

Preparing Your Child for Kindergarten

Going to elementary school for the first time can be a big change in a child's life. It is only natural that a child may be anxious or concerned about starting this journey in their life. In order to do this with success, a child must be able to:

- Make the shift from dependency upon parents and the home to dependency upon peers and other adults. This means that the kindergartener must allow other people to meet many of their needs and to relate to them in a meaningful manner. How easily this task is mastered depends in large measure upon how secure and trusting his early relationships have been and how supportive parents have been about this new venture.
- Manage separation anxiety. For most children this is accomplished with a minimum of anxiety or distress. For others, however, the threat of the loss of mother or father is terribly frightening and extremely stressful. Separation anxiety is one of the most painful experiences a child and parents can have.
- Learn to accept the authority of other adults, namely the teacher, principal and other support personnel in the school. This acceptance is made easier if the child has had a healthy dose of basic trust through his or her early relationships with other adults.

The parents' responsibility to support their child to deal effectively with this new school experience by:

- Treating going to school as part of the normal course of events. Don't give the impression that there is any choice about whether to attend school or not. Children will often say "I'm not going." Or "They can't make me." Respond to these types of comments calmly and reassuringly. Let your child know that you understand their concerns about this new situation, but that you know that they will be able to handle it-and that all children have to go to school.
- Not allowing older children to frighten or tease the younger child with tales of how awful school is. If necessary, speak with older children privately about their responsibility in helping the younger child go to school without fear. Try to make the older children your allies.
- Answering all questions honestly about school and what to expect. Tell your child the length of time at school, the days they will attend, how they will get back and forth to school. A child may be anxious and knowing these details will help them handle the stress involved. Working parents should make sure the child knows the arrangements for before and after school care.

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Dulling the Pain of a Headache

Nearly two out of three children will have a headache by age 15. Headaches are one of the most common reasons for pain, missed school days and visits to the doctor. During a headache, your child may experience a dull pain around the front, top, back and sides of their head.

Headaches in kids can be either "primary," such as a migraine, or "secondary" to an exhaustive list of conditions that could be as simple as a nasal sinus infection or as serious as a brain tumor. A detailed history and examination is critical to differentiate different headaches.

While it's not possible to prevent all headaches, making sure your child avoids identified triggers, stays well hydrated, maintains a well-balanced diet and keeps a regular sleep schedule will help reduce their frequency and severity and also will optimize the response to other treatments, if needed.

Migraine headaches in particular can be triggered by a variety of factors, including:

- Dehydration
- Irregular eating
- Inadequate physical activity and exercise
- Poor sleep hygiene or habits
- Emotional problems, such as a big life change like social and family problems
- School-related stress (whether academic, sports-related or personal problems)
- Weather changes
- Certain foods, drinks and odors



If your child continues to experience recurrent and worsening headaches or pain in the head area that is not responding to the usual measures directed by your primary care physician, your child may be suffering from a primary headache such as a migraine, or from one of the secondary headaches.

The National Safety Council recommends every family have an emergency plan in place in the event of a natural disaster or other catastrophic event. Spring is a great time to review that plan with family members to make sure they know what to do.

The FEMA website has a guide for creating a family emergency plan <https://www.fema.gov/media-library-data/20130726-1802-25045-8711/familyemergencyplan.pdf> Additionally, FEMA advises an emergency kit should include one gallon per day of water for each person, at least a three-day supply of food, flashlight and batteries, first aid kit, filter mask, plastic sheeting and duct tape, and medicines. 
Amazing Graphic Novel

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Gamification

I recently viewed a video by Yu-kai Chou, a specialist in the theories of gamification. The basic idea of gamification is how to take something most people view as dreary or dull and make it fun by adding elements of gaming. Seek out his videos and website by searching his name above and “gamification” for more information. Below is a synopsis of the main motivations he has described. When designing curriculum or working with a student to complete homework, you can start with a motivation that you think would be successful, and try to design elements of it into your approach, and perhaps have more success.

Here are the 8 Core Drives, as he describes them. 1) Epic meaning and calling : You believe you are participating in something greater than yourself or have been “chosen” to take the action. 2) Development and accomplishment : You strive to make progress, develop skills, and achieve mastery. 3) Empowerment of creativity and feedback : You are engaged in a creative process where you repeatedly figure new things out and try different combinations. 4) Ownership and possession : You are motivated by the feeling of owning or controlling something. The fact that you have feelings of ownership makes you value it more. 5) Social influence and relatedness : You are motivated by the desire to belong. This incorporates all the social elements that motivate people, including mentorship, social acceptance, companionship, and even competition and envy. 6) Scarcity and impatience : You want something because it is extremely rare, exclusive, or immediately unattainable. 7) Unpredictability and curiosity : You are constantly engaged because you don't know what will happen next. 8) Loss and avoidance : You avoid something negative from happening.

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
