarding each student's current level of readiness for college and for their high school courses.

Perhaps equally important is simply taking that step to think about life beyond high school. Most of our students say they are going to college, but these tests are concrete steps towards taking charge of their educational progress. Moreover, this may be the only academic feedback from a state or national level test that students will receive this year. Special parent nights will be held in December and January to review the score reports.

FVHS used to offer the PSAT test on a Saturday for \$20. Typically 250–350 students took the exam. Last year, we chose to offer the PSAT during the school day, but as an option and for a fee. Nearly 700 students paid to take the exam. So we got to thinking, "This is great. Twice as many students are going to be getting important information about college. What if we just offered it to all the juniors and found a way to pay for it?" And so the current plan was hatched. Luckily, ACT also has a great tool for freshmen and sophomores, so we can get everyone involved.

So what about seniors? Seniors were treated to a College and Career Fair in the FVHS gym that included over 40 representatives from colleges, universities, and businesses. Students listened to presentations from Dr. Gregory Washington, Dean of the Samueli School of Engineering at University of California, Irvine, and Road Trip Nation about setting goals and following dreams.

FVHS College and Career Specialist Michaela Wakeman is excited for this event. She noted, "All students will get back college and career information and get literature from colleges. It might spark an interest or open a door for a lot of students."

I would like to recognize the following people for the huge amount of planning it took to pull off an event of this magnitude: Assistant Principal Nancy Peterson, College/Career Specialist Michaela Wakeman, Community Resource Coordinator Sharen Tait, and Coastline Regional Occupational Program Coordinator Marvene Sanders.

This was big. Now $2{,}700$ students at FVHS have taken a bigger step towards college readiness, and 900 seniors are more informed about the world they are about to enter.

No Teacher Left Behind

The real role of leadership in education—and I think it's true at the national level, the state level, at the school level—is not and should not be command and control. The real role of leadership is climate control, creating a climate of possibility. And if you do that, people will rise to it and achieve things that you completely did not anticipate and couldn't have expected.

-Sir Ken Robinson

This quote comes from last year's TED Talks Education special. Earlier in the talk, Sir Ken mentioned that great teaching in the United States exists "in spite of the dominant culture of education, not because of it." This simple yet profound statement struck me because I found it to be not only incredibly true but also enormously dangerous. Over the past decade, teachers have constantly been on the defensive, dealing with mandate after mandate. It is past time for teachers to reclaim the profession and fight for the educational principles and policies that make sense. We decided to do exactly that at Huntington Beach High School.

Last year, I was introduced to an online system that revolutionized the way I run my classes. Finally, the years of promises of educational technology became reality. Along with Google Apps for Education, I started using a free version of the learning management system (LMS) Canvas. This system allowed me to efficiently communicate with my students, provide instruction and feedback in new ways, and push students to be directly in control of their own learning. These tools allow me to use my time with students in a more meaningful way while helping them communicate and learn in the ways necessary to be successful after high school. After seeing the impact it made in the way I taught and the way students could learn, I decided to help push our school toward using technology more effectively and efficiently.

At the end of the last school year, two other teachers in the district-Chris Long and Brian Boone—and I created an online training course, using Canvas, to help teachers learn how to use Canvas at their own pace. Teachers voluntarily enrolled and spent time over the summer working their way through the various levels. By the end of the summer, we had over 250 teachers from our district enrolled in the course and taking part in the direction our profession is headed.

Good Climate Encourages Actualizing Ideas

Because of the overwhelming interest from teachers at HBHS, our principal, Dr. Rocky Murray, provided time for technology training during the two days of staff development meetings at the beginning of this school year. During this training, teachers helped other teachers learn how to effectively use this new technology. With the teacher-led training in place, HBHS implemented Google Apps accounts for all students and started using Canvas as its official LMS. By the end of September, nearly 80 percent of teachers at HBHS were voluntarily using Canvas. At the beginning of October, the district announced an agreement to purchase the paid version of Canvas. This shows the influence teachers can have when they proactively impact their profession.

What we learned through this process is that change isn't the hard part; creating the right environment for change is the real challenge. This transition has been messy, but messy can be good. With a major transition in public education occurring, schools need to embrace messiness. The major leap forward in educational technology at HBHS shows that teachers are not resistant to change but rather are hungry for progress and have been waiting for the right opportunity.

When Ms. Delanty's students see her passion for art, and how she stresses simple concepts and skills that can be mastered quickly, they begin to think that maybe they can "do" art as well.

One of her students, Kristen, said that, "She motivates us through demonstrations and giving us individual attention when you get stuck." Another student, Mackenzie, says, "I couldn't draw a stick figure, but Ms. Delanty breaks the work down, and I find that I can really do this. She brings out our potential that we didn't even know existed."

Lauren adds, "I never thought I was good at art, and said I didn't like it, but now that I'm learning techniques of contrast and shading, I really like art."

Delanty describes her goals this way. "I hope that when my students are out of school, they will rely not only on their own knowledge, but on their own creativity to find their own answers."

Life Lessons

In addition to continuing to support other core courses with integrative art assignments, Delanty has also initiated the "Gallery on the Green" program to showcase her students' creative accomplishments. Every few months the school will display our student works on our grass-covered central quad.

The program has also included dance, and the next one will include sonnets and other written works by students from our English classes. We also plan to add additional forms of creative expression to this public forum.

The personal power of art as a non-verbal life-lesson is evident in a special program for the spring semester called The Memory Project. This is a national program where art students create portraits of the children and teens living in orphanages around the world. The portraits are then given to the children as a

College and Career Focus

"With the growing complexity of the world and the increasing demands of the 21st-century workforce, there is little question that all students should graduate from high school fully prepared for college AND careers."

Here at the Home of the Vikings, we understand that college and career readiness means that high school students have the English and math knowledge and skills needed to qualify for and succeed in their chosen colleges and careers,

including community colleges, universities, technical/vocational programs, apprenticeships, or significant on-the-job training.

To be college- and career-ready, we believe that high school graduates must have studied a rigorous and broad curriculum, grounded in the core academic disciplines, but also consisting of other subjects that are part of a well-rounded education. Research indicates that academic preparation alone is not enough to ensure postsecondary readiness, but it is clear that it is an essential part of readiness for college, careers, and life in the 21st century.

In an effort to prepare all students for college and career readiness, Marina High School (MHS) is focusing on a continuum of services for both students and parents. The 2013–2014 school year began with an evening for parents: " Making High School Meaningful and College Possible: It Starts Today." A guest speaker from Princeton Review discussed the finer points of college admissions and also addressed the importance of the Explore, Act Plan and Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude (PSAT) tests. For the first time, MHS offered a school-wide testing day for ninth- through 11th-graders in October. These tests identify early indicators for college and career readiness. The PSAT, taken by juniors, also recognizes students for potential scholarship opportunities. December 4 (Explore and PLAN), and January 13 (PSAT) are scheduled testing interpretation nights to discuss the results and to offer an opportunity for questions and answers from MHS staff and a representative from Princeton Review.

To serve all students, we are hosting several evening presentations aligned with our classroom presentations. The development of the freshmen four-year plan begins in November with our counselor classroom visits. The information gathered on the Explore will assist with high school course planning and future college/career discussions.

December is an important month for our seniors. The process of completing and submitting college applications continues. A financial aid presentation will review the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and offer tips for searching for scholarship opportunities.

We are excited to offer ongoing opportunities for all students to explore different avenues toward college and career readiness.

Guidevisement

Understandably, our students and parents have a number of questions about high school graduation requirements and what options exist after high school. A student's four-year plan, college options and majors, application timelines, admissions requirements, NCAA eligibility, along with future career options, are always normal issues where students need guidance and advice.

Teachers play an important role in this regard as resources and role models. A few years ago, Nancy Peterson (the assistant

principal of guidance at Fountain Valley High School) combined the activities of guidance and advisement into an activity that we call "Guidevisement." This is where our teachers, in collaboration with the guidance administrators, provide relevant information to help students make appropriate choices for their postsecondary education.



Westminster High School had its fall Guidevisement on Friday, October 11, during the double-fourth periods. Melissa Chan-Nauli, assistant principal of guidance, created two PowerPoint presentations about post-secondary topics for the teachers to discuss with their students. There was one each for the 9/10 and 11/12 grades.

The teachers handed out four-year plans to the ninth-, tenth- and eleventhgraders, and the seniors received a checklist of recommendations for applying to colleges or obtaining financial aid. Index cards were also handed out to students for their feedback, and any additional questions they would like to ask. The goal of Guidevisement is to encourage every student to explore their post-high school options at a community college, a four-year school, vocational training, or an apprenticeship.

Our students found the activity very rewarding and educational. We look forward to the spring semester Guidevisement, with topics that will include scholarship information, financial aid, career/vocational options, and class registration.

I express my thanks for making our community's children your top priority. Also, let me compliment and thank all crossing guards for the great job they do. Have a great school year, Fountain Valley!

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
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
