Every 15 Minutes

Since 1998, the Fountain Valley Police Department has partnered with local high schools to present a program called "Every 15 Minutes." Targeting high school juniors and seniors. the program challenges them to think about the harmful effects of drinking and driving, personal safety, and the responsibility of making mature decisions. The program title reminds students that someone in the United States dies or is seriously injured every 15 minutes in an alcohol-related traffic collision.

Each year, the program rotates from Los Amigos High School to Fountain Valley High School every other year. Unfortunately,

this year's rainy weather forced a small change to the event. The collision was modified and livestreamed into classrooms for the student body. The twoday event is very dramatic and emotional. Beginning on day one, a simulated collision is staged in front of the high school. It begins with a prerecorded 9-1-1 call that triggers emergency responses by law enforcement, firefighters, paramedics, and the coroner. One the second day, the student participants return to school to attend a student body assembly to view the video of the previous day's events and share with their classmates what it felt like to die without being able to say good-bye.

During the "Every 15 Minutes" event, everyone involved is reminded that drinking and driving is not an accident, that these crashes and injuries are preventable. The Fountain Valley Police Department is very serious in working to eliminate deaths and injuries caused by drunk driving.

Drivers under 21 are subject to zero tolerance laws. Underage impaired drivers are subject to very strict penalties, such as license revocation, fines, and community service. It does not pay to drink and drive.



Stroke Can Occur at Any Age

Most people picture an adult when thinking about stroke. Sadly, this is not always the case. Strokes remain one of the top 10 causes of death in children. According to the National Stroke Association, stroke occurs in one in 4,000 live births. The risk of stroke from birth to age 18 is almost 11 in 100,000; though slightly more common in children under 2.

Risk Factors: Adult risk factors for stroke include high blood pressure, irregular heartbeat and/or a hardening of the arteries. Pediatric stroke risks are different, and include:

- Congenital heart defects Sickle-cell disease
- Abnormal blood clotting Head or neck trauma
- Maternal history of infertility
- Maternal infection in the fluid surrounding an unborn baby
- Pregnancy-related high blood pressure in the mother

Signs & Symptoms: Recognition of stroke is often delayed or missed in children. The most common signs and symptoms of stroke in newborns and infants are: • Seizures, including repetitive twitching of the face, arm or leg

- Apnea (pauses in breathing) associated with staring
- Extreme sleepiness A tendency to use only one side of their body

With children and teens, look for:

- Weakness or numbness of the face, arm or leg, usually on one side of the body
- Severe dizziness or loss of coordination
- Severe sudden headache, especially with vomiting and sleepiness
- Difficulty speaking or understanding others
- Vision loss or double vision
- New onset of seizures, usually on one side of the body

Don't Play With Toy Safety

According to the United States Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), there were an estimated 166,300 toy related injuries treated in U.S. hospital emergency departments, and seven reported fatalities of children 12 years of age or younger during 2016. Many toy related injuries and fatalities can be prevented by taking some precautionary steps when buying new toys for your child:

- Purchase age appropriate toys recommended by the manufacturer.
- Read and follow all warning labels, especially for electric toys.
- · Avoid toys with small parts that may become a choking hazard for younger children.
- Be cautious of toys with small batteries and magnets because they can cause serious harm if swallowed.
- Be aware of toys that may contain lead.
- Ensure that toys with movable parts do not trap or jam your child's finger.
- Be sure your child can breathe comfortably in toys they can enter, such as a tent.
- Register your toys to stay up to date with any recalls.

Orthodontics Matters

Does Invisalign really work?

With the esthetics and the convenience of Invisalign, I frequently have new patients come to the office specifically requesting Invisalign treatment. But, I also have many new patients convinced that Invisalign doesn't produce great results - they insist upon treatment with braces. So why are there such differing opinions about using clear aligners?

I find the difference between the two types of patients described **Dr. Andrew Harner** above is what they have seen and researched online and amongst their friends. In the cases that didn't work, what happened? There

are really only three reasons Invisalign doesn't work and none of them have to do with the aligners themselves, but rather the doctor and the patient:

(1) The movements that were planned by the doctor are biologically impossible. Most patients don't realize that Invisalign is manufactured based on what tooth movements the doctor prescribed and in turn what tooth movements the doctor thinks will happen. (2) The tooth movements were too complex or difficult for clear aligners to perform. In these cases, it is important to be in treatment with an orthodontist who can recognize this early on so partial braces or other strategies can be used for the few difficult teeth (see my prior article where I talked about combination braces/Invisalign cases). (3) The patient isn't compliant – to get the desired tooth movement with Invisalign, the patient really has to wear the aligners 21-22 hours per day. Quite simply, clear aligners should only be taken out of the mouth when eating, drinking, brushing and flossing.

So at the end of the day, if you are contemplating straightening your teeth and perfecting your smile, but you aren't sure how easy or difficult your case really is, do yourself a favor and see an orthodontic specialist.

For the last several years, school districts across the country have been using technology to improve the learning outcomes for students. In fact, recent national studies show that 31 percent of middle school and elementary students have access to a schoolissued device. At the onset of the technological movement, the push for more technology was simply about equal access and student engagement. However, as we have learned more about its effective uses and ability to truly impact achievement, the conversations have shifted from using technology to consume

information to using technology as a tool for creation and production. It's not good enough to simply have devices and ensure students are using them. Instead, students need to be creating more content...writing more, imagining more, collaborating more, and evaluating and analyzing more. In addition, we want students engaged in authentic and relevant research, as well as solving real-world problems.



In FVSD, students create more, are engaged in authentic and relevant research, and solve real-world problems all through technology.

In FVSD, I am proud to share how we are using technology to enhance and improve learning for all of our students. Currently, our schools have a ratio of one device for every 1.2 students. Furthermore, we are using these devices as a vehicle to allow students to write more, create more, collaborate more, and problem solve in new and thoughtful ways. Some of the primary resources we use include:

Google Classroom, Edulastic, Turnitin.com, and ST Math. These tools allow our students greater access to a world of discovery. For example, in our middle school English program, each teacher is equipped with a Chromebook cart that, when paired with programs like Turnitin.com, provides targeted support and increased levels of feedback for students, one of the strongest variables in learning. Moreover, integrating technology into the classroom nurtures increased student confidence and higher levels of engagement. And, building technology into lessons encourages our students to approach problems differently, which strengthens their critical thinking skills and provides a more personalized learning environment.

School Safety

There are many aspects to school safety. However, they all start with two common principles: planning and training. At Peterson Elementary School, the entire staff is trained on how to respond to any type of school emergency. Direct staff-development and practice drills are held on a regular basis. Staff and students become familiar with the procedures and appropriate responses to fire, earthquake, intruders, and natural and man-made disasters. The school follows the same protocols as first responders to ensure that staff and first responders are speaking in the same terms and responding in the same way. The protocols rely on the Incident

Command System, also known as ICS. ICS is a standardized approach to the command, control and coordination of emergency response, providing a common hierarchy within which responders from multiple agencies can be effective.

Research indicates that school staff will respond more successfully and ensure the safety of students to a higher degree when they practice these standardized responses many times throughout each school year. It is also important that students of all ages understand before an emergency occurs what to expect when a situation requires immediate response. Again, practice is key.

Parents play another important role in the response to emergency situations. Patience, although hard, is important to allow the school staff and first responders to ensure the safety of all students and staff before parentchild reunification can occur. Peterson Elementary works closely with the Huntington Beach Police Department through our school resource officer (SRO) to develop efficient methods for quick and easy parent-child reunification following an emergency situation. The school also uses many forms of parent communication from automated phone calls, Facebook and Twitter to inform parents when emergency drills are held and parent training opportunities are available, and provide updates on emergency situations at the school.

Our Marine View "Anchors"

Marine View Middle School staff members continue to focus on new ways to improve the school climate for our students, and reduce suspensions. We are seeing the positive results of our efforts, too. We have successfully reduced suspensions by nearly 85 percent, and are increasing connections with those students who may feel lonely during the school day.

In the spring of 2017, our sixth- and seventh-grade teachers chose students who were interested in helping others feel comfortable at school. After initial training with the Orange

County Human Relations Board and the Walk in My Shoes Conference at UCI, the students were then trained in understanding conflict resolution and different points of view.

As the 2017–2018 year started, Marine View was one of only 10 schools in Orange County selected for the Youth-Led Violence Prevention Campaign grant offered through the Orange County Department of Education. With this grant, they had further training on conflict resolution, and received funds to use towards team-building activities. Working with seventh-grade English teacher Amanda Wilkes and recently retired teacher Carolyn Lloyd, these student volunteers then agreed on a name for the group: The Mariner Anchors.

As the year took off, the Anchors students focused on connecting with new middle school students in grades six to eight. They had ice cream socials and sent them notes of connection. They also have a classroom open on Wednesdays and Fridays during lunch for the students to have a safe haven, play games, do homework, or just hang out.

A small group of Anchors students are currently working with the sixth-graders in their language arts classes on understanding different points of view. There are also offering team-building games for the sixth-graders at lunch. This spring our Anchors are working on our "Kindness Weeks" and continuing to connect with our students.

Plastic Footprints

"Egg"ineering

Each year our Anderson sixth-grade students participate in an engineering challenge called "The Egg Drop." In self-selected small groups, students design contraptions that will keep a raw egg safe when thrown off the top of a scissor lift.

Following the scientific process, the students first complete background research and plan their designs. They can use a variety of materials to keep the eggs safe, including balloons, parachutes, bubble wrap, boxes, and cylinders. They are also required to keep within a \$100 classroom budget for the supplies.

For example, balloons cost \$15 each, and cotton balls cost \$3 each. The students then test their contraptions and revise their designs.



In the final experiment, the principal and custodian throw the students' contraptions off the top of a scissor lift. Once they hit the ground, the studentexperimenters check to see if their eggs have survived. This year only three of the eggs exploded. Great job, sixth-graders!

Celebrating Student Success!

At a student-recognition assembly, students and parents learned about what it means to be an English learner and what

it takes to become fluent English proficient. In Westminster School District, there are 4,072 English learners. At DeMille, there are 360 English learners. We are very proud that 40 of these students were reclassified as fluent English proficient. Students were presented certificates of achievement and celebrated with a pizza party.

Rhyme Time

Land School, which serves nearly 300 preschool children, is getting kids ready to read! The early years are the best time to lay a foundation for strong reading skills. This process starts with developing phonemic awareness, the ability to hear the individual sounds that make up words. Once students have developed this understanding, they begin manipulating the phonemes to learn how the meanings of words change as their sounds change. In preschool, that comes in the form of rhyming and word games.

Helping preschoolers understand these

concepts works best when they physically respond to the sounds they are hearing. Teachers set up learning activities such as tapping sticks to isolate the sounds within words, rolling a ball between students in a circle as they identify words that rhyme, singing rhyming songs with specific gestures to



show the different meanings of similar sounding words, and using rhyming chants with student names to personalize their understanding.

At Land School, as a rule, we think rhyming is cool!



Brooding YA Hero: How to Become a Main Character (Almost) as Awesome as Me




