# **Modernization and Safety Measures**

#### **Measure R Bond Modernization Begins**

Measure R bond modernization is one of the most comprehensive, important facilities projects that the Ocean View School District has ever undertaken. Following the bond measure's passage in November 2016, we committed to pursuing these projects with strict adherence to safety, the least amount of disruption to learning, efficiency and economy, maximum oversight of the construction process, and timeliness.

This past March, Dr. Michael Conroy, Deputy Superintendent of Administrative Services, presented our Board of Trustees with updated, detailed information about our Measure R modernization projects, costs, and timelines. Previously, we had planned to modernize two school sites in 2018–2019, College View and Westmont Elementary Schools. Taking into consideration actual interim housing costs, Measure R bond cash flow, stakeholders' input on school priority needs, and construction phasing, we have revised our plans and will now modernize one school each year.

Beginning in the 2018–2019 school year, Westmont Elementary School, which houses our Visual and Performing Arts (VAPA) Academy, will be modernized. Westmont students and staff will move to the Sun View Elementary School campus, which closes this year to serve as our interim housing site for all future modernization projects. Construction at Westmont will be completed in time to welcome everyone back for fall 2019. Next will be College View Elementary School in the 2019–2020 school year. During construction, College View students and staff will safely attend school at the Sun View interim housing campus. Our district team has prepared a tentative timeline for modernization at our remaining campuses, which can be viewed at www.ovsd.org/MeasureR.

This amended approach maximizes Measure R cash flow and expedites physical improvements at more schools, especially fencing and field projects. Our Board of Trustees voted to support an expedited fencing plan. It is anticipated that safety fencing will be installed at all of Ocean View's campuses by the end of the 2020–2021 school year, using an attractive tubular steel panel system at a height of eight feet, which will be supplemented by interior fencing, using two-inch, chain-link fencing at a height of six feet. Perimeter fencing for our campuses located adjacent to "pocket" parks will also use a tubular steel panel system at a height of eight feet to enclose the school grounds.

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### **Increased Safety Measures**

During this past year, with the passage of Measure Q in the Huntington Beach City School District (HBCSD), we have talked a lot about the changes that are coming. HBCSD will be transforming all of our classrooms into 21st-century learning environments with an increase in technology, which will better engage and educate our students. However, there will also be changes to our schools in the area of safety.

When we return from summer break, each of our schools will have a new sign-in system in the office, which will require visitors/parents to show picture identification, which will be scanned and submitted through a minor background check to make sure that individual should be on a school campus. Once the identification is verified, the machine will then print a one-day badge, which all visitors on campus will be required to wear. Teachers and staff will also be wearing badges, so visitors and staff will know they belong on campus. A single point of entry will also be implemented at our sites in order to help facilitate the sign-in procedure. Therefore, you will begin to see fencing go up at many of our schools. HBCSD is also adding more cameras to each campus, so staff can watch for issues on campus that need to be addressed.

HBCSD is also committed to developing stronger School Site Safety Plans and having teachers hold grade-level-appropriate discussions and drills designed to help remind students what our plan of action is should any change to the regular school day become necessary. Our District Safety Committee is also touring school sites to observe drills and review safety plans.

At times, change is difficult. For those parents who are used to just walking on campus to drop off a lunch or an assignment, these changes will now require a bit more time and effort to enter the school. In every Huntington Beach City School, we depend on our fantastic team of volunteers, who work in classrooms and assist each school through our fantastic PTSA teams. You will see these volunteers at each of our schools assisting in the learning that is happening. We will continue to depend on volunteers and still wish to see those eager volunteers on each campus.

We would also like to remind all parents and visitors that the best course of action to keep our schools safe is to "see something and say something," While on or around a school campus, if you see something that just looks out of place or unsafe, we encourage you to call the school office and report what you see. Working together, we will continue to make HBCSD an elite school district in Orange County.

#### **Measure O Continues to Be On Time**

And while the progress at Masuda and Courreges is apparent just by driving by the campus, plans for three additional campuses (Fulton Middle School, Cox Elementary School and Tamura Elementary School) are in design with our architect and will go through the same plan check process as our first two schools.

We want to thank the entire FVSD community for making this work possible, through the passage of Measure O in 2016!!! Just one more reason why #WeHeartFVSD!



### **Food Allergy Emergencies**


Milk, eggs, peanuts, tree nuts, fish, shellfish, soy and wheat represent the top eight food allergens. A food allergy can cause a life-threatening condition called anaphylaxis, also known as anaphylactic shock. Anaphylaxis requires immediate professional medical attention. A food allergy can be diagnosed through a blood or skin test, an elimination diet, or through challenge testing, all of which should only be done under a physician's supervision.

Approximately 40 percent of children and 30 percent of adults have food allergies. Children typically outgrow allergies to milk, eggs, soy and wheat by the time they are five years old if they avoid the offending food. However, most people do not outgrow allergic

reactions to peanuts, tree nuts, fish or shellfish. If you do have a food allergy, you can decrease your chances of having an allergic reaction by:

- Avoiding foods that you know can cause an allergic reaction.
- Asking about how the dish is prepared and specific ingredients when eating out.
- Always reading the food label when purchasing packaged foods.
- Wearing an identification bracelet and carry an alert card in your wallet that describes your allergy.
- Being prepared for an emergency and, if necessary, carry an epinephrine self-injection pen or allergy kit with you at all times.

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### **Savvy about Sun Safety**

Summer is all about spending time outdoors in the sun. During childhood and adolescence, protection from ultraviolet (UV) exposure reduces the risk for skin cancer in adulthood. Here are some tips to help your family enjoy outdoor activities safely this summer:

- For kids six months and older (as well as adults), sunscreen with a sun protection factor (SPF) of 30 or greater reduces the intensity of UV exposure that cause sunburns.
  - —Apply sunscreen liberally 15 to 30 minutes before sun exposure to ensure the skin absorbs the sunscreen and will reduce the likelihood that it will be washed off.
  - —Reapply every two hours and after kids swim, sweat or dry off with a towel.
- Dress kids in high ultraviolet protection factor (high-UPF) swim shirts or rash guards and choose bathing suits that cover more skin, like one-piece suites and long trunks.
- Have your kids wear a hat with a brim all the way around that shades their face, ears, and the back of the neck.
- Sun exposure damages the eyes as well as the skin. The best way to protect eyes is to wear sunglasses that provide 100% UV protection.
- Infants under six-months-old should be kept out of direct sunlight.
- Remind teens that tanning can increase skin cancer risk, and leads to wrinkles, blemishes and age spots later in life.

Make sun safety a part of your family's everyday lifestyle to reduce the risk of skin cancer, sun damage and skin aging.


### **How Long Do I Wear My Retainer?**

One of the more common questions I am asked by patients is "how long do I have to wear my retainers?" The answer is based on the biology that allows tooth movement and normal aging.

Essentially, when teeth are moved, the bone and tissues surrounding the roots of teeth are remodeled and reorganized around the newly aligned teeth. Immediately after a tooth moves, the bone is still immature for a period of time (just think how long you have to wear a cast if you break a bone – this is the

time it takes for the bone to heal and mature). In addition, when teeth move, the fibers (collagen and elastin fibers) within the gum tissue stretch and their 'rebound' provides the force that wants to move teeth back into their pretreatment crooked positions. So, retainers are used until the bone around the teeth matures and the gum tissue fibers reorganize around the newly aligned teeth. Most orthodontist will prescribe full-time wear during this period of time and then nighttime wear. Studies show that with normal aging lower incisors tend to crowd over time, so we should expect to see some tooth movements/ crowding as we age. I always think of this as the expectation we all have about getting wrinkles as we age. We know there are ways to try and prevent getting wrinkles (botox, facial lotion, etc), but sooner or later wrinkles do appear. This is the same with teeth. We should expect to see some tooth movement as a normal aging process. HOWEVER, retainers can ultimately prevent this movement, if they are used!!! So, if you want to maintain aligned teeth after your Invisalign treatment or after your braces were removed, it is wise to continue to wear your retainers at night.

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

#### **How Children Learn**

Watching. Listening. Doing. Three simple descriptors of how children learn.

As school board members, we tour all our schools' classrooms twice a vear.

What do we observe? Children watching and listening to their teachers, docents, virtual presentations and their peers. And, children "doing." They are building words and sentences, sorting and counting, coding and programming, dribbling, jumping and running. We see children solving problems in various ways,

making mistakes and learning from them, questioning, sharing and critiquing reasoning and trying new things.

Children are interested in doing real things in the present moment. Learning sets of facts for the future may be a by-product of what they are doing, but not their primary motivator.

As we stop to chat with these children they, typically, will tell us what they are doing. The brilliance of their doing may be that they don't even think of it as learning!

Our children have interesting things to do with interested teachers to help them. They feel loved and safe in their school settings.

With all this doing, they are defining who they are, building their confidence, learning how to get along, developing their attitudes towards differences and expressing creativity.

Although children develop at different rates, we continually see the growth, especially at this time of the year. We see independent readers, different degrees of difficultly in math problems within a grade level, novels being dissected through Socratic seminars, robotic competitions being entered and complex musical compositions being performed.

We are grateful that, throughout the year, our students were watching, listening and doing because it resulted in a great deal of learning!

### **Keeping Students Safe**

Due to the inexplicable increase in school shooting tragedies all around the country, it is no wonder that parents are frantically asking School Boards for safety plans. At our own Board meetings, we have parents who speak on the issue every month. The whole idea of having to consider these scenarios is heart-stopping but something we must face and try to plan for, while avoiding fear and insecurity among our students, who now have to do safety drills not just for fire and earthquake, but also for intruder alerts and shooters. It is a challenging balancing act for students and staff.

At Huntington Beach City School District (HBCSD), we created a volunteer safety committee that includes parents who are experts in the law enforcement and safety fields. They are meeting to discuss scenarios and strategies and visiting school sites to observe current safety drills in order to make crucial suggestions and initiate changes where needed. Other strategies include enhanced security camera systems, fencing in areas of some campuses where it makes sense, and a new phone system, which will allow for multiple options in emergency communications.

We continue to ask ourselves, *How can we put a stop to these dangers?* Of course, we cannot anticipate or plan for every possible event. It can be discouraging when you look back on school campuses where these tragedies

have happened only to see that some of them had very stringent security processes in place. We can only do the best we can, even it is only to deter in time to prevent.

I addressed this issue in an earlier article, and, while it is a good idea to work to block these violent events, I have to reiterate that we really need to get at the root of them. I think we can all agree, as I mentioned previously, that a major issue is that of mental illness, whether inherent or caused by trauma, abuse, or some other factor in a person's life. I can't emphasize enough that we must lobby for more mental and emotional health interventions in our schools. You may have seen local news reports about the tax monies in the millions that have been collected for mental health interventions and treatments for the past two or three years that have yet to be spent. Our county's Board of Supervisors is planning to spend a large amount of that money addressing the homeless issue, which includes so many adults who are suffering from mental illness. I am on the Board of Directors for the Orange County School Boards Association, where we have formed a coalition to meet with our local political leaders to see if there is a way that school districts, either directly or through the Orange County Department of Education, could access some of that funding to ensure availability of psychological counseling and other mental health interventions.

Awareness leads to involvement, which will hopefully lead to resolutions. A vision to embrace while our students enjoy their summer is that of a world where children can grow up carefree and unafraid.

#### **Better Math Strategies**

Huntington Seacliff Elementary School is always looking for the best research-based teaching strategies. About two years ago, we looked at our math concepts data and determined that, although our students were "memorizing" their facts, many did not understand the concepts of number operation. So, we looked for another way to teach these skills.

Do you remember having to take timed math fact tests? I am sure you do, and it is not a happy memory! We realized that testing the same facts without explicit teaching was not working. We likened it to forming a team and having them play in the

World Series over and over again without any training or practice! Through investigation and connections with other teachers, we found a teaching strategy that assists students in understanding number facts.

FactsWise, developed by Valerie Henry, focuses on explicitly teaching students so they are able to understand math facts and retrieve them easily from their long-term memories. Why does 2+3=5 or 8x4=32? These are important questions. You might be able to quickly say 2+3=5, but do you know why it is true? FactsWise implements "part-whole" and "small chunk" learning every day, with short lessons and practice sessions. All of the math facts are broken into nine goals, which are taught throughout a student's K-5 school

For example, students begin with learning the 5s and 10s so they can build on this knowledge with the remaining facts. After careful teaching, the students apply their knowledge and practice their facts with games using cards and dice, which is fun and engaging. Once they have had teaching and engaging practice, they move from understanding the concepts to being able to represent them using abstract forms of the facts with numbers and mathematical symbols. Finally, they are assessed—but not with a timed test!

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

Teachers collaborate and focus on guiding students in learning through critical thinking, analyzing, evaluating, and developing projects and written text.

Circle View Principal Kristi Hickman and her staff pride themselves on Authentic Literacy strategies and practices that use the Socratic Method. Teachers are trained to guide students in developing projects and pieces of work that showcase higher levels of thinking. Students analyze, evaluate, and discuss texts, which are chosen to meet the needs of all students.

In just two years, Star View Principal Carrie Haskin says Authentic Literacy grew from being an idea to becoming a daily practice across all grade levels and curricular areas. Teachers are focused on nonfiction texts, experience-based learning, and engaging student discussions. Activities range from reading to writing and verbal exchanges in all classrooms.

As an educator myself, I want to emphasize the notable academic strides made by these students and congratulate them for their efforts and achievements. I also want to recognize the dedication and creativity demonstrated by these school principals, teachers, and other staff members, who work incredibly hard to provide nurturing, engaging learning environments for every student. #### **Proof in the Results**

As this is the last edition of the *School News Roll Call* for the 2017–18 school year, I would like to take a moment to thank the Spring View staff for their dedication to our students and to one another. In any given school year, there are ups and downs and highs and lows, but through it all, the Spring View staff always finds a way to stay focused on supporting our students.

There is evidence to show that our work is paying off. Spring View has been named a Star Honor Roll School by the Educational Results Partnership Group as our students continued

to demonstrate improvement on the Smarter Balanced State Assessment.

Additionally, Spring View students feel far better about school than their peers do nationally, according to a report called "Monitoring the Future," published by the University of Michigan's Survey Research Center. Spring View fared 7 percentage points higher than the national average of students being asked if they enjoy being at school. Also, Spring View students were nearly 20 percentage points above the national average when asked if they felt school rules are generally fair and reasonable. When asked if they felt safe at school, Spring View finished 18 percentage points higher than the national average.

As Spring View's principal, I am fortunate to be able to work alongside such a dedicated and professional group of educators who go above and beyond to ensure that our students are given the tools they need to succeed and be connected to their school.



Land School special-education staff attended a districtwide training on the Zones of Regulation with the creator of the program, Leah Kuypers, in April. Participants included special-education teachers, speech and language pathologists, school psychologists, school counselors, occupational therapists and autism-support staff.

The Zones of Regulation is a framework to foster self-regulation by supporting students in managing their emotions and sensory needs. Staff received training on the Zones of Regulation framework and how to implement

the curriculum in their classroom. Learning outcomes included identifying the sensory systems that impact regulation, describing sensory integration and its impact on modulation and regulation, outlining executive functions that frequently impact self-regulation, defining emotional regulation to include social cognition's role in emotional expression, and reflecting on the importance



of using individual strategies to self-regulate.

Staff responded positively to the training and are looking forward to implementing the Zones of Regulation curriculum across all school settings.
