Ocean View's New Central Kitchen Serving Up Fresh & Healthy Food

The Ocean View School District recently opened a brand new 13,000 square foot Central Kitchen. The new facility provides the District the ability to produce fresh and healthy food on-site, from scratch, rather than relying on vendors to deliver pre-packaged product. Complete meal preparation and cooking for high quality breakfast and lunch items takes place in the kitchen with fresh fruits, vegetables, soups, sauces, dressings, bakery items, new entrées and more. But most importantly, our kitchen supports learning. Healthy eating is the foundation to proper nutrition and well-nourished students have higher test scores, increased school attendance, and improved

Strategic and thoughtful planning went into this impressive facility and an exciting feature of the kitchen are two new Blast Chillers, Food service staff can package freshly cooked products and then "flash-freeze" them in the Blast Chillers. This process locks in the flavor, taste and quality of each item without the need for preservatives. The kitchen also includes a programmable Combi Oven, 30-gallon tilt skillet, 60-gallon kettle, several hi-tech packaging machines, convection ovens and an intuitive, touch-screen hood ventilation system. In addition, a massive loading dock can accommodate up to three full-size semitrucks to deliver product directly through a large, automated sliding door.

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Is It a Cold or Allergies?

Your child's nose won't stop running and they're constantly sneezing. You may blame the common cold, but it could be a telltale sign of allergies, especially as seasons change. While colds and allergies share common symptoms, there are certain differences that may help you distinguish what your child is experiencing.

Allergies — Allergies occur when your child's immune system reacts to a foreign substance (allergen)—such as pollen or pet dander. Symptoms include:

Shortness of breath, wheezing, itchy, watery eyes, runny or congested nose, swollen sinuses, sneezing

The severity of allergies varies in children and can range from minor irritation to anaphylaxis — a potentially life-threatening allergic reaction to an allergen.

Common Cold — The common cold is caused by a virus, which Long Beach spreads through the air and close personal contact. Cold symptoms include: Sore throat, runny nose, coughing, sneezing, headaches, body aches and fever.

Telling the Difference — The difference is in a few key distinctions. Colds are more likely to cause sore throats, fever, headaches and body aches, while itchy, watery eyes are a classic sign of allergies.

Most people recover from a cold within 7-10 days whereas allergy symptoms continue with exposure to the allergen. Allergy symptoms also respond better to over-the-counter antihistamines.

The Children's Pulmonary Institute at MemorialCare Miller Children's & Women's Hospital Long Beach uses several types of allergy tests to identify allergens that may be causing your child's symptoms. It can then be decided what type of medications or treatments are needed. By identifying these allergens, changes can be made in your home to potentially improve your child's health.

Orthodontics Matters

Vaping and Oral Health


The negative correlation between cigarette smoking and oral health has been established and is well known, but it turns out vaping can also cause similar, irreversible damage to one's oral health. This damage may include death of gum tissue, gum disease and, in some cases, loss of teeth. As such the position of the American Dental Association and the American Association of Orthodontists is that vaping is not a safe alternative to cigarettes or other tobacco products.

Vaping simply means smoking an e-cigarette. We say vaping because, unlike traditional cigarettes where smoke is created by

burning the cigarette, e-cigarettes produce an aerosol, or vapor that delivers nicotine into the lungs. From an oral health perspective it is the nicotine that is the biggest problem for the oral cavity because nicotine reduces blood flow, which in turn affects your teeth and gums. Without enough blood flowing through your veins, your gums don't get the oxygen and nutrients they need to stay healthy. In this way, vaping causes the death of gum tissues, which in turn causes gum recession. Severely receding gums lead to tooth sensitivity, increased risk of cavities and, in some cases loss of teeth. Nicotine from e-cigarettes also reduces the saliva in your mouth. Lack of saliva leads to dry mouth, plaque buildup, increased bacteria, and ultimately tooth decay.

The aerosol produced by e-cigarettes contains the nicotine and also ultrafine particles of toxic chemicals and heavy metals - many of which are linked to cancer, respiratory disease, lung injury, and heart disease. It is a misconception to believe that e-cigarettes are healthier than tobacco cigarettes, or that vaping isn't bad for your teeth. The best advice I can give is simply don't try any form of smoking – why risk your smile?

Next Generation Science Standards

When California adopted the Next Generation Science Standards in 2013, the goal wasn't simply to generate more doctorates in chemistry, physics and biology.

The intent was to create a more scientifically literate society, where people better understand the world around them and are able to think critically to find solutions to everyday problems. The shift was also designed to ensure that U.S. students remain globally competitive in careers reliant on science, technology, engineering and math, or STEM.

Seven years later, these new standards are showing a lot of promise in a world transformed by technology. Still, plenty of work lies ahead.

If you're not familiar with the Next Generation Science Standards, they were developed by states in collaboration with the National Research Council, the National Science Teachers Association, the American Association for the Advancement of Science and other partners to map out the scientific knowledge and skills that all K-12 students should possess — and they differ quite a bit from their late '90s predecessors.

Rather than calling for lectures and step-by-step instructions to find the one "correct" answer, NGSS standards were written to inspire students to launch their own investigations and to develop scientific models to explain different phenomena.

For example, third-graders still study how plants start off as seeds, how animals in the forest adapt to their environment and how weather changes with the seasons. But NGSS dives deeper by empowering students to ask their own questions, analyze data, collaborate, take intellectual risks, defend their findings and communicate what they've learned.

Research shows students not only prefer to learn this way, they remember these lessons better and are more willing to embrace rigorous content. They're also more likely to pursue careers in STEM fields.

The Next Generation Science Standards also demonstrate the interconnectedness between subjects that were once taught in silos. Moreover, there are certain "cross-cutting concepts," such as patterns and the notion of cause and effect, that have applications across all domains. Cross-cutting concepts are in fact one of the three dimensions of science learning, along with disciplinary core ideas and science and engineering practices.

With a special emphasis on both environmental literacy and the application of technology, NGSS is engaging students of all abilities by nurturing their innate curiosity. It's rewarding work for both students and educators, but that doesn't mean it's been easy.

Science teachers in California have had to dramatically transform their lessons, and because NGSS leverages the interconnectedness of science, some have had to re-learn disciplines they haven't studied in years. For example, under the preferred integrated middle school model, a teacher who had been teaching eight-grade physical science for 15 years must integrate all of the disciplines, including physical, life, and Earth and space science.

Another challenge is that elementary schools in some districts extend to grade six, meaning they now have to bolster their science offerings to meet more rigorous sixth-grade science standards. Then there's the fact that changing any standards across multiple grade spans is a bit like remodeling an airplane mid-flight.

The Orange County Department of Education recognizes these obstacles and has an all-star team in place to address the needs of our local districts. Since the NGSS adoption, OCDE's staff of educational leaders has traveled to schools and districts across the county to lead trainings and offer resources. The department has also hosted NGSS workshops, along with a rollout event and a materials fair, at our campus in Costa Mesa.

Our work will evolve as we continue to track results from the new California Science Test, or CAST. First piloted in 2018, this assessment will give us a better idea of where we're at and how we can improve each year.

In California and throughout the country, science instruction is moving away from the old paradigm of telling students what to do and what to see. Students are instead engaged with more open ended questions like, "What do you see?" and "What can we do with that?"

Today, it's not just about knowing science. It's about living science, understating our place in the world, and embarking on the journey of curious discovery and problem-solving that will continue throughout our lives.

She passed the lit tree, the small train running around the snowman and all the gifts under the tree. These, in the past, were the items which captured her attention. But, not this year.

You see, a mere 14 weeks ago, she entered Kindergarten in our school district where she announced she "learned to read."

The Very Hungry Caterpillar, a story which I love to this day, sounded wonderful as she tracked the words with her finger, pointed to the colorful caterpillar on each page and commented on how silly he was to eat so much!

This scenario, I'm confident, it being replicated within the families of our Kindergarten students.

Parents, rarely, doubt that their newborn will learn to crawl, walk and talk. Natural development almost guarantees these milestones. Reading, however, is a different matter and is not inherent just because a child is born.

Reading is a high priority as our teachers focus on the skills necessary for students to become adept at reading. Our teachers possess a skill set that is supported by professional development utilizing scientific research on the process of learning to read. They do so with support from programs which are solid in laying a phonemic awareness foundation and building from there. They do so with the additional support of Teachers on Special Assignment and Reading Intervention Specialists for grades K-5. And, they parse on-going data to better guide their instruction.

Just as the very hungry caterpillar turned into a beautiful butterfly, our students are turning into successful readers!

ELA standards, are using the Fountas and Pinnell Benchmark

Assessment Systems, have trained in teacher workshop models. and have every student read 20 minutes every day. As educators. we know—and long-term studies have indicated—that students who were not proficient in reading by the end of third grade were four times more likely to drop out of high school than proficient readers. In fact, in one study, 88 percent of students who failed to earn a high school diploma were struggling readers in third grade.



This year at College View Elementary School, staff members have been focusing on providing practices and tools that support student growth in social-emotional awareness. Students are learning specific vocabulary focusing on emotions so they can more accurately speak to how they are feeling. Each morning upon entering class, students go to their Mood Meters and express their feelings. Teachers and peers can then use Restorative Practices to help students in need.



In teacher Chrisy Salvati's class, students are engaged in yoga meditations and breathing work to help clear their minds, calm down, sooth themselves, and even cool off. For example, students have learned breathing through the left nostril helps when they need to settle down after recess or calm down in general. Conversely, breathing through the right nostril is energizing. Students have also learned different hand and finger positions, otherwise known as mudras, which they can employ to activate their brains and set the appropriate mindset when needed.


January Fun

In order to foster communication, collaboration, critical thinking, and community, our project-based learning units are now highlighting environmental science. Why environmental science? According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, jobs in the environmental sector are expected to grow 12 percent in the next several years. This is faster growth than any other occupation.

Each grade level is focusing on one or more of the environmental principles and concepts that are outlined in the California Science Framework. 
Amazing Art Exhibit by our Special Education Students


lessons that are overlooked. Helping others via a structured volunteer program is a positive and safe way to develop oneself in this regard.
