

Recently, there have been numerous studies and articles highlighting the importance of providing an appropriate learning environment for students and staff. In fact, many researchers argue that learning environments contribute to improved student achievement, attendance rates, and school behavior. Thus, it is extremely exciting to share some of the tremendous progress we've made over the last 18 months. modernizing our school sites. As February comes to an end, three quarters of the classrooms at Masuda Middle School and more than half of the classrooms at Courreges Elementary School now boast new paint, flooring, ceilings, acoustic panels and, most importantly, air conditioning! nd the enthusiasm over the improved air quality for staff and students is evident across both campuses.





The updated facade at Masuda Middle School is a source of pride for the District and community and a newly renovated classroom at Courreges School welcomes students and staff to a drastically improved learning environment.

At Masuda, teachers moved back into their rooms in the B Core on February 28th. Students and staff now enjoy modernized and inviting classroom environments that support the incredible programs and services the school offers. Moreover, at Courreges, phase three in the library core includes six upper grade classrooms that will soon feel the benefits of improved air quality. And the transformation of the media center has greatly improved staff and students' use of the space. It is thrilling the see the dramatic changes at both campuses and more so, to hear the positive comments from our community!

In addition, our next phase of modernization includes Fulton Middle School, Tamura Elementary School and Cox Elementary School, all of which have received approval of their plans from the Department of State Architect (DSA). These schools are set to break ground during the summer of 2019.

Human Trafficking

In a perfect world, all students would walk into our classrooms free of distress and distraction, ready to absorb the knowledge and skills they'll need to succeed in college and career, and beyond.

But today's educators must be responsive to extraordinary circumstances that can inhibit teaching and learning, such as poverty, violence and homelessness. Despite these major issues, we must also be aware of the malignancy caused by human trafficking here in Orange County. According to a 2016 report, women and children account for 90 percent of the victims.

That brings us to some of the bigger myths about human trafficking: We tend to think it happens mainly to adults, and in communities other than our own.

The real picture is vastly more complicated and difficult to combat, because human traffickers use deception, manipulation, intimidation and threats to prey on and exploit those who are vulnerable. Victims are often coerced into prostitution, illicit drugs and other forms of trafficking. According to the organization Polaris, this has grown to become a multi-billion dollar criminal

industry, one that quietly strips nearly 25 million people of their freedom.

I'll be the first to acknowledge this is a subject that is difficult to discuss, but it is a scourge in our city, county, state and country, and it affects the lives of children and young adults. Believe it or not, the victimization begins early in life and it is imperative that we strengthen our schools and public institutions to recognize how to combat this problem.

To that end, the Orange County Department of Education teamed up with our partners at Vanguard University to participate in the "Ensure Justice 2019" conference. This two-day event was designed to equip teachers, parents, law enforcement personnel, students and community members with strategies to identify and protect those who are most at risk.

Prevention starts with shedding light on perpetrators and recognizing tell-tale signs in our communities. This may include evidence of malnourishment or abuse, withdrawal, drug abuse, and chronic absenteeism.

In Orange County, I believe we are well-positioned to prevent trafficking and the exploitation of children. In addition to working closely with the Orange County Sheriff's Department and other local law enforcement agencies, our educators are committed to addressing the social-emotional needs of all

Pregnancy Over 35

First birth rates for women aged 35-39 rose six-fold from 1973-2006, and more than doubled for women aged 40-44 from 1980-2012. With so many women giving birth later in life, it's important to know the possible risks.

Conception: Each woman is born with a set number of eggs and, as you age, both the number and the quality of them declines, and the eggs you have left may not be as easily fertilized.

Gestational Diabetes: Gestational diabetes occurs when glucose levels rise significantly during pregnancy, putting you at risk of having a very large baby with other health problems.

High Blood Pressure: High blood pressure can decrease the flow of blood to the placenta, which can lead to slow growth, low birth weight or preterm birth.


Preeclampsia: Preeclampsia occurs when a pregnant woman develops high blood pressure and has signs that some of her organs are not functioning properly.

Multiples: As you age, your chance of having twins or multiples increases. About 5% of births among women over 35 are twins, while almost 20% of women over 45 had multiples.

C-section: Approximately 42% of pregnant women aged 35-39 had C-sections, compared to just 28% of women between 20 and 24.

Premature: A baby is considered preterm when born before 37 weeks and they tend to have more health problems.

Women over 35 may or may not experience the above risks, but because of these risks, you should consider choosing a hospital that has a neonatal intensive care unit (NICU). Connect with an obstetrician early in the process, and follow their guidance for the best possible outcome.

Kids with Asthma Can Play and Excel in Sports

Exercise can be a common trigger for children with asthma. However, if asthma is controlled, student athletes can and should exercise normally. Most kids with asthma can successfully participate in sports with proper guidance.

Sensitive airways in the lungs along with a lot of mucus and spasms cause asthma — where the airways become narrow and restrict the flow of air.

Some children are affected by asthma only during physical activity, which is referred to as exercise-induced bronchoconstriction. This is frequently treated with a hand-held inhaler used only when needed to open the airways by quickly delivering medication, albuterol, to the lungs.

However, other kids have a more persistent condition that manifests outside of exercise, and they use inhalers delivering steroids on a regular, daily schedule.

Kids with asthma can stay healthy and excel in sports, but they need to take their medication, take it consistently and do it the right way. If parents are ever in doubt, they should follow their child's asthma action plan.

Parents often recognize asthma symptoms before their children do. When children are exercising, keep an eye out for these symptoms that may indicate an asthma flare up:

- Coughing
- Wheezing
- Having trouble taking a deep breath
- Tightness in the chest halfway, often described as feeling like someone sitting on the chest

Time It takes to Move Teeth

How do orthodontists move teeth, what is the best way to move teeth and how long will my treatment take? I get these questions all the time from patients when they come in and want to improve their smile. Moving teeth is a fairly simple biologic process – when a continuous force is placed on a tooth, it moves in the same direction as the force. How quickly teeth move doesn't depend upon how large the force is, but rather how quickly cells within the jaw bone remodel and change the bone surrounding

the teeth. The length of time for treatment depends upon how quickly the bone is remodeled and how far each tooth needs to move (longer distance to move = more time needed).

The best way to move teeth really depends on two factors: the complexity of the tooth movement and the skill/experience of the person performing the movements.

Of course moving teeth is the easy part because it really just involves putting constant pressure on teeth. However, knowing where to ideally move and position the teeth for the best esthetic and functional outcome, and knowing what movements are healthy movements are the most critical aspects of a patient's overall orthodontic treatment. In addition, regular monitoring the movements and making adjustments during orthodontic treatment is necessary to avoid any complications. So to ensure you achieve your absolute best smile, see and orthodontic specialist. They will go over all of your treatment options and all of the tools that could be used (clear aligners such as Invisalign, traditional braces, clear braces, self-ligating braces, and retainers).



Technology Journey

At Hawes Elementary School, thanks to the implementation of our district-wide Measure Q bond project, our classrooms are receiving a major upgrade to the 21st century! Our classrooms are filled with new technology: an interactive flat panel that connects to a touchscreen computer to visually display content/ media to our students, a touch space board that can register many hands on the display at once, and one-to-one devices for all students.

In addition, our classrooms are filled with new furniture. Our new furniture is on wheels—and, in our second-through fifthgrade classrooms, the student desks are topped with dry-erase surfaces.

These new technologies are now embedded into our daily instructional practices. Our students demonstrate proficiency as they research, think critically, create, innovate, collaborate and communicate. They can connect with experts in other parts of the world, plug in microscopes to bring the invisible to life, and access their work from devices outside of their classroom.

Students are developing their understanding of fluency through ST Math, Accelerated Reader, and ST Music. As our students' skills develop, we can see them researching, creating digital movies, publishing wikis, writing blogs, and researching explorers, missions, the life cycle of plants, bees, and more. They are learning to use applications appropriately to demonstrate their learning and to cite sources to support their arguments.

To help our students gain a better appreciation of the ethical issues surrounding the use of technology, our digital citizenship program, spearheaded by our librarian, begins in kindergarten and continues into fifth grade with monthly lessons focused on social media and internet safety.

Technology is embedded throughout our school, and we are excited to see where our students take us on this journey!



These academies are facilitated by our own Sowers teachers and staff who are able to draw greater connections with students' passions and social-emotional or academic needs in one a positive student-choice environment.

Learning a Second Language

Mesa View is proud to offer a rigorous and challenging Spanish curriculum. Many of our eighth-grade students participate in the year-long Spanish 1 elective which, if passed, means that they can begin Spanish 2 during their freshman year of high school. This eighth-grade elective gives students a head start on meeting the A-G college entrance requirements that high school students use as a guideline for their course schedules.

In Mesa View's Spanish 1 class, active participation is encouraged. Students regularly converse with partners so that

they can practice using new vocabulary and language concepts and develop their listening and speaking skills. They also use whiteboards to practice working in Spanish and use some creative freedom.

As part of Spanish 1, students are required to apply what they learn into various projects that they then present, in Spanish, to their peers. For example, some students have created cartoons in Spanish by creating computergenerated animations, while others use their own drawing skills. Picture book projects in all sizes, and in a variety of mediums, have also been created.

The students have also created weather reports on posters by using PowerPoint. Most recently, they have been working with partners to write scripts about the foods they eat for different meals and what they do to stay healthy. Most student-pairs present skits in front of the class, while other students have opted to create videos.

As our seventh-grade students are considering their elective choices for the next school year, I want to encourage them to take this opportunity to enroll in the year-long Spanish course. We are confident that students will enjoy being challenged and engaged by learning a second language.

They're performed by master musicians, including Peter Yarrow, whom some of you will remember from Peter, Paul and Mary.

"Come and Go with Me to That Land" is a New Orleans-jazz spiritual of hope; "Rainbow in Your Eyes" introduces colors to very young children and early English-language learners, and is a guaranteed earworm; "Little Fox," which is catchy as all get-out, is a bluegrass-fiddle mountain ballad about a fox whose dinner plans are foiled, albeit temporarily. "Funga Alafia" is a Nigerian song of welcome, sung in the Yoruba language by gospel vocalist Marcelle Davies Lashley, who was raised in New York by her native African parents.

Back to the Land tells listeners that every day must be Earth Day, both for the survival of the planet and harmony among everything on it.
