OVSD Provides Range of School Programs in 2017

The Ocean View School District (OVSD) is looking to the future and planning innovative programs that will serve the needs of our diverse student population, which includes preschoolers through eighth-graders. We seek to provide families with a range of educational options for their children. With a focus on achievement and continued success for these students, we are excited to expand several of our existing programs and launch new ones in 2017. Some are still in the planning stages, but many are already underway. Our hardworking leadership team, teachers, and staff members are committed to finding the best learning opportunities for our students, so they can benefit from a strong foundation of academic success and well-rounded experiences as they advance into the 21st century.

In December, we began enrolling students in OVSD's new Early Kindergarten program. The program serves children born between December 3, 2011, and March 1, 2012. Three family information meetings were held in November and December to help families learn more about the program, ask questions of staff, and find out if the Early Kindergarten program is right for their children.

As of this month, the first class of Early Kindergarten students

HBCSD: Awesome New Programs and Unlimited Possibilities

By Gregory Haulk, Superintendent – Huntington Beach City School District Huntington Beach City School District (HBCSD) has brought the arts to life with incredible new programs, has increased the physical fitness of our elementary school students with physical education specialists, and is increasing the language capacity of our elementary students with both Mandarin Chinese and Spanish lessons. These new programs, along with the passage of Measure Q, mean the future potential of our students is unlimited. Measure Q will bring new facilities, including technology and fabrication labs and new gyms, to both middle schools. Measure Q also provides updates to all classrooms, bringing in both 21st-century technology and devices for all students.

Huntington Beach City School District is committed to bringing the arts to ALL of our students to help develop ALL of their skills. Utilizing the research-based methods of the MIND Research Institute, all of our elementary students have the opportunity to learn how to play the keyboard and read and write music. They also receive instruction from a vocal teacher while learning music theory and history. These programs are available at all of our elementary schools and then feed into our middle schools. Dwyer Middle School has a junior Academy of the Performing Arts (APA) program with a direct link to the Huntington Beach High School APA program, and Sowers Middle School has over 350 students enrolled in at least one music elective course. With our test scores placing HBCSD as one of the top performing elementary districts in Orange County, this shows the strong district commitment to educating the whole student.



Huntington Beach City School District has also committed to the physical health and well-being of our students. The district is piloting a program at the elementary level with physical education specialists, who work with our elementary students on a regular basis. Students are trained to become lifelong


Happy New Year!

RSV Infections

Almost all children have a respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) infection by their second birthday. In most cases RSV causes only minor cold-like symptoms. Some children may develop more severe infections that require hospitalization.

RSV is spread through infectious respiratory secretions that are inhaled or passed through direct contact. The virus also can live for hours on toys or door handles. The peak RSV season starts in the fall and ends in the spring.

Signs of RSV usually appear about 4-6 days after exposure to the virus. Older children typically have a runny nose and decrease in appetite. Coughing, sneezing and a low-grade fever may develop 1-3

days later. The only signs of RSV in very young infants could be irritability, decreased activity, and problems with breathing. Full recovery from RSV takes about 1-2 weeks.

Severe cases of RSV can lead to infections such as bronchiolitis and pneumonia. Hospitalization may be necessary for infants who require intravenous fluids, supplemental oxygen, suctioning of mucus from the airways, or a breathing machine to ease breathing. Antibiotics may be administered for bacterial complications.

Children at increased risk for developing severe cases of RSV include: Infants under 6 months old; Babies under 1 year old born prematurely or with congenital heart or lung disease; Children with weakened immune systems from a medical condition or treatment

There is no specific treatment or vaccine for RSV. Symptoms can be relieved by creating moist air to breathe, sitting in an upright position, drinking fluids, avoiding exposure to cigarette smoke, and using saline nasal drops or over-thecounter pain relievers to reduce fever and relieve a sore throat. A medication called palivizumab may be prescribed for children at increased risk for serious complications from RSV. The drug does not stop RSV infections, but it can prevent severe cases from developing.

Managing Your Child's Asthma at School Asthma can't be cured, but it can be controlled with proper

care. To help manage your child's asthma during school hours, it's important to communicate with their school early and educate them on warning signs.

There are several important steps you can take:

- · Notify the school that your child has asthma.
- Obtain the medication school form signed by your child's doctor.
- Keep a current copy of your child's asthma action plan on file at their school. An asthma action plan is a written plan that is developed with your child's doctor to help control their asthma. The action plan shows daily treatments, such as medication. It also describes how to handle worsening asthma or attacks.
- Identify and communicate your child's warning signs to their teacher and other caretakers.

Identifying Warning Signs

Warning signs and symptoms are not the same for everyone, and your child may exhibit different signs at different times. Common warning signs include:

- Difficulty breathing Coughing Wheezing Tight Chest Sneezing
- Increased coughing, wheezing or shortness of breath during or after exercise
- Getting out of breath easily Breathing faster than normal Runny nose
- Itchy, watery or glassy eyes Itchy, scratchy or sore throat Restlessness
- Stuffy head or headache Change in face color Dark circles under eyes Think back to your child's last asthma attack. Write down the signs they experienced. When these signs do appear, either at school or home,

it's important to follow your child's asthma action plan. With consistent communication, you and those close to your child will know exactly how to help prevent or treat an asthma attack.

Grateful in FVSD

On November 8, 2016, the Fountain Valley School District (FVSD) community came together and passed Measure O, with 64.2 percent of the voters marking "YES" on their ballots. To get to this point, hundreds of parents, teachers, classified staff members, community members, city officials, business leaders, and even students participated in over 18 months of work, prior to the Board of Trustees placing the measure on the ballot in early

Beginning in March 2015, the facilities committee, comprised of more than 35 teachers, classified staff members, administrators, parents, and business leaders studied facilities in the Fountain Valley School District, as well as surrounding districts. The goal was not just to see what was needed in FVSD today, but to examine the possibilities for facilities well into the future. In October, seven months after their work began, the facilities committee made a recommendation to the Board of Trustees to hire an architect and begin the process of developing a comprehensive facilities master plan.

With this recommendation, the Board of Trustees hired LPA Architects, Inc. to complete the Facilities Master Plan. From January through June of 2016,

LPA engaged stakeholder teams, hosting more than 40 meetings with more than 290 participants and 171 survey responses. This extensive work led to the development of our Facilities Master Plan, presented to the Board of Trustees in June 2016.

Driven by the need to include input from our community, especially those who do not currently have children in our schools, the School Facilities Engagement Committee (SFEC) was created, which included 60 participants representing a cross-section of our community. SFEC met weekly for four weeks in May, three hours each night, focusing on one topic per meeting. At the end, they presented a consensus report to the Board of Trustees in June 2016, recommending amongst other things, the pursuit of a general obligation bond to fund educational infrastructure and facilities improvements.

We are grateful for the hard work and dedication of those individuals committed to facilities improvement in the Fountain Valley School District. Over the past 18 months, through participation in the facilities committee, our Facilities Master Plan teams, and the SFEC, hundreds of staff members. students, and members of our community committed themselves to improving the learning environments in our district. On behalf of our students, staff and community, we applaud the dedication of these individuals, who have made this dream a reality. And for that, we are forever grateful.



No Idle Zone

As part of Peterson Elementary School's GO GREEN campaign and the creation of our Great Green Giants (G3) team, the school has developed a No Idle Zone around the school. Idling is when a driver leaves the engine running and the vehicle parked.

Every day in the United States millions of cars and trucks idle needlessly, sometimes for hours, and an idling car can release as much pollution as a moving car. We may not be able to avoid keeping our engine running when we're stopped at a traffic signal or stuck in slow-moving traffic, but other times idling is

One of those times is when waiting to pick up a student from school. Peterson Elementary is asking parents and visitors to turn off their ignition if they're waiting more than 10 seconds. Contrary to popular belief, restarting your car does not burn more fuel than leaving it idling. In fact, idling for just 10 seconds wastes more gas than restarting the engine. Reducing idling makes the air healthier around the school by cutting down on hazardous pollution in our neighborhood.

Idling tailpipes spew out the same pollutants as moving cars. These pollutants have been linked to serious human illnesses, including asthma, heart disease, chronic bronchitis, and cancer. For every 10 minutes an engine idles in front of our school, a pound of carbon dioxide is being released into the air. Carbon dioxide is the primary contributor to global warming.

The GO GREEN campaign will be addressing other areas of environmental concern with students and their families in the months ahead, including recycling, energy conservation, beach clean-up, and vermicomposting (worm farming).

Dr. Carol Hansen Following the election, I sent a message to district employees and posted it publicly to our Web site, saying, "I wish to send a heartfelt thank you to each of you for your contributions toward the passage of Measure R! We are incredibly grateful for your support of our students and our schools. This general obligation bond in the amount of \$169 million is desperately needed. We can now move forward and begin the process of addressing our aging facilities to provide safe, comfortable learning environments for our students. I wish to acknowledge your ongoing commitment to the Ocean View School District. In the coming months, I will continue our communication to employees, families, and the community at large about the status of next steps. Thank you to everyone who helped make this possible!"

Newly re-elected Trustee and Board President Gina Clayton-Tarvin, who led the Board in its decision to pursue Measure R, said she "always had faith in the voters of the Ocean View School District."

The path toward pursuing a general obligation bond became a real possibility during the 2015–2016 school year, when our new leadership team was established. Work continued last spring with the creation of a districtwide Facilities Master Plan (FMP). A team effort ensued in May and June, with hundreds of people from within the district, each OVSD school site (staff, parents, and students), and the community at large coming together in four comprehensive community meetings to list and prioritize school projects. The resulting FMP and dedicated Web site, www.ovsd-fmp.org, are now in place and will guide the district's work with these projects.

Again, we thank everyone for the personal time spent sharing our message and prioritizing our vital facilities needs, which are so important for student success. Our community heard you!

is underway at Westmont Elementary School, which conveniently borders the cities of Huntington Beach and Westminster. This inaugural class will provide us with valuable information as we consider expanding the program in the 2017–2018 school year. The response from our community is overwhelmingly supportive, and we have created a waiting list. Our goal is to begin teaching students, at an age-appropriate level, the essential skills needed in language and literacy, mathematics, physical development, science, visual and performing arts, health, history/social science, English language development, and social-emotional development. It is a complete program based on state standards and aligned with the OVSD curriculum.

"We believe our Early Kindergarten class will give our families another important option in preparing their children for success in kindergarten and beyond," said Dr. Carol Hansen, Superintendent. "Early Kindergarten, which is based on the Transitional Kindergarten curriculum, helps these young students to develop the academic, social, and emotional skills they will need to be successful throughout their educational experiences."

At the beginning of the school year, we reopened Lake View Elementary School as our first-ever Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics (STEAM) school, with specialized curriculum, classroom design, and teacher training. Our focus on curriculum as seen through the STEAM lens continues in 2017. As a way to further involve families in this new way of learning, the school is hosting STEAM Family Nights throughout the year, involving each area of the STEAM experience. This fall, Lake View hosted two family nights: a Science Night involving the stars, planets, and out-of-this world

The Kid's Guide to Service Projects

The title of this wonderfully helpful resource is directed at children, but Barbara A. Lewis's Kid's Guide to Service Projects, Free Spirit Publishing, 1995, is a volunteer guide for any age. The more than 500 suggested projects, ranging in difficulty

from caring for a neighbor's pet to getting state laws and city ordinances passed, will appeal to anyone who want to make a difference and earn breathing space on the planet. The projects, all worthy, are described simply and clearly enough to encourage any aspiring humanitarian.

The projects focus on human and animal welfare, community development and safety, the environment, literacy and politics, further divided into 10 categories. In the introduction, Lewis gives short shrift to anyone's claims of not having enough time or that the goals are too involved for any one person to attempt. Instead, she maps out projects for every passion, and invites the reader to send her anything that she hasn't thought of. She then provides a template of 10 steps to make any effort a successful one; gives handy how-tos for pesky paperwork tasks such as creating fliers, writing petitions and press releases, and lobbying for a cause; and suggest seven ways to raise funds.

Anyone who wants to be proactive in solving problems for the community, either local or at large, will find frequent use for The Kid's Guide to Service Projects. It will be particularly helpful in the service requirement for graduation from high school; and families, youth and religious organizations, and classroom teachers will all find something to forward worthy efforts. Most of all, lone individuals who feel the need to take action on a problem but may be overwhelmed by the details will be happy to find that Lewis has done the initial organization for them. And that in itself is a great service.

For many, 2016 has been an immensely challenging year, culminating with one of the most toxic and divisive elections in the history of our country.

The latest election cycle has, it seems, reopened old wounds, and electoral maps suggest we live in a nation increasingly divided by politics, ideology and values. Yet there is one trait that unites all Americans, and it is a trait we need to embrace now more than ever. It is kindness.

In May, the Orange County Department of Education launched the One Billion Acts of Kindness initiative as a way to promote

civility, character and positive school climates in Orange County and beyond. We also envisioned this campaign as a way to spotlight the compassion that occurs each and every day, often quietly or unnoticed.

So far, we haven't been disappointed. Well over half a million good deeds have been logged on www.kindness1billion.org and on social media with the hashtag #kindness1billion. And scores of new ones roll in each week.

We've heard heartwarming stories from everyday people who are providing food and clothing for the homeless, baking cookies for veterans and finding lost dogs. We've heard from children who have welcomed newcomers to school, and we've heard from more than a few kids who have spotted someone sitting alone at lunch and invited them to dine together.

One girl said she simply complimented a classmate she didn't know on her new haircut — and now the two are friends.

As you can see, kindness doesn't have to be a sweeping movement that immediately impacts thousands. But each compassionate act has the potential to start a chain reaction that can change the world. At the very least, kindness reveals an inner humanity in all of us that transcends politics, race and other barriers used to divide us.

Since the One Billion Acts of Kindness campaign began, a number of local school districts and community organizations have reached out to let us know they're on board, and many are organizing their own activities and logging their counts on www.kindness1billion.org. Included among them are the Girl Scouts of Orange County and the Boy Scouts of America Orange County Council, which asked its members and volunteers to commit at least one act of kindness per day in November.

We hope this momentum will continue into 2017, with benefits that cascade across the state and throughout the country. And OCDE will continue to champion this cause, because kindness is a sustainable resource that drives society. It's also a virtue that powerfully manifests character, and character defines who we are.

Our electoral maps may show stark patches of red and blue, but we are certainly more than a nation of two political parties. We are, and will continue to be, a country of compassion, love and inclusion, reinforced every day, one kind act at a time.

What's Your New Year's Resolution?

Just like the adults around them, our students may be looking at the new year as an opportunity for renewal and a time to assess their lives and consider how they might want to improve them. As a school community, we can help.

Since the topic of New Year's resolutions is likely to come up anyway, why not make a discussion out of it? Spend some time looking at the kinds of resolutions people make. You might brainstorm a list of possible resolutions with your son or daughter. Then divide that list into categories.

One of the reasons some resolutions fail is because they aren't specific or measurable. If a person resolves to "eat healthier," that's hard to measure and hard to track. With a broad resolution, it's easy to fall into a gray area and eventually drop it altogether. So teach your student how to take a vague resolution, such as to give the dog more attention, and turn it into a specific, measurable goal, such as spending 10 minutes a day petting and playing with the dog.

Have your child consider how well the plan is going, what factors may be getting in the way, and how the new changes are impacting quality of life. The first evaluation might be a week after goals are set, followed by two more checkins spaced farther apart. During these reflection times, share how you are progressing with your own goals, and talk to students about how we sometimes end up changing our goals based on what we learn about ourselves over time.

Giving students goals for the year, whether academic or social in nature, will help them to succeed in the future and get them used to meeting and reaching their goals.
